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## Galveston District Corps of Engineers recognized for contract awards to disabled vets

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Galveston District was recently recognized for its achievement in awarding government contracts to service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses. The Galveston District awarded more than \$9 million to service-disabled veteran-owned firms in Fiscal Year 2007. This amount was 5.4 percent of the District's contract awards for the year, and exceeded the goal of 1.5 percent for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as well as the 3 percent goal set for all Federal Agencies.
