

About the

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA)

One of the LARGEST Federal departments in the executive branch of government

With responsibility for 17 separate agencies, USDA is 1 of the biggest departments in the whole Federal Government. The Secretary of Agriculture reports directly to, and advises the President on, agricultural issues and policies.




In 1862, when President

Lincoln's day, 48 percent
of Americans were farmers,
and they needed good
seeds and information to
grow their crops. Today,
USDA continues Lincoln's
legacy by serving all Americans.

INTRODUCTION TO THE ANIMAL AND PLANT HEALTH INSPECTION SERVICE (APHIS)

APHIS is a Federal agency within USDA. APHIS exists to protect agricultural crops from foreign pests and diseases. APHIS is like a big umbrella: it protects crops from animal and plant pests and diseases that could limit production and damage export markets. APHIS also guards against agricultural bioterrorism, promotes the humane treatment of animals, monitors invasive species and diseases of wildlife and livestock, and works to minimize conflicts between humans and wildlife.



APHIS' PRIMARY MISSION IS ...

... to protect U.S. agriculture from diseases and pests, many of which are species that come here from abroad. These invasive species are plants, animals, or disease pathogens that, once established, are difficult to get rid of and cause economic or environmental harm. Most invasive species come here in connection with human actions like travel and trade. Controlling invasive species is a tough job that requires the cooperation of all three levels of government-Federal, State, and local. Exclusion (preventing the entry) of invasives is the most effective means of protecting America against them. With its State and local partners, APHIS is currently working to control or eradicate several invasive species across the country, including giant African snails and giant hogweed.
