

### You are valuable to us.

The value of the work that volunteers do is immeasurable. Corps volunteers serve as campground hosts, staff visitor centers, conduct interpretive programs, assist maintenance personnel, restore fish and wildlife habitat, and maintain park trails.

Nationwide during 2006, nearly 53,000 volunteers contributed over 1.3 million hours of work with an estimated value of \$23.7 million.

In 2007 at Berlin Lake, 423 volunteers contributed 4643 hours at an estimated value of \$87,150.00
