Adopted Changes to the Remanufactured and Repaired Device Definition

The NCWM modified the definition of "manufactured device" and adopted new definitions of "remanufactured and repaired device and element" that will appear in the 2002 edition of NIST Handbook 44. A corresponding new marking requirement that applies to remanufactured devices was also adopted. The definitions will also be included in NIST Handbook 130 and NCWM Publication 14.

Tables of examples developed by the Remanufactured Device Task Force that provide guidance about whether a option to select cars with or without internal device is remanufactured or repaired, requires equipment such as GPS.
