SHORTCOURSE NEED/OBJECTIVES: This course seeks to increase expertise in resolving ethical issues in the clinical setting. The course seeks to accomplish three objectives: (1) Assist caregivers in identifying, analyzing

and resolving ethical dilemmas -- in the hospital and on the battlefield -- applying current training in bioethics and related law; (2) Identify roles, functions and key issues in ethics consultation; and (3) Evaluate hospital ethics programs using current medical ethics guidelines.

WHO MAY ATTEND? All military and DoD civilian medical professionals (physicians, nurses, chaplains, social workers, administrators, dieticians, medics, etc.) and students. Contractors with supervisor approval.

COST? The Medical Ethics Short Course is offered free of charge.

CME, CEU, CE CONTACT HOUR ACCREDITATION: The Medical Ethics Short Course features 28 total training hours of classroom instruction. One hour of classroom instruction equals:

- -- 1 CME for physicians
- -- 1 CEU for social workers
- -- 1 CE for psychologists (note: the total number of authorized CEs for psychologists will vary)
- -- 1 Contact Hour for nurses
- -- Those who attend the entire 3-day course will receive 20 CMEs, CEs, CEUs, or Contact Hours.
