That position at Mark Twain Lake, working for the St. Louis District in the spring of '97, proved to be the starting point for the Mizzou alumni who walked into the job, while she was earning a bachelor of science in Parks, Recreation and Tourism from the University of Missouri – Columbia. Since her days at Mark Twain Lake, Deeds has accom-

plished a lot and continues to be involved in a diverse amount of activities at Saylorville Lake, where she has worked since early summer 2003.

"Until I got married, I loved the mobility of a federal job," said Deeds. "Now, I would have to say that the Corps of Engineers interpretation program gives me the flexibility to try new things," said

> Deeds. "This year, we planned lots of mini-events and programs for the public to find out what will work for our audience. I like the idea that it's okay to try new things."

Deeds enjoys the diversity of her job, but there are certain aspects she likes more than others.

"I would have to say that my favorite part of the job is giving programs," said Deeds. "It doesn't really matter who the audience is or the topic. I get excited about helping people understand and learn to interact with the outdoors."

Deeds is married, has a 5year-old stepson, and enjoys their year-old lab mix that she

says, "eats everything." As for hobbies, she said they vary from month to month.

"I'm currently into sewing, reading and playing the piano," said Deeds. "I'm learning to rollerblade, but I haven't figured out how to stop safely – yet. Camping season is here, and this year I hope to go at least once a month."

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

FY06 Budget, Funding, and Summertime Safety

L's good to be back after my three week "secret mission" in Washington, DC. For those who are interested, I can talk about what I did in about three months. You may be somewhat underwhelmed when I do!

Recently, I had the opportunity to watch our great work crews install the miter gates at Lock 15. The repair work looks remarkable, and I was extremely impressed by our professionalism during the installation. Congratulations to all involved on a job well done!

As I reported to you in February, the president released the budget for Fiscal Year 2006. The House of Representatives reviewed this budget and passed our appropriations (funding) bill on May 24. In the House version, the Corps of Engineers' funding is higher than the President's Budget. For the District, in summary, the House bill includes: 1. Operations and Maintenance funding that approximates what was in the President's Budget; 2. Construction General funding that is higher than the President's Budget with the Environmental Management Program fully funded (this is unusual) and sufficient funding to keep the rehabilitations at Locks 11 and 19 on track; 3. General Investigations funding that is higher than the President's Budget, but still omitted funding requests for seven of the District's ongoing GI studies; and 4. The navigation improvements and ecosystem restoration projects from the Navigation Study are not funded.

Of course, the Senate must still take action on their version of our appropriation. Since they have yet to do so, I believe that it is very likely we will operate under a continuing resolution authority at the beginning of the next fiscal year. Once the Senate passes our appropriation, the Senate and the House must resolve conflicts before the bill can go to the president for signature (or veto).

Until the president signs our appropriation bill into law, we won't know our actual funding levels and the associated impacts. Of greatest concern is funding for O&M. If the final funding level is consistent with what was in the President's Budget and House bill, which is not sufficient to maintain the current level of service, then we are really going to need to work as a team to overcome this challenge. We are presently working with Division and Headquarters to get appropriate levels of funding for the projects to avoid problems in the out years. And, as I said before, I am committed to taking care of our people when the time comes to deal with these impacts and challenges.

The Senate is working on our authorization bill, the Water

Resources Development Act. Our governing committee sent the bill to the full Senate, which has yet to vote on it. The version to be considered by the full Senate includes construction authorization as recommended in the Navigation Study. The House has not begun work on their version of WRDA.

The bottom line is that it is still too early to draw any conclusions about the District's funding level for next year or predict if we will have a WRDA bill and, if we do, whether or not the Navigation Study recommendations will be



authorized. But, I think it is important for you to be informed.

Finally, I must sadly report that an employee from J.F. Brennan, the contractor for the Mud Lake Environmental Management Program project, died May 12, while traveling to the job site by boat. Even though this very unfortunate event is still under investigation, it serves as a stark reminder of just how dangerous it can get on the water.

So, as we enter summer, I would urge you to be particularly safety conscious, especially when around the beautiful lakes and rivers throughout the District. Ensure you have adequate flotation devices when appropriate ... and use them. For more summer safety tips see <u>www.wramc.amedd.army.mil/safety/</u><u>safetip.htm</u>.

I'm looking forward to Corps Day and hope to see you there. A lot of people are working hard to make this a good time.

Ríver Rubbísh Rendezvous A Success

Rangers from the Muscatine Ranger Office coodinated the fourth annual River Rubbish Rendezvous held on Earth Day April 22.

About 40 volunteers, mostly young adults, participated in the event held west of Andalusia, Ill., which featured the participants carrying garbage bags and gloves, while others pushed wheelbarrows full of dirt and woodchips to bushes alongside the Andalusia Slough Recreation Area.

Members of four different organizations particpated: the Illinois City Methodist Church Youth Group, Venture Crew #4127, Boy Scout Troop #444, and the Red Cross Club from Sherrard High School, they picked up trash and mulched plantings.

At 9:30 a.m., with winds gusting at 20 to 30 mph, the workers were cold. By afternoon, the sun had given them a little warmth. Jim Homann, park ranger, Muscatine Ranger Office, said this year's turnout was the best yet. "We've gotten a huge amount of work done," Homann said. "It's more volunteers than expected. "Despite the cool weather, they came out. This park doesn't seem to get the attention. It's a nice area. The Andalusia Slough is a popular boating area in the summer."

During the three-hour event more than 3/4 of the length of the park was walked and trash picked up from the shoreline, wooded areas, and highway shoulder filling a six-cubic-yard dumpster. Also, five tires were picked up and the bushes in the day-use area were weeded and mulched for the first time in about four years.

Two area media affiliates covered the event.

LOCK 15'S ORIGINAL GATES REPLACED

The District's Mississippi River Maintenance Crew removed the spare set of lower miter gates from the main lock at Lock 15 on May 24 and 26, and installed the original renovated set of miter gates.

Renovation of the original set of miter gates took place at the Mississippi River Project Office and began shortly after they were removed from Lock 15 last August. Prior to their removal, the District's dive inspection team discovered serious structural damage to the lower portion of the gates requiring immediate removal and replacement.

The spare gates' removal and the installation of the renovated original gates had minimal impact on river traffic at Lock 15, as it was only closed to traffic on May 24 and 26, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Lock 15's auxiliary lock remains closed until further notice due to structural damage to the lock's upper and lower gates.



Duncan earned the award for her actions as contracting officer on the 2004 Illinois Waterway maintenance dredging solicitation. In a situation that was unprecedented for the District, protests were filed on this solicitation in all three possible venues – the Corps of Engineers, the Government Accountability Office, and the U.S. Court of Federal Claims. Each protest alleged that the government had mishandled and/or improperly evaluated bids and presented unique legal arguments for which there was no clear controlling precedent.

Duncan worked closely with agency counsel and her efforts were indispensable in the government's successful defense of the protests. By her efforts, Duncan promoted a greater respect for, and a better understanding and appreciation of our legal system, key requirements for an individual to qualify for the award.

fter all was said and done, 15 volunteers collected more than 300 pounds of trash in more than 30 garbage bags as a part of the District's sixth annual river cleanup.



District employees and their family members, participated in the event held May 21 at Locks and Dam 14. They collected trash and debris from our river miles adopted through the Adopta-Mississippi-River-Mile Program.

The District adopted river miles 493-495. The locations cleaned include the areas around Locks and Dam 14 and Smith's Island.

The cleanup also took place during National River Cleanup Week, a nationwide effort that traditionally occurs during the second or third week of May each year.

Steve Vacek, Mississippi River Project Office, once again helped to coordinate the District's cleanup and said this year's event was successful.

"This was the first year the District targeted the nature trail and the 'house' for a large scale cleanup," said Vacek. "The majority of items came from the house located by Smith's Island trail. There were a number of layers of trash there."

> The Adopt-a-Mile Program is an important part of the Mississippi River Beautification and Restoration Project. Schools, organizations, companies, and families have adopted shoreline miles since the program started in 1999. There are no fees involved in adopting shoreline miles, only a voluntary commitment to stewardship. Chad Pregracke, coordinator of the MRBRP, estimates that by the end of the project more than 100 groups will be adopting Mississippi River miles.

The MRBRP was founded in 1997 with the objective of cleaning up the Mississippi River. In addition to cleaning the shoreline, the project's mission is to involve as many people as possible in the hands-on project.

Army Awards District Employee For Life-Saving Effort

David Purdy, lock operator, Lock and Dam 17, was presented the Secretary of the Army Award for Valor at an award ceremony held at the Pentagon on May 9.



Purdy earned the award

for aiding in the recovery of a deckhand who had fallen from a barge at Locks and Dam 15 on July 7. He did not hesitate to risk his own life in an attempt to rescue the individual who had fallen into the turbulent waters of the Mississippi River.

Purdy placed his own life in jeopardy when he climbed down a lock-wall ladder to assist two barge deckhands in pulling a fallen man onto a barge deck.

Upon retrieval, the man was unconscious with a deep gash in his forehead and displayed little to no signs of life. Purdy immediately began CPR in a confined area on the barge deck. He diligently continued resuscitation efforts until the Rock Island Arsenal Fire and Emergency Services Division, Directorate of Force Protection, arrived and assumed the CPR process. He was then immediately transported to a local hospital, where he was pronounced dead by the Rock Island County Coroner.

In this particular instance, the victim did not survive, however, it was not due to the lack of effort and diligence on Purdy's part. He demonstrated a great concern for the safety and wellbeing of another, without any regard to his own personal safety or his future.

The Secretary of the Army Award for Valor was established by the Army's

Institute of Heraldry to acknowledge civilian employees and private citizens who perform an act of heroism or sacrifice, with voluntary risk of personal safety in the face of danger either on or off the job.

Purdy is an Army veteran with more than 20 years of active-duty service. He started working for the Corps in May 2002.
