Banding Together: School Bands as Instruments of Opportunity
September 11, 2006 through May 14, 2007

This exhibition presents a century and a half of the history, community impact and support of instrumental music education in Washington, D.C., public schools from the 1880s to 2006. Special emphasis is placed on the story of the development of junior and senior high school cadet (military) bands and their evolution into the popular marching and show bands of today. "Banding Together" explores the challenges and benefits of band membership and examines the state of public school band programs today. Band uniforms, historic photographs, instruments, and recordings are among the items telling the story of this significant community tradition.
