

Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) for 2006

Livestock producers who had land located in Kane County, who suffered forage losses due to drought in 2006 may be eligible for benefits under this program.

Livestock producers in both Garfield and Kane Counties, who suffered forage losses due to flooding in 2005, may be eligible for benefits under this program.

Eligible livestock include beef cattle, equine, elk, sheep and goats. To be eligible, livestock must have been located in an eligible county on January 1, 2006, and must have been maintained for commercial use as part of a farming operation.

Please provide our office with the following information when you come in to apply:

- Animal numbers on January 1, 2006.
- Producers who run on BLM, Forest Service or State Lands must bring in their billing statements for 2006 so that we can determine how many AUM's you paid for during the 2006 grazing season.

Note: Animal numbers need to be very accurate. If you are selected for spotcheck and are currently running fewer animals than certified to in 2006, you will be required to provide sales documentation/or other documentation showing what happened to the animals.

COC Elections

Upcoming County Committee Elections will be held for Area 2, Antimony, Tropic, Cannonville, and Henrieville, and Area 5, Kanab, will be mailed out to eligible voters in these 2 areas on November 2, 2007. Ballots must be returned to the county office by December 3, 2007.

Crop Disaster Program 2005-2007 CDP

Farmers who suffered crop losses because of natural disasters may be eligible to receive benefits through the new Crop Disaster Program (CDP).

You may be eligible if you suffered losses from natural disasters that occurred in 2005, 2006 or to 2007 crops that were planted before February 28, 2007. Producers must have suffered losses in excess of 35 percent of their expected production to qualify.

Note: Only producers who obtained crop insurance coverage or coverage under the Non Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for the year of the loss will be eligible for CDP benefits.

Producers who incurred qualifying losses in 2005, 2006 or 2007 must choose only one year for which to receive benefits. They may receive benefits for multiple crop losses if all were in the same crop year.

Eligible damaging conditions would include drought, excessive moisture, hail, excessive wind and freeze.

NAP Deadline

The NAP (Non Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program) can soften financial losses caused by natural disasters, but only if you have applied for coverage and paid the application fee.

NAP provides coverage on crops in the county that are non-insurable. NAP fees are \$100 per crop, not to exceed \$300 per producer, per county.

<u>December 1, 2007</u> is the final day to sign up for coverage on perennial crops for the 2008 crop year. This would include hay and grazed forage (pasture and rangeland).

Note: All livestock producers should buy the \$100 coverage on their pasture and rangeland each year. This is a small fee for coverage that can pay large returns during the drought years.

NAP NOTICE OF LOSS

Just like filing a claim, producers who have a NAP contract on file with this office need to file a Notice of Loss when it becomes apparent that a covered crop or pasture has been damaged by drought, frost, insects, etc. This Notice of Loss should be filed within 15 days of when the damage is apparent-no matter how significant the loss may seem at the time.

Additionally, you will need to submit production evidence to the FSA Office for your crops, even if you did not have a loss on your covered crops. This is required to establish an APH (actual production history) for each year. This is used to calculate your production yield, and consequently, will effect your nap payment now and in the future.

Emergency Loans Available

Garfield and Kane Counties have been declared a disaster area by Governor Huntsman. The disasters were due to the following conditions; severe drought, insect infestations, killing frosts, hot dry winds, below normal runoff, wildfires and flash floods. This makes producers eligible for Emergency Loans and Disaster Set-Aside programs. If you have suffered a 30% below normal production yield, you may be eligible for an Emergency Loan, this is a 3.75% low interest loan, or if you are unable by the end of the year to pay all of your family living and operating expenses as well as all debts, you may be eligible for the set-aside program, this is where all or part of your FSA debts can be delayed this year or next year. The deadline for accepting applications is April 21, 2008. You will need to try and get financing from your bank first before you come to FSA for the loan.

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2007 Compliance Activities

County Office performs a variety of compliance reviews and spot checks to ensure the accuracy of payments and integrity of administered programs. Currently, these compliance reviews and spot checks are selected through a variety of processes.

Instead of selecting individual farms, contracts, loans, LDP's etc. for spot check and review, a nationwide selection of producers for 2007 has been made using a statistical sampling method. Produces were selected based on their participation in CRP, DCP, LDP, marketing assistance loans, (MAL's) and NAP.

For 2007, producers selected through the selection process will be spot checked or reviewed for:

- Compliance with all programs in which they participated or received benefits.
- Accuracy of all of their FSA-578's (acreage report)

In many cases, this will mean that the same producer will be spot checked and reviewed in multiple states and counties. The reviews will take place throughout the year at times applicable for the certain program or activity.

The following is a list of programs that will be included in this review process:

Crop Disaster Programs CRP
HELC/WC compliance DCP
2005 Hurricane TAP FSA-578
LDP's/MAL's NAP

Example: If a selected producer is participating in DCP for 2007, compliance with DCP provisions and anything associated with eligibility for DCP will be reviewed in all counties in which the producer is a program participant for 2007. The accuracy of the information on all FSA-578's associated with the producer will be determined by measuring the acreage) on all farms.

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
