SESSION 03-07 OF ALTERNATE REPRESENTATIVES

SUMMARY RECORD

The Commission for Environmental Cooperation (CEC) Council, represented by its Alternate Representatives, met via conference call on 19 December 2003. Mr. José Manuel Bulás (Mexico) chaired the meeting. Ms. Norine Smith and Mr. Jerry Clifford represented Canada and the United States, respectively. Mr. Gustavo Alanís-Ortega and Donna Tingley represented the Joint Public Advisory Committee (JPAC). Mr. William Kennedy, CEC Executive Director, represented the Secretariat. Ms. Julie-Anne Bellefleur, Council Secretary, acted as secretary for the session. Other officials of the Parties and the Secretariat were also in attendance.

Item 1 Adoption of the Agenda

The Alternate Representatives adopted the agenda based on the provisional agenda (Annex A).

Item 2 Report by the Executive Director

In the interest of time, the Executive Director limited his report to introductory remarks for the discussion on the 2004-06 Operational Plan. He expressed some concerns relating to proposed changes under Objectives A and B of Goal 3. Referring to the precarious situation of the North American Fund for Environmental Cooperation (NAFEC), he cited an extract of the June 2000 Report on the Internal Review of NAFEC, which suggested that an adequate level of funding for maintaining the integrity and efficiency of the fund was estimated at a minimum of US\$1,000,000. The report also suggested that an alternative—in the absence of adequate funding—would consist of replacing NAFEC with a more strategic program targeted at the community level.

Item 3 Report by JPAC Chair

The JPAC Chair provided an update on the JPAC meetings held on 4-5 December in Miami. He indicated that JPAC had submitted its advice on Articles 14 and 15 (limiting the scope of factual records and review of the operation of Council Resolution 00-09) and would soon be submitting advice on invasive species He informed the Alternate Representatives of JPAC's decision—following a private meeting with members of the Ten-year Review and Assessment Committee (TRAC)—to postpone any decision relating to the conduct of a self-evaluation until the TRAC report has been published, so as to avoid the duplication of efforts. JPAC also suggested to the TRAC that a public meeting be organized on the margins of the June 2004 Council Session in order to present the findings of the TRAC's report. Referring to JPAC's recent letter relating to the importance of improving communications and of making the best use of the Council and JPAC's time when they meet in June 2004, he suggested that this issue be discussed with the Alternate Representatives at their joint meeting in March 2004 in Oaxaca.

Item 4 2004–06 Operational Plan

Final version -1- 1711/03-07/038 (30-03-04)

The Alternate Representatives reached general agreement on the 2004-06 Operational Plan and budget, as per the attached 2004 budget reconciliation (Annex B), pending further discussion of the following issues by the General Standing Committee (GSC) in early January:

Goal 1, Objective B: Trade officials and the public understand the environmental effects of liberalized trade and use that understanding to inform new agreements

• Contingent on review by Canada and Mexico of the United States proposal related to Strategies 1 and 2.

Goal 3, Objective A: Conserve North America's biodiversity and use it sustainably

- Subject to review and discussion of the United States proposal related to structuring and content of this Objective and to the integration of all biodiversity related work under Objective A.
- Proposed budget to be reviewed taking into account that additional savings identified by the Secretariat may be achieved as a result of the new travel policy for government representatives.

Goal 3, Objective B: Ensure North American environmental, economic and trade policies are mutually supportive

- Strategy 1 (renewable energy): Pending further discussion of the Secretariat's reformulation of related projects and corresponding budget.
- Strategy 2 (environmental labeling) and Strategy 3 (disclosure of environmental information): Contingent on review by Canada and Mexico of revised language proposed by the United States.

Article 13 report (Maize and Biodiversity)

• The United States suggested that the level of funding for the Article 13 report on Maize and Biodiversity be revisited in order to determine whether further savings can be achieved under this initiative.

The Alternate Representatives agreed on the importance of staffing the two vacant positions within the Pollutants and Health program in support of the Sound Management of Chemicals, Pollutant Release and Transfer Register and Children's Health and the Environment projects.

Finally, it was noted that in spite of concerted efforts to identify additional savings in support of the NAFEC, the amount of funds available for this initiative was well below the threshold amount deemed appropriate for maintaining the efficiency of the fund. The Parties and JPAC therefore agreed with the Secretariat's suggestion to work with JPAC in developing a proposal for the implementation of a capacity development initiative. Funding for this initiative will be supplemented by the amount of funds available once the 2004-06 Operational Plan and 2004 budget is finalized.

Item 5 2004 Council Session

As host of the Eleventh Regular Session of the Council, Mexico proposed some dates for a June 2004 session. As the proposed dates conflicted with other commitments of the Canadian and United States Council members, Mexico undertook to propose a new set of dates for a June meeting during the first week of January. The venue will be determined upon confirmation of a date for the session.

Item 6 Other Issues

No other issues were discussed.

Item 7 Next Session of Alternate Representatives

The Alternate Representatives will meet via conference call in January 2004 in order to finalize the 2004-06 Operational Plan, should this be necessary following discussions at the GSC level. They will also meet in March 2004 in Oaxaca, Mexico, in conjunction with the Symposium on Maize and Biodiversity and the JPAC meeting.

Item 8 Closure of the Session

Before closing the session, the Alternate Representatives thanked Gustavo Alanís-Ortega for his valuable advice and participation in Council sessions during his tenure as JPAC Chair over the past year.
