PANEL DISCUSSION: EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION AND QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

The focus of this panel discussion will be to explain the laws of Mexico, the USA and Canada with respect to the exchange and the protection of information, including confidential business and government information. These laws are the *Access to Information Act* (Canada), the *Freedom of Information Act* (USA) and the *Information Access Law* (Mexico). The panelists will discuss what information is required for law enforcement purposes what information can be exchanged. They will also discuss legal restrictions on the exchange of such information. By confidential business information, we refer:

• trade secrets of a third party;

• financial, commercial, scientific or technical information that is confidential information supplied to a government institution by a third party and is treated consistently in a confidential manner by the third party;

- information the disclosure of which could reasonably be expected to result in material financial loss or gain to, or could reasonably be expected to prejudice the competitive position of, a third party;
- and, information the disclosure of which could reasonably be expected to interfere with contractual or other negotiations of a third party.

We also refer to trade secrets or financial, commercial, scientific or technical information that belongs to a private party, the Governments of Mexico, the USA, and Canada, or to a government institution and has substantial value or is reasonably likely to have substantial value.

Environmental protection investigators will go to a group that will focus on an environmental case. Wildlife investigators will go to a group that will focus on a wildlife case. The scenarios will involve Mexico-US environmental protection law enforcement issues, US-Canada environmental protection law enforcement issues, and Mexico-US-Canada wildlife protection law enforcement issues.
