### Canadian Forest Products: An economic cornerstone

Forest Products Association of Cenada forestiers du Cenada

- 3% of GDP
- Economic engine of 350 communities
- Employ ~ 1 million Canadians
- Average annual compensation: \$70,000
- Over 150 pulp and paper facilities
- Over 1000 wood products facilities

## Aggressive Action: Overall Environmental Performance



# Since 1990:

- •\$8 billion on environmental improvements
- •28% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions
  - 1600 MW of renewable energy generation
- Virtual elimination of dioxins and furans
- Doubling of recycling
- Halving of particulate emissions

## A Forestry Leader: Forestry Practices



- Canada is global leader in third-party certification
- Condition of FPAC membership
- More hectares certified than any other country
- No net change in forest cover
- More protected wilderness areas

Pulp and Paper

- Mature industry
- Large, integrated and consolidated
- Highly regulated

#### Lumber

- Mature
- Small and large
- Limited regulations

- Newer industry
- Regulated

# NPRI Reporting Challenges



- Diversity (size, technology, emission profiles, etc)
- Data accuracy and consistency challenges
  - Limited expertise, variations in methodologies, credibility in approach
  - Species variability between Canada and the U.S.
  - Caution with public reporting
- Increasing complexity and overall expansion of the NPRI substances
  - Prioritization necessary, unable to 'keep pace' with all changes
- Potential for poor government decision-making based upon poor NPRI data quality
- Concerns with relevancy to our communities

# Addressing NPRI



- Engaged stakeholder
- Aggressive action to:
  - Improve quality of data
  - Improve consistency of data
  - Address data gaps over time
    - Prioritization!
  - Reduce reporting burden on sector
    - Flexibility!
  - Leverage US data and experience, where possible

## Reporting Tool Our Commitment to Quality Data



- Invested over \$1.5M CDN on a reporting tool for the sector since 1999
  - NCASI partnership (expertise and funding)
  - Annual updates
  - Pulp and paper sector first, now all sub-sectors
  - Methodology referenced and defensible
  - Drew from experience with TRI
    - Improved comparability between Canada and US data
  - Growing adoption by industry
  - Substantial improvement in data quality

## Addressing Data Gaps Pulp and Paper



- Reporting since 1994
- \$2.5M industry funded study
  - To address data gaps through field measurement
  - Launched in 1999 and completed in 2003
  - Multi-stakeholder steering committee
  - 20 facilities selected based upon process type, age, ecozone, etc
- Data undergoing rigorous QA/QC for inclusion in next version of reporting handbook (2004-2005)

# Addressing Data Gaps



- Reporting since 1999
  - Air quality triggers
- Reporting tool prepared in 2001
- Lumber kiln study launched in 2003
  - Joint EC FPAC project
  - Forintek pilot kiln, NCASI methodology
  - Addressing significant gap in Canadian data
  - VOC emissions for 2 3 top Canadian species
  - Data to be rigorously QA/QC for inclusion in future reporting tool (2005?)

## Future Opportunities A Collaborative Approach



- Technical Agreement signed with Environment Canada in 2004
  - Working together on improved reporting approach for sector
  - Improved reporting efficiency, data accuracy, relevancy to communities, overall data quality, and predictability
  - Support sound decision-making by government
    - Understand strengths and weaknesses with NPRI data
  - Progress reporting to stakeholders
  - Official kick off in October, 2004
- Adoption of tools within lumber sector an ongoing challenge

# In Summary



- FPAC has worked proactively to support improving NPRI database
- Rapid growth of NPRI program has created significant reporting burden to our sector
- Changes to NPRI often require significant effort
  - Flexibility and prioritization are necessary
- Data quality challenges are not unique to sector, caution when reporting to public
- FPAC continues to be committed to addressing reporting challenges with NPRI
  - Collaborative approach holds promise
