Co-sponsored by the Washington, D.C., Ward 7 Arts Collaborative, "A Creative Profile: Artists of the East Bank" features the work of 19 artists from communities east of the Anacostia River, showcasing a little known source of talent in the District. The exhibition includes 39 pieces ranging from paintings to objects artistically embellished by artists from Wards 7 and 8. A cross-section of artists, from the self-taught to formally trained, are participants in this juried show. Exhibition highlights include the work of the following artists:

- Ampofo-Anti, "Mbalax": One of three towering totem-like ceramic sculptures almost 8 feet high
- Adrienne Mills, "Kawanna": One of three digital photographs presenting images that explore the body as a canvas
- Diedra Bell, "Empress Trilogy": Four-foot porcelain dolls, embellished with paint, metals, hair, exotic feathers and hand crafted jewelry
- James Stephen Terell, "Exegisis": One of two paintings that employ layered colored lines to create frenetic drawing-like pictures of the subject matter
