






GENERAL NEWS:

Congratulations to **Sean Brady**, who was given a Science Achievement Award at the NMNH Town Hall meeting in mid-May.

Several scientists from the combined entomological staff participated in a BioBlitz at Rock Creek Park in the District of Columbia to help record plant and animal species there. It was the first of ten annual BioBlitz events that will occur across the United States until 2016, when the National Parks Service will celebrate its 100th anniversary. Each BioBlitz will be organized and co-sponsored by the NPS and the National Geographic Society. Festivities for the Rock Creek Park BioBlitz began early in May, when Gary Hevel presented a public program about his backyard insect survey at a Café Scientifique setting in Arlington, Virginia. On Thursday, May 17, associated BioBlitz displays and information were set up for the Congress and their staff at the Sam Rayburn Building on Capitol Hill, with presentations by Hevel and NMNH botanists John Kress and Ida Lopez. On May 18 and 19, noon to noon, at the RCP BioBlitz, entomologists Hevel, Wayne Mathis and Don Davis, (with their wives, respectively, Julie, Dianne and Mignon), represented the Department Entomology. USDA's Systematic Entomology Lab entomologists included John Brown, Buck Lewis, and Mark Metz. Some seventy scientists, mostly local, but from as far away as Kansas, were joined by hundreds of volunteers to discuss biodiversity and lead school groups and the public on trips to observe nature and collect specimens in the park. Organizers had asked Hevel to bring some specimen drawers of his backyard insect survey as an educational tool, and the display received a lot of attention. Throughout the 24 hours, scientists were fully accessible for interaction with the public, and to explain collection, preservation and identification

techniques. Collecting success was sharply hampered by the weather, with cool temperatures and dry conditions. No bees or butterflies were in flight on Friday, with most insects collected by examining decaying logs and sweeping vegetation with nets. Preparation of specimens on Friday evening, with field conditions of limited light, reduced warmth and a moderate breeze was somewhat challenging. Wavne Mathis. accompanied by his wife Dianne, managed to collect more than forty species of shore flies, his research specialty. At the end of the BioBlitz, the general tally of all species observed or collected was as follows: Amphibians and Reptiles; 17, Aquatic Invertebrates: 21, Aquatic Plants: 30, Birds: 29, Fish: 20, fungi: 52, Mammals: 12, Soil Invertebrates: 10, Terrestrial Plants: 232, and Terrestrial Insects: 243. The total was 666, a figure that led the organizers to quickly suggest that the figure will increase after lab analysis by researchers.
