By cooperatively designing and maintaining this system, the two institutions can improve our mutual capacities to reach out to rural Hispanic and low-income students who have difficulty accessing education in a traditional setting.

- 2. Strengthening professional development in hybrid instruction (long distance, Web-enhanced and traditional classroom instruction). The project will introduce and maintain a systematic approach to providing this professional development. By sharing the professional development, we will be able to provide it in a cost-effective, efficient manner and find common solutions to common problems.
- 3. Improving access to education programs that have the most impact in addressing critical issues within the Hispanic and low-income populations we serve. We will use technological and instructional improvements to enhance access to the CAC's Arizona General Education Curriculum (AGEC) and to ASU East's Bachelor of Arts in Education. This strategy will increase opportunities for CAC students to transfer to a four-year university. It will also enable more minority residents to become certified teachers in local school districts, where the need for minority teachers is great.
- 4. **Expanding and improving student services.** While we need to improve the services, as they exist in the traditional "walk-in" format, we also need to make them available on-line, especially as we develop distance-learning programs.
