Today, the momentum behind health care price transparency continues to increase across the country, and policy-makers in Washington are listening. In August, President Bush took a major step forward in providing consumers with easy-to-use information about the quality, price, and value of their health care by signing an Executive Order to help increase the transparency of America's health care system.

The Executive Order, entitled <u>Promoting Quality and Efficient Health Care in Federal Government Administered or Sponsored Health Care Programs</u>, recognizes that in order to spend their health care dollars wisely, Americans need information about doctors, hospitals, and costs.

Greater transparency in health care pricing will create opportunities to improve care and lower costs by supporting those doctors and hospitals that deliver high-quality care and avoid unnecessary health care costs.

State Representative Jodie Laubenberg (Texas)

Two weeks ago President Bush signed an Executive Order mandating more transparency in federal health care.

As Vice Chairman of Public Health for the State of Texas, I applaud the President's action and hope that the State of Texas will soon adopt similar legislation. Coming from the highest office in the nation, this order will no doubt have a very positive affect on federally administered health care programs.

The order will allow Americans to "comparison shop" for their health care by requiring providers to release information regarding quality of care and price points for common procedures.

Health care costs have been, at best, murky and confusing for far too long. Anything that the government can do to help consumers have a better understanding of cost, and the ability to compare costs, will both improve health care and, ultimately, bring the cost of quality care down to a more reasonable level.

This order directs federal agencies to share information with beneficiaries regarding the quality of services offered by health care providers. I believe the public has the right to know what the qualifications and reputation of their health care providers might be. They should be able to easily obtain information regarding quality of care issues when selecting a doctor in order to ensure they will get the most capable care possible.

The President's recent order also encourages the adoption of Health Information Technology Standards to better facilitate the expedient exchange of health information. This portion of the order would allow patients to receive vital care more readily by quickening the transfer of medical records to and from doctors, hospitals and insurers.

In this age of technological advancement it is vital that health care providers and insurers make better use of new methods to improve patient care. This includes record keeping and file sharing between involved parties, it will not conflict with Health Information Privacy and Protection Act (HIPPA) and privacy laws. To have a patient suffer because their new doctor or hospital cannot obtain information regarding the patient's medical history is inexcusable.

Beneficiaries of federally subsidized health care, from federal employees to Medicare beneficiaries, comprise one quarter of all Americans covered by health insurance. Though this directive is focused on federal health care patients and facilitators, it can benefit the population as a whole. As state legislators we need to bring this transparency down to the state level.

The entire purpose of the President's order is to make health care work more efficiently and transparently for the average American. This order will not raise taxes and does not increase federal funding for health care; it is simply an encouragement for all providers to look after the best interests of the consumer.

Health care issues are a continuing battle for all Americans. It is imperative that we work together to develop a system that will benefit both patients and providers to ensure that all citizens continue to have the best health care possible in their hours of need.

Additionally, we know that more tests and procedures do not necessarily equal high quality. This spring, the Iowa Legislature created an Electronic Health Care Records System Task Force. I would like to add my strong support to that of others for President George W. Bush's Executive Order aimed at bringing transparency to America's health care system. Public reporting of pricing and quality of services and the promotion of health information technology are critical to every American's health and well being. I know that you have been promoting this kind of consumer access to health care cost and quality information for some time, so I appreciate your strong advocacy in this matter.

As Co-Chair of Iowa's Health & Human Services Appropriation Sub-Committee, I have been working for years to provide all Iowans with an opportunity to receive quality health care at the lowest cost possible. We have been working with private insurance companies as well as local, state, and federal government agencies to improve access, to promote quality, and to encourage cost effective care for all Iowans.

The Iowa Medicaid program has initiated a number of efforts over the past 3 years to make the program more transparent to members and providers. Nearly all fees, payment rates, and costs are published on the Iowa Medicaid Enterprise (IME) website, including all fees and rates paid for all individual medical services, and all payment rates for individual prescription drugs. Further, the Iowa Medicaid program is administered through performance based, fixed price contracts. The IME has over 200 performance measures reported each quarter on its operations, also published on the website.

Lastly, Iowa entered into the Sovereign States Multi-State Drug Purchasing Pool. Iowa specifically chose this pool because all of the rebates, payment rates, and finances of the managing entity are entirely transparent to the member states. Other state pools are operated by Pharmacy Benefit Managers where the rebates and prices are hidden from the states.

Iowa is looking forward to additional transparency through our partnership with the federal government, namely the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. Providing consumers health care options and choice among health providers based on value and quality care is the desire of all Iowans. I commend you and the President for this kind of leadership.

Letter from Chief Executive Officer Robert Fruend, Jr. to Secretary Mike Leavitt

I am writing on behalf of the St. Louis Regional Health Commission to support the Federal government's efforts through the Department of Health and Human Services to increase transparency in the U. S. health care system.

The Commission's mission is to improve access to health care, reduce health disparities, and improve health outcomes in the St. Louis region. Various organizations are represented in our network including: Saint Louis City and County, the State of Missouri, area hospitals and medical schools, primary and specialty clinics, neighborhood and faith-based organizations, community members, area health foundations, Federal officials, and health consortiums. In addition to the nineteen-member Commission, the Commission has two thirty-member advisory boards. One represents community organizations, citizens and users of the safety net system and the other consists of health service providers in the region.

In the Commission's strategic plan submitted to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in October 2003, the Commission and its Advisory Boards unanimously agreed that improved health literacy in our community was a vital component to building a healthier St. Louis. Providing consumers with the information and tools to make informed, healthy decisions about their lifestyle and how they obtain health care services is critical to improving the health of our community.

As we move forward with these initiatives, we believe that it is important that such initiatives promote better quality health care, reduce variability within our institutions, and improve access to health care for all. One of the hallmarks of the work to date in St. Louis through the Commission has been the collaboration among patients and providers to build a better health care system in our region. We believe that initiatives to increase transparency, while essential, should build upon the collaborations already established, and not promote adversarial relationships between payers, providers, and consumers. We also believe such initiatives should be based on statistically sound methodologies that promote clinically meaningful metrics, and account for patient acuity, co-morbidities, and other complexities inherent in treating patients served by the safety net institutions in our community. Through the adherence to these important principles, we believe significant improvements are possible in delivering high quality care and empowering individuals to make responsible decisions about their health, and we appreciate the Department's efforts to lead this initiative at this time.

We appreciate the partnership between the Federal government and the St. Louis community over the past five years, and look forward to continuing our work together to build a healthier community.
