It is the obligation of the DoD Inspector General to "initiate, conduct, and supervise such...investigations in the Department of Defense (including the military departments) as the Inspector General considers appropriate" (IG Act Sec. 8(c)(2)) and to "provide leadership and coordination and recommend policies for activities...to prevent and detect fraud and abuse in...[DoD] programs and operations (IG Act Sec. 2(2))."



DCIS is the criminal investigative arm of the Department of Defense Inspector General. Employment with DCIS offers individuals a unique opportunity to serve their country by conducting investigations which ensure DoD remains capable of deterring war and defending our nation.

In furtherance of its mission, DCIS employs an elite, highly-trained team of special agents and support personnel, all of whom are steadfastly committed to "protecting America's warfighters" by conducting investigations in support of crucial National Defense priorities.

The DoD IG is competitive with other Federal law enforcement agencies in terms of career progression and pay progression.

To be considered for a DCIS special agent position, an individual must:

- Be a U.S. Citizen
- Be between 21 and 37 years of age
- Pass the complete applicant screening process, which includes an interview battery, drug screening, medical exam, and a physical fitness test
- Pass an extensive background investigation
- Possess exceptional communication skills
