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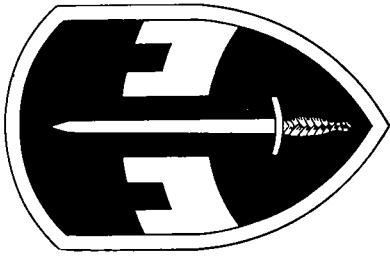

I. GENERAL

1. The Annual General Inspection of the Americal Division was conducted during the period 1-7 July 1968.
2. The mission of the Americal Division was being accomplished in a satisfactory manner (based on a satisfactory - unsatisfactory rating scale). Personnel contacted during the inspection were competent and enthusiastic in the performance of assigned duties. The overall appearance and condition of facilities and equipment, except as otherwise noted herein, and the positive attitude exhibited by all personnel were indicative of an outstanding degree of professionalism and devotion to duty.
3. Pertinent observations and recommendations of the Inspectors General were reported to the Commanding General and members of the organization during the inspection and at the exit interview. This report includes those observations and recommendations that warrant incorporation. ANNEXES B through P contain observations and recommendations pertaining to conditions of the units within the division. A memorandum of minor irregularities and deficiencies was submitted to the Commanding General under the provisions of paragraph 26a, AR 20-1.
4. General information pertaining to the inspection is contained at Appendix I to ANNEX B.
5. Information pertaining to the mission, organization, and personnel is contained at Appendix II to ANNEX B.

SUBJECT: Annual General Inspection, FY 69, of the Americal Division

6. The Americal Division presented no problem areas prior to the inspection.

II. DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY SPECIAL SUBJECTS FOR INSPECTION

7. Command Surveillance of User Communications Discipline (DA Circular 20-16).

All elements of this program were outstanding throughout the division. Positive command attention had resulted in a most comprehensive and effective program.

8. Security of Arms and Ammunition (DA Circular 20-17).

Weapons and ammunition were being secured and accounted for in an excellent or satisfactory manner throughout the division. Weapons were assigned by serial number which were entered on individual clothing records and a chart was posted in each unit to reflect assignment of weapons to individuals by name.

9. Command Implementation of the Materiel Readiness Program (DA Circular 20-18).

The policies and procedures for implementing this program were excellent throughout the division. Red Ball Express officers had been appointed and instructions had been published. However, additional emphasis was required to insure timely acceptance of work requests at direct support maintenance level. The division had not established a formal CMMI program within the command as required by USARV Regulation 7D-8; however, a program had been developed with implementation planned on or about 20 July 1968.

III. SUMMARY OF OBSERVATIONS

10. The overall operation of the personnel service division, operations of the personnel management, personnel actions and casualty branches, and procedures for preparation and forwarding of officer efficiency reports were excellent. The maintenance of officer and enlisted personnel records was satisfactory. A detailed review of 335 personnel records disclosed that numerous Records of Emergency Data (DA Form 41) did not contain all required information. Enlisted Qualification Record (DA Form 20) had not been annotated to reflect the month individuals had been reported on the advance oversea - returnee report (AOR), and primary MOS indicator codes had been omitted in all cases. All Personnel Records Jackets (DA Form 201) were in need of screening to remove duplicate orders, correspondence and documents of a temporary nature.

11. G1/S1 sections throughout the division were functioning in an excellent manner. Personnel were knowledgeable and enthusiastic in the performance of their duties.

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12. The rotational hump problem within the division had been handled in a satisfactory manner through infusion programs.
13. The adjutant general had developed and distributed outstanding directives, SOPs, and policies pertaining to personnel management. However, in many cases the elements of the division had not complied with these directives. A recent survey conducted by the division AG revealed that the Serviceman's Group Life Insurance Forms (DA Form 3054 or VA Form 29-8286) were missing from 300 Personnel Record Jackets (DA Form 201). Consequently, the insured status of these personnel could not be ascertained.
14. The AG operation was hampered by a lack of air conditioning units for the IEM vans.
15. The awards and decorations program had been implemented and functioned in an outstanding manner. Since January 1968, 9,795 awards had been processed.
16. The division finance office functions had been performed in a satisfactory manner. A detailed review of 370 Financial Data Records (DA Form 2143) revealed several irregularities in the collection and processing of allotments and in the handling of servicemen's group life insurance. In addition, one partial payment in the amount of \$150.00 had not been recouped.
17. Unit administration, records management, and postal activities were either excellent or satisfactory throughout the division. Common deficiencies noted were: numerous orders did not reflect individuals social security account number, file folder labels had been positioned improperly, and appropriate postal regulations and SOPs were not available in mail rooms.
18. The reenlistment program was excellent to satisfactory in all units. It was noted that the USARV objective for career regular Army personnel had not been achieved. However, since January 1968 an aggressive reenlistment program had been implemented.
19. Control of ration cards was either excellent or satisfactory throughout the division except in the 23d Administration Company, which was unsatisfactory. Deficiencies noted were: Receipts for Accountable Item (DA Form 410) were not on file to indicate the number of ration cards for which the unit was accountable, and a Destruction of Classified Records (DA Form 546) had not been maintained for destruction of obsolete or mutilated ration cards.
20. Publications supply activities, and posting and maintenance of bulletin boards throughout the division were excellent.

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42. The officers' club open mess was not inspected because the transition from sundry fund to officers' club open mess had not been completed.
43. G2 functions were performed in an outstanding manner, and S2 functions in all units were either excellent or satisfactory. Personnel were well qualified and familiar with their duties.
44. Control and safeguarding of classified material and related areas were either excellent or satisfactory throughout the division except in the 723d Maintenance Battalion and the 26th Engineer Battalion, which were unsatisfactory. The primary reason for the unsatisfactory conditions was the inability of these units to properly account for classified documents. Numerous procedural errors were noted throughout the division, such as inter-filing classified and unrelated unclassified material; improper use of cover sheets; and failure to properly mark documents, execute directive familiarity statements, or maintain records of SAEDA briefings.
45. Division crypto-operations were outstanding.
46. G3 activities and operations were outstanding. S3 activities and operations were outstanding in the 523d Signal Battalion, and excellent in all other units. All requirements were evaluated, and missions were judiciously assigned and promptly executed.
47. Training was outstanding in the 1st Battalion, 46th Infantry and the 523d Signal Battalion, and excellent in all other elements of the division. Training inspections had been conducted and records had been maintained for mandatory and recurring training.
48. Historical activities were either excellent or satisfactory throughout the division. The majority of deficiencies noted concerned the maintenance of daily staff journals, the most common deficiency being failure to maintain files to support daily staff journals.
49. Physical security was excellent to satisfactory throughout the division. However, an unsatisfactory condition noted was the inadequate perimeter defense of the headquarters area. Guards on the 24 hour posts were unfamiliar with their duties, and were inattentive on their post. Additionally, the police of 24 hours guard posts in the division headquarters and 523d Signal Battalion was unsatisfactory.
50. The health, welfare and training of scout dogs in the 57th Infantry Platoon (Scout Dog) were excellent. Capabilities of the scout teams had been fully utilized.

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65. The fire prevention program was either excellent or satisfactory in all units except the Division Headquarters Company, and the 26th Engineer Battalion, which were unsatisfactory. In these units flammable liquids had been stored in or under troop billets and motor shops, many electrical circuits were overloaded, many appliances had been left plugged in while not in use, several fire extinguishers were empty, and inflammable straw matting had been used to line ceilings and walls in some buildings.

66. Privately owned weapons were secured and accounted for in either an excellent or satisfactory manner in all units except the 26th Engineer Battalion, which was unsatisfactory because personnel had been permitted to carry privately owned weapons.

67. Combat Operations Loss and Expenditure Data - Vietnam (COLED-V) reports had been submitted on a timely basis by all units. Personnel were aware of the objectives and requirements of the project.

68. There had been no previous Annual General Inspection for the Americal Division.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

69. It is recommended that:

a. Commanding Officers of inspected units:

(1) Take necessary action to correct the deficiencies noted in ANNEXES C through P.

(2) Forward by separate indorsement to the Commanding General, Americal Division, report of corrective action. Each corrective comment will:

(a) Be referenced to the appropriate deficiency.

(b) Clearly and completely describe all corrective actions completed or contemplated for each deficiency.

(c) Include estimated completion date for any actions not completed at the time reply to this report is forwarded to the Commanding General, Americal Division.

b. Commanding General, Americal Division:

(1) Indicate actions to correct the deficiencies listed in paragraphs 9, 13, 36 and 49 above, and in Appendix II to ANNEX B.

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
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V. ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

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ANNEX B

GENERAL INFORMATION PERTAINING TO THE INSPECTION

1. Inspectors and Inspection Period

a. The inspection was conducted during the period 1-7 July 1968 by Colonel Richard M. Wildrick, Inspector General, and 33 team members under the provisions of paragraph 16a, AR 20-1.

b. Upon arrival at Headquarters, Colonel A. A. D'Esmond, USARV Deputy Inspector General, conferred with the Commanding General and informed him of the purpose and scope of the inspection. Prior to departure Colonel Wildrick reported to the Commanding General the substance and nature of the findings resulting from the inspection.

2. Latest Prior Inspection

The Americal Division was organized in October 1967 and this was the first Annual General Inspection.

3. Scope of the Inspection

This inspection covered activities of all elements of the division shown on the organizational chart attached as TAB A to Appendix II to ANNEX B.

4. Five complaint periods were held. Six complaints and three request for assistance were received. Five were resolved locally and four will be handled by the Division Inspector General. The subjects of the complaints and requests were: hospital mail, medical treatment, promotions, racial discrimination, reassignment, and awards.

1. The Commanding General was Major General Charles M. Gettys, who assumed command on 23 June 1968. The former commander was Brigadier General George H. Young.

2. Mission

The headquarters commands, controls and supervises operations of the division and attached units.

3. Organization

The organization of the Americal Division, for units inspected, was as indicated by the chart attached at TAB A to Appendix II to ANNEX B.

4. Personnel





B. Personnel, Administration, Morale, and Discipline.

1. Personnel (U)

a. (U) Enlisted Records.

1. A complete screening was made of DA Form 41 (Record of Emergency Data). As a result of this screening, it was determined that approximately 4000 forms required review by individuals and/or updating. Immediate action was taken accordingly and review and updating of DA Form 41 is being accomplished.

2. The Enlisted Records Branch experienced a heavy workload during this period due to a large turnover of personnel. 3,621 individuals were in processed; 1,382 individuals were out processed; records of 938 medical evacuees were out processed; records of 332 KHA were out processed; and 4,211 individuals were serviced.

b. (U) New Officer Efficiency Report. On 1 April 1968, a new Officer Efficiency Report (DA Form 67-6) became effective. To provide for the smooth transition to the new report, during March 1968, classes were given to officers assigned to this headquarters and to all S1's and Personnel Staff NCO's assigned to subordinate commands. Additionally, the Chief of the Officers Records Branch visited several subordinate units and gave classes to assigned officers. A revised officers efficiency reporting regulation was also published to implement the new DA regulation.

c. (U) Awards and Decorations. The Awards and Decorations Branch, Adjutant General Section, continued to experience a heavy workload. During the period 1 February through 30 April 1968, a total of 3,783 individual awards were processed and 1,916 General Orders were published. Procedures were implemented to provide for a more expeditious processing of awards to include posthumous awards.

d. (U) Administrative Machine Branch. During this period, the ADP equipment was still not received by this headquarters. Consequently, the preparation and processing of all data was accomplished manually. The lack of ADP equipment hampered the Personnel Services Division, Adjutant General Section, in providing timely and accurate statistics and reports. However, pending the receipt of the equipment, personnel assigned to the Administrative Machine Branch were given training by attending various USARV sponsored courses. Additionally, plans were formulated for reception and use of the equipment.

e. (U) Senior Enlisted Promotions. During this period, policies and procedures were formulated and a comprehensive regulation published on promotions. During the latter period of March and early April, a Division E8 and E9 Promotion Board was convened to establish and integrate E8 and E9 Standing Promotion Lists. It was necessary to establish an initial standing

b. Reproduction. During the last reporting period, two Multilith "1250" presses, one Meteorite camera and one Bruning "2100" copier were requisitioned through normal supply channels. Throughout the current period, constant effort was placed on determining the status of this equipment since the estimated delivery date has passed without receipt of the equipment. One AB Dick, Model 350, Multilith Machine was reconstructed from salvage to try to obtain a small Multilith capability pending receipt of the overdue equipment.

c. Publications and Blank Forms. Normally, publications have been requisitioned and received within allowable intervals, with two major exceptions. One is Da Form 2139 (Military Pay Voucher) which had been repeatedly requisitioned from FPG, Japan and not received in sufficient quantities to sustain the division for more than one month at a time. The supply is USARV Form 176A (Joint Messageform) which has been in short supply since December 1967. Also, on numerous occasions quantities requested of USARV, Da, and DD Forms have been arbitrarily reduced when filled, being termed excessive.

d. Distribution. Distribution of official correspondence and the Stars & Stripes newspaper for this reporting period has become more efficient with the establishment of a division wide courier system. The Division Signal Office has assumed all responsibilities for courier service to units outside of the division headquarters area, thus expediting distribution to all units of the division on a fixed schedule basis.

9. (U) Chaplain: Due to combat commitments and shortages of helicopters it has been difficult and sometimes impossible for the Division Chaplain or his deputy to visit unit chaplains. Command Control and supply ships were sometimes available but their schedule is often irregular, especially on return trips from their designated units. So visits were often a hit and miss proposition. The Chief of Staff has made available the use of his ship for regular staff visits thus making available more regular trips by the staff to all units.

10. (U) Staff Judge Advocate:

a. The Staff Judge Advocate section continued to furnish legal services to the Commanding General, his staff, and subordinate units. Visits were continued to subordinate units. Advice and assistance were given to Article 32 investigating officers, counsel of special courts-martial, presidents of special courts, and summary courts.

b. During the period, the section experienced a change of SJA's in April, the loss of one captain in February and the gain of a warrant officer in April. The warrant officer now occupies the position of legal administrative technician, which has been vacant since Task Force Oregon was organized. This office is now staffed with 1 LTC, 1 MAJ, 4 CPT, 1 CO, and 7 Lt.

c. Military justice/military affairs matters still comprises the largest area of activity. During the quarter February 1968 - April 1968 this command tried 3 general courts-martial and received 25 special and 5 summary courts-martial cases for supervisory review. In addition 700 Article 15's were received for administrative corrections, logging and forwarding for file. Defense counsel also were furnished for several Article 32 investigations and counsel was furnished for one SPCM. The majority of Military Affairs problems received were reports of survey, line of duty investigations and congressional inquiries. The rates for general, special, and summary courts-martial during the period were 0.04, 1.05, and 0.32 respectively. The rates reflect the average number of cases per month per thousand troop strength.

d. Internal reorganization has resulted in the creation of a Soldier's Advocate Division, combining the former functions of the Legal Assistance Division and the defense portion of the Military Justice Division. During the quarter, 1,799 cases were processed, including but not limited to income tax, domestic relations, indebtedness, wills and powers of attorney, and counseling and advice on disciplinary actions and administrative proceedings.

e. The section continues to provide instruction on the Geneva Convention, with emphasis on War Crimes and Treatment of Detainees, to each group of replacements as they process through the Americal Combat Center.

f. During the period 103 claims were approved for payment for loss or damage to property of servicemen, 89 of which arose out of rocket and mortar attacks on Chu Lai.

11. (C) Personnel Status 123rd Aviation Battalion:

a. Throughout the quarter, "A" Company enlisted and officer service and support personnel were gradually attached to various sections of the battalion. This change reduced "A" Company to three complete airlift platoons and necessary company headquarters personnel. The company strength averaged approximately 75 per cent of authorized officers and warrant officers.

b. The Aero Scout Company was activated 1 February. Unit strength on 31 January was one officer and eighteen (18) enlisted men. During the month of February the total strength grew to twenty-two (22) officers and 172 enlisted men. Strength at the end of the reporting period was twenty-five (25) officers and warrant officers, and 126 enlisted men.

12. (U) Post Exchange

The overall sales for both the retail sales and concession sales have shown a steady upward trend. The increased sales can be attributed to the opening of the concession arcade, the increase in the amount of merchandise coming to the Chu Lai area, and the opening of the two Inprest Fund Post Exchanges, one by the 11th Infantry Brigade and the other by the 2d Surgical Hospital.

13. (U) Education Center.

The Americal Education Center continues to provide expanding General Educational Development services to the Americal Division as well as Air Force, Navy, and Marine personnel in the Chu Lai area. USAFI High School Tests, General Examination-College Level, Achievement Tests, and numerous USAFI Standard Achievement and End of Course Tests are now permanently stocked so that much of the delay in ordering tests has now been eliminated. There were 31 enrollments in the University of Maryland during Term 4. Anthropology I and English I will be offered during Term 5, 3 June to 27 July. Spoken Vietnamese evening classes are being conducted again with CPT Ty as the instructor.

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t. During the reporting period visual reconnaissance revealed that the enemy was improving and constructing LOCs in western Quang Nam and Quang Tin Provinces. Highway 165 in Laos had been extended through Base Area 608 to join with highway 14 in western Quang Tin Province and a new road had been constructed through Base Area 607 in Laos to join the A Shau Valley route with major LOCs in western Quang Nam Province.

u. Captured documents, prisoner interrogation and agent reports during the reporting period indicate that the enemy plans to continue his General Offensive until ultimate victory is obtained. The period 1 - 19 MAY 68 has been mentioned on numerous occasions as the time for his next major ground actions.

v. During the reporting period the Americal Division lost operational control of the 3rd Bde, 1st US Air Cav Div and the 3rd Inf Bde, 4th Inf Div. The 3rd Inf Bde, 4th Inf Div was one of the original units assigned to Task Force Oregon, which later became the Americal Division. From 19 APR 67 to 28 FEB 68 the brigade accounted for 545 NVA KIA, 3,103 VC KIA, 91 NVA PWs, 292 VC PWs, 65 C/S and 911 Ind weapons captured. The 3rd Bde, 1st US Air Cav Div joined the Americal Division and initiated Operation Wallows on 4 OCT 67. This operation was later to be combined with Operation Wheeler being conducted by the 1st Bde, 101st Airborne Division. During the period 4 OCT 67 to 26 JAN 68 the brigade accounted for 1,507 NVA KIA, 900 VC KIA, 28 NVA PWs, 61 VC PWs, 53 C/S and 259 weapons captured.

2. (C) Quang Ngai

a. Activity in Quang Ngai Province resulted from Operations Muscantine and Norfolk Victory, enemy attempts to sustain his General Offensive through attacks on new life hamlets, refugee camps, district headquarters and harassment attacks by fire and enemy interdiction of LOCs with mine, boobytrap and sabotage tactics. There was a total of 47 such incidents along Highway 1 during the period 1 FEB 68 to 30 APR 68 (27 in FEB 14 mines and 10 sabotage 7, 14 in MAR 14 mines and 10 sabotage 7, 6 in APR 14 mines and 2 sabotage 7).

b. Following the initiation of "Tet" Offensive by enemy forces on 31 JAN 68, during which enemy forces sustained a total of 642 EN KIA, 35 PWs, 42 C/S and 190 Ind weapons captured, Americal and ARVN Forces reacted swiftly and aggressively to counter the offensive and deny the enemy any gains militarily or politically.

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c. On 1 FEB 68, a PW from the C-219 LF Co of Duc Pho (D) led elements of the 3-1 Inf Bn (11th Inf Bde) to his unit's weapons cache vic BS 7238 resulting in the capture of 4 C/S and 46 Ind weapons. A later captured document written by a cadre of the C-219 LF Co revealed that allied forces had raided one of his unit's base camps and captured the above-mentioned weapons. Also on this date, the 11th Inf Bde Base Camp, LZ Bronze (BS 8138) received 25 rds of 82mm mortar fire resulting in 12 helicopters damaged.

d. On 6 FEB 68, elements of the 2nd ARVN Div supported by Americal gunships contacted the 40th Co, 406th MF Sapper Bn southwest of Quang Ngai City resulting in 50 VC KIA, 3 PWs and 7 Ind weapons captured.

e. On 7 FEB 68, elements of the 2nd ARVN Div supported by Americal armor and gunships contacted the 83rd LF Bn vic BS 6370 resulting in 92 EN KIA (74 KBA), 1 C/S and 5 Ind weapons captured.

f. Reacting on intelligence indicating the 48th LF Bn had moved into one of its old base camps for rest and resupply, elements of the 11th Inf Bde initiated an operation of 12 FEB 68 vic BS 7280 resulting in 78 EN KIA.

g. On 19 FEB 68, the Ha Thanh Special Forces Camp vic BS 3970 received 4 rds of 140mm rockets marking the first use of rockets by enemy forces in Quang Ngai Province. Also on this date, elements of the 11th Inf Bde captured the XO of the 120th LF Sapper Co. The PW provided sufficient information to establish the unit in the confirmed Order of Battle Holdings.

h. On 23 FEB 68, elements of the 3-1 Inf ^{Bn} ~~Bde~~ (11th Inf Bde) reacting on intelligence, initiated an operation south of the Batangan Cape (BS 7380) contacting the 48th LF Bn and 21st LF Sapper Co resulting in 71 EN KIA and 5 weapons captured.

i. A CICV readout of documents captured vic BS 6070 by elements of 2nd ARVN Div on 17 FEB 68 revealed that the Quang Ngai Province Unit had established a new regimental size unit designated the 328th. The documents indicated the regiment consisted of the 81st and 83rd LF Bns and several other force units.

j. On 28 FEB 68, elements of the C-19 LF Sapper Co conducted a mortar/ground attack on the Mo Duc (D) Hqs and jail resulting in moderate damage to the installation. There were 3 VC KIA and 3 Ind weapons captured during the attack.

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k. On 1 MAR 68, the enemy attempted to land a resupply trawler along the coast south of the 11th Inf Bde Base Camp (BS 8835). The trawler was brought under fire and exploded before it reached shore. A search of the area by elements of the 11th Bde produced 16 C/S and 751 Ind weapons (over 700 being new K-44s) and quantities of equipment and ammunition.

l. On 4 MAR 68, as enemy forces were conducting attacks by fire throughout the Americal AO, the Rural Development Hqs and Power Station near Quang Ngai City came under heavy mortar/rocket launcher attack and a limited ground probe by the 506A LF Sapper Co. Counteraction by friendly forces resulted in 7 VC KIA.

m. An operation initiated by the 2nd ARVN Div on 12 MAR 68 in southwestern Nghia Hanh (D) vic BS 5663 contacted the 401st MF Regt resulting in 90 EN KIA, 3 C/S and 4 Ind weapons captured (including 2 Russian flamethrowers).

n. On 16 MAR 68, friendly forces in Operation Muscatine contacted local force elements south of the Batangan Cape (BS 7173 - BS 7197) resulting in 128 VC KIA and 3 weapons captured.

o. On 18 MAR 68, elements of the 3-1 Inf Bn (11th Inf Bde) contacted the C-19 LF Sapper Co vic BS 7657 resulting in 9 VC KIA and 11 Ind weapons captured. Later reports indicated the CO of the company had been killed during the engagement.

p. During MAR 68, the 2nd ARVN Div discovered a new enemy technique of launching satchel charges. With this technique the VC use a small kicker charge to launch the satchel charge. Test conducted by the 2nd ARVN Div revealed that the range of the satchel charge could be as great as 320 meters and would clear an obstacle 60 meters high. This new technique seems to be a field expediate method similar to that of launching of the "Explosive 320" by NVA forces in the DMZ area.

q. On 5 APR 68, the Tu Nghia (D) Hqs (BS 6768) received a heavy mortar/rocket launcher/small arms and a probing ground attack from elements of the 506A LF Sapper Co, 83rd LF Bn and the Tu Nghia (D) Force resulting in 16 VC KIA and 5 wpns captured.

r. On 9 APR 68, the 11 Inf Bde initiated Operation Norfolk Victory in western Tu Nghia and Nghia Hanh Districts and shifted forces operating in Operation Muscatine to assist in the operation. Purpose of the combined operations was to disrupt any enemy plans for consolidating for another major attack against Quang Ngai City and to destroy traditional

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(4) Overlays of enemy defense and mosaics were made of all the Special Forces Camps in the Division Area.

(5) Liaison missions were made to all of the brigades and the 1/1 Cav. These were used to exchange intelligence information.

(6) Approximately 4 VR flights per week were made by II aerial observers. They reported approximately 200 significant sightings.

(7) The 3d Brigade, 82d Airborne Div was assisted when it passed through our area. Photography and maps were supplied through this section.

(8) During this period a new targeting section was established. This section utilizes personnel from the II and OB sections and is responsible for receiving, recording, plotting and analyzing all pertinent targeting information.

g. Interrogation Section.

(1) During the reporting period, the Interrogation Section interrogated and classified 676 detainees at the Chu Lai Collecting Point, 2d Surgical Hospital, 1st Marine Hospital, and 27th Surgical Hospital. A team has been assigned from Division Interrogation resources to operate the Division Cavalry Squadron's POW Cage, but the totals below do not reflect their results:

(2) The large number of Innocent Civilians reflected above is a significant increase over previous reporting periods. This is due in part to the fact that the Division Interrogation Section is presently receiving, screening and interrogating all detainees from Operation Muscatine and 198th Brigade (rear). The remainder of the Innocent Civilians are mostly

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hospital cases from all units in the division. Previously, the 11th Brigade and the 198th Brigade were interrogating all hospital cases from their respective brigades, but this is now accomplished by the Division Interrogation Section.

(3) The Interrogation Section supported six US Navy Swift Boat Operations along the Southern I Corps coastal region. A total of over 150 persons were screened (not reflected in above totals) for intelligence information, with twenty brought into the Division Collecting Point for detailed interrogation on VC activities in that area.

(4) The Interrogation Section assumed the responsibility of providing field interrogation support and processing of all detainees apprehended by the Division Cavalry Squadron. An Interrogator and interpreter team was permanently detailed to accomplish this mission. Additionally, two ARVN interrogators from the 8th ARVN MID are assigned for interrogation support. All interrogation support rendered has been extremely well received. Interrogators have provided invaluable assistance in the immediate exploitation of intelligence gathered through questioning of detainees, and document screening. Teams provided not only support for the POW Cage, but also went in with the squadron on several combat assaults. On several occasions, immediate exploitation of intelligence gained from field interrogations led to significant finds by ground troops.

(5) Eight interrogation teams were dispatched by Division Interrogation in support of Operations Wheeler/Wallowa and Muscatine during the reporting period. The teams were utilized in the interrogation of large numbers of detainees received and exploitation of information of an immediate tactical nature gained through interrogation at the Division POW Collecting Point.

(6) During the reporting period, the Division Interrogation Section screened, provided document summaries, and forwarded to the Combined Document Exploitation Center over 2,000 pounds of captured documents in support of division elements. A much-increased improvement was observed over the previous reporting period in the production of timely and accurate summaries of information derived from captured material. This improvement is due to increased interest and priority at all levels and quicker response by brigade elements in getting the documents to the Division Interrogation Section.

(7) Fifty weapons were registered as war trophies during the period, approximately 100 NVA uniforms, medical equipment, NVA web gear, insignia and related equipment, and assorted Russian chemical equipment was delivered, on several occasions, to III MAF Collection Branch in response

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D. (C) Plans, Operations, Training and Organization

1. G3 Section.

a. General. (1) The Americal Division continued offensive operations in the Americal AO during the period 1 Feb 68 to 30 Apr 68. Contact varied from light to heavy. Two major named operations, Wheeler/Wallowa and Muscatine, continued throughout the period and two new operations, Burlington Trail and Norfork Victory, were initiated.

(2) On 13 April 1968, LTC William J. Baxley, Jr., assumed the duties of ACoS, G3 from LTC Jesomond D. Balmer, Jr.

(3) On 23 April 1968, a courtesy inspection was conducted by the Division IG office in preparation for USARV AGI to be conducted in July 1968. Only minor administrative deficiencies were noted.

(4) The Division Standing Operating Procedures (SOP) were completed and approved. Publication is expected in the near future.

(5) The ORLL for the 4th Bn, 21st Inf, a newly arrived unit in Vietnam, is at inclosure 1.

b. Organization. The buildup of Americal Division units continued during the reporting period. Fourth rifle companies were added to the battalions of the 196th and 198th Inf Bdes (Lt) (SEP) and fourth Infantry battalions joined the 11th and 198th Inf Bdes (Lt) (SEP). Task Force Oregon with all attachments was discontinued. The Division troop list, as of 30 Apr 68, is attached as inclosure 2. The following organizational actions were completed.

(5) USARV General Order 806, 21 Feb 68, discontinued the US Army Combat Tracker team #10 (Prov), which was assigned to the 196th Inf Bde (Lt) (SER), effective 15 Feb 68.

(6) USARV General Order 821, 21 Feb 68, assigned the 63d Inf Plat (Combat Tracker) to the Division, effective 15 Feb 68. Assets of the Combat Tracker Team #10 were transferred to this unit.

(7) USARV General Order 766, 19 Feb 68, attached the 3d Bde, 82d Abn Div to the Division, effective 16 Feb 68, less operational control. This unit was detached from the Division, effective 12 Mar 68, by USARV General Order 1006, 11 Mar 68.

(8) USARV General Order 640, 12 Feb 68, assigned the 3d Bn, 18th Arty to the Division, effective 6 Feb 68.

(9) USARV General Order 666, 13 Feb 68, assigned the 57th Inf Plat (Scout Dog) to the Division, effective 19 Feb 68.

(10) USARPAC General Order 108, 8 Feb 68, reorganized Troop F, 17th Cav by MTOE 17-57G, FAC 1/68, effective 20 Feb 68.

(11) USARPAC General Order 110, 8 Feb 68, reorganized the following units as indicated, effective 20 Feb 68:

(14) USARPAC General Order 166, 12 Mar 68, reorganized all Infantry battalions of the Division, effective 25 Mar 68, by MTOE's 7-176T FAC 2/68, 7-177T FAC 2/68, and 7-178T FAC 3/68.

(15) USARV General Order 1171, 17 Mar 68, assigned the 5th Bn, 46th Inf to the Division, effective 31 Mar 68.

(16) USARPAC General Order 182, 21 Mar 68, activated F Troop, 8th Cav, the Division organic Air Cav Troop. Personnel and equipment of C Troop, 7th Scdn, 17th Cav were transferred to F Troop and C Troop was assigned to Fort Knox, Kentucky.

(17) USARPAC General Order 189, 22 Mar 68, reorganized the direct support (DS) artillery battalions assigned to the Infantry brigades of the Division, effective 1 Apr 68, by MTOE's 6-116T FAC 1/68, and 6-11T FAC 1/68.

(18) USARV General Order 1501, 4 Apr 68, discontinued the US Army Military Intelligence Det (Prov), effective 5 Apr 68.

(19) USARV General Order 1711, 13 Apr 68, assigned the 4th Bn, 21st Inf to the Division, effective 17 Apr 68.

(20) The 6th Bn, 31st Inf, previously scheduled to be assigned as the fourth battalion for the 196th Lt Inf Bde was diverted, on arrival in-country, to the 9th Inf Div.

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c. Disposition and movement of units during the period.

(1) At the beginning of the reporting period units were conducting combat operations as follows:

(a) 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div with 1-14th Inf, 1-35th Inf, and 2-35th Inf: Northern portion of Wheeler/Wallowa AO.

(b) 1st Sdn, 1st Cav: Eastern portion Wheeler/Wallowa AO.

(c) 196th Inf Bde (Lt) (SEP) with 2-1st Inf, 4-31st Inf, and 3-21st Inf: Southern portion of Wheeler/Wallowa AO.

(d) 198th Inf Bde (Lt) (SEP) with 1-6th Inf, 1-46th Inf, and 1-52d Inf: Chu Lai TOR and a small portion of NE Muscatine AO.

(e) 11th Inf Bde (Lt) (SEP) with 3-1st Inf, 4-3d Inf, and 1-20th Inf: Duc Pho AO and Muscatine AO.

(2) Major movement of units during the period was as follows:

(a) On 3 February 1968, 4-31st Inf was airmoved from 196th Inf Bde AO to 3-4th Inf Bde, at LZ Baldy. OFCON of 4-31st Inf passed to 3-4th Inf Bde at 031100. 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div moved north into the 1st Mar Div and 2d ROK Bde area with the 1-14th Inf and 1-35th Inf to put pressure on elements of the 2d NV Division.

(b) On 6 Feb 68, Americal Division was tasked by III MAF to provide a two battalion TF to become OFCON to 1st Mar Div to conduct operations in Da Nang area. 1-6th Inf from the 198th Inf Bde and 2-1st Inf from the 196th Inf Bde under control of TF Miracle (Provisional TF from 196th headquarters personnel) moved north vic of Da Nang. The force remained OFCON to the 1st Marine Div during the period 7-12 Feb 68. Two battalions returned on 12 Feb 68, with both units initially being placed OFCON to 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div.

(c) During the period 12-14 Feb, there was a realignment of forces in the Wheeler/Wallowa AO. The 3d Bde, 4th Inf Division shifted emphasis of combat operations to the west conducting operations with the 4-31st Inf, 1-14th Inf, 1-35th Inf, and 1-6th Inf. The 196th Inf Bde also shifted forces and concentrated operations in the western portion of the AO conducting operations with the 2-35th Inf, 2-1st Inf, and 3-21st Inf.

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(d) On the 15th of February elements of the 3d Bde 82d ABN began to arrive in Chu Lai for a period of combat orientation training prior to a move north to the Hue, Phu Bai area. The brigade remained in the Americal AO until March and cleared the AO on 6 March 1968.

(e) On 17 Feb 68 the 1-35th Inf of the 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div prepared to move south from Americal AO. 1-35th Inf cleared Americal AO on 18 February 1968 passing OFCON to 2d Bde, 1st Cav Div (AM) in II CTZ.

(f) On 25 February 1968, the 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div with the 1-14th Inf, prepared to move south to the 2d Bde, 1st Cav Div (AM). On 27 Feb 68, the 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div's AO in Wheeler/Wallowa passed to the 196th Inf Bde and the 4-31st Inf and 1-6th Inf passed OFCON to 196th Inf Bde. On 29 Feb 68, the 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div with the 1-14th Inf cleared the Americal AO to the II CTZ.

(g) On 1 March 68 the 196th Inf Bde moved from Hill 35 (BT227315) to LZ Baldy (BT133453).

(h) On 6 March 68, elements of the 11th Inf Bde began movement to a field location in support of operation west of Quang Ngai. The 4-3d Inf reinforced with supporting forces conducted the operation. Operations terminated on 14 Mar and units returned to original location.

(i) On 10 Mar, 4-31st Inf moved from FSB Polar Bear (AT898471) to LZ Colt (BT114375).

(j) On 18 March 68, B Battery, 2d Bn, 11th arty departed Americal AO.

(k) On 19-20 March 68, three battalions were reshuffled in order to position 2-35th Inf for movement from Americal AO. 1-20th Inf moved to 196th Inf area, 2-35th Inf replaced 1-20th Inf in Duc Pho AO, and 4-31st Inf moved west in 196th AO.

(l) On 25 March 68, 2-35th Inf was relieved of their combat mission in Duc Pho AO. 2-35th Inf departed Americal AO 261600H March 68. 3-1st Inf assumed responsibility of entire Duc Pho AO with 3-1 Inf moving from Muscatine AO to Duc Pho.

(m) On 31 March 68, the 5-46th Inf closed Vietnam, joining the 198th Inf Bde as the brigade's fourth battalion.

(n) On 6 April 68, the 1-20th Inf moved from the Wheeler/Wallowa area of operations to the 11th Lt Inf Bde's area of operation, in preparation for Operation Norfolk Victory.

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(o) On 8 April 68, two major named operations were initiated, Operation Burlington Trail and Operation Norfolk Victory. 1-6th Inf was airmoved from LZ Baldy (BT133453) to vic Tam Ky coming under control of the 198th Inf Bde. The 1-52d Inf was airmoved from the Chu Lai TACR to LZ Baldy coming under the control of the 196th Inf Bde. The 1-20th Inf combat assaulted into area NW of Song Ve Valley, west of Quang Ngai City initiating Operation Norfolk Victory.

(p) On 9 April 68, TF Barker operating in the Muscatine area of operation was disbanded, with 4-3d Inf assuming responsibility for the Muscatine area of operation.

(q) On 14 April 1968, the 4th Bn, 21st Inf closed Chu Lai to join the Americal Division.

(r) Between 17-23 April 68, the 196th Inf Bde with 3 Inf Bns, 4-31st Inf, 3-21st Inf and 2-1st Inf moved from Americal AO to Camp Evans (YD535322) in the PCV area of operation. Americal Division had been tasked by III MAF to provide three battalion, brigade force to PCV.

(s) On 20 April 68, the 198th Inf Bde assumed control of Operation Wheeler/Wallowa from the 196th Inf Bde, conducting operations in the area with the 1-52d Inf (-), 1-20th Inf, and 1-6th Inf. TF Roach, a provisional headquarters consisting of assets from the 198th Inf Bde, assumed control of the Chu Lai TACR. The 5-46th Inf and 1-46th Inf were placed under its control.

(t) On 26 April 68, the Mike Force operating in the Duc Pho AO was relieved by elements of the 4-21st Inf and departed the Americal AO.

d. Plans. The following plans, operational orders or fragmentary orders were in effect or initiated during the reporting period.

(1) Operation Wheeler/Wallowa has been continued from the 1st reporting period. The operation has been characterized by light to heavy contact in all portions of the AO, with primary emphasis placed on clearing the Que Son (BT0334) and Antenna (AT9137) Valleys and neutralizing Base Area 116. Primary tactical technique used was company sized search and sweep or search and clear operations to achieve contact, then a battalion size or larger combat assault to exploit the contact.

(2) Operation Muscatine has been continued from the last reporting period. The operation has been characterized by light to moderate contact

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with predominately local force units. Recently a high incidence of booby trap and mine activity has occurred. Primary emphasis has been placed on elimination of the infrastructure and destruction of local force units. Company and platoon size operations have been used, with occasional combat assaults into suspected cache areas.

(3) Operation Burlington Trail was initiated during the reporting period. The mission is to open the road from Tam Ky (BT306204) to Tien Phouc SF/CIDG Camp (BT107153). The operation is conducted on two levels, with cavalry secured engineer units physically repairing the road and infantry companies conducting operations in the Burlington Trail AO.

(4) Operation Norfolk Victory was begun and terminated during the reporting period. The mission was to neutralize Base Area 121 and to extend GVN influence over the Song Ve Valley (BS5763). However, deployment of one brigade from the Americal area of operations required premature termination of the operation.

(5) During the reporting period, OFCRD's 4-68 and 5-68; covering reception, in-country orientation and training assistance for the 3d Bde, 82d Airborne Division, were executed. The 3d Bde, 82d Abn Div was successfully received, processed, trained and deployed to FCV.

(6) OFCRD 6-68 (Golden Fleece), establishing rice denial and control operations within the Americal Division AO, was executed during the reporting period. Operations include search and sweep to locate caches, mobile and fixed check points to monitor and control flow of rice, and physical security of friendly harvesters in VC rice growing areas. Golden Fleece operations are closely coordinated and conducted in conjunction with ARVN forces.

(7) OPLAN 17-67 (Golden Valley), continues in effect. It provides for the relief selected SF/CIDG Camps in case of attack.

(8) OPLAN 1-68, provided for deployment of one, three battalion, brigade to three general areas. This plan was executed, in part, as OFCRD 7-68 and resulted in the deployment of the 196th Inf Bde (Lt) to the FCV.

(9) Fragmentary Order 2-68 confirmed verbal orders establishing TF Miracle (a two battalion force), and deployment of the TF north to destroy the enemy TET offensive threat against Da Nang.

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e. OPERATIONS.

(1) The frequency and intensity of combat operations in the Americal area of operations varied during the reporting period. During the latter part of March and during the month of April the enemy avoided any major contact. The enemy during this same period placed increased emphasis on the harassment of friendly troops, resulting in a large increase in mine and booby trap incidents during the month of April. Americal Division initiated two major named operations on 8 April 1968; however, it terminated one of these on 19 April 1968. At the end of the reporting period three major named operations were being conducted, Operation Wheeler/Wallows, Operation Burlington Trail, and Operation Muscatine. In addition the Americal Division was conducting operations in the Chu Lai TACR and the Duc Pho AC.

(2) Operation Norfolk Victory began at 080800H April 68, and was terminated at 191800H Apr 68. It was an operation to extend GVN control to the NW in the Song Ve Valley and neutralize NVN/VC elements in Base Area 121. The area for the operation was in Quang Ngai Province generally southwest of Quang Ngai City. The operation began with a combat assault by A, B, C and D, 1-20th Inf and C/4-3d Inf between 080800H and 081230H April 1968. Other Americal elements that participated in the operation were B/6-11 Arty and B Trp, 1st Cav. In addition, the 4th Bn, 4th ARVN Regt and the 1st Trp of the 4th ARVN Cav Sqn participated, conducting operations in the eastern portion of the AC. Operation Norfolk Victory was characterized by light scattered contact and the location of several significant enemy weapons and ammunition caches. At 121408H Apr, D/1/20th Inf found weapons cache containing 56 individual weapons and 3 crew served weapons. On the 14th of April, 3 significant enemy positions were located. At 1215H, C/1-20th Inf, vic BS524653, found 2 enemy base camps, consisting of tables, classrooms, a mess hall, 6 large huts, bunkers, medical supplies, and 75 rds of ammo. At 1520H the same unit vic BS519657 found a hospital consisting of 30 huts, a large amount of soiled bandages and medical supplies. At 1845, B-1-20th Inf vic BS502622, found a VC prison which had been evacuated approximately 6-12 hours earlier. Operation Norfolk Victory was terminated on the 19th of April at 1800H when the 1-20th Inf moved to the Wheeler/Wallows area of operation, and B Btry, 6-11th Arty moved to the Muscatine area of operation. Final results for Operation Norfolk Victory were:

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(3) Operation Burlington Trail began at 08155H April 1968. It is an operation to open the road from Tam Ky to Tien Phouc, neutralize base area 117, locate and destroy NVA/VC forces in the area, and extend GVN control in the area. The operation is being conducted in conjunction with the 6th ARVN REGT of the 2d ARVN Division, elements of the CIDG forces from Tien Phouc Special Forces Camp and the 3d Trp of the 4th ARVN Cav Sqdn. The 1st Sdn, 1st Cav, 1-6th Inf (-) and elements of the 1-46th Inf are the Americal forces participating. The road was opened to 2½ ton vehicle traffic on the 17th of April 1968 with a small 2d ARVN Div convoy of 15 vehicles going from Tam Ky to Tien Phouc. On 18 April 1968 the road was officially opened when a 2d ARVN Div, 50 vehicle convoy, moved from Tam Ky to Tien Phouc and returned, closing at 1810H. Ground action has been light to moderate in the operation. On 19 April 1968 at 1610H vic of BT209140, B-1-1 Cav, F Trp-8th Cav, and C-1-6th Inf engaged an estimated VC platoon. Results of the engagement were 25 VC KIA(C), and 5 IWC. There has been frequent mortaring of friendly units in night defensive positions. (4) Operation Wheeler/Wallowa continued during the reporting period with sporadic heavy contact during February and March and mostly light scattered contact in April 1968. The Wheeler/Wallowa AO continued to be the most active area in the Americal AO during the period. Heavy contacts were reported on the 9th and 10th of February by the 3d Bde, 4th Inf Div in the northern Wheeler/Wallowa extension. Again on 27 February heavy contact was reported by the 1st Sdn, 1st Cav vic BT2721. During the period 4-9 March 1968, the 1st Sdn, 1st Cav again reported heavy contact vic BT1523. On 11 March 1968, elements of the 196th Inf Bde reported heavy contact vic BT0829. On 21-22 March 1968, elements of the 196th Inf Bde and the 1st Sdn, 1st Cav became engaged southwest of Hoi An. On 5 April 1968, B-4-31st Inf found a large weapons cache vic AT847337. Found were 199 individual weapons and 27 crew served weapons. (7) Operation Muscatine continued during the reporting period with light to moderate contact reported. Mine and booby trap incidents continued through out the entire period, increasing significantly toward the end of the reporting period. The enemy for the most part avoided major contact concentrating instead on small scale harassing attacks and extensive use of mines and booby traps. On 12 February 1968, elements of the 11th Inf Bde, operating with elements of the 2d ARVN Div became engaged with the enemy vic BS7179. On 23 February 1968, the 11th Inf Bde made contact with the enemy at the same general area. 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(8) Weather was generally good during the reporting period and did not hinder combat operations.

(9) Americal Division units continued to conduct many combat operations in conjunction with 2d ARVN Div Forces as well as Provincial Forces. In addition, Americal units provided protection for rice harvest areas during March and April and implemented a vigorous plan to deny rice and rice growing areas to the enemy.

f. Close Air Support

(1) Missions/Sorties: During the period of 1 Feb 1968, through 30 April 1968, the Americal Division received 778 close air support missions utilizing 1414 air sorties.

(2) Skyspot Missions: The division received 603 requests from subordinate units for Skyspot/TFQ-10 missions, of which 253 were passed and 233 approved. The USAF flew 125 missions utilizing 163 sorties, the USMC flew 2 missions utilizing 2 sorties and the RAAF flew 30 missions utilizing 30 sorties in support of the division. Total Skyspot missions completed during the reporting period is 157 utilizing 195 sorties.

(3) FAC Missions: The division received 975 requests for preplanned forward air controlled missions, of which 486 were passed and 453 approved. The USAF flew 311 missions utilizing 627 sorties and the USMC flew 7 missions utilizing 14 sorties in support of the division. The division requested 302 immediate/divert missions utilizing 1216 sorties.

(4) ARC Light Missions: One ARC Light Strike was flown in support of the division during the reporting period. Bomb damage assessment (BDA) by forward air controlled as a result of this mission was approximately 15 bunkers opened and partially destroyed, and 5 tunnel entrances uncovered.

(5) Ordnance Expended: Total ordnance expended by close air support during the reporting period is 1325.17 tons of bombs, 289.61 tons of napalm and 5866 rockets.

(6) Damage Assessments: Forward air controllers made the following BDA during the reporting period: 1101 structures destroyed, 229 bunkers destroyed, 1428 meters of trench line opened or destroyed, 251 weapons



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positions and spider holes uncovered, 20 sampans destroyed, 116 secondary explosions and secondary fires observed, and 84 killed by air (KBA) possible.

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(6) Several training facilities were constructed at the Combat Center during the reporting period.

- (a) A 1400 man mess hall.

(7) The Division Training Regulation was finalized and sent to the Command Section for approval.

3. Aviation.

a. The Aero Scout Company (Prov), which was activated 1 Feb 68, was declared operational on 8 March. The company employs its aircraft in teams. One observation helicopter and two armed helicopters are employed as a reconnaissance team. Four utility helicopters with three squads of infantry are used to exploit targets acquired by the reconnaissance teams. This concept has proven to be very effective.

(1) The primary area of responsibility for the company has been in the 11th Infantry Brigade area of operation with emphasis on the Muscantine Area.

(2) Results for the month of March include twelve Viet Cong killed, one Viet Cong captured and numerous Viet Cong suspects detained. The infantry platoon was inserted twelve times and thirteen snatch operations were conducted.

(3) On 1 April, while screening for elements of the 4/3d Infantry, three Viet Cong were captured. One of the captured Viet Cong was the equivalent of a colonel. Various weapons were also captured.

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(4) Operations from 1 to 7 April resulted in ten VC/NVA killed and fourteen Viet Cong captured. The period was characterized by an increased use of the Aero infantry squads.

(5) The 1/20th Infantry was supported from 8 to 14 April. Mountainous terrain, double tree canopy and low clouds reduced the effectiveness of the reconnaissance teams. One observation aircraft was shot down by hostile fire.

(6) Operations were conducted in the Puscatine Area from 14 to 30 April. One aircraft was destroyed when it crashed after receiving hostile fire. On 23 April, the infantry squads, while employed as a blocking force, found a salt cache. The cache contained 83,000 pounds of salt.

(2) This campaign has been marked by a significant decrease in the number of Hoi Chanh during the reporting period (Detailed statistics are listed in par 2f). An analysis of the campaign indicates that the drop off occurred during February after the VC TBT offensive and continued into March and April when ground action was less intense than during the pre TBT months. The VC TBT offensive coupled with the decision to temporarily suspend dissemination of propaganda had significant effects on this campaign. Not only was there a minimal number of Hoi Chanh accepted at the Cai Lu Hoi Centers during February but the after effect of the suspension of the program has resulted in a loss of momentum and credibility. The non availability of required leaflets during February had a detrimental effect on attempts to revive this campaign although a considerable portion of aerial leader work time was devoted to this campaign.

(3) The majority of Hoi Chanh continue to come from the areas where the military action is the most intense. The high percentage of Hoi Chanh from the Wheeler/Bollow area of operation bears a direct relationship to the successful military operations conducted by the Americal Division in Quang Nam province.

b. Rewards Campaign

(2) This campaign has been marked by a significant increase in the number of voluntary informants who have given information concerning both enemy activity, and munitions and arms locations. Since its inception in December 1967, the program has more than tripled in size and all brigades are now actively participating in the payment of rewards to civilians who voluntarily provide such information (Detailed Statistics are listed in par 2g). Of particular significance was an incident that occurred on 26 February 1968. At Hue Son (D) Quang Nam (I) a Vietnamese civilian guided US troops to an arms cache which resulted in the recovery of 55 losing M16 rifles and 1 7.62 light machine gun. For this information the informant was paid \$5,000(VN).

(3) Consistent results have been obtained from Operation Muscatini. This area has produced approximately 50% of all material turned in and has been marked by the large number of children who are acting as informants. Approximately 75% of all payments in this area are made to children under 15 years of age. Feedback indicates that both the printed propaganda and the loudspeaker broadcasts are understood and have been received favorably by the civilian populace.

(2) A substantial increase has been shown in the scope of activities of the audio visual (HE) team. In April 1968 104 hrs of movies were shown which was more than the total output of the previous two months. The HE team has previously been utilized in only one brigade area. Present utilization permits the team to operate throughout the entire Americal Division TACR.

(3) The combat loudspeaker (HB) teams of Americal Division have conducted various waterborne loudspeaker broadcasts in support of GVN Campaign during the reporting period. These missions were conducted aboard U.S. Army and Navy watercraft, using Military Policemen as crew members.

(4) On 11 Apr 68, a leaflet was disseminated in support of Operation Burlington Trail. This leaflet was targeted at the civilian populace and concentrated on enumerating the many economic benefits that would emerge as a result of opening the road from Tam Ky to Tien Phuoc. It requested the support of the civilian populace to report any VC activity and 100,000 copies were disseminated along the entire 20km route by UH1D helicopter.

(2) On 16 Feb 68 a leaflet was developed by Americal Division PSYOP to capitalize on the losses suffered by the 2nd NVA Division in Que Son and Duy Wuyen districts. Aerial dissemination was made on known locations of the 2nd NVA Division within the division area of operation.

(3) On 22 Apr 68, a campaign was initiated against MR5 headquarters with the objective of causing disruption of activities, dissension amongst the members and possible defection of personnel. This campaign consists of the dissemination of ten leaflets and five typed messages combined with air strikes on designated targets. It is programmed for a two week period and is expected to terminate early in May 1968.

(4) On 30 Apr 68 PSYOP OFLAN "Summer Victory" was developed and distributed. This contingency plan is designed to counter any propaganda effect the enemy may claim to gain out of offensive action conducted during May 1968. This month is considered ideal for propaganda exploitation as 6 separate North Vietnamese and Communist anniversaries occur during this month.

(2) The campaign conducted to counter the VC TET offensive although eventually considered effective indicated a need for more preparation for such contingencies. Printed propaganda and tapes were not available for usage at the operating level until 8 Feb 68. This coupled with the absence of the armed propaganda personnel (who had been released for TET) initially left a complete void in the PSYOP campaign to counter the VC offensive.

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(3) On 25 Apr 68, two leaflets were developed which were targeted specifically against the 48th and 72nd VC Battalions. Intelligence reports had indicated vulnerabilities in both units pertaining to malaria (72nd Bn) and high combat losses (48th Bn). These leaflets will be disseminated in support of Operation Burlington Trail (72nd Bn) and Operation Muscatine (48th Bn) early in May 1968.

(4) On 27 Apr 68, two leaflets were developed which were targeted against the VC and local populace in Que Son (D), Quang Nam (P). Intelligence reports had indicated dissension amongst local cadre and an impending recruitment - drive. These leaflets will be disseminated throughout the district supported by loudspeaker broadcasts early in May 1968.

G. Inspector General Activities:

1.(U) Inspector General Activities during the last quarter (Feb - Apr) included the conduct of one formal Annual General Inspection, six unit Pre-Annual General Inspections, inspection of fourteen headquarters general and special staff sections in preparation for the forthcoming USAFV AGI during the first week of July, and two open messes. In addition, the office conducted an inquiry into the state of morale of two units and processed 223 complaints and requested for assistance.

2.(U) Materiel Readiness and Funds were the areas found to be the most deficient throughout all the units inspected.

3.(U) The complaints and requests for assistance processed by the office averaged 73 per month, with a high of 92 received during the month of April. A total of three actual complaints received during the period were considered justified. The bulk of the requests and complaints were in the categories of Malassignments, Medical Treatment, and a variety of items grouped under unit administration.

4.(U) The past quarter saw the organization of an inspection team consisting of 22 members drawn from units within the division, and include inspectors for automotive, food service, supply, and materiel readiness, chemical, security, funds, health and sanitation, weapons, and ammunition for the conduct of Pre-Annual General Inspections.

5.(U) The new Inspector General reported in on 30 April and will assume his duties upon departure of the present IG on 6 May 1968.

6.(U) Future plans include the continuance of the vigorous Pre-Annual General Inspection of selected divisional units.

H. (U) Information:

1.(U) During the period 1 February 1968 through 30 April 1968 the Information Office continued as a clearing agency for news releases from the brigades, as well as a news-generating office. Support was provided to the news media, both military and civilian as follows:

6. SUBJECT: (U) US/Vietnamese Police Relations

a. Observation. US Military Police have experienced limited success in achieving harmonious working relations with the Vietnamese National Police and the ARVN Military Police.

b. Discussion. The Vietnamese police agencies that the US Military Police come in frequent contact with are the ARVN Military Police and the National Police. The ideal combined police team incorporates all three of the police organizations. However, the ARVN MP and National Police level of training, discipline, and efficiency is far below that of the US MP. Further, the disparities in background, culture, and language make it difficult to achieve understanding between the US and Vietnamese police. The rate at which American units displace and the relatively short time that any individual remains at one location also inhibits the development of rapport on a person-to-person basis. Therefore, the Vietnamese police representative sees a constant parade of new faces and great repetition of combined police efforts that succeed for varying lengths of time. Very few military police operations have well established and successful combined police programs. One example of success in combined police operations occurred recently as a result of close cooperation between a brigade Provost Marshal and a MACV District Advisor. (District advisors do not have police advisors on their team. The nearest representative is the CORDS Public Safety Officer at province level. The district advisor, usually a combat arms officer, does not have the experience nor the time to devote working closely with the police chief.) The brigade Provost Marshal assigned a military NCO and three policemen to a detachment district headquarters for the purpose of working with the district police chief. The results were far more successful than expected. By being available 24 hours a day, the military police developed harmonious professional relationships resulting in local police improvement and the formation of an effective combined police team. The individual policeman's confidence rose, knowing that an American MP was present to support him, and police influence was soon extended beyond the steps of the police station. The military police NCO found that by assisting the local policeman in a variety of ways, i.e., improving police station defenses, instructing in police marksmanship, or insuring that a sick dependent received proper medical care; a substantial degree of mutual respect and friendship was formed. The effectiveness of this team quickly proved itself. The combined team working with Popular Forces and provincial reconnaissance units under the control of the district chief began ferreting out VC suspects, confiscating medical supplies and other goods destined for VC use, and cutting deeply into local black market and narcotics operations.

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6. SUBJECT: (U) US/Vietnamese Police Relations (Continued)

c. Recommendation. That whenever possible close and continuous contact be established at district level and below to insure an effective combined police operation. In dealing with Vietnamese Military Police, the Provost Marshal must make immediate contact with the nearest ARVN Military Police Battalion or company and initiate exchange program, social events, and civic action projects. Effective combined police operations will soon result from these efforts. The assistance rendered by the 23d Military Police to the ARVN Military Police Company in Quang Ngai led to the permanent assignment of two ARVN military policemen at Chu Lai.

7. Subject. (U) Personnel (Staff Judge Advocate)

a. Discussion. The TOE for an infantry division provides for five officers, one warrant officer, and four enlisted men. This is based upon a troop strength of approximately 15,000. This division's general court-martial jurisdiction numbers approximately 24,000 or sixty percent above the strength upon which the TOE is based. In addition, this section furnishes legal services to 5,000-10,000 other military personnel of all services in the division area of operations who are not under our GCM jurisdiction. The authorized strength of the office should be increased to insure that adequate legal services are available.

b. OBSERVATION. This section submitted a request in November 1967 that the authorized strength be increased to seven officers (+2), one warrant officer, and seven enlisted men (+3). Recommend continued emphasis be placed on this request.

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2. Signal Power Equipment.

(a) Observation: It has been determined that school trained personnel operating signal equipment which required power generators knew little or nothing about maintenance and operation of the power equipment. As a result, several generators have been deadlined due to improper maintenance performed by the operators.

(b) Evaluation: Through a study of the power generator problems within the units, it was determined that signal equipment operators had received little or no training on operator maintenance and correct operation of power generating equipment at the service schools. In an effort to improve maintenance programs, classes were conducted for all operators, mechanics, and supervisors by a technical representative from USAMECOM, which proved to be beneficial to all concerned.

(c) Recommendation: That service schools incorporate classes for communication equipment operator personnel in operation and maintenance of power generating equipment, and that units which are experiencing similar problems utilize the USAMECOM technical representative training program.

D. Intelligence (C)

1. Discussion: More and better information can be obtained from a FW when time is taken to coordinate OB information with that of the interrogation section.

Observation: We have found that through this coordination the useless harassment of the FW is prevented and timely intelligence is made faster and easier.

2. Discussion: Coordination between the CI Section, II Section and OB Section has produced reliable intelligence from unreliable sources.

Observation: Instead of pushing CI agent reports aside we have taken this information and compared it with information from the II Section. Now, when an agent report gives an enemy location or installation we have a means of verifying it by the use of readouts on SLAR, VR, APD, and IR missions received from II section. We also feed back to the CI Section evaluation reports on the agents information. Thus CI is better able to judge the effectiveness of their agents.

3. Discussion: Our coordinated efforts with the II Section in establishing a "Targeting Team" has enabled us to produce more extensive and timely intelligence.

Observation: We have found that by setting up a separate team of two

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men from the OB Section and two men from the II Section, with both sections plotting their information on the same Situation Map, we are able to arrive at probable enemy locations, fortifications, movements, etc. This information is used by Americal Division Artillery in plotting their H&I fires and G2 Air for airstrikes. When possible a feed back on the effectiveness of the artillery is sent to us for the purpose of checking our effectiveness. This same information is used to evaluate CI agent reports.

4. Discussion: More effective intelligence on the enemy has been obtained through the coordination and cross-training of each OB Specialist and through daily briefings on current enemy activity each man has been able to acquire a working knowledge of the enemy situation.

Observation: As a result of this coordination, we have found that the officers are able to carry on more liaison with subordinate units because the men in the section are capable of satisfying most requests that enter our office without the aid of an officer. Most important, we have been able to instill the confidence in the men that is necessary for a smooth and efficient operating team.

5. Discussion: We have found that it is necessary to have a filing system that can enable us to find information with speed and ease.

Observation: At one time we were forced to waste time hunting through papers for facts to prove a point or assist in writing a report. Now our files are set up with an index system and there are also catalog files that are crossed referenced for quick access to immediately needed information such as letter box numbers, code names, AKA's and personalities.

6. Observation: A separate targeting section has been created.

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3. Subject: Safeguarding SOI's.

- a. Observation: Operational commitments require that certain personnel carry SOI's or SOI extracts on their person.
- b. Evaluation: SOI's or SOI extracts, when carried by the individual, can be lost or compromised by poor safeguarding procedures.
- c. Recommendations: That all SOI's or SOI extracts be secured by means of a dog tag chain worn around the neck of the user. It is further recommended that SOI's or extracts be returned to classified storage facilities at the end of each working period unless operational commitments dictate otherwise.

4. Subject: Gathering of Intelligence Information from Civilians in Enemy Controlled Areas.

a. Observation: In an area in which the enemy still exerts a considerable amount of influence, willing cooperation, in the form of agent reports from the civilian populace, is at times nonexistent. This fact has hampered our efforts in these locations since intelligence has had to depend upon aerial reconnaissance flights and information gained as a result of operations.

b. Evaluation: The "Snatch" has proved an effective method for gathering timely intelligence of a specific area. This operation is well suited to the Air Cavalry Troop. The "Snatch" team consists of a light reconnaissance team, one OH6A and one UHLG, accompanied by a UHLH containing an infantry fire team.

When a suitable individual is located by the reconnaissance element, the infantry team is inserted for the capture, hence the term "Snatch", while the reconnaissance team provides cover and cuts off possible avenues of escape. The detainee is then returned to the base camp where he is interrogated by an IPW team. Items of interest are usually location and strength of enemy in the area, supply and weapon caches, and recent enemy activity. If the interrogation is productive, the detainee may be asked to lead ground elements into the area so as to further exploit pertinent information. Immediate response to intelligence of this sort is essential to the success of the operation.

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c. Recommendation: The Air Cavalry employs the "Snatch" most effectively. Its helicopters provide the requisite surprise, often lacking when ground elements move into the area. By combining fire power and maneuverability, the helicopter is supremely suited for fixing and isolating the prospective detainee. The detainee can be quickly transported to base camps where trained I/W teams are available for proper evaluation of information. This fact allows the commander to commit his ground elements quickly, and upon reliable intelligence. It is also important to note this tactic is effective only in relatively open terrain where aircraft can maneuver while maintaining visual contact with the prospective detainee, thus closing off his avenue of escape.

5. Subject: Detainees

a. Observation: Past experience with detainees seized in the field have led to the conclusion that these detainees who are interrogated immediately after capture provide the most information. The field commander and his interrogator have the advantage over the military intelligence teams by their being present in the environment of the detainee when he is captured. The detainee, if he has committed a suspicious act, knows that his captors were witnesses, and that point in the interrogation is understood by both parties; therefore establishment of such an act is the questioning is unnecessary and time is saved. Any information given by the detainee is usually easily described and understood as both parties are located in the area of concern. Reaction to useful information is immediate and the normal 12-24 hours "read-out" waiting time is avoided. The administrative and travel time involved in processing detainees is bypassed by immediate interrogation and the effect of the detainee still being in the shack of capture is an aid to the interrogator.

b. Evaluation: Immediate interrogation is best accomplished by trained interrogators. This can be done by having trained intelligence teams make frequent trips to the field, especially when intelligence on a locale indicates that the inhabitants are involved in enemy activities or may provide information. An alternate proposal would have selected individuals from battalion sized units trained in interrogative techniques.

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c. Recommendations: More information is gleaned from a detainee when he is interrogated immediately after capture. Standing plans should be in effect to provide units with interrogator-interpreters or to send an interrogator in upon request. It is also suggested that RVN interpreters newly assigned to subordinate units be given training in the techniques of proper interrogation.

6. Subject: Enemy Information

a. Observation: Accurate, up-to date intelligence information upon which to base offensive sweep operations is normally difficult to obtain, due to the time required to process and disseminate reports from the various intelligence sources available. Usually the receipt of an intelligence report occurs 2 to 15 days following actual collection of information contained in the report. The fact that VC normally do not remain in one specific area more than 1 day at a time complicates the continuing problem of accurately locating the enemy.

b. Evaluation: Additional methods for gathering current intelligence and verifying reports just prior to offensive action are necessary to the conduct of successful operations. One such method is reconnaissance of targets by heliborne aero scouts. This unit has successfully obtained current information concerning specific areas by directing an aero scout element to "Snatch" or pick-up suspected VC or individuals living close to or within these areas. These individuals often provide information upon which to base immediate offensive action.

c. Recommendation: That aero scouts, when available be employed to reconnoiter a number of potential targets to aid in the selection of that specific area most likely to contain the greatest concentration of VC.

7. Subject: The Hand-Held Camera Program

a. Observation: The hand-held camera when used by aerial observers is valuable for measurement and verification of visually sighted and suspected targets. Photography obtained in this manner has also been an aid in briefing FAC pilots prior to air strikes.

b. Evaluation: Imagery interpreters are widely employed as aerial observers in RVN, but II personnel are not normally trained in aerial photographic techniques prior to assignment in-country. Furthermore, II Sections do not have the necessary camera equipment for the program, which necessitates borrowing the needed equipment.

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c. Recommendation: That imagery interpreters be school trained in the use of hand-held cameras for aerial photography and that cameras and associated equipment be included in the TOE of field-based II Sections.

8. Subject: Target Folders

a. Observation: In targeting operations, best results are achieved by maintaining two sets of target folders; one for hard targets such as tunnels and fortifications, and the other for soft targets such as cultivation, population location and movements, and individuals observed evading friendly sweeps.

b. Evaluation: The use of this system keeps the folders relatively uncluttered, and permits rapid recognition of enemy movement into an area as well as more accurate estimates of strength.

c. Recommendation: Hard and soft targets within an area of operations should be recorded in separate target folders to facilitate recognition of enemy activity.

9. Subject: Operations Against the VC Infrastructure

a. Observation: One of the most difficult problems which confronts tactical elements is the identification of infrastructure personalities encountered on operations. It is not feasible to have all suspects encountered in the field transported to the detention facilities for screening. Best results are obtained when a local GVN official is available to be transported to the area where the operation has been conducted upon the request of the tactical unit commander. These officials are usually quite knowledgeable of the area and the populace where the operation was conducted, and are often able to identify infrastructure suspects to be detained for interrogation.

b. Evaluation: Coordination with local GVN officials during infrastructure elimination operations proves beneficial in three ways:

Personnel known by local authorities to be part of infrastructure are efficiently apprehended. Field interrogation of individuals determined to be members of the infrastructure often leads to the apprehension of other personnel and equipment in the immediate area.

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8. (U) Subject: Reduction of Battlefield litter of potential use to the enemy.

a. Observation: Substantial amounts of waste material is generated in field environments which cannot be disposed of adequately by troops. Some examples of which are C-ration cans, ammo box wire, and expended smoke grenades.

b. Evaluation: Currently enemy forces make use of these items to provide shrapnel for their boby traps and mines. The high exploding rate of most commonly used battlefield explosive makes even light objects quite lethal.

c. Recommendations:

(1) That all wires and banding straps be removed from ration and ammo cartons prior to issue to field.

(2) That maximum use be made of soft aluminum containers in supplies like rations, smoke grenades and beer/soda. Such cans may easily be rendered useless by pocket knife or bayonet.

9.(U) Subject: Water Resupply in Inaccessible Arcas.

a. Observation: When field units are employed in areas of heavy vegetation resupply of water and other items is difficult.

b. Evaluation: The use of the 5 gallon plastic water bottle and a slack rope eliminates the need for the ground unit to clear LZ. A snap link should be fasted to the handles of the water bottle and the snap link attached to the rope by means of a half-turn (friction from sliding melts the handles of the water bottle precluding the direct attachment of the handles to the rope). One man on the ground with the end of the slack rope can control the descent of the water bottle by increasing or decreasing the amount of slack.

c. Recommendation: This procedure should be publicized so that units with similar situations may make use of the idea. With a little ingenuity this method will work for resupply of many items which can not be free-dropped.

10.(U) Subject: Combat Load for the Individual Soldier

a. Observation:

(1) In order for the individual soldier to accomplish his assigned combat mission, he must have the necessary equipment to sustain himself in the field for a specified period of time. All of the individual fighting men of a rifle company must carry either an M16 Rifle, CAR 15 Rifle, M14 Sniper Rifle, M79 Grenade Launcher, and/or an M60 machine-gun. 9,000 rounds of machinegun ammunition, 900 rounds of M79 grenade ammunition, 360 rounds of M16 ammunition plus four fragmentation grenades per individual, 72 smoke grenades, 200 flares, 70 pounds of demolitions and a minimum of 18 claymore mines, are required to be carried by the personnel of a rifle company.

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(2) The above equipment coupled with the required rucksack, poncho and poncho liner, pistol belt and suspenders, two first aid pouches and packs, bayonet, four canteens filled with water, air mattress, entrenching tool, rifle cleaning pouch and material, extra socks toilet articles, a change of clothing, and nine meals of C-rations, brings the average weight of equipment load to approximately 85 pounds per man.

(3) During the hot weather season, the weight of the equipment greatly reduces the maneuverability of the individual soldier and is one of the major contributing factors causing heat casualties.

b. Evaluation:

(1) The poncho, poncho liner, and air mattress create unnecessary additional weight and bulk for the combat soldier, especially when items are wet.

(2) LRP rations must be made available in larger quantities than are presently being issued for the combat soldier, in an effort to reduce the excessive weight of three days supply of C-rations.

c. Recommendation:

(1) To bring relief to the individual soldier during the hot weather season, his combat load must be reduced to a maximum of 40 pounds. Therefore, it is essential that the combat soldier be provided lighter weight sleeping gear and rations. This could be accomplished very readily by a light weight poncho and a lightweight hammock. Both items must be durable, waterproof, and have the capability of being folded into a pocket size package. The use of such items will eliminate the necessity for carrying the bulky poncho, poncho liner, and air mattress.

(2) In addition, the LRP (Long Range Patrol) rations or a similar lightweight substitute should be issued exclusively to the field soldier during the hot weather season. The exclusive use of the LRP type rations would reduce the three days ration weight by 13 pounds and further lessen the volume of the C-rations.

11.(U) Subject: Red Ball Expanded (RBX) Procedures.

a. Observation:

(1) The 723 Maintenance Battalion's use of RBX program to acquire critical repair parts in anticipation of deadline was minimal through 31 Jan 68

(2) Prior to March quantities authorized to be placed on RBX were exceptionally restrictive, ranging from 10% to 25% of 15 day safety level quantity.

(3) Critical items of equipment were going deadline before repair parts were requisitioned on a Red Ball request, causing delays in returning end items to serviceable status.

b. Evaluation. Effort expended in the Chieu Hoi, and Rewards campaigns and results obtained are as follows:

2. SUBJECT: (U) Exploitation of Hoi Chanhs.

a. Observation. One of the prime uses of Hoi Chanhs has been to exploit them as a personal contact to urge other members of their unit to rally. Maximum use is made of broad cast appeals, both aerial and ground and hand written messages, reproduced in leaflet form and dropped in the target area. However, a different approach must be made to each Hoi Chanh dependent upon whether he is VC and has a family in the local area or is NVA and has a family in North Vietnam.

b. Evaluation. If the Hoi Chanh is from a VC unit, assurance must be given and action taken to insure that his family is in a safe area to prevent retaliation against them once he identifies himself. The Hoi Chanh from NVN will seldom permit his name to be used in dissemination for fear of repercussions which might be taken against his family in North Vietnam.

3. SUBJECT: (U) PSYOP Indoctrination.

a. Observation. Information concerning the intent and application of PSYOP within the Division was not being disseminated to the individual soldier. In the course of his duties the soldier has need to know specifically about the provisions of the Chieu Hoi and Rewards campaigns.



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b. Evaluation. Indoctrination classes have been presented to all new arrivals in the Division. Particular emphasis has been given to the Chieu Hoi and Rewards campaigns as they apply to the individual soldier. The actions expected if confronted by a potential returnee or informant are emphasized. During the period 1 Feb - 30 Apr 68, 21 classes were presented to 1,594 individuals. Classes will continue for all future arrivals in the division.

4. Subject: Use of Kit Carson Scouts.

a. Observation. Problem of transporting Armed Propaganda Team personnel every two weeks from Danang to Chu Lai resulted in lack of continuity amongst combat loudspeaker (HB) team members and loss of man hours. These personnel augmented the HB teams and provided a means of face to face communication with target audiences.

b. Evaluation. To overcome the problem described above, 2 Kit Carson Scouts (KCS) were used to augment each HB team. These men selected for their capability to conduct face to face communication are now employed full time by the division. The result has been a more harmonious, united team effort and more productive hours of ground broadcasting accomplished.

5. Subject: (U) Limited PSYOP Resources.

a. Observation. The capabilities presently organic to the 7th PSYOP Bn have not provided the desired degree of support for this division. The input from this division represents only 15% of the total mission placed upon the 7th PSYOP Bn. The need for timely, localized leaflets required to exploit a specific situation cannot be met by the battalion. Supported units are therefore required to use preprinted less localized and therefore proportionately less effective leaflets to cover their area of interest.

b. Recommendation. This problem can be overcome by making available to the division its own propaganda development and printing capability. The division has on hand components of a Model 85 multilith press but is awaiting receipt of a Pioneer 2 platemaker before it can be fully utilized. To enable this division to fully exploit all propaganda opportunities in the most timely fashion two additional teams are required. It is therefore recommended that one each HC (Printing) and one each ED (Propaganda Operations) team support this division so that maximum advantage may be taken of psychological opportunities as they occur.

6. Subject: (U) MICE Availability.

a. Observation. Lack of valid authorization for PSYOP personnel and equipment causes problems in establishing data for requisitioning replacements of personnel and equipment.

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(RCS-CSFCR-65) (U)

Present personnel organization is based on MACPD letter to USARV dated 6 Jun 66 subject: Augmentation of Psyops Personnel. Equipment distribution is based upon verbal directions from MACPD and USARV.


b. Recommendation. That the MTOE be approved and disseminated as soon as possible.

7. Subject: Audio Visual "Jeepster".

a. Observation. The Kaiser "Jeepster" used to transport the equipment and personnel organic to the audio visual team was practically useless during the reporting period. The loss of this vehicle, due to the lack of repair parts, curtailed the activities of the team. Some use was made by replacing the organic vehicle with a substitute 3/4 ton which indicated that with certain modifications, this vehicle would prove a more suitable piece of equipment for this team. The problem has been not only the long lead time in replacement of parts for this commercial vehicle but also the inability of the "jeepster" vehicle to withstand the rigors to which it is exposed.

b. Recommendation. That action be taken to obtain the substitute vehicle for the "jeepster" referred to in the MACV - Psychological Directorate meeting of October 1967.

SUBJECT: Operational Report - Lessons Learned, Headquarters, Americal Division, Period Ending 31 July 1968 (U)

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1. Subject report is forwarded for review and evaluation in accordance with paragraph 5b, AR 525-15. Evaluations and corrective actions should be reported to AGSFOR OT UT, Operational Reports Branch, within 90 days of receipt of covering letter.

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C. (C) Intelligence and Counterintelligence.

1. G2 Section.

a. (1) The Americal Division continued to operate against elements of the 2d NVA Division in the Wheeler Wallowa AO. In addition elements of the 2d NVA Division were contacted in Operation Burlington Trail. Of special note was the arrival of the 3d NVA Division in the Song Re Valley area; thus, creating a threat to the SF/CIDG camps and population centers of Quang Ngai (P). Operations against MF, LF, Irregular and Infrastructure continued.

(2) On 1 June 1968, LTC A. E. ADKINS assumed duties as ACofS, G2 from LTC TOMMY P. TREXLER who departed on 15 May 1968. MAJ JOHN H. DORF was the interim ACofS, G2.

(3) On 3 July an inspection was conducted by the USARV IG Office and results were outstanding.

b. G2 Air.

(1) The G2 Air Section intensified its collection efforts through aerial reconnaissance and surveillance during the Quarter. Increasingly favorable weather conditions allowed for more comprehensive planning and actual coverage flown. The monthly reconnaissance plan was adjusted to include those areas previously out of range due to poor weather. The volume of daily requests increased; and the Quarter saw a marked rise in the percentage of requests fulfilled to the specifications.

(2) Emphasis was placed on furnishing more information of immediate tactical value to Americal units. Working for faster imagery interpretation furnished timely targets to the artillery and tactical air elements, thus insuring rapid exploitation of intelligence.

(3) During the next Quarter, G2 Air will allocate its resources to maximize the advantages of the current weather and tactical situation. An improved AO plan has been developed which will provide Americal units with the latest reconnaissance information.

2. Enemy situation:

a. (C) Quang Tin and Quang Nam.

(1) Activity in Quang Tin-Quang Nam Provinces resulted from Operations Wheeler/Wallowa and Burlington Trail. The enemy started another offensive in May with ground attacks and attacks by fire, interdiction of LOCs and sabotage. There were a total of 22 such incidents along Highway #1 during the period 1 May 68 to 30 July 68 (15 in May, 14 mines and 1 sabotage, 3 mines in June, and 4 mines in July).

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(24) On 23 Jul, elements of 1/1 Cav, in Opn Burlington Trail, contacted the enemy vic BT1527. Contact resulted in 68 NVA KIA, 8 IWC and 2 CSWC. Captured equipment and documents identified the 105 LF Co and elements of GF-40 Engr Bn, 2d NVA Div.

(25) On the morning of 24 Jul, LZ Bayonet received approx 40 rds of 60mm mortar fire and 2-4 rds of RPG fire, resulting in 1 US KIA, and 9 WHA. One or two VC entered the base and placed satchel charges inside the perimeter.

(26) On the night of 24 Jul, a 16 year old VC turned himself in under the Chieu Hoi program. He stated that he was working with the V-14 LF Co, and that the company was located at BT 287 089.

(27) On 24 Jul, a PW captured vic BT 042 432, stated that he was a member of the 4 Trans Co, 31 Regt, Div unk. He indicated that he had seen four American PWs in Phuoc Lanh (H) #2. He also stated that he had seen five more American PWs on 23 Apr in the vic of PHUOC HIEP (V), TIEN PHUOC (D).

(28) On 26 Jul, a PW captured vic AT 309 191, stated that he was a member of the 2 Bn (AKA 70 Bn), 21 Regt, and that the regiment was currently engaged in resupply activities in the Kham Duc area. The regiments base camp is currently located in the vic of ZC 1010, and the 21 Regt intends to move to the NUI DA Mtns (vic AT8916) for an offensive in August. At present thirty trucks, escorted by tanks, move along the SON HAI Trail (poss Hwy #14) to carry ammunition and rice.

(29) A PW captured on 29 Jul, stated that he was a member of the 44 Bn (aka 90 Bn), 1 MF Regt, 2 NVA Div. The PW stated that he believes the 1 MF Regt is located in the SON PHUC area vic AT 9237. A Hoi Chanh at Tam Ky subsector HQ indicated that 400 NVA believed to be part of the 31 Regt (aka 3 Regt) are located at BT 050 198.

(30) Operations in the Quang Tin, Quang Nam (P) area resulted in 797 NVA KIA, 1164 VC KIA, 529 IWC and 75 CSWC.

b. (C) Quang Ngai

(1) Enemy activity in Quang Ngai Province resulted primarily from friendly operations during the conducts of Operation Chattahoochee Swamp and Vance Canyon; with enemy initiated contact heavier in May than in June and July. Incidents were characterized by sniper fire and mortar attacks. There was also an increase in acts of terrorism and sabotage, interdiction of LCCs by mine and booby traps continuing. There were a total of 26 such incidents along Hwy #1 during the period 1 May 68 to 31 July 68, (11 in May, 9 mines and 2 sabotage; 9 in June, 7 mines and 2 sabotage; 6 in July, 3 mines and 3 sabotage.)

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(2) On 1 May, vic BS 6977, elements of an RF Co were overrun by an estimated two VC Cos.

(3) On 5 May at 0130H, the MACV Compound in Quang Ngai City was mortared until 0202H. At 0145H, LZ Dottie received 18-20 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. At 0240H a MACV advisor reported that Duc Pho District HQ received 8-11 mortar rounds plus satchel charges near the police station and MACV Compound. At 0235, LZ Bronco received two satchel charges inside the perimeter with two more exploding outside the perimeter. At 0340H, LZ Liz received two satchel charges.

(4) On 6 May at 0300H, LZ Bronco received 64 rounds of 60mm mortar, 2 RPG-2 rounds, and at least 1 RPG-7 round. As a result of the contact there were 3 NVA KIA. At 0355H LZ Thunder received 11 rounds of mortar fire. At 0400H, the 174 and 11 Avn received 40-50 rounds of 60mm mortar fire, resulting in several aircraft damaged.

(5) On 13 May, Quang Ngai Sector Engr Co and family quarters were hit by four 60mm mortars and small arms fire. As a result of the contact, there were 13 VC KIA, 7 PWs and 9 IWC. B/4-21 Inf vic BS 930 224, received nine rounds of mixed 60mm and 82mm mortar fire. At the same time an APC on a ridge near BS 920 233 was hit by RR fire. LZ thunder received a satchel charge near the perimeter.

(6) On 22 May at 2300H Ba To SF/CIDG Camp received a ground attack and mortar fire from an unknown size enemy force, thought to have been elements of the 406 Sapper Bn. Contact resulted in 25 VC KIA.

(7) On 23 May at 1000H, at Mo Duc (D), BS 749 506, an unknown size enemy force kidnapped 15 civilians who had been working for US forces.

(8) On 24 May, the 2 ARVN Div, BS 705 735, engaged an unknown size enemy force resulting in 53 VC KIA, 13 VCS, 12 IWC, and 2 CSWC. Documents captured during the contact identified one or two companies of the 48 LF Bn.

(9) On 27 May at Duc Pho (C), a reported VC sapper attack of four satchel charge destroyed 75% of a Catholic church with 5 IHA and 3 WHA all civilians. At Tho Lac, a refugee camp, vic BS 302 378, several satchel charges were received, damaging 3 houses. A hamlet at BS 306 390 received one or two satchel charges with 2 civilians IHA and 8 houses destroyed. D/4-21 Inf at LZ Bronco, received 8-10 satchel charges in its perimeter as a result of an enemy attack against a refugee camp north of the LZ.

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(10) On 29 May, LZ Bronco received an estimated 125 rds of 60mm and 82mm mortar fire resulting in 2 MHA and 41 WHA. A female detainee stated that she was part of a group of 15 uniformed VC who mortared LZ Bronco with 3 mortars.

(11) On 31 May at 0200H, BS 6081, gunships sank 35-40 sampans on the Song Ham Giang.

(12) On 2 Jun at 0910H, C/4-21 Inf vic BS 700 343 found and destroyed approx 30,000 lbs of salt.

(13) On 6 Jun at 0100H, vic BS603 917, friendly forces received 1 RPG round and AW fire in the Binh Son Bridge. VC entered a refugee camp near by and burned several houses. At 0415H, on LZ Thunder C/6-11 Arty received 25 rounds of 82mm mortar and small arms fire, inflicting 2 WHA and light damage to one 105mm howitzer.

(14) On 8 Jun at 0415H, BS 724 570, an RF/PF Co on a road clearing mission was ambushed, resulting in 24 VC KIA and 1 CSWC.

(15) On 15 Jun at 0800H, B/3-1 Inf vic BS 723 451, captured 2 PWs, IE VAN PHUNG, Sr Sgt, NVA and a female from 112 Co, 22 Regt, 3 NVA Div. These PWs were the first definite indication of the presence of the 3 NVA Div in Quang Ngai (P).

(16) On 16 Jun at 1045H, B/3-1 Inf vic BS 680 391, found a VC base camp with several huts.

(17) On 19 Jun, B/3-1 Inf at BS 394 602 had contact with 7 VC resulting in 7 VC KIA, 2 K-44 CIA. VC were all wearing blue uniforms with pistol belts and had documents indicating they were from the 401 NVA Regt.

(18) On 24 Jun, a PW was captured from the 21 Sapper Co who stated his unit was to coordinate with the 81 LF Bn plus elements of the 506 B Sapper Cos to ambush and block US/ARVN forces at the conclusion of Operation Chattahoochee Swamp.

(19) On 29 Jun, four detainees, captured by the 4 ARVN Regt, vic BS 515 715, stated they were from the 3 and 4 Cos, 83 LF Bn and had a mission of ambushing ARVN elements. At BS 623 018 at 2320H in Son Tra (H) #1, VC opened fire on friendly forces keeping them busy while other VC launched satchel charges and grenades and set fire to houses in the village destroying about 90% of the houses with 15 RD FHA, 30 civilians MHA, 21 WHA evacuated.

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(20) On 2 Jul, Aero Scouts vic BS 592 412, observed an unknown number of VC. Infantry was inserted at 1400H and contact resulted in 18 VC KIA. The unit appeared to be a transportation unit.

(21) On 3 Jul, LRRP OLD GOLD reported a base camp vic BS 325 695.

(22) On 6 Jul, vic BS 604 724 at 0205H, an ARVN barracks received 15 rounds of 82mm mortar.

(23) On 7 Jul, vic BS 745 806, A/B 5-46 Inf contacted an estimated VC Co. A FAC reported 20-30 bunkers and spider holes in the area.

(24) On 10 Jul, vic BS 765 826 at 1418H, Swift Boats engaged with 81mm mortar and .50 cal, 25 MAM in two junks on the beach, resulting in one secondary explosion and fire, 2 VC KIA, boats and one structure destroyed. Also on 10 Jul four returnees at Quang Ngai provided information locating C-95 LF Sapper Co vic BS 697 12, 708 910, 707 900 and F-31 LF Co vic BS 684 919, 683 925. They stated that they received training as replacements at BS 724 895, and that the units were planning to attack the HQ at Binh Son during the dark of the moon. Another VC returnee on 18 Jul, reported the same units at BS 686 922 and BS 695 923.

(25) On 11 Jul, vic BS 373 393, 2 NVA PWs were captured. Subsequent interrogation revealed their unit to be the 3 Bn, 18 Regt, 3 NVA Div. However it is thought these PWs had only been assigned to this unit and had not yet joined it. Another alternative is that a new 18 Regt is being formed, but there is nothing further to substantiate this hypothesis.

(26) On 12 Jul, A/1-6 Inf vic BS 337 148 and BS 347 and 147 spotted a VC Co and platoon. At BS 555 815, a gunship and a FAC observed approx. 100 people who broke up and moved SE when they observed the A/C. At BS 472 475, R/1-20 Inf observed 67 VC moving SE in groups of 2-4 carrying heavy packs and four hvy wpons.

(27) On 13 Jul at BS 434 393, B/3-1 Inf found a base camp with partially completed bunkers and three mess halls large enough to feed two Cos. They also found a document indentifying the 511 unit (aka for 400 Mortar Bn 3 NVA Div). At BS 290 601, the Aero Scouts acting on the advice of an informer at Ha Thanh SE/CIDG Camp, conducted an operation and recovered 3X120mm mortars, 20,000 rds of SA Ammo, 75 bicycles each with a carrying rod for 10XSA, and documents from the 201 Arty Regt.

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(28) On 19 Jul vic BS 433 387, B/3-1 Inf found a new base camp south of the one vic BS 434 393. (See sub paragraph 27 above). C/1-52 Inf vic BS 726 829, contacted an estimated platoon of VC wearing uniforms and camouflaged helmets, vic BS 7483, documents captured identified the 43 LF Bn.

(29) On 20 Jul vic BS 432 392, B/3-1 Inf captured a PW from the 3 Plat, 2 Co, 1 Bn, 22 Regt, 3 NVA Div, who stated his Cos base camp was vic BS 423 395. He became separated from his unit because of malaria while on a rice gathering mission and was captured when he returned to the deserted base camp. He further stated the strength of the Co was about 48 men, but he had no knowledge of mission or locations. A detainee picked up near Quang Ngai by the ARVN stated he was from the 3 Engr Co, 3 Bn, 2 Regt, 3 NVA Div, and that his unit was located along the Selo River from BS 3055 to BS 2442. His mission was to recon the Quang Ngai airfield for an impending attack.

(30) On 22 Jul at 2300H, Ho Duc Sub-sector received fifty 60mm and 82mm mortar rounds. On 23 Jul at 0100H, they received 20 rounds of 60mm mortar. At 0130H, Son Tinh received 10X82mm mortar rounds. At 0140H, Quang Ngai vic BS 650 730, received 21X82mm mortar rounds, 7XM-79 rounds, and satchel charges which knocked out the radio station. At 0155H, Duc Pho, South of LZ Bronco perimeter near a refugee camp, vic BS 817 379, received 10X82mm mortar rounds. At 0200H, Binh Son received 5X82mm mortar rounds.

(31) On 24 Jul at 0940H, Opn C-166 from the Ha Thanh SF/CIDG Camp vic BS 239 606, drew sniper fire. Fire was returned resulting in 1 enemy KIA and documents CIA indicating the KIA was part of a thirteen man team from B-7. (AKA Civilian Proselyting Section, Pol Staff, 3 NVA Div).

(32) On 26 Jul at 1030H, Opn-156 from the Ha Thanh SF/CIDG Camp, BS 428 634, made contact with an estimated company in bunkers using AW, HG and Hvy MG. They were suspected VC MF or NVA.

(33) In Quang Ngai (P) for the reporting period, there were 19 NVA KIA, 475 VC KIA, 138 IWC, and 15 CSNC. Contact was generally light and was characterized by attacks by fire and light harrassing attacks. A significant change during the period was the movement of two regiments of the 3 NVA Div from Binh Dinh (P) to the Song Re Valley area of Quang Ngai (P).

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3. (U) Military Intelligence Detachment: Significant events of the detachment for the period ending 31 July 1968.

a. Military intelligence specialists continued to support the Americal Division Headquarters in the areas of Imagery Interpretation, Counterintelligence, PW Interrogation, and Order of Battle. This support was provided despite the fact the detachment at Division Headquarters was formally discontinued during the previous reporting period. The planned consolidation of brigade military intelligence detachments failed to materialize. Personnel strength continues to be far short of that necessary to effectively respond to Division intelligence requirements on a timely basis. The personnel situation will not be corrected until a division military intelligence detachment is organized. Currently, the Americal Division is overstrength in military intelligence specialists yet support for the Division Headquarters is inadequate and each brigade has personnel shortages.

b. Efforts to organize a Division MID received further impetus upon receipt of USARV Message AVHCB-P 52670, DTG 301105Z May 68, subj: Assignment of Personnel to MI Detachments. The message established a standard MID for Vietnam divisions and authorized personnel assignments pending approval of the MTOE by DA. The USARV table of organization for division MID, together with the structure for a brigade MI Team, were forwarded to each brigade commander and his comments were solicited. Final staff action required to establish a division MID, including preparation of general orders, should be completed without further delays.

c. On 1 July 1968, Major Raymond E. Zickel assumed command of the Americal Military Detachment from Major Donald E. Williams, Jr.

d. Order of Battle Section.

(1) During the reporting period, the OB Section continued to produce timely intelligence concerning the enemy situation in Southern ICTZ.

(2) Significant activities and projects completed by the Order of Battle Section during the period were as follows:

(a) Assisted the G3 Plans by writing nine Intelligence Estimates on areas within the Americal Area of interest.

(b) Assisted the G2 by preparing charts, overlays and notes for the briefing of the Commanding General, Americal Division; Commanding General, I Field Force Vietnam; Commanding General, MACV;

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and the Secretary of the Army. Such studies included enemy locations, capabilities, vulnerabilities, and summaries of enemy activities.

(c) Produced special studies, estimates and overlays for the S2s of subordinate units, C Co 5 Special Forces Group (Abn), and other intelligence agencies in the area.

(d) The targeting Section produced special studies on the Song Ho Valley area and the Tien Phuoc Rice Bowl area in an effort to locate elements of the 2 and 3 NVA Divisions.

(e) Working in conjunction with the II Section and G3 Plans, a study was prepared of all SF/CIDG Camps within the division area of interest.

(f) Updates were made on the OB studies of the 70 MF Bn and the 72 LF Bn.

(g) Updated studies on Hwy 1, 535 and the southern Chu Lai TAOR (Muscatine area) concerning mines, boobytraps and acts of sabotage. Prepared weekly studies on mines, boobytraps and acts of sabotage throughout Americal AO to aid in reducing casualties sustained by friendly forces due to such incidents.

(h) Concurred in Psyops drops and broadcasting for the G2.

(i) Continued to maintain and update Order of Battle files on all confirmed enemy units and higher headquarters.

(j) Continued to furnish Agent Report evaluations for the G2.

(k) Conducted liaison visits with SF/CIDG camps, advisory groups, subordinate units and higher headquarters.

(l) Provided Order of Battle information to the Radio Research Company.

c. Imagery Interpretation Section.

(1) During the reporting period the II Section continued to furnish the division imagery interpretation support through photo readouts and special studies.

(2) Specific accomplishments were:

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(a) Photography resulting from 175 photo missions was received. 131 of these were distributed to the brigades.

(b) 72 supplementary Imagery Interpretation Reports were published and distributed from the readouts of 89 photo missions

(c) 24 special studies were completed. These include studies of Hiep Duc, Hau Duc and Kte 534 river areas.

(d) Completed the Special Forces Camp studies including overlays, mosaics and drawings. These were produced and compiled into book form for distribution.

(e) A total of 20 VR flights were made by the aerial observers of the Imagery Interpretation Section. They reported approximately 60 significant sightings. The hand held 35mm camera was used effectively, producing detailed aerial photographs of bridges, fording sites and trails.

(f) Liaison missions were continued to all the brigades, several SF/CIDG Camps, and III MAF. These were used to exchange intelligence information.

i. Interrogation Section.

(1) During the reporting period, the Interrogation Section interrogated and classified 234 detainees. Teams were assigned from division interrogation resources to operate the 1/1 Cav Sqdn's POW cage.

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The totals above represent a decrease of 442 from the previous reporting period. This is due to the fact that there was a decrease in POWs captured.

(2) The decrease in number of Innocent Civilians is due to the fact that Division Interrogation Section is no longer receiving detainees directly from the field, as was the case during the last reporting period (Operation Muscatine). The brigade Interrogation Sections classify detainees and only the NVA/PW, VC/PW and Hoi Chanh are forwarded to the Chu Lai Collection Point. The Innocent Civilians at division level come mainly from medical evacuation patients at the 2 and 27 Surgical Hospitals, detainees from Swift Boat operations, and headquarters elements. All hospital cases are now handled by the Division Interrogation Section.

(3) The Interrogation Section supported seven US Navy Swift Boat operations along the Southern I Corps coastal region. Over 125 persons were screened (not reflected in above totals) for intelligence information. Five were brought into the Division Collection Point for detailed interrogation.

(4) The Interrogation Section continues to provide field interrogation support and processes all detainees apprehended by the 1/1 Cav Sqdn. An interrogator and interpreter team is permanently detailed to accomplish this mission; however, there were four teams (2 US and 2 ARVN) operating with the squadron during most of the reporting period. Through field interrogations, these teams have helped the troops locate many rice caches, weapons caches, and tunnel complexes.

(5) In support of Operation Pochantas Forest, the Division Interrogation Section dispatched a team consisting of two interrogators, two interpreters, and one ARVN officer (from 3th ARVN MID) to TF Cooksey.

(6) On 12 May five teams were sent to the Chu Lai Airfield to debrief the pilots and crews of aircraft that evacuated personnel from SF/CIDG camp. Personnel from B/2-1 Inf, and other elements of the 196 Bde which assisted in the evacuation were also debriefed. On 17 May two teams were dispatched to the NSA Hospital in DaNang to debrief three members of the 196 Bde who had escaped and evaded from the Kham Duc area when their outpost was overrun by NVA troops. Numerous electronically transmitted reports were prepared and disseminated to COMUSMACV, and other reports were submitted to the ACofS, G3, Americal Division for preparation of an After-Action Report on the evacuation of the SF/CIDG camp.

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(7) During the reporting period, the Division Interrogation Section supported division elements by screening, summarizing, and forwarding to the Combined Document Exploitation Center (CDEC) over 500,000 pages of captured documents. During the month of May, the Americal Division was second of all units in Vietnam, in the total number of document pages forwarded to CDEC. The average time from time of capture to forwarding to CDEC was 5 days, which represents an improvement over the last reporting period.

(8) One hundred and twelve weapons were registered as war trophies during the reporting period. Approximately 30 NVA uniforms, medical equipment, NVA web gear, 54 AK-47s, and a Russian Flamethrower were delivered to the III MAF Collection Branch in response to SICRs levied by higher headquarters.

(9) The interrogation Section continues to coordinate with the IPW Sections of the 11, 196, 198 Bdes and the 1/1 Cav Sqdn. The section is also in constant contact with the Quang Ngai Interrogation Center, the Tam Ky S2 Sector Advisor, and III MAF to insure the fastest possible dissemination of intelligence obtained through the exploitation of prisoners of war.

e. Counterintelligence Section.

(1) During the reporting period the CI Section has continued to support the Americal Division by conducting investigations and inspections, collecting information and managing the Kit Carson Scout and Volunteer Informant Program.

(2) Counterintelligence inspections continue in an effort to strengthen the security posture of Division Headquarters and other divisional elements. Nineteen semi-annual CI inspections, nine pre-IG inspections, eleven courtesy inspections and ten unannounced inspections were conducted during the reporting period. In addition, security and investigative assistance was provided to the Marine Air Groups on Chu Lai installation.

(3) Cooperation with the Americal Provost Marshal and the Industrial Relations Office continues in an effort to increase control over the indigenous workers by establishing stricter procedures for processing, guarding and reporting changes in the work force. Approximately 25% of the reports containing the names, and pass number of employees of each activity have been received. An aggressive inspection and spot check program is in progress and is resulting in

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better internal control of workers. Indigenous employees apprehended out of their immediate area of employment were remanded to the CI Section for investigation. Hiring activities are required to make positive identification of the employee and explain why the person was not under required supervision and control. Workers repeatedly violating SMC Reg 190-5 were barred from employment on the installation. When applicable, formal reports of the incident were forwarded through the G2 to the activity concerned.

(4) The recruitment of Hoi Chanhs to serve in the division as Kit Carson Scouts (KCS) continues. At the end of the reporting period, 9 scouts were on the rolls. The performance of the scouts continues to improve as the scouts and the Americal Division units learn to work as a team. Two scouts were killed in action and one was reported missing in action during the reporting period.

(5) The Volunteer Informant Program (VIP) reached a peak in monthly expenditures during May and June. The VIP expenditure during these months averaged \$3,000 per month (354,000 \$VN). The termination of Operation Muscatine sharply reduced VIP expenditures in July. Expenditures were still predominantly for weapons and munitions rather than information through this program. The present downward trend of VIP expenditures is expected to continue until a new operation develops new areas of exploitation.

(6) Source recruitment continues to receive increasing emphasis. The major concern of the source program is to provide an early warning system for hostile activity and the identification of VC infrastructure in the Chu Lai TAOR.

(7) Personnel of the 8th ARVN MID, working with the CI Section, continue to assist in the identification of VC infrastructure and to provide increased coverage for the installation informant program.

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D. (C) Plans, Operations, Training and Organization.

1. G3 Section.

a. General.

(1) The Americal Division continued offensive operations in the Americal AO during the period 1 May 1968 to 31 July 1968. Contact was generally light. Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA continued throughout the period. Operation MUSCATINE and NORFOLK VICTORY terminated, new operations were VANCE CANYON, BURLINGTON TRAIL, POCAHONTAS FOREST, CHATTAHOOCHEE SWAMP and GOLDEN VALLEY.

(2) On 1-7 July 1968 a USARV AGI was conducted within the Americal Division, official results have not been received at this time.

(3) The Division Combat Standing Operating Procedures (SOP) was received in late July and distributed throughout the Division.

b. Organization. The buildup of the Americal Division continued during the reporting period. The Division Troop list, as of 31 July 68, is attached as inclosure 1. The following organizational actions were completed:

(2) USARV General Order 2511, 27 May 68, assigned the 251st and 252d Field Artillery Detachments (RADAR).

(10) USARPAC General Order 303, 17 June 68, reorganized the 196th Signal Platoon under MTOE 11-33E PAC 1/68 effective 25 June 68.

(11) USARPAC General Order 311, 20 June 68, reorganized the 3d Bn, 18th Arty under MTOE's 6-436G; 6-437G; 6-439G; PAC 1/68 effective 1 July 68.

c. Disposition and movement of units during the period.

(1) At the beginning of the reporting period units were conducting combat operations as follows:

(a) 196th Inf BDE(1st) with 2-1st Inf, 4-31st Inf and 3-21st Inf: OPCON to Provisional Corps Vietnam conducted operations in the vicinity of Hue-Phu Bai.

(b) 193th Inf Bde (Lt) with 1-52d Inf (-), 1-20th Inf, and 1-6th Inf: Conducting operation WHEELER/WALLOWA and Opn BURLINGTON TRAIL.

(c) TF Roach with 5/46th Inf and 1-46th Inf: Conducting operations in the CUU LAI TACR.

(d) 11th Inf Bde (Lt) with the 3-1st Inf, 4-3d Inf, and 4-21st Inf: Conducting Operation MUSCATINE and conducting operations in the DUC PHO AO.

(2) Major movement of units during the period was as follows:

(a) On 3 May 68, because of enemy buildup in the WHEELER/WALLOWA Area, two infantry companies and an artillery battery were moved from DUC PHO AO to WHEELER/WALLOWA area (A/4-21st Inf, D/3-1 Inf and B/6-11th Artillery).

(b) On 10 May 68, because of a mission to reinforce KEAM DUC SF Camp, A/1-46 Inf from Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL and the 2-1st Inf from the Camp Evans area moved to KEAM DUC. This initiated Operation GOLDEN VALLEY.

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(c) On 12 May 68, 2-1 Inf with A/1-46th Inf were extracted from Kham Duc. The 2-1 Inf returned to Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA with A.1-46th Inf returning to Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL. Operation GOLDEN VALLEY terminated this date.

(d) On 13 May 68, 196th Inf Bde (Lt) began movement back to LZ BALDY from PCV. The 4-31 Inf returned to WHEELER/WALLOWA area (FSB WEST). The 193th Inf Bde moved back to CHU LAI TAOR. TF Roach was disbanded.

(e) On 14 May 68, 196th Inf Bde (Lt) assumed control of Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA.

(f) On 29 May 68, because of enemy build-up in Tam Ky-Tien Phuoc area, 1-6 Inf moved from Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA to Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL.

(g) On 1 June 68, 1-52 Inf began movement from Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA to Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL. Movement completed on 2 Jun 68.

(h) On 8 Jun 68, 1-46 Inf began to move from CHU LAI TAOR to Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL to replace 1-6 Inf. On 9 Jun 68, move was complete with 1-46 Inf conducting operations in BURLINGTON TRAIL and 1-6th Inf conducting operations in the CHU LAI TAOR.

(i) On 13 Jun 68, 1-20th Inf began movement from WHEELER/WALLOWA AO to DUC PHO AO. The 4-21 Inf moved from DUC PHO AO to WHEELER/WALLOWA AO replacing 2-1 Inf at LZ BALDY. 2-1 Inf moved to LZ ROSS (BT027342). All moves complete on 15 Jun 68.

(j) On 16 Jun 68, 1/52 Inf began movement from BURLINGTON TRAIL AO to the CHU LAI TAOR to replace the 5-46th Inf for VANCE CANYON Operation. The movement was completed on 20 Jun 68.

(k) On 19 Jun 68, Operation CHATTAHOOCHEE SWAMP was initiated with 3-1 Inf conducting a battalion (-) combat assault into the area southwest of Quang Ngai City, vicinity HA THANH Special Forces Camp. The 1-20th Inf assumed responsibility for the DUC PHO AO.

(l) On 20 Jun 68, Operation VANCE CANYON was initiated with the 5-46th Inf conducting a battalion size combat assault into the area vicinity TraaBong Special Forces Camp. The 1-52 Inf assumed responsibility for the southern portion of the CHU LAI TAOR with base at LZ GATOR, relieving the 5-46th Inf for the operation.

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(m) On 29 Jun 68, Operation CHATTANOOCHEE SWAMP was terminated with the 3-1 Inf moving back to the DUC FHO AO and assuming responsibility for the northern portion of the AO.

(n) On 1 Jul 68, 5-46th Inf began extraction from Operation VANCE CANYON area, moving back to the southern portion of the CHU LAI TAOR. Operation VANCE CANYON was terminated on 2 Jul 68.

(o) On 1 Jul 68, 11th Inf Bde (Lt), initiated reconnaissance and surveillance operations in Song Re River Valley. C/3-1st Inf moved to Ea Thanh S.F. Camp and Recon 1-20th Inf moved to Minh Long S.F. Camp.

(p) On 2 Jul 68, 198th Inf Bde (Lt) assumed responsibility for southern portion of CHU LAI TAOR with the 4-3 Inf moving to CHU LAI base in preparation for moving to WHEELER/WALLOWA area. The 4-3 Inf completed move to WHEELER/WALLOWA on 3 Jul 68.

(q) On 4 Jul 68, 196th Inf Bde (Lt) began redeployment of forces in preparation for Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST. Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST was initiated on 6 Jul 68, with TF COOKSEY conducting operations with 4 battalions from the 196th Inf Bde and TF ARVN with 3 battalions.

(r) On 5 Jul 68, TF ARVN joined Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST. TF ARVN consisted of the 5th ARVN Regt HQ with 2-5ARVN Bn, 3-5 ARVN Bn, 4-5 ARVN Bn, and C/1-22 ARVN Arty.

(s) On 11 Jul 68, 5-46th Inf was air-moved from CHU LAI TAOR to Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST with HQ at LZ WEST. The 1-52 Inf assumed responsibility for 5-46th Inf portion of the CHU LAI TAOR.

(t) On 20 Jul 68, 4-21 Inf was extracted from Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST and moved to Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA with HQ at LZ BALDY.

(u) On 22 Jul 68, two Mike Force companies from Da Nang arrived to conduct combat operations with the Americal Division in Operation POCHONTAS FOREST.

(v) On 29 Jul 68, two Mike Force companies were extracted from Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST and moved back to Da Nang.

d. Plans. The following plans, operations orders or fragmentary orders were in effect or initiated during the reporting period.

(1) OPLAN 2-68 (Defense of Critical Cities), 3-68 (US and Third Country National Emergency Relief/Evacuation Plan) and 4-68 (Natural Disaster Relief Plan) were all published during this reporting period. OPLAN 17-67 (GOLDEN VALLEY), which provides for the relief/evacuation/counterattack for selected SF/CIDG camps, continues in effect and is being rewritten at this time.

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(2) OPORD 8-68, which initiated operation POCAHONTAS FOREST was the only OPORD published during the reporting period.

(3) Fragmentary order #57-68 w/change 1, continues in effect. This order provides for intensified surveillance of a suspected NVA Division in Southern ICTZ.

(4) Numerous fragmentary orders have been issued that have bearing on the following operations: Operations WHEELER/WALLOWA, MUSCATINE, CHATTAHOOCHEE SWAMP, VANCE CANYON, BURLINGTON TRAIL and POCAHONTAS FOREST.

a. Operations:

(1) Light contact was generally the characteristic of combat operations during the reporting period. The enemy avoided any major engagement, placing emphasis on the harassment of friendly troops. Mine and booby trap incidents continued high during the reporting period. Americal Division initiated 4 major named operations during the reporting period, Operation GOLDEN VALLEY, Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST, Operation CHATTAHOOCHEE SWAMP and Operation VANCE CANYON. Four major named operations were terminated during the reporting period, Operation CHATTAHOOCHEE SWAMP, Operation VANCE CANYON, Operation GOLDEN VALLEY and Operation MUSCATINE. At the end of the reporting period three major named operations were being conducted, Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA, Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST and Operation BURLINGTON TRAIL.

(2) Operation MUSCATINE was conducted during the reporting period from 1 May 68 to 10 Jun 68 at which time it was terminated. The 11th Inf Bde conducted the operation with one battalion (4-3 Inf). Operation MUSCATINE was characterized by numerous mine and booby trap incidents. The enemy avoided major contact concentrating instead on small scale harassing attacks and extensive use of mines and booby traps. Results of Operation MUSCATINE for the period 1 May 68 to 10 Jun 68 were as follows:

(3) Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA continued throughout the reporting period. During the first part of May heavy contact was experienced vicinity of FSB CENTER (BT052253) from 5-14 May 68. Action centered around the high ground of Nue Hoac Ridge (BT0722). During this same period (12-14 May 68) the 196th Inf Bde (L) returned to the WHEELER/WALLOWA AO relieving the 193th Inf Bde in place. Again during the period 5-7 Jun 68, Operation WHEELER/WALLOWA experienced heavy contact, this time vicinity of FSB EAST (BT131202). The 3-21 Inf conducted extensive combat operations against the enemy entrenched in the high ground vicinity BT160205.

(6) Operation CHATTANOOCHEE SWAMP an operation SW of QUANG NGAI, was initiated by the 3-1 Inf of the 11th Inf Bde on 19 Jun 1968. The purpose of the operation was to neutralize VC/NVA elements vicinity Base Area 121 and extend GVN control in the area. The 3-1 Inf initiated operations with a battalion (-) size CA. The 2d ARVN Division participated with the 4th ARVN Regt (1-4 ARVN and 2-4 ARVN and 4-4 ARVN) and the 5th ARVN Regt (1-5 ARVN, 2-5 ARVN, and 3-5 ARVN) joining the operation on 20 June 1968. BA THANH SF Camp participated with elements of one CIDG company. The operation was terminated on 29 Jun 68 with light scattered contact reported during the operation. (10) Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST was initiated on 6 Jul 68 with the mission to find, fix, and destroy enemy forces in the HIEP DUC (AT9426) and Antenna (AT9137) Valley areas and to interdict enemy use of highway #534. TF Cooksey was formed to conduct operation, having 4 US Battalions an ARVN TF with 3 ARVN Battalions and CIDG Special Forces operating in the POCAHONTAS FOREST AO. In addition 2 Marine battalions conducted operations in Operation POCAHONTAS FOREST in conjunction with Americal Division. Light contact has been characteristic of the operation during the reporting period. The initial period of the operation (6- 20 July) was an attack to the west to seize predesignated objectives. Beginning on 20 July a reorientation of forces began in order to cordon and search the high ground southwest of Base Area 116. This phase was completed on 31 Jul 68. (12) Weather was generally good during the reporting period and did not hinder combat operations.

(13) Americal Division units continued to conduct many combat operations in conjunction with 2D ARVN Division forces as well as with Provincial and CIDG forces. Americal Division continued to support and conduct small joint operations with the combined action platoons. During the reporting period a major effort was made to conduct as many joint operations as possible. Joint convoys were run between Tam Ky and Tien Phouc with ARVN and US Forces both having an area of responsibility for raid and mine sweep security. f. Close Air Support.

(1) Missions/Sorties: During the period 1 May 1963 through 31 July 1963 the Americal Division employed 1,279 missions utilizing 2,681 air sorties.

(2) Skyspot missions: The division received 606 requests from subordinate units for CSS/TPQ-10 or MSQ-77 radar controlled missions. The division passed 377 mission requests to III MAF and 377 were approved for strikes. The USAF flew 225 missions utilizing 400 sorties, the USMC flew 26 missions utilizing 27 sorties and the RAAF flew 2 missions utilizing 2 sorties in support of the division. Total CSS completed during the reporting period was 252 missions utilizing 429 sorties.

(3) Forward Air Controlled (FAC) Missions: The division received 912 requests for preplanned forward air controlled missions, of which 732 were passed by III MAF and 630 approved. The USAF flew 467 missions utilizing 1066 sorties and the USMC flew 36 missions utilizing 172 sorties in support of the division. The division received 458 immediate/direct missions utilizing 924 sorties of which 437 sorties were flown by USAF, 404 sorties by USMC and 33 sorties by VNAF. Total FAC missions for the period was 1011 missions utilizing 2162 sorties.

(4) Arclight Strikes: Fifteen Arclight Strikes were flown in support of the division during the reporting period.

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(5) Ordnance expended: Total ordnance expended by close air support during the reporting period was 5,103.83 tons of bombs, 427.90 tons of napalm and 7,904 rockets.

(6) Damage assessment: Forward air controllers made the following bomb damage assessment (BDA) during the reporting period: 844 structures destroyed, 110 bunkers destroyed, 3010 meters of trench line opened or destroyed, 227 weapons positions and spider holes uncovered, 22 sampans destroyed, 246 secondary explosions and secondary fires observed, 63 killed by air (KBA), 56 culverts destroyed, 17 bridges destroyed, and 152 trail and road cuts.

g. Training.

(1) The Americal Combat Center continued the mission of conducting in-country orientation and replacement training for all assigned and attached units of the division. During the reporting period 51 courses were completed and 3891 individual and unit personnel completed training.

(2) Fifteen personnel completed the Division Reconno Course.

(3) 293 junior leaders completed the Americal Combat Leadership Course.

(4) 36 personnel completed the Unit Reconnaissance Course.

(5) The mobile training team program continued. The following training was conducted by the Division for the 2d ARVN Div.

(a) Maintenance and employment of the M-29, 81mm mortar.

(b) Organizational maintenance of the M-16 rifle.

(c) Organizational maintenance of the M-60 MG.

(6) The 2d ARVN Division conducted the following training for the Americal Division:

c. (C) Intelligence.

(1) Sixty (60) aircraft were hit by hostile fire during the reporting period. Analysis of hit reports are as follows:

(c) "A" Company continues in general support of the division with two (2) UH-1D helicopters being provided for support of Special Forces operations.

(d) The Aero Scout Company provided support to both the 11th and 193th Light Infantry Brigades during the period 1 May through LIB, 1 July 1968. The most significant activity during this reporting period occurred 2 July 1968 at BS 592412, where a reconnaissance team located an unknown number of enemy in Khaki and green uniforms. The aero-infantry were inserted resulting in 23 KIA.

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(e) F Troop, 8th Cavalry continues under operational control of the 1st Squadron, 1st Cavalry.

(3) Training:

(a) Standardization check rides and emphasis on all aspects of flight safety were areas receiving major command attention.

(b) Special emphasis was also placed on the training of newly assigned aircraft maintenance personnel. These personnel are being trained with more experienced mechanics for closer supervision during training activities.

(4) Organization. No report.

e. Logistics.

(1) The Aero Scout Company converted from XM-16 to XM-21 helicopter gunship armament subsystems.

(2) Two (2) UH-1C gunships were received as replacements for damaged UH-1B's.

(3) Three (3) JP4 refueling points and one (1) 115/145 aviation gasoline refueling point were established at Minh Long Special Forces Camp.

4. Chemical.

a. Organization: During the reporting period there were several personnel changes in the Division Chemical Section. SFC Clevenger was assigned as Radiological Plotter on 15 May 1963. On 1 June Major Denmark, Division Chemical Officer, rotated to CONUS. MSG Alfara was assigned as Operations Sergeant on 3 June 1963. Major Arter was assigned as Assistant Division Chemical Officer on 12 July 1963. At the present time the Division Chemical Section is at 100% strength.

b. Training:

(1) On 2 June a presentation of the M106 Riot Control Agent Dispenser (Mighty Mite) was given by SFC Spencer to three members of the 4th ARVN Regt. The purpose of the instruction presented was to familiarize the participants with the nomenclature and functioning of the apparatus. The 4th ARVN planned to use the Mighty Mite extensively for perimeter defoliation.

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F. (U) CIVIL AFFAIRS/CIVIC ACTION

1. (U) GENERAL. This report covers the significant organization, activity and lessons learned during the period 1 May to 31 July 1968.

2. (U) ORGANIZATION.

a. The G5 Section of the Americal Division is an augmentation to TOE 7-4E and is organized according to paragraph 25, TOE 7-4E as follows:

c. The G5 Section is augmented by three Civil Affairs Platoons which are under the operational control of the G5, Americal Division. The 4th and 6th platoons are organic to the 29th Civil Affairs Company and the 51st platoon is attached to the company. The 29th Civil Affairs Company is under the command and control of the US Office of Civil Operations and Revolutionary Development Support (CORDS). The 4th CA Platoon is in an area support role in the Duc Pho AO, the 6th CA Platoon is in an area support role in the Chu Lai AO, and the 51st CA Platoon is in an area support role in northern Quang Tin Province and southern Quang Nam Province. These platoons coordinate civic action programs in their areas of responsibility and act as liaison agents between US military and civilian agencies.

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d. The organic brigades and battalions of the division have principal duty civil affairs officers.

e. The 29th Civil Affairs Company provides a displaced persons team to each Province Senior Advisor in Quang Nam, Quang Tin and Quang Ngai Provinces. These teams assist the Province Advisors in the control of refugees, and maintain records of relief supplies.

3. (U) OPERATIONS.

a. The refugee hamlet of Son Tra in Binh Son District (BT264015), was attacked at 2330 hours 28 June 1968 by an unknown enemy force, resulting in extensive damage, loss of life, and injuries. Americal Division units, especially the 198th Inf Bde, responded with considerable quantities of emergency supplies. On 1 July 1968, VA Civil Affairs Platoon assumed responsibility for reconstruction and distribution of supplies. To date, reconstruction and LEDCAP's continue.

b. A meeting was held on 9 July 1968 at III MAF for all civil affairs officers in ICTZ. The meeting provided an opportunity for III MAF G5 to explain and discuss items of interest and problem areas that have arisen. Several forthcoming events, Mid-Autumn Festival, General Walt Scholarship Fund, and Christmas - TET were discussed in detail with all attendees. A representative from the III MAF CORDS office spoke on the functions of that office and what assistance G5's could expect.

c. On 13 July 68, the G5 held a meeting of all S5 officers at the division G5 office. The information from the III MAF meeting was disseminated and discussed. Commands not represented were furnished the information at a later date.

d. The weekly liaison visits to both province advisors meetings continue to be valuable to this office. Province advisors are able to request assistance, present problems, and discuss matters of mutual interest.

e. This office continued to coordinate movement of cords supplies from ISAD to each province headquarters. However, the quantities shipped are not sufficient to prevent supplies from accumulating. Each province was able to send one convoy each to ISAD and ship some supplies. The G-4 was advised of this problem and he will provide 10 flatbed trucks a day for the movement of CORDS supplies.

b. In direct support of the division is Detachment 3, 7th PSYOP Bn, consisting of 2 officers and 7 enlisted men. These personnel presently comprise 1 command (HA), 1 audio-visual (HE) and 3 combat loudspeaker (HB) teams. The HE team consists of 1 officer and one enlisted man while the HB teams consist of 2 enlisted men each augmented by 2 Kit Carson Scouts and an interpreter. The loudspeaker teams provide ground, waterborne and serial broadcasts in support of tactical operations and civic action projects in each brigade area. The audio visual team is in support of the division and is used to show films on health and education and provide general entertainment throughout the division area of operations. The 7th PSYOP Bn also supports the division with the production of leaflets, posters and tape recordings. A quick reaction leaflet can be obtained within 36 hours, however, a normal time frame for production of an original leaflet has been 6 to 10 days.

c. The US Air Force, 9th Air Commando Squadron, provides C47 aircraft for large leaflet drops. The O23 aircraft broadcasts during daylight hours and drops limited amounts of leaflets on designated target areas.

d. Joint United States Public Affairs Office (JUSPAO) provides support in the form of leaflets, tapes and films in the Vietnamese language. These films are shown by the audio-visual team throughout the division area of operations to local populace audiences.

(a) "Wait and see" attitude of NVA/VC following commencement of peace talks.

(b) Reduction in intensity of ground contact.

(2) Propaganda continues to be developed specifically oriented to identified units. In June 68, elements of the 1st Regt, 2nd NVA Division were located within the Burlington Trail operation. A leaflet and tape were developed capitalizing on known hardships suffered by this unit and specifically directed at the 1st Regiment offering them a choice of freedom or death. This propaganda was disseminated following extensive air strikes on the unit and in conjunction with follow up ground operations.

(3) In July 68, Operation Pocahontas Forest commenced in western Quang Nam and Quang Tin provinces. Propaganda oriented specifically to designated units and individuals within the three regiments of the 2nd NVA Division has been developed and is ready for dissemination as soon as target audiences are confirmed.

m. Anti VC Campaign

(2) On 16 Jun 68 and again on 20 Jun 68, civilian vehicles traveling along Highway 1 in the vicinity of Hoduoc (D), Quang Ngai (P) hit mines which had been emplaced by the VC. As a result of these incidents, 26 civilians were killed and an additional 16 injured. Quick reaction propaganda was developed and included the dissemination by air and ground means of two leaflets, a poster and an aerial broadcast made by the district chief appealing to the local populace to report all VC activity. Ground loudspeaker broadcasts enforced this initial

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this initial dissemination by distributing the posters to all villages in the surrounding area and appealed to the people to help keep their roads safe to travel and their area free of VC atrocities by reporting all VC activity.

(3) Increased use has been made of loudspeaker teams working in conjunction with US Navy Swift Boats along the coastline. Messages have been targeted specifically against the 43rd VC Bn on the Batangan peninsula (BS 7580) and also against VC controlled areas north of Chu Lai. As a result of surrender appeals made from the boat 3 VC swam out to the boat to surrender on 9 July 68 rather than be exposed to allied firepower. These missions have been conducted both day and night to make maximum use of optimum broadcasting conditions.

(4) On 6 Jul 68 a tank from 1/1 Cav hit a mine which had been emplaced along a road by the VC. A quick reaction tape was broadcast within 24 hours exhorting the local populace to report all VC mine emplacements for their own protection and safety. This was followed by an on the ground, face to face communication by Kit Carson Scouts working in conjunction with a combat loudspeaker team pointing out to the civilians in the area the benefits that they could accrue by reporting such activity. This process was repeated when an other vehicle hit a mine in the same general area on 30 July 68.

SECTION II

Lessons Learned, Commanders' Observations, Evaluations and Recommendations

A. Personnel, Administration, Morale, and Discipline.

1. SUBJECT: (U) Letters of Sympathy and Condolence.

a. Observations (U) Suspense dates were not being met and desired information was not being incorporated into letters prepared by unit commanders in the field.

b. Evaluation: (U) Letters, when prepared by this headquarters based on information received telephonically from the unit in the field, can be transmitted to HQ, USARV before the suspense date. Letters prepared at this headquarters and hand carried to the field for the unit commanders signature are more accurate and meaningful. This practice relieves the unit commander of a portion of his administrative workload.

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b. Evaluation: To gain maximum effect the following guidelines should be followed:

(1) Aircraft maintain altitude of 700-900 feet.

(2) Small target area should be selected such as one hamlet or concentrated troop area.

(3) Aircraft should bank into the target area so that speakers are inclined at 45° angle.

(4) Wind direction must be considered. It may be necessary at times to fly upwind in order for broadcasts to be heard in designated areas.

(5) Aircraft forward speed should not exceed 80 knots.

(6) Torque should be reduced on helicopter's blade in order to reduce blade slap noise to a minimum.

c. Recommendation. That the guidelines outlined above be amplified as necessary and incorporated into doctrinal guidance for aerial use of the AN UH-5 loudspeaker system.

3. SUBJECT: Limited PSYOP Resources.

a. Observation: Distribution of printing and developmental resources does not permit a continuous availability of localized, unit oriented leaflets to exploit specific situations.

b. Evaluation: Effective PSYOP campaigns require the rapid exploitation of specific vulnerabilities. Under the present centralized system of retaining all printing and developmental assets at one location, a numerically greater, but proportionately less effective product is disseminated.

c. Recommendation: That PSYOP assets be decentralized on an area support basis. Developmental and printing assets should be placed in support of this division working under the guidance of the division PSYOP officer. One HC (Printing) and one HD (Propaganda Operations) team augmented by authorized division PSYOP assets would enable the most effective, localized campaigns to be conducted.

4. SUBJECT: Increased Loudspeaker Resources.

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(RCS-CSPQR-65) (R1) (U)

a. Observation. There is an insufficient number of combat loudspeaker (HB) teams available to permit continuing support of each maneuver battalion in the division.

b. Evaluation. Division has authorized 6 sets of loudspeaker equipment AEM-BS-4 which contains a total of 24 separate loudspeaker units AN UIR-5. Distribution of these assets can be made permitting support of one set to each battalion. OJT of selected personnel will provide the commander with ready access to a broadcasting capability and will permit maximum use to be made of all available equipment.

c. Recommendation. That the guidelines outlined above be amplified as necessary and incorporated into doctrinal guidance for use of the AEM-BS-4 loudspeaker system.

1. This headquarters has reviewed the Operational Report-Lessons Learned for the quarterly period ending 31 July 1968 from Headquarters, Americal Division.

2. Comments follow:

a. Reference item concerning letters of sympathy and condolence, page 53, paragraph A1: Nonconcur. In accordance with paragraph 3-20a, AR 600-10, letters of sympathy are best written by the deceased or missing member's unit commander. In this way, the most personal and factual set of circumstances can be given to the next of kin.

b. Reference item concerning Missing Persons Boards, page 54, paragraph A2: Nonconcur. The determining factor in appointing a missing persons board is the unexplainable absence of an individual. The fact that believed-to-be remains may have been recovered is only contributory to the investigation.

c. Reference item concerning kit food disposable, page 60, paragraph E1: Nonconcur. This item did not meet the intended purpose and is being deleted from the supply system. The disposable food kit is no longer authorized for use and future requisitions will be cancelled.

d. Reference item concerning establishment of miniports (helicopter refueling points) in forward areas, page 61, paragraph E3: Nonconcur. If the FARE systems are adopted as standard items, it is planned to authorize five sets per S&T Bn. The sets are presently being issued to the S&T Bns for testing.

e. Reference item concerning packing and crating of double pedestal desks, page 61, paragraph E4: Concur. The Americal Division will be advised to submit a DD Form 6, Report of Packing and Handling Deficiencies.

f. Reference item concerning order ship time, page 62, paragraph E5: Nonconcur. To alleviate this problem DS/GS units are being advised to insure that ASLs are verified on a quarterly basis with supporting depots.


g. Reference item concerning screws used to secure the VRC-12 series radio antenna mounts, page 63, paragraph E7. The unit will be advised to submit Equipment Improvement Recommendation (EIR) in accordance with paragraph 3-7.4, TM 38-750.

h. Reference item concerning limited PSYOP resources, page 65, paragraph G3: PSYOP resources existing in I CTZ are presently in excess of MTOE. The current operational guidance of CG, III MAF, is that production of printed PSYOP materials will be centrally controlled to insure quality products which conform to US mission and USMACV directives. The Americal Division has been provided with a small, quick reaction, multilith printing press (Model 85) to perform limited PSYOP leaflet and poster production. MTOE, currently at DA for approval, include this equipment and additional personnel within the division G5 section. USARV strength ceilings prohibit further expansion of the 4th PSYOP Group to provide the support recommended.

j. Reference item concerning Increased Loudspeaker Resources, page 65, paragraph F4: Concur. The AEM-ABS4 loudspeaker sets are division assets. Employment as recommended is considered to be efficient utilization of these assets.

1. Reference your unclassified message, control 81982, dated 3 November 1967

2. This office has arranged with Division G-3 to include instructions on the Hague and Geneva Conventions as part of the training program at the Americas Division Replacement Detachment when it becomes operational on or about 15 December 1967. This instruction will be given by a Judge Advocate. A copy of the proposed lesson plan is attached.

3. With the exception of field grade officers all personnel reporting to the Division for duty will be required to take the training at the Replacement Detachment provided they have not gone through a training cycle at another replacement unit in Vietnam previously. This office will arrange to give the instructions to field grade officers, but it will be difficult to assemble those who have already received training at another replacement unit.

4. It would seem advisable if instructions on the Hague and Geneva Conventions were given at each major unit replacement detachment in country. In that manner it could be insured that each individual would receive the instruction shortly after arrival in Vietnam.

5. Consideration also might be given to initiating this instruction at the 22d Replacement Bn in Cam Rahn Bay and the 90th Replacement Bn at Long Binh. This might prove more economical in instructor time than having the instruction given in the major units.

6. As this office has not received a copy of AR 350-216, 28 Sept 67, the extent of the instruction requirement is not clear. Request information as to whether:

a. This instruction must be given to all individuals in Vietnam at this time and to all new arrivals.

b. This instruction must be given to new arrivals only.

c. This instruction has to be given only to those individuals who have not received it previously.

Any guidance you can furnish on this would be appreciated.

a. Geneva Convention Instructions. A recent change to an Army Regulation requires all personnel in the Army to receive 2 hours of instruction annually on the Geneva Convention. This instruction must be given by a Judge Advocate. USARV has directed all subordinate commands to commence this instruction as soon as possible. We are working with G-3 and including a somewhat abbreviated course of instruction in the training to be given at the Replacement Detachment. The extent to which we must try to reach personnel already in country has not been decided.

b. The necessary claims forms and instructions have been given to military personnel who lost property at Binh Son the other night.

2. (C) History

The 48th LF Bn of Quang Ngai (P) was activated on 1 Aug 65 at Binh Duc (V), Binh Son (D), Quang Ngai (P) with a strength of 500-550 men. The cadre from company to battalion level were returnees from regroupment cadre trained in NVN, while the remaining strength was either guerrillas from villages and districts or young draftees from the Quang Ngai (P) and Quang Tin (P) areas. The following units were assembled and organized to form the 48th LF Bn: The 401st Provincial Independent Company became the 1st Co, 48th LF Bn; the 802d Provincial Independent Company became the 2d Co, 48th Bn; the 3d Co, 48th Bn was composed of personnel reassigned from various district units; while the 4th Co drew personnel from the district forces and the 1st, 2d, and 3d Co's 48th LF Bn.

In August 1965 the 48th LF Bn was engaged by the USMC in Binh Duc (V), Binh Son (D) vic BS 7785. The attack occurred while the 48th Bn was still in training and resulted in 50 KIA. There were 5 contacts from September 1965 to December 1965 scattered in Eastern Binh Son (D) and Northern Son Tinh (D) resulting in approximately 53 KIA.

In January 1966 the 48th Bn coordinated with the 38th LF Bn in an attack on Tra An (V), Tra Bong (D) vic BS 3888. The 48th Bn reportedly sustained 10 KIA in the engagement. There were 4 contacts involving the 48th Bn between March 1966 and September 1966 in Ho Duc (D) resulting in a reported 22 KIA. These contacts were with USMC, ARVN, and PF's. During December 1966 the 48th Bn was thought to be in Eastern Son Bn (D) for training and replacements. Contact was again established with the battalion in April 1967. These contacts, from April 1967 through August 1967 were scattered in Eastern Binh Son (D) and Eastern Son Tinh (D) resulting in approximately 13 KIA. On 30 August 1967, and again 7 September 1967 the 48th Bn attacked the PF's at Tu Binh (V), Tu Nghia (D) vic BS 7078. One of these attacks was in conjunction with C-16th LF Co. The majority of the incidents were small, with the exception of the ARVN initiated action on 30 August 1967, in which the unit suffered 130 KIA. Throughout the fall of 1967 the battalion was reported to have been located in Northern Son Tinh (D) and Southern Binh Son (D).

Captured documents dated 1 January 1968 to February 1968, confirmed that the 48th Bn had become a member of the new Quang Ngai (P) unit designated the 328th VC LF Inf Regt. The regiment was organized in January 1968 and disbanded in March 1968, when the 48th Bn once again became an independent battalion.

The 48th Battalion participated in the 1968 TET Offensive attacks on the Quang Ngai City area on 31 January 1968. The battalion had the mission of assaulting the RF/PF Training Center, Son Tinh (D), 2km north of Quang Ngai City. The objective was successfully taken and held until the next morning when the battalion was driven out and withdrew to the northwest. The 48th Bn sustained 144 KIA and 6 CIA in this engagement and its strength after this contact was thought to have been reduced to 80 men.

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During the period from TET 1968 until May 1968 the 48th Bn is thought to have remained in the Batangan Cape area recruiting, training and resupplying its forces. On 24 May 1968, the 48th Bn was contacted by the 4/5 ARVN, six kilometers east of Quang Ngai City, vicinity BS 690 730 and suffered 47 KIA. There was another period of inactivity until 23 August 1968 when the 48th Bn in coordination with an element of the 107th NVA Hvy Wpns Bn attacked the Tra Khuc Bridge, Tu Nghia (D). In September, the battalion retreated to the Batangan Cape area and throughout the months to follow - October 1968 through January 1969 - the 48th Bn continued to operate in the immediate area. Following the arrival of the 38th Bn to this area, probably in late December 1968 or early January 1969, the 48th Bn and 38th Bn commenced training for a future attack on Quang Ngai City sometime in early 1969. On 13 January 1969, Operation Russell Beach/Bold Mariner was initiated against the 38th and 48th LF Bns on the Batangan Peninsula. Although the 48th Bn managed to evade the cordon, it is believed that combat losses reduced their strength from 240 to 140 men. During the period February 1969 - March 1969, the battalion was repeatedly reported operating in the vic of Northeastern Son Tinh (D). In April 1969, a Hoi Chanh stated that the 48th Bn was located vic BS 680 882. On 24 April 1969, contact was made with elements of the 48th LF Bn by elements of the 6th ARVN Regt vic BS 6980 resulting in 26 VC KIA. On 25 April 1969, several contacts were made by elements of the 198th Inf Bde vic BS 7186 resulting in another 20 VC KIA, believed to have been elements of the battalion that had been contacted the day before and that were fleeing to the north-east. On 21 May 1969, the 3/6 ARVN Bn engaged an estimated 2 VC companies vic BS 713 824 and BS 718 828 resulting in 15 VC KIA. The companies were thought to be elements of the 48th LF Bn. From 21 May 1969 to 6 June 1969 the 48th LF Bn was believed to be operating in Southeastern Binh Son (D), and Northeastern Son Tinh (D), avoiding contact.

5. (C) Training and tactics

As new members are assigned to the 48th LF Bn they receive training consisting of Political Indoctrination, and Military Training. This training is not scheduled, but is given at different times by the CO, XO, and PO. The military training included rifle marksmanship, forced marches, climbing, walking on dry leaves, and swimming. Political training was that of the communist regime, overthrowing the US and SVN government.

The 48th LF Bn uses raid and ambush tactics on a company and/or battalion level. The attack is divided into two phases, preparation, and execution.

Preparation - The enemy situation is determined and a study of the terrain is conducted by a recon element. The recon element also confirms the exact location and composition of the primary and secondary targets. The plans are discussed by the unit and the missions are assigned.

Execution - Briefings are conducted and elements prepare to move to the target area.

In the raid, soldiers of the battalion are divided into 3 man cells to attack houses; into platoon and company size elements to attack a village. They try to attack from different directions.

Ambushes will be set along a route of advance. After an ambush, the main group moves to another position while the support element stays in position to wait for enemy reinforcements. They then bring the reinforcing unit under fire with all available fire power.

Defence - VC defensive tactics are based on the proper selection of terrain and to withdraw if the opposing force is too strong. Two defensive lines are normally constructed with a distance of 200-300 meters between them. If the attacking force is superior the VC will try to stay in position until dark, then withdraw.

6. (C) Logistics

Rice is procured for the 48th Bn by the battalion administrative section from village economic committees of the VC controlled villages in the area of operations. Each company has a designated administrative representative who gets rice for the company from the battalion administrative section. Each man gets approximately 2½ cans of rice per day.

It is not known where the battalion gets its ammunition and weapons. When a company has a shortage, they report to the battalion ammunition section. The ammunition section sends a squad to an unknown location to procure ammunition.

Medical supplies are replenished every three months from an outside source. Most of the drugs are marked "made in NVN", but many of these have English language labels. Captured drugs are used. However, medical

supplies are reported to be inadequate. Seriously wounded men are moved to an unknown location for treatment while minor wounds are treated in villages convenient to the 48th's area of operations.

The battalion receives replacements from three sources: The villages within the province, local force companies operating in the area, and newly trained graduates from Province Training Schools.

7. (C) Combat Effectiveness

Continued reports from PW's indicate the 48th Bn suffers from insufficient food and inadequate medical supplies. Statements from these PW's put the food allowance at 25 piasters a day which is not sufficient. In addition, a PW captured in early October 1968 stated that 75% of one company suffered from malaria. He also stated that the soldiers feared death and wanted to return to their families. The cadre had to attend a re-indoctrination school for 15 days because of the low morale of the battalion.

8. (C) Miscellaneous

A PW captured on 23 August 1968 from the 107th Hvy Wpns Bn stated that his unit had been giving heavy weapons support to the 48th Bn for an attack on the Tra Khuc bridge. Recent agent reports have indicated that the 48th Bn has a heavier weapons strength than OB currently holds for this unit. It is thought possible that elements of the 107th Hvy Wpns Bn is supporting the 48th LF Bn.

1. (U) An investigation has been conducted of the allegations cited in In-closure 1. The following are the results of this investigations,
2. (C) On the day in question, 16 March 1968, Co C 1st Bn 20th Inf and Co B 4th Bn 3rd Inf as part of Task Force Barker, 11th Inf Bde, conducted a combat air assault in the vicinity of My Lai Hamlet (Son My Village) in eastern Son Tinh District. This area has long been an enemy strong hold, and Task Force Barker had met heavy enemy opposition in this area on 12 and 23 February 1968. All persons living in this area are considered to be VC or VC sympathizers by the District Chief. Artillery and gunship preparatory fires were placed on the landing zones used by the two companies. Upon landing and during their advance on the enemy positions, the attacking forces were supported by gunships from the 174th Avn Co and Co B, 23rd Avn Bn. By 1500 hours all enemy resistance had ceased and the remaining enemy forces had withdrawn. The results of this operation were 128 VC soldiers KIA. During preparatory fires and the ground action by the attacking companies 20 non-combatants caught in the battle area were killed. US Forces suffered 2 KHA and 10 WHA by booby traps and 1 man slightly wounded in the foot by small arms fire. No US soldier was killed by sniper fire as was the alleged reason for killing the civilians. Interviews with LTC Frank A. Barker, TF Commander; Maj Charles G. Calhoun, TF S3; CPT Ernest L. Medina, Co Co C, 1-20; and CPT Earl Michles, Co Co B, 4-3 revealed that at no time were any civilians gathered together and killed by US soldiers. The civilian inhabitants in the area began withdrawing to the southwest as soon as the operation began and within the first hour and a half all visible civilians had cleared the area of operations.
3. (C) The Son Tinh District Chief does not give the allegations any importance and he pointed out that the two hamlets where the incidents is alleged to have happened are in an area controlled by the VC since 1964. COL Toan, Cmr 2d Arvn Div reported that the making of such allegations against


4. (C) It is concluded that 20 non-combatants were inadvertently killed when caught in the area of preparatory fires and in the cross fires of the US and VC forces on 16 March 1968. It is further concluded that no civilians were gathered together and shot by US soldiers. The allegation that US Forces shot and killed 450-500 civilians is obviously a Viet Cong propaganda move to discredit the United States in the eyes of the Vietnamese people in general and the ARVN soldier in particular.

5. (C) It is recommended that a counter-propaganda campaign be waged against the VC in eastern Son Tinh District.

Statement

This statement is in reference to letter from the Son Tinh District Chief to the Quang Ngai Province Chief Subject: Allied forces Gathered People of Son-My Village for Killing, dated 11 April 1968.

The Son Tinh District Chief received a letter from the Village Chief of Son-My Village containing the complaint of the killing of 450 civilians including children and women by American troops. The Village Chief alleged that an American unit operating in the area on 16 March 1968 gathered and killed these civilians with their own personal weapons. The incident took place in the Hamlets of Tu-Cong and Co-Luy located in the eastern portion of Son Tinh District. According to the Village Chief the American unit gathered 400 civilians in Tu-Cong hamlet and killed them. Then moved to Co-Luy hamlet. At this location the unit gathered 90 more civilians and killed them..

The Son-My Village Chief feels that this action was taken in revenge for an American soldier killed by sniper fire in the Village.

The letter was not given much importance by the District Chief but it was sent to the Quang Ngai Province Chief. Later the Son Tinh District Chief was called and directed by the 2d Division Commander, Col Toan, to investigate the incident and prepare a report. The District Chief proceeded to interview the Son-My Village Chief and got the same information that I have discussed above. The District Chief is not certain of the information received and he has to depend on the word of the Village Chief and other people living in the area.

The two hamlets where the incident is alleged to happen are in a VC controlled area since 1964.

The Americans Devils Devulge Their True Form

The empire building Americans invade South Vietnam with war. They say that they came to Vietnam to help the Vietnamese people and that they are our friends.

When the US Soldiers first arrived in Vietnam they tried to conceal their cruel invasion. They gave orders to the US soldiers to be good to the Vietnamese people thus employing psychological warfare. They also employed strict discipline which required US soldiers to respect the Vietnamese women and the customs of the Vietnamese people.

When the first US soldiers arrived in Vietnam they were good soldiers and they paid when they made purchases from the people. They would even pay a price in excess of the cost. When they did wrong they gave money to indemnify their deeds. They gave the people around their basecamps and in nearby hamlets medical aid. This lead a small group of ARVN's to believe that the American man was a good friend and had continued pity for the people. The Army Republic of Vietnam was happy to have allies which are such good friends and who are rich.

But, it is a play and every play must come to an end and the curtain come down. The espionage was very professional and clever. If the plan is completed it will one day become saucy, because all the people will know what they are trying to hide and what they are really doing to the Vietnamese people.

They continue to produce this play but each year they receive fewer victorious responses. Each year they are attacked by the enemy in the south and they are being defeated more every day. This play lies to the people and will soon be disclosed to them. Today the Americans cannot cover anything. Now they only kill and rape day after day. Their animalistic character has been uncovered even by the American civilians. In Saigon there are some Americans that put their penis outside of their pants and put a dollar on it to pay the girls who sell themselves. The Americans get laid in every public place. This beast in the street is not afraid of the presence of the people.

In the American basecamps when they check the people they take their money, rings, watches, and the women's ear rings. The Americans know the difference between good gold and cheap bronze. If the jewelry is of bronze they do not take it.

Since the Americans heavy loss in the spring they have become like wounded animals that are crazy and cruel. They bomb places where many people live, places which are not good choices for bombings, such as the cities within the provinces, especially in Hue, Saigon, and Ben Tre. In Hue the US newspapers reported that 70% of the homes were destroyed and 10,000 people killed or left homeless. The newspapers and radios of Europe also tell of the killing of the South Vietnamese people by the Americans. The English tell of the action where the Americans are bombing the cities of South Vietnam. The Americans will be sentenced first by the Public in

Saigon. It is there where the people will lose sentiment for them because they bomb the people and all people will soon be against them. The world public objects to this bombing including the American public and that of its Allies. The American often shuts his eye and closes his ear and continues his crime.

In the operation of 15 March 1968 in Son Tinh District the American enemies went crazy. They used machine guns and every other kind of weapons to kill 500 people who had empty hands, in Tinh Khe (Son My) Village (Son Tinh District, Quang Ngai Province). There were many pregnant women some of which were only a few days from childbirth. The Americans would shoot everybody they saw. They killed people and cows, burned homes. There were some families in which all members were killed.

OPERATIONS - TRAINING

General: From the period of January 1967 to February 1967 the 11th Infantry Brigade continued to remain assigned and under operational control of CG, US Army Pacific with the mission PACFORCE Reserve. On 1 February 1968 the 11th Infantry Brigade was assigned to USARPAC with operational control CG USARPAC. The 11th Infantry Brigade continued to be Pacific Reserve.

Air mobility training was conducted during period of 1 February to 30 March simultaneous with the Brigade's participation in Moon Dust exercises moving the Brigade (-) to Pohakuloa Training Area, Hawaii. 3d Battalion 1st Infantry, 4th Battalion 3d Infantry, 1st Battalion 20th Infantry and Troop E, 1st Cavalry participated as did elements of Headquarters, Headquarters Company, 11th Infantry Brigade and necessary support elements of 6th Support Battalion. The 6th Military Police Company (-) provided necessary traffic control, convoy escorts and town patrols in addition to continuing preparation for its company test to be administered in April, prior to the return of the 11th Infantry Brigade to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii.

The Air Mobility Training received by the Brigade was effective and well received. This training included:

- (1) Loading and lashing of vehicles and equipment.
- (2) Marshalling area procedure.
- (3) Basic troop orientation.
- (4) Familiarization with type aircraft.
- (5) Over water safety.

The Brigade moved to PTA during joint services exercises (Moon Dust) and working relationships with sister services were strengthened by the professional manner in which the Brigade functioned during the exercises.

Training conducted while at PTA was primarily live fire exercises, and preparing units for annual company tests. Company tests were conducted during the last week of each Battalion's stay in Pohakuloa training area. Tests were administered to six of the nine rifle companies then assigned. Elements scoring low and elements indicating need for additional training were retested in late April and early May in the training areas at Schofield Barracks. While the Brigade was participating in the Moon Dust Exercises, E Troop 1st Cavalry and 6th Military Police Company were administered appropriate company tests. The Brigade completed the Moon Dust Exercise with a Brigade CPX in March.

The following objectives had been established and met during the last Fiscal Year 1966:

- (1) Continue basic unit training.

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- (2) Conduct air mobility training.
- (3) Conduct marksmanship training.
- (4) Conduct annual individual weapons qualification firing.
- (5) Conduct crew served weapons training.
- (6) Conduct crew served weapons qualification firing.
- (7) Conduct air mobility training.
- (8) Conduct annual company testing.
- (9) Improve the combat posture of the Brigade.
- (10) Continue to support the Reserve, National Guard, and ROTC training programs as directed by Commanding General, US Army, Hawaii.

Upon the return of the Brigade to Schofield Barracks, it was assigned the mission of training ECT filler personnel in AIT subjects on a train and retain basis. Programs and schedules were formulated, finalized and approved and 1st Battalion 20th Infantry was assigned the mission of conducting the training with cadre personnel assigned. Instruction commenced in early April. 1-20 Infantry was assisted by instructors sent to the 11th Infantry Brigade from CONARC to assist in the special problem areas peculiar to AIT training. The instructors arrived in late April from Forts Lewis, Ord and Jackson.

Simultaneous to the arrival of the CONARC instructors, DA sent 400 fully trained infantrymen to the Brigade to bring the Battalions to strength in order that they could meet the emergency deployability criteria established by DA. An accelerated training program was planned and implemented. The Brigade continued to conduct the AIT program with assistance from USARHAW and CONARC.

The 11th Infantry Brigade commenced training in April at the 11th Infantry Brigade Jungle Warfare Training Center located on the East Range, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. This facility had been previously used by 25th Infantry Division and after the division's departure had deteriorated substantially to an unserviceable condition. Utilizing personnel assigned, the Brigade rebuilt the center, prepared a POI and commenced instruction utilizing non-commissioned officers who had previous service in RVN as primary instructors. The Brigade required all personnel scheduled for deployment to attend the course. Many VIP demonstrations were presented and well received during the period.

The 11th Infantry Brigade participated in one major SEATO Exercise, Exercise Aurora, conducted in May at Bangkok, Thailand. This exercise was extremely beneficial to the Brigade allowing the staff to gain an inside view of SEATO and operations conducted in conjunction with other services and other allied nations.

In June the Brigade administered rifle company AIT's to the three companies yet untested and conducted Battalion AIT's modified to Vietnam type situations and emphasizing counter-insurgency operations by testing land navigation, search and clear operations, use of supporting arms, ambushes, and mines and booby traps. Situations were developed to cause commanders to conduct multiple, simultaneous small unit operations. Aggressor elements concentrated on hit and run type activities.

With the successful completion of this training the Brigade, less 6-11 Artillery, met the emergency deployability criteria.

26 West Point Cadets were assigned to the Brigade for the period 29 June thru 29 July 1967. The Cadets were integrated into leadership positions, e.g. platoon leaders positions, and allowed to command a rifle platoon during field training and training exercises. Adequate supervision ensured correct procedure and techniques of good leadership was maintained and applied. A complimentary report of the training presented by the Brigade was received from the Commandant, West Point Academy.

Upon the Brigades return to Schofield Barracks, after BN AIT's, all efforts were directed to prepare the Brigade for participation in operation Coral Sands II, a joint services amphibian exercise scheduled for 1-10 August. Preliminary training of primary staffs began in early May with instructions presented by the mobile training teams from Landing Force Training Command, Pacific. The Brigade's training program for Coral Sands II included:

- (1) A rigorous physical training program.
- (2) Dry net training.
- (3) Non-swimmer training.
- (4) Three hour orientation on amphibious operations to include:
 - a. Discipline aboard ship.
 - b. Conduct aboard ship.
 - c. Safety at sea and during landing.
- (5) Training on preparation of and loading of vehicles for amphibious assault.
- (6) A CPX oriented to amphibian operations was conducted to acquaint the staff with terms and reports required. The exercise period included preparation and loading of troops, vehicles and equipment; conduct of wet net training; a rehearsal and fire power demonstration and the actual assault, landing conduct of the raid and extraction of land forces. Again the 11th Infantry Brigade exemplified by the attitude, conduct, and moral of the officers and men, displayed its capability to react in a professional manner. (a) Selected individuals attended special Vietnamese language classes presented by the USARHAW Education Center. The first graduating class was sent on TDY to MACV to gain practical experience in the employment of their language skills.

(b). Weapons Training.

(1) Individual. All personnel within the brigade participated in familiarization or record firing with their basic weapon. Individuals failing to qualify were required to re-fire. This procedure resulted in a very low percentage of personnel who were not qualified with their basic weapon prior to deployment. New M16 rifles were issued to all personnel armed with this weapon approximately two weeks prior to deployment of the brigade. Special classes were conducted and all personnel were required to zero their newly issued M16. Range firing for qualification of newly assigned personnel and zero firing was conducted up to the last minute to insure compliance with POM requirements.

Intensive effort was made to thoroughly familiarize personnel with the VN people, customs, geography, climate and the nature and causes of the conflict in that country.]

(d). Vietnam Tactical Environment.

(1) ORLLs also proved to be a valuable asset in determining procedure and doctrine for incorporation in field training of Brigade units.

(2) A large percentage of field grade officers and senior NCO's with previous experience in VN contributed many worthwhile suggestions which lead to improved training emphasizing the tactics employed in VN.

(3) Liaison visits to VN by senior commanders and staff officers led to an increased understanding of training requirements which were geared to the area of operation where the Brigade was to be deployed.

(4) The Schofield Barracks and Pohakuloa Training areas, from a terrain and climatic stand point, proved to be ideal for conditioning troops and acquainting tactical commanders with the difficulties and problems that they would face in the employment of their units in the northern province of South Vietnam.

(e). Counterinsurgency and Jungle Oriented Training. All tactical units of the Brigade were required to emphasize this type training in their training activities. The primary vehicle used by the Brigade was the jungle warfare school, which all subordinate units were required to complete. This school was organized with 11 stations which included among others: Mountaineering; Survival; Ambush; Counterambush and Patrolling; River Crossing Expedients; A Typical Southeast Asian Village where the Soldier

learned the proper methods of Securing, Searching and Clearing Villages, and how best to work with the Civilian Population; A mines and Booby Trap Station which employed the more common types used by the VC in RVN, and A Quick Fire rifle range which emphasized "Quick Kill" techniques.

(f) Unit Training. All units of the Brigade completed their AT's prior to deployment. Following this exercise the companies and battalions conducted numerous field training exercises and concentrated on maximum field training under simulated combat conditions which stressed live fire exercises. At Brigade level one FTX was conducted to incorporate an unconventional environment such as that which exists in RVN.

c. Actions Taken During Deployment

(1) Advance Planning Group. An advance planning group of 15 personnel representing all major subordinate units and Brigade staff sections departed Schofield Barracks by aircraft. This group departed at TAN SON NHUT Air Base on 27 Nov 67 where they were met by USAF and Americal Division representatives, and were subsequently transported to CHU LAI, RVN. On 29 Nov 67 the planning group was greeted by Major General Koster and briefed by the Americal Division staff on training and employment of the Brigade. Subsequent arrangements were made for an exchange of information and detailed discussion between the Brigade representatives and their counterparts on the Americal Division staff. Discussions were held with the S3, 198th Infantry Brigade. As a result of these meetings tentative plans were made regarding the move and reception of the Brigade and forwarded to the Brigade at Schofield Barracks. On 30 November 1967 the planning group departed CHU LAI for DUC PHO, the area in which the Brigade was to be employed. One representative remained at CHU LAI to coordinate reception of the advance party. The planning group was received at DUC PHO by representatives of the 3d Brigade, 4th Division, which was assigned as the sponsoring unit for the Brigade. The period of 30 November 1967 to 4 December 1967 was occupied with planning conferences relating to reception of the advance party, reconnaissance of the area to be occupied by the Brigade during the in-country training phase, and coordination with 3d Brigade, 4th Division on the preparation of an in-country training program and on availability of resources and support required to make the Brigade base liveable.

(2) Advance Party Activities. The advance party departed Hawaii for RVN on a phased schedule which extended from 28 November 1967 through 4 December 1967. The advance party consisted of 350 personnel with token representatives from all Brigade units and a minimum amount of essential equipment. Both personnel and equipment were airlifted to either DANANG or CHU LAI and subsequently airlifted to DUC PHO. All members of the advanced party were temporarily billeted in facilities provided by 3d Brigade, 4th Division. On 6 December 1967 the advance party moved from DUC PHO to LZ CARENTAN to establish a base camp and commence preparations for reception of the main body. Security for the advance party was provided by Company C, 1st Battalion, 20th Infantry which had been deployed as a part of the advance party for that purpose. The advance party had approximately two

weeks to prepare for arrival of the main body. During this time detailed planning and reconnaissance was made for unit locations, organization, and defense of base camp area. During this phase the advanced party relied quite heavily on support provided by 3-4 Infantry. Excellent cooperation was extended in this area.

d. Action Taken After Deployment

(1) Coordination and planning with host unit. Close coordination was made at every level of staff and command between Brigade personnel and their 3-4 Infantry counterparts. This coordination included planning conferences, joint reconnaissance of the area of operations, observations of all aspects of combat operations, participation of company commanders in field operations at company level and detailed briefings on current procedures and support activities.

e. Adequacy and Effectiveness of Briefings Presented on Deployment Procedures. Adequate information was provided on deployment procedures.

f. Task Organization. All assigned elements deployed with the Brigade minus 4th Battalion, 21st Infantry, which remained in Schofield Barracks to complete training. 415th ASA was redesignated 415th RRU upon arrival in RVN.

Summary. The 11th Infantry Brigade (Light) progressed from a newly organized, unskilled, untested unit thru a rigorous training program that included air mobility and amphibious movements in addition to the tactical training normally conducted by an infantry unit, to a well trained, organized unit capable of conducting combat operations. The 11th Light Infantry Brigade was reorganized, alerted for movement, and deployed to South East Asia and upon arrival at destination was capable of accepting and conducting combat missions as assigned.

was not met and replacements were assigned and joined the brigade up to the actual deployment date. The failure of replacements to arrive on the scheduled dates caused a continual adjustment of training activities and resulted in deployment of many newly assigned personnel with only the bare minimum of required combat skills.

9. **Conclusions.** The brigade has not experienced significant operational, organizational or training deficiency in connection with deployment and the subsequent combat operations missions.

10. **Recommendations.** Replacement fill should be programmed for completions not later than 60 days prior to unit deployment. This time lead will insure that individuals are provided time to adjust to their fire team, squad, platoon etc., and will permit required training to be accomplished prior to deployment.

Circumstances of Capture

INTERROGEE was captured by US Forces while hiding in a tunnel vic BS 735759.

Information Obtained

INTERROGEE stated substantially as follows:
SHE has been cooking for the VC in My Khe 2 (H) Son My (V) Son Tinh (D) Quang Ngai (P), since 6 March 1968. On 6 March 1968, a VC, by the name of Uu, came to HER home in An Hai 2 (H) Binh Duc (V) Binh Son (D) and told HER to come with him. He took HER to My Khe 2 Hamlet where SHE stayed until HER capture. There were 8 VC in My Khe 2 Hamlet. Their job was to treat and evacuate wounded VC. SHE does not know where the wounded VC came from or where the VC took them to, because SHE always remained in My Khe 2 Hamlet. On 15 March 1968, SHE saw approximately 200 VC or NVA Soldiers pass by My Khe 2 (H) Son MY (V), traveling in a westerly direction. The 200 men were green uniforms, Ho Chi Minh sandals

and green round hats camouflaged with leaves. SHE saw 3 mortars (type unknown) with the first element of approximately 50 men. The first element had also 3 machineguns, which from the description appeared to be of Chinese manufacture.

Information Obtained

INTERROGEE stated substantially as follows:

HE has been a member of the Young Men's Association in HIS hamlet, My Lai 3 (H) Son My (V) Son Tinh (D) Quang Ngai (P) for one month. HE was introduced into the Association by its leader, Huynh Chua. There are 70 men in the Association of ages ranging from 12 years to 35 years old. The Association meets twice a month in an open field near Nghiem Quang (H) (numerical designation unknown) approximately 500 meters from HIS hamlet. The meetings presided over by Huynh Chua, include political indoctrination, economics lectures, and history of the life of Ho Chi Minh. Association members dig tunnels, carry rice, and warn the hamlet guerrillas of Allied operations. On 5 March 1968 the Association dug 12 spider holes around the perimeter of HIS hamlet.

There are 25 VC guerrillas and 9 VC cadre in HIS hamlet,

HE Knows of one tunnel in My Khe 2 (H) Son My (V) Son Tinh (D) Quang Ngai (P). HE is willing to show US Troops the tunnel. The tunnel is made of bricks, and measures approximately 5 meters wide, 5 meters long, and 3 meters in heighth.. The tunnel contains medical supplies, Garand M-1 Ammunition, and rice. The rice is hidden in the false floor of the tunnel. The tunnel has only one entrance which is concealed by brush. There is one guard in the vicinity of the tunnel, armed with a Garand M-1. The guard's duty is to warn the 25 VC guerrillas in My Khe 2 Hamlet of any Allied operations in the area. The VC guerrilla force in My Khe 2 Hamlet is armed with carbines, thompsons, Garand M-1's, and 1 grenade per man. The tunnel is located approximately 200 meters East of a pagoda which is located vicinity BS 731758.

There are many punji pits surrounding My Khe 2 Hamlet. Punji pits are placed in the center and on either side of the trails leading to the hamlet. They are placed at 25 meter intervals and are not marked to warn the people of the hamlet. My Lai 3 Hamlet is also defended by the same placement of punji pits.

INTERROGEE was inside a tunnel vic BS 736758 when US Forces set fire to the hamlet where tunnel was located. The tunnel also caught fire, and HE was forced to exit from the tunnel and was captured.

INTERROGEE stated substantially as follows:

HE has been a platoon leader for the VC Local Force X-15 Medical Platoon since 24 February 1968. This platoon was located in Khanh Van 2 (H) Son Kim (V) Son Tinh (D) Quang Ngai (P) since 13 March 1968.

HE was in charge of the food production unit within the X-15 Medical Platoon. HE insured that there was an adequate supply of food for the platoon members and the wounded personnel that were being treated.

HIS activity with the communist cause dates back to 1946. From 1946 to 1954 HE lived and fought as a Viet Minh guerrilla against the French in Binh Dinh Province. HE spent eight years in this province and attained the rank of Sergeant.

In 1950, HE became a Communist Party member. HE joined the Communist Party in Binh Dinh Province.

In 1954, HE went to North Vietnam. HE Lived in Thanh Hoa Province, North Vietnam from 1954 to 1955. From 1955 to 1963, HE lived in Nghe An Province, North Vietnam. HE worked in both provinces as a farmer. In August 1963, HE went to Hanoi for one month to undertake training as a Unit Food Supplier. In September 1963, HE returned to South Vietnam and became the commander of the Quang Ngai Province Production Unit, which was an independent unit located in the Re Valley (Possibly the Song Giang River Valley) in Son Ha (D) Quang Ngai (P). The unit was responsible for supplying food for all VC units within Quang Ngai (P). The unit was located near the Song Giang River in Son Dong (V) Son Ha (D). There were 20 men in HIS unit and they came from various provinces in South Vietnam. HIS men took the food that was produced to different storage areas located in the mountains. HE did not know the locations of these storage areas except that they were located about 1500 meters from HIS location in the Re Valley. Every VC unit Quang Ngai (P) would send men to pick up the food at these storage areas. Different units were in charge of the mountain storage areas. HE did not know what units these were nor how many storage areas there were. HIS Production Unit had two MAS-36's.

On 17 July 1967, HE was assigned as Assistant Platoon Leader to the X-15 Medical Platoon. Again, HE was in charge of all food production for the platoon. HE had nothing to do with medicine or taking care of the wounded. The X-15 Platoon was not subordinate to any unit. It was composed of 15 medics and nurses. When there were no wounded to be taken care of, HE would have the medics and nurses get food from the fields. When they were unable to get food themselves they would ask the Local Farmers Association for food.

Medical supplies for the platoon came from the Quang Ngai VC Provincial Headquarters (location unknown). The Platoon Leader, Huynh Canh, was the one who always procured the medical supplies. HE would usually travel every three months through various VC liaison posts to the Provincial Headquarters. His trips would normally last three to five days. When he needed more medical supplies than usual he would take several men with him. The last time he went for medical supplies was at the end of December 1967. He took one man with him at this time and returned after five days. INTERROGEE does not know what type of medical supplies were obtained, but HE said it was a three month supply.

The X-15 Medical Platoon is a mobile unit. Prior to being located at Khanh Van 2 Hamlet it was located at an unknown hamlet in Son Hoa(V)

Son Tinh (D) for six or seven days. The platoon moved to Khanh Van 2 (H) on 13 March 1968. INTERROGEE said the platoon was planning to move again but HE did not know when or where. When HE arrived with the platoon in Khanh Van 2 (H), HE stayed only one day with them. HE was granted permission to take leave to visit HIS cousin in My Khe 2 (H) Son My (V) Son Tinh (D) where HE was captured. HE left Khanh Van 2 (H) on 14 March 1968 and was to leave My Khe 2 (H) on 18 March 1968. He was captured on 16 March 1968.

Seven of the 15 people in HIS platoon were female nurses. Wounded VC from Son Tinh District were brought to the medical platoon for immediate medical attention. They were then taken in groups of ten by one medic and 20 forced-stretcher carriers to a Provincial Hospital, located in the mountains West of Khanh Van 2 Hamlet. The exact location is not known.

In February 1968 the unit received 30 wounded VC. Most of the men had gunshot wounds. These people were treated and sent to the Provincial Hospital in groups of ten. The medic and the stretcher carriers returned in seven days, then took another group of ten.

Between 1 March 1968, and 19 March 1968, the platoon received 20 wounded VC. Again, most had gunshot wounds. They were taken in groups of 10, and again the escorts returned in seven days.

Most of the wounded were carried by stretcher. All traveling was done by night.

The platoon leader, Huynh Canh, had a 45 pistol. The other medics carried the grenades. There were 15 grenades in the platoon. No females carried grenades.

Khanh Van 2 (H) has been under VC control since February 1967. One guerrilla squad is located in the hamlet. In the event that US or ARVN Forces approach the hamlet, members of the medical platoon leave the hamlet and take the wounded with them, returning only when they feel it is safe.

On 24 February 1968, INTERROGEE was promoted to Platoon Leader. This platoon then had two platoon leaders. In the event that the Senior Platoon Leader was absent, then INTERROGEE would assume command of the platoon. Even though HE was a platoon leader, HIS chief responsibility was still the production of food for the platoon.

Old trails are mined, but used daily by the local populace. The mines are marked by laying a bamboo pole parallel to the trail on one side of the path. The mine is located somewhere between the ends of the pole, at any position on the trail. Punji pits are placed to the sides of the trails and are long, covered trenches. When an American sets off the mine on the trail, everyone else in HIS element will usually jump to the side of the trail and impale themselves. Sometimes the pits are booby-trapped, also.



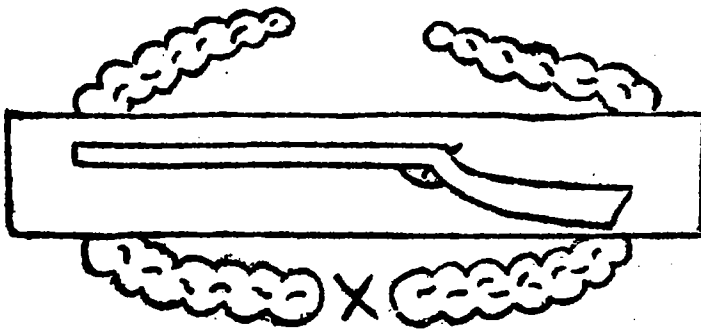
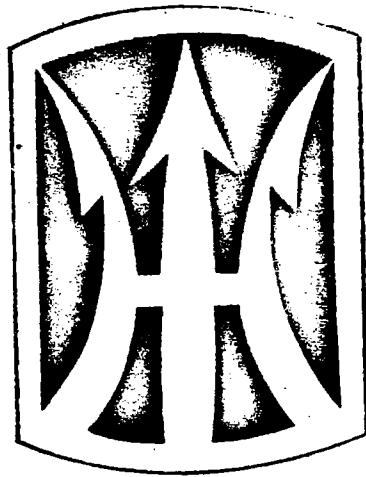

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INTRODUCTION

The 11th Light Infantry Brigade was reconstituted on 15 April 1966 as a Regular Army Unit. It was activated on 1 July 1966 and on 5 December 1967 the 11th Light Infantry Brigade deployed to the I Corps Area of Operations, Quang Ngai Province, Republic of Vietnam. The Hawaii-trained "Jungle warriors" became a part of the Americal Division and moved to their permanent base camp LZ BRNCO, near Duc Pho city, in late January 1968. The past year has seen the "Jungle Warriors" hit the enemy hard both in battalion sized operations and company sized sweeps. As a result of the Brigade's constant pressure the VC/NVA supply lines have been interdicted throughout the AO, from LZ BRUFF in the northern portion of the AO, to Sa Huynh in the south, and east from the Gaza Strip to the western mountains of Vernon Lake II. The Brigade has compiled a record of outstanding achievements since arriving in the Republic of Vietnam. One of the more significant successes was Operation Vernon Lake II, for which the Brigade has been recommended for a Presidential Unit Citation. This outstanding record is characterized by continuous successful combat operations launched against the enemy and by the effective suppression of insurgency in the Brigade Area of Operations.

I. Mission and Resources

A. Mission. In addition to the traditional mission of the Infantry, the Brigade was also tasked to: provide security in zone for convoys and Engineer road upgrading operations on QL 1; provide area security for the logistical installation vicinity of Sa Huynh; defend Duc Pho against enemy attack; be prepared to relieve, reinforce, and/or evacuate Ba To, Gia Vuc and Minh Long SF/CIDG camps; conduct counter-infiltration operations along coastal areas and inland waterways. The Brigade successfully executed five major operations during 1968, ranging from the initial in-country training program to Operation Vernon Lake II. The mission statement for Vernon Lake II was to "Realign forces in the Duc Pho AO and employ ground forces in the Da Vach mountains, Song Re and Song Ve valleys to find, fix and destroy elements of the 2nd NVA Division.

B. Task Organization. During 1968 the Brigade remained organized as a Light Infantry Brigade; however, it became an organic brigade of the Americal Division.

C. Personnel. The Brigade had three commanders during 1968, SG Andy A. Lipscomb, Col Cran K. Henderson and Col John W. Donaldson. (See attached Biographies) See Amex C for listing of principal staff officers.

D. Logistics. In contrast to the rest of the Americal Division, the 11th Light Infantry Brigade received all classes of supply, except Class V from Quin Nhon. Supplies received at Quin Nhon were trucked along QL 1 ("The Street Without Joy" during the French and Viet Minh fighting) to Duc Pho by Task Force 57-2. Class I supplies were shipped to the logistical complex at Sa Huynh, from Da Nang, by MSTC vessels. Class I was also trucked to Duc Pho by Task Force 57-2. As a matter of interest some eleven kilometers along QL 1, vicinity of FSB Lowboy to just north of FSB Charlie Brown, has been named "Ambush Alley" due to the number of convoys ambushed in that area by the enemy. Future plans call for a good deal of logistical supplies to come to FSB Bronco using USAF C123 and C130 aircraft.

E. Intelligence. The Brigade S2 Section has been enhanced through the augmentation of a Military Intelligence Team, a Radio Research Team, a Long Range Reconnaissance Platoon and an Air Force Weather Detachment. In addition to other methods of aerial surveillance, the S2 made extensive use of the 90th Chemical Detachment and their Airborne Personnel Detector (People Sniffer). Hot spots detected on Sniffer Missions have been engaged by artillery and later exploited by ground forces.

II. Operations

In December of 1967 the 11th Infantry Brigade initiated combat operations in the Duc Pho area. At this time the Brigade assumed responsibility for the Muscatine Area of Operations from the 198th Infantry Brigade, Americal Division and from the 3rd Infantry Brigade, 4th Infantry Division. The Brigade's combat record at the end of July 1968, was 1807 enemy killed (to include 15 NVA), 1411 individual and 39 crew served weapons captured. During this period the Brigade severely interdicted the enemy's supply lines. Combat sweeps throughout the Brigade's Area of Operations resulted in the capture of 82 tons of rice and 178.5 tons of salt which were found hidden in caves and tunnels.

In early April, Operation Norfolk Victory was undertaken by elements of the Brigade in the Quang Ngai Province. During this operation, the Brigade succeeded in completely destroying the enemy's major base of operations and capturing enormous weapons and munitions caches. The 11th Infantry Brigade distinguished itself in March 1968, by sinking an enemy trawler off the coast of Duc Pho. A forced night march to the beach resulted in trapping the ship as it was chased ashore by swift boats and gunships.

During the period 4-24 September 1968 the 11th Infantry Brigade under the control of Task Force Galloway participated in Champagne Grove, a sweep to Base Area 121 and the Song Re Valley. Concentrated enemy forces capable of rapidly massing to division size and launching a major attack on Quang Ngai City prompted the Brigade to commit three battalions and one Cavalry Troop to the hard fought twenty day campaign. Casualties were high on both sides, but eventually the threat was crushed. This single operation resulted in over 450 enemy dead and sixty-eight weapons captured.

Another major Brigade accomplishment was achieved by Task Force Barker, composed of one rifle company from each battalion stationed at LZ Dottie. At the time of its disbanding, Task Force Barker had accounted for more than 400 enemy dead.

The biggest and most successful operation of the year was Vernon Lake II (2 November 1968 through 28 February 1969). The operation was conducted in an area which preliminary intelligence indicated was a massive VC/NVA resupply and consolidation region. The operation resulted in the capture of large quantities of VC/NVA supplies, thereby putting an additional burden on an already overtaxed supply system. Vernon Lake II also resulted in the capture of large amounts of enemy ammunition and weapons, thereby reducing the enemy's short term combat effectiveness and increasing his long term logistical

problems. Supply and consolidation locations which previously had been virtually uncontested were subject to systematic harrassment and attack. This action demonstrated to the enemy, as well as to the general population of Southern Quang Ngai Province, the ability of friendly forces to conduct operations in what had been considered VC/NVA sanctuaries. During Vernon Lake II, the 11th Infantry Brigade, on a broad scale, accomplished three objectives:

(1) The enemy's already massive logistical problems were compounded by the destruction of supplies and disruption of bases.

(2) The enemy was constantly on the move throughout the operational area, thus limiting his ability to consolidate for widespread attacks along the coastal plains.

(3) By denying the enemy free and unlimited access to an area which formerly had been a VC/NVA sanctuary, the 11th Infantry Brigade demonstrated to the people of Southern Quang Ngai Province, as well as to the VC/NVA, that friendly military forces can and will operate throughout Southern Quang Ngai Province.

III. Major Events and Developments

A. S5 Section. As the Brigade began combat operations the S5 Section grew to its full capability. As organized in 1968, the S5 Section contained two sub-sections: Psychological Operations and Civil Affairs. The Psychological Operations (PSYOPS) program was aimed at free world forces, VN civilians, and the enemy. The VN civilians were shown films on the importance of a strong effective government and better methods of agriculture, while the enemy was bombarded with leaflets and broadcasts playing up his hunger, poor medical care and loneliness for his loved ones. Prominent in PSYOPS was the Chieu Hoi program in which the VC/NVA was exhorted to turn himself in, in return for pardon and a place to live. Civil affairs was many faceted. The MEDCAP program treated Vietnamese for their illnesses while the Civic Action program constructed new public buildings. The 29th Civil Affairs Detachment introduced a better quality of hogs in order to start a local meat industry. The Detachment also introduced a sorgum program for feeding the hogs.

B. The Addition of the 4th Battalion, 21st Infantry. On 13 April the 4th Battalion, 21st Infantry, which was formed in November and had been training for deployment to RVN, joined the Brigade at Duc Pho. The Battalion became the fourth maneuver battalion and increased the Brigade strength to approximately 5,000. The 4th Battalion, 21st Infantry was immediately deployed in the Brigade AO and remained generally on the boundary of the mountains and coastal lowlands. In June the battalion became OPCON to the 196th Infantry Brigade and was transported to LZ Baldy, remaining there until 8 November, when it returned to 11th Brigade control and the AO in the mountains around LZ Amy.

C. Presidential Unit Citation. Due to the magnitude and success of Operation Vernon Lake II the 11th Infantry Brigade has been recommended for the Presidential Unit Citation. The results of Vernon Lake II are shown in Annex E.

D. Tactics.

(1) Combat operations in the 11th Brigade GZ were characterized by semi-independent small unit operations conducted from company size patrol bases with occasional massing of forces to battalion size as the enemy situation dictated.

(2) Ambushes. Ambushes were used frequently in conjunction with day and night defensive positions to harass and limit the enemy's freedom of movement in addition to inflicting casualties. They were usually located three to seven hundred meters from the main body of the unit on a route of approach into the unit's defensive position.

(3) The most significant tactical concept in general use throughout the Brigade in 1968 was the airmobile concept with its extensive use of helicopters. UH-1H (Huey) helicopters were used in the air assault role to exploit and rapidly reinforce ground contacts, as utility helicopters to resupply troops in the field, as command and control ships to direct the course of the fighting, and finally as medical evacuation aircraft to bring the wounded to swift medical attention. UH-1C aircraft were used as "gunships", heavily armed gun platforms with rockets, belt fed M79 HE launchers, mini-guns and 2 M60 machinegun door guns. OH-6 helicopters were used as visual reconnaissance aircraft, usually as part of a team composed of two gunships, a LOH, and a slick. The helicopter workhorse CH-47 Chinook, assisted greatly in the building of Fire Support Bases and provided resupply. The Brigade averaged 6-8 CH-47 hours and 45-55 UH-1 hours daily.

OFFICIAL BIOGRAPHY

ANDY ARCHER LIPSCOMB

BRIGADIER GENERAL, U. S. ARMY.

Andy Archer Lipscomb was born in Bessemer, Alabama. He graduated from the United States Military Academy, West Point, New York, with a Bachelor of Science degree on June 14, 1938, and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry in the Regular Army. His first assignment was at Fort Hamilton, New York, with the 18th Infantry Regiment of the First Division. During his assignment with the 18th Infantry, he was selected for special duty during the summers of 1939 and 1940 with the US Army Provisional Battalion stationed at the New York World's Fair. In December 1940, he was transferred to Camp Paraiso, Panama, where he commanded Company E, 5th Infantry.

He returned to the United States in August 1942, to attend the Advanced Course of the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Georgia. Upon graduation, he remained at Fort Benning for duty as an instructor and Assistant Director of Training of the Infantry School.

In November 1943, General Lipscomb was selected for attendance at the Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and upon graduation was assigned as the Battalion Commander of the 3rd Battalion, 31st Infantry, 78th Division, in the Tennessee Maneuver Area near Lebanon, Tennessee.

In October 1944, General Lipscomb sailed for the European Theater of Operations with his battalion and commanded it in the Ardennes-Alsace, Rhineland and Central European campaigns on the Western Front in Germany, Belgium and Holland until the war ended in Europe in 1945.

Following occupation duty in Germany, General Lipscomb returned to the United States and was assigned overseas again as the Chief of the Infantry Training Section of the Joint Brazil-United States Military Commission with station in Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, from May 1946, until August 1947. Upon returning to the United States in 1947, General Lipscomb served as Regular Army Advisor with the New York National Guard in New York City until July 1951.

In August 1951, General Lipscomb was transferred to Fort Meyer, Virginia, where he commanded the 1st Battalion, 3rd Infantry, and for a short period of time, the 3rd Infantry Regiment.

During his period of service with the 3rd Infantry, General Lipscomb also served as White House Aide to President Harry S. Truman.

In August 1952, General Lipscomb was selected for attendance at the Army War College, Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania, and upon graduation in June 1953, was transferred overseas again to Ankara, Turkey, where he was assigned as Chief,

Infantry Section, US Army Group, Joint American Military Mission to Turkey. In May 1954, he was transferred to Headquarters, Seventh United States Army, in Stuttgart, Germany, and served there as Deputy Army G3 (Plans, Operations and Training), until June 1955.

In June 1955, General Lipscomb was transferred to Gelnhausen, Germany, where he commanded the 12th Infantry Regiment of the Fourth Infantry Division, until the regiment was returned to the United States in June 1956. From August 1956 until 1959, General Lipscomb was stationed at Headquarters, Second United States Army, Fort Meade, Maryland, where he served as Assistant Chief of Staff, G3, of Second Army.

In August 1959, General Lipscomb was once again transferred overseas, this time to Korea. Here he was assigned as Chief of Staff of the famous First Cavalry Division, which was engaged in patrolling the Demilitarized Zone between North and South Korea. Upon returning to the United States in September, 1960, General Lipscomb was assigned to Washington, D. C., in the Office of the Secretary of Defense where he served as Military Staff Assistant to the newly-created United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. Upon being selected for promotion to Brigadier General, he was transferred to Fort Bragg, North Carolina, in March, 1962, and was assigned as Deputy Commanding General and Chief of Staff of the XVIII Airborne Corps and Fort Bragg, Strategic Army Corps (STRAC). Effective 17 April 1962, he was presented the rank of Brigadier General. In June 1963, General Lipscomb was transferred to Fort Wainwright, Alaska, where he became Commanding General, USARAL, Yukon Command and Fort Wainwright, and Deputy Commander, United States Army, Alaska. On 15 January 1966, General Lipscomb was reassigned as Deputy Commanding General, US Army Training Center (Infantry), Fort Polk, Louisiana. On 22 March 1967, General Lipscomb assumed command of the 11th Infantry Brigade at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii.

ANNEX C (2)

COL DONALDSON BIOGRAPHY

COL John W. Donaldson received his commission from the United States Military Academy at West Point in June, 1944, and began his career with the 42nd Division in Europe. Moving from platoon leader to company commander in the 232nd Infantry, he remained with the "Rainbow" Division when they became an occupation force in Austria.

In 1946 COL Donaldson studied at the Sorbonne in Paris in preparation for his next assignment as French and German instructor at West Point. In 1948 he was selected for the US Pentathlon team for the Olympic games in London. He taught at West Point until 1950 when he returned to Germany for two years as Assistant Chief of Staff with the 1st Infantry Division and one year as a Battalion Operations Officer and Regimental S1 with the 16th Infantry Regiment.

The Colonel was made Senior Aide and Assistant Executive Officer to General Lauris Norstad, Supreme Commander of Allied Forces Europe, from 1956 to 1960, and then attended the Armed Forces Staff College in 1961. A year later he served the first of two tours with the 7th Infantry Division in Korea as Deputy Commander of the 1st Battle Group, 32nd Infantry, and as Division G3.

Returning to CONUS in 1962, he attended the Air War College at Maxwell AFB and concurrently earned an MA in International Affairs from George Washington University.

COL Donaldson returned to the 7th Division in Korea as Chief of Staff, and then moved to Washington to serve as Assistant Director for plans in the Office of the Army Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations.

Prior to coming to the 11th Brigade, COL Donaldson spent 11 months as the Army Member of the Staff Group of the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff.

He assumed command of the 11th Infantry Brigade on October 4, 1968. Among his awards and decorations COL Donaldson counts the Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Joint Services Commendation Medal, the Bronz Star Medal with "V" device, and Oak Leaf Cluster, the Army Commendation Medal, the Purple Heart, two Vietnamese Crosses of Gallantry with Palm, the Silver Star Medal, the Distinguished Flying Cross, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge with Star.

His wife Margarethe Ros and their two sons make their home in Alexandria, Virginia.

8. Intelligence: Enemy forces in the area of operation were estimated to be one local force battalion located in the vicinity of My Lai, BS 728795 as shown in Inclosure 1. This information was based upon previous combat operations in this area, visual reconnaissance, and PW and agent reports. During the operation it was estimated that only two local force companies supported by two to three local guerrilla platoons opposed the friendly forces. The area of operation consisted of six hamlets to varying degree of ruin, each separated by rice paddies which were bounded by a series of hedge rows and tree lines. The area was also honeycombed with tunnels and bunkers. The many hedge rows offered the enemy considerable cover and concealment from the attacking friendly forces. However the clear weather permitted maximum utilization of reconnaissance aircraft and helicopter gunships to seek out and destroy enemy defensive positions.

9. Mission: To destroy enemy forces and fortifications in a VC base camp and to capture enemy personnel, weapons and supplies.

10. Concept of Operation: Task Force Barker conducts a helicopter assault on 160730 Mar 68 on a VC base camp vicinity BS 728795 with Company C, 1st Battalion, 20th Infantry landing to the west and Company B, 4th Battalion, 3d Infantry landing to the southeast of the VC base camp. Company A, 3d Battalion, 1st Infantry moves by foot to blocking positions north of the base camp prior to the helicopter assault. USN Swift Boats screen the coastal area to the east of the base camp and Company B (Aero Scout) -123d Avn Bn screens to the south to block or destroy enemy forces attempting to withdraw. See Incl 1. An artillery preparation and gunship suppressive fires are planned for both landing zones. Artillery blocking fires are planned on all paths of escape which the enemy might use. Upon landing, the two rifle companies assault enemy positions making a detailed search of all buildings, bunkers and tunnels as they move.

11. Execution: The order was issued on 14 March 1968. Coordination with supporting arms reconnaissance and positioning of forces was conducted on 15 Mar 68. On 160726 Mar 68 a three minute artillery preparation began on the first landing zone and at 0730 hours the first lift for Co C touched down while helicopter gunships provided suppressive fires. At 0747 hours the last lift of Co C was completed. The initial preparation resulted in 68 VC KIA's in the enemy's combat outpost positions. Co C then immediately attacked to the east receiving enemy small arms fire as they pressed forward. At 0809H a three minute artillery preparation on the second landing zone began and the first lift for Co B touched down at 0815 hours. At 0827 the last lift of Co B was completed and Co B moved to the north and east receiving only light enemy resistance initially. As Co B approached the

area of the VC base camp, enemy defensive fires increased. One platoon from Co B flanked the enemy positions and engaged one enemy platoon resulting in 30 enemy KIA. Throughout the day Co B and Co C received sporadic sniper fire and encountered numerous enemy booby traps. Co A in clocking positions to the north had only light contact against small enemy elements attempting to withdraw to the north. Attempts of the enemy to escape along the beach or to the south were successfully countered by the Swift Boats and the Aero Scout Company. By 1630 hours the surviving enemy elements had broken all contact with friendly forces by infiltrating with civilians leaving the area, or by going down into the extensive tunnel systems throughout the area. At 1715 hours Co C linked-up with Co B and both units went into a perimeter defense for the night in preparation for conducting search and destroy operations the next day. With the establishment of the night defensive position at 161800 March 1968 the operation was terminated.

13. Administrative Matters:

a. Supply. Units moved with basic loads of ammunition and three C-ration meals per man. Resupply was planned and effected by helicopter. No problem existed in resupply.

b. Maintenance. No problems encountered.

c. Medical treatment and evacuation. All casualties requiring evacuation were removed from the area by helicopters including wounded VC and some of their civilian supporters. All other casualties were treated by company aidmen.

d. Transportation. Helicopters were the primary means of transportation. No problems encountered.

e. Communications. No problems encountered.

14. Special Equipment and Techniques:

a. Aero Scout Company. This unit was used effectively as a reconnaissance and supporting force along the southern portion of the area of operation.

b. US Navy Swift Boats. Effective use of these craft was made to provide surveillance of the beach area and to detect enemy personnel attempting to escape in boats or along the beach.

15. Commander Analysis: This operation was well planned, well executed and successful. Friendly casualties were light and the enemy suffered heavily. On this operation the civilian population supporting the VC in the area numbered approximately 200. This created a problem in population control and medical care of those civilians caught in fires of the opposing forces. However, the infantry unit on the ground and helicopters were able to assist civilians in leaving the area and in caring for and/or evacuating the wounded.

SUBJECT: Combat Action Report (RCS AVDF-GC1)

16. Recommendations: Operations conducted in an area where large numbers of refugees might be generated should provide for civil affairs, psyops, medical, intelligence and police teams to be brought to the area as early as practicable after the arrival of combat troops. This would facilitate population control and medical care, and would permit the sorting out of VC which have mingled among the population for cover. The presence of these teams would free infantry personnel for combat operations.

8. Intelligence: An enemy force consisting of one local force battalion was estimated to be located in the vicinity of Ky Lai BS728775 prior to the operation as shown in Inclosure 1. This information was based upon previous combat operations in this area, visual reconnaissance, and PW and agent reports. Enemy strength and situation found as the operation was conducted was as estimated. The area of the operation consisted of six hamlets in varying degrees of ruin, each separated by rice paddies which were bounded by a series of hedgerows and tree lines. The many hedgerows offered the enemy considerable cover and concealment from the attacking friendly infantry and armored personnel carriers. However, a good secondary road leading in the direction of attack provided an excellent avenue of approach for the APC's. Weather throughout the operation was clear.

9. MISSION: To destroy enemy forces and fortifications at a VC base camp and to capture enemy personnel, weapons and supplies.

10. Concept of Operation: Task Force Barker attacks at 230900 Feb 68 to the east with Company A. Company B blocks avenues of escape to the north and northeast of the attacking company. 3d Platoon, Trp 2 screens the right flank until contact is made by the attacking company and then conducts an armored envelopment of the enemy's south flank. (See Incl 1) This maneuver is followed by the infantry continuing the attack to linkup with the APC's while capturing or destroying enemy personnel, weapons and supplies in zone. Artillery fires are planned to block enemy escape routes and to fire contact missions as required. USA Swift boats conduct screening of beach areas to prevent escape of VC forces in those areas.

24 March 1968

SUBJECT: Combat Action Report (BSG AVDP-GC1)

11. Execution: The order was issued on 21 Feb 68. Coordination with supporting arms, reconnaissance, and positioning of forces was conducted on 22 Feb 68. The maneuvering units crossed the line of departure at 230900 Feb. The units continued to move until 1100 hours when Company A and the APC's began receiving heavy enemy fire in the form of 60mm and 81mm mortars, 57mm recoilless rifles, B-40 rockets, automatic weapons and small arms. Artillery was immediately called on the enemy positions followed by two airstrikes (BS722795 and BS 728794). Company A and the APC's continued to move forward. The APC's made a sweep through the enemy's outpost line but received a heavy volume of mortar and automatic weapons fire. Two APC's were hit by recoilless rifle fire seriously wounding the platoon leader. The cavalry platoon was forced to withdraw to BS726786. Artillery fire was again placed on the enemy. This was followed by two air strikes on the enemy's main fortifications at BS735794 and BS736805. Company A continued to attack enemy positions under heavy resistance. During this period the Commanding Officer of Company A was seriously wounded but refused to be evacuated. Upon completion of the air strikes the APC's again swept through the enemy outpost line exacting a heavy toll on the VC. The APC's then swept eastward and overran the enemy's main fortifications. Company A moved forward to search the area for VC dead and for weapons. Throughout the operation USM Swift Boats placed fires on the enemy's rear with 81mm mortars and .50 cal machine guns. By 1700 hours the enemy had broken contact by infiltrating with civilians leaving the area, or by going down into the extensive maze of tunnels which abound the area. Throughout this action, Company B had only light contact and was moved to the southeast to link-up with Company A at 1730 hours at which time Company A and the APC's withdrew from the area to return to the Task Force fire base. Company B went into a company perimeter for the night to prepare for a search and destroy operation the next day. With the closing of Company A and the APC's at the Task Force base at 231915 Feb 68 the operation was terminated.

13. Administrative Matters:

a. Supply. Units moved with basic loads of ammunition and two C-ration meals per man. Resupply was planned and effected in two ways. First, the APC's carried a complete resupply of ammunition for the attacking company. Company A was resupplied in this manner. Secondly, resupply of critical items such as radios, batteries, weapons, etc., was accomplished by helicopter. 9-12

b. Maintenance. No problems encountered.

c. Medical treatment and evacuation. All casualties requiring evacuation were removed from the area by helicopters including wounded VC and their civilian supporters. All other casualties were treated by company aidmen.

d. Transportation. The APC's were used successfully to transport ground troops to and from the area of operation and to effect resupply of ground units.

e. Communications. No problems existed with communications equipment. However, some difficulty was experienced with the number of stations operating on the Task Force command net. In addition to five stations organic to the Task Force, gunships, FAG's and swift boats were at one time or another in the net. During periods of heavy enemy contact it was difficult to communicate.

24 March 1968

14. Special Equipment and Techniques:

a. Armored Personnel Carriers were used effectively to flank enemy positions. (The .50 cal machine gun and the mobility of the APC make the armored cavalry platoon an excellent maneuver element, either with infantry or independently). Further, the APC's were used extensively for transporting infantry to and from the battle area and for resupplying the infantry.

b. Swift Boats. Effective use of the US Navy Swift Boats was made to provide surveillance of the beach area to detect enemy troops attempting to escape. Also the armament on the Swift Boat, consisting of twin .50 cal machineguns forward and one .50 cal machinegun and an 81mm mortar aft, placed observed fires on the enemy's rear. This caused the enemy to defend himself from two directions.

15. Commander's Analysis: This operation was well planned, well executed and successful. Friendly casualties were light and the enemy suffered a hard blow. However, many enemy soldiers were able to escape with their weapons and the weapons of the enemy dead. This was caused by several factors. First was the calling for tactical air. Although the air strikes were timely and effective for an immediate air request, time was lost waiting for aircraft. This allowed the enemy reaction time in which to withdraw. Air evacuation of wounded was a contributing factor in allowing the enemy time to escape, since supporting fires had to be stopped each time a medevac helicopter was brought in. The ground units were not as aggressive later in the battle as they were earlier. This was partially caused by the CO, Company A being wounded and not able to push his unit as fast as he wanted to. Also the wounding of the cavalry platoon leader and his subsequent evacuation by air held up the APC's for a short time. Aggressiveness increased again at the insistence of the Task Force commander, but during the lull several VC had escaped with weapons.

16. Recommendations:

a. When contact is made with the enemy's outer defenses, units should make maximum use of all organic weapons and attack by fire and movement under organic supporting mortar fire. This should be followed by a rapid advance on enemy positions. Artillery can be placed on the enemy's deeper positions as the infantry continues the attack and can be lifted by the infantry commander. Immediate air strikes should be called if the infantry is completely stopped by the enemy's defenses and artillery has not been able to soften him up.

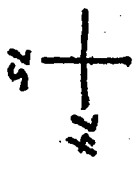
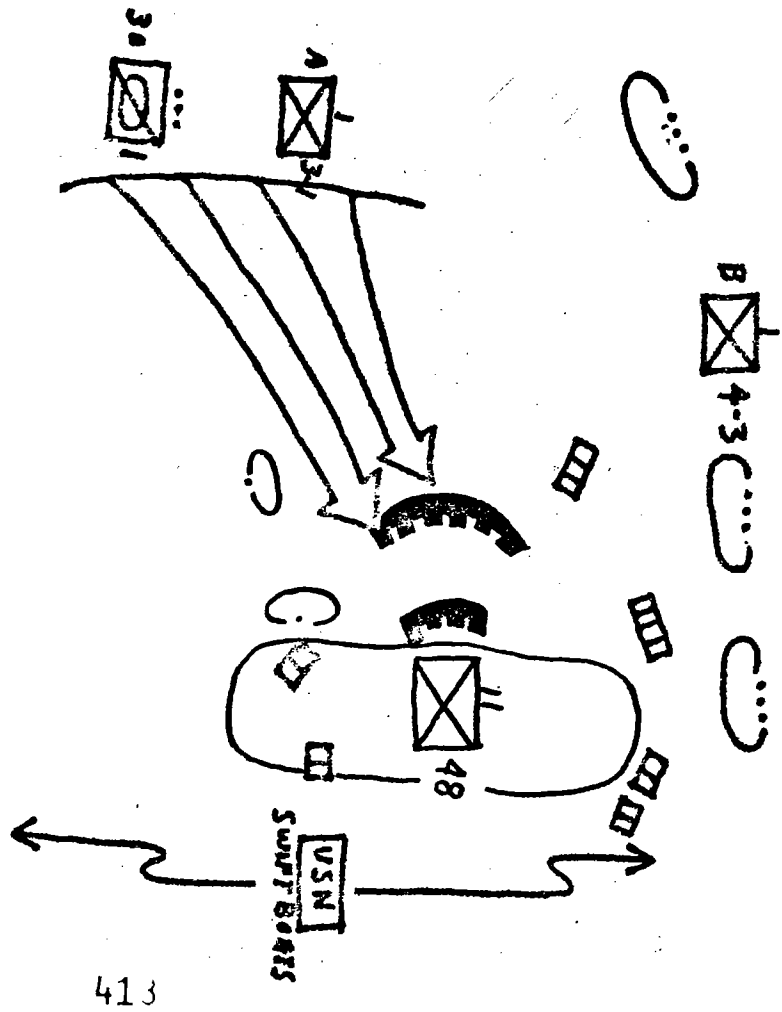

1. (C) Status of the Revolutionary Development Plan:

a. Although the RD program is not yet fully back on schedule, massive success has been achieved for the second consecutive month in the fight against the VC infrastructure. All but eight of the 48 RD teams are back at work in their assigned hamlets. A "safehaven village" experiment has shown continuing success in providing security for the people while pacification is conducted in selected locations outside the RD campaign areas. RD momentum has been regenerated in most areas although the activity is heavily weighted toward security. Many key GVN officials showed more activism. VC initiated incidents decreased this month in both number and intensity. The Americal Division support has precluded serious supply problems and made an outstanding contribution to reestablishing security.

b. On the negative side, ARVN's RD support battalions performance has been spotty and problems of command, coordination, weak leadership, and indiscipline involving ARVN RD support battalions, RF/PF units, RD teams and several district chiefs have been badly and belatedly handled by the Province Chief. For these reasons, security in Nghia Hanh and Tu Nghia Districts continued defective, the road to the province's principle supply port was not safe and the prestige of the GVN and the confidence of the public were not fully reestablished.

c. By stepping up the variety and intensity of considerable leverage already being applied to their key GVN counterparts, our CORDS advisors and other key USG officials in the Province, Tactical Zone and Region expect to ensure completion of the GVN and RDC return to the countryside and have priority portions of the revised 1968 RD program moving ahead under forced draft before the end of April.

d. The RD program remains behind schedule as a result of the TET setback. The full security status quo prior to TET has not yet been achieved, although there has been solid progress. Problems have been many. The Province Chief was under considerable pressure to reduce his 1968 plan, however, he has remained undaunted and made only minor adjustments in his basic plan. These adjustments have been to change assignment of RDC Groups during the first phase and place them in a smaller area within each campaign area. This action will reduce the area security problem but still allow work to continue in planned hamlets. In May or June the plan and progress made will be reviewed prior to movement of RDC Groups to second phase hamlets. At this time the decision will be made to cancel or retain each of the hamlets in the plan.

EXHIBIT R- 14

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a. Project implementation will be accelerated in April. It will concentrate on destroying the Vietcong infrastructure, and the other first five points of the RD program. The formation of effective RD youth hamlet defense groups continued to fall short as did the organization of hamlet defense systems by the entire population. Inadequate security is still the primary problem in this province, as it has been for several years. Its improvement, happily, has preempted the attention and energy of many GVN officials, both civil and military.

2. Project Takeoff: N/A

3. (C) Political/Psychological:

a. General: Psywar operations produced a generally improved psychological climate during the past month. However, the majority of the rural populace still maintained a "fence sitting" attitude while awaiting significant favorable action on the GVN side regarding security and more tangible evidence of governmental concern for their well-being. Continued large scale inaction by many provincial technical services tended to degrade the favorable psychological climate mentioned earlier. Meantime, CORDS advisors vigorously prodded their counterparts into more widespread and aggressive action with some quite favorable results. VC propaganda efforts are continuing at a high level, especially in threats, notices, etc. Friendly efforts were directed toward countering VC propaganda, improving the GVN image and restoring the people's confidence in the government. Exploitation of ARVN and FWMAF victories was made in an effort to destroy the VC morale and undermine their leaders. The low level of VC military inactivity during the month helped.

b. VIS: N/A

c. Election activities: N/A

d. Minorities, Political, and Religious Groups: No significant change. Inactivity has been the keynote.

4. (C) Security:

a. General:

(1) During the month the overall security situation in the Province improved as friendly forces began extensive operations throughout the central lowland districts. As a result of the operations and the desire of the VC to avoid contact, most major enemy units returned to the base areas in the west. Enemy activity declined from a high of 96 incidents in February to only 61 for the first 25 days of March. Nghia Hanh and Tu Nghia Districts were the center of enemy activity with a total of 18 and 16 incidents respectively reported. Although these totals are slightly lower than those recorded for January and February, Son Tinh District, which up through December 1967, was the constant leader in enemy initiated incidents, had only one incident reported during the month as compared with five for February and 12 for January.

b. Enemy Situation: The enemy situation remained basically unchanged during the month.

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The 401st Sapper Regiment and the 328th Provincial Regiment was positively located during the month as operating in the western area of Nghia Hanh, Tu Nghia, and Son Tinh Districts. Contact was made with the headquarters and one support battalion of the 401st Regiment on 12 March approximately four kilometers west of Nghia Hanh District Headquarters with a total of 60 VC confirmed KIA during the engagement. Following the contact, the regimental headquarters initially moved south but subsequently began to move north and as of 22 March was located in extreme western Son Tinh District, along the Tra Khuc River. The subordinate battalion of the Regiment also moved northward to the vicinity of base area 121 in western Tu Nghia where they are reportedly training for an attack on Quang Ngai City during the end of March or the first of April. The 328th Regimental Headquarters is also located in base area 121. Local force companies and platoons continued to concentrate on recruiting of replacements for their forces, and according to returnees and prisoners, had been very successful in the endeavor. The C16 Co. of Tu Nghia, which prior to Tet had an estimated strength of 30 men, has, according to returnees from eastern Tu Nghia, a current estimated strength of 100. Other companies, particularly the C18 Co. of Nghia Hanh, the C19 Co. of Mo Duc, and the C219 Co. of Duc Pho, have also reportedly increased their strengths within the past two months. Although unconfirmed, low level agent reports have also indicated the infiltration into the Province of NVA replacements for Main Force units. The absence of any major enemy activity during the last two weeks, together with reports of units in training and of the movement from the west of large quantities of weapons and ammunition, has caused speculation that a second major attack on Quang Ngai City is imminent.

c. Infrastructure: The attack against the province infrastructure continued at a rapid pace. There are presently 75 members of the provincial infrastructure under arrest in the Provincial Interrogation Center (PIC). This is an increase of 28 since 28 February 1968. Reward posters are being made up to air drop on all Districts. The posters offer 25,000VN\$ reward for the capture of any VC district chief and 20,000VN\$ reward for any NLF district chairman. A "10 most wanted" reward poster is being completed for province level Vietnamese Infrastructure (VCI). Example: The VCI security province chief is the subject of a 75,000VN\$ reward. Intelligence Centers are in full operation and have contributed materially to the current VCI attack. A province order has been issued by the Province Chief directing the full cooperation with the DIOCC advisors and the proper organization of the DIOCC. The PHUONG-HOANG Phoenix Program (PHPP) has been put into full motion. The PHPP building has been approved, supplies, radio, and other equipment are on order. The PHPP, operating as the parent unit of the DIOCC, uses the DIOCC as a "fact finding" base with the PHPP acting as the intelligence collecting and action center. Through this arrangement, the general intelligence flow in the province has greatly increased, both in efficiency and speed, to the GVN and FWF reaction groups.

d. Friendly Situation: No significant major operations were conducted during this period. Activities effecting the RD program are included in sub-paragraphs.

(1) ARVN Forces: The 4th Regiment, 2nd ARVN Division, on 16 March, was placed under OPCON of Quang Ngai Sector in support of the RD program. Assignment is for an indefinite period of time. Two additional battalions (1/5 and 3/5) are available upon request, for limited periods of from one to three days.

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Each battalion of the 4th Regiment operated within a specific area of responsibility, and was assigned the missions of clearing assigned areas of enemy forces and assisting in the reestablishment of RD/RF units and RD teams in designated areas. Generally, ARVN RD support battalions have performed satisfactorily in a military sense. Extensive patrols, ambushes and search and destroy operations have resulted in 55 VC KIA, four (4) VCS, 31 VCC, 35 detainees, 23 weapons captured, and have reestablished GVN control over some area recently controlled by VC units. Serious problems have been encountered in reestablishing RF/PF units and RD teams. The most significant of these problems stemmed from a breakdown in communications, misunderstanding, or refusal to work within the established chain of command even though the command line was simple and direct. Specific examples are:

The commander of the 2/4 Battalion operating in Nghia Hanh District stated that he considered RF/PF and RD units incompetent and refused to exercise military control over these units even though he was designated as overall commander of all military and para-military forces in Nghia Hanh Sub-Sector. The sub-sector commander was designated as deputy to the battalion commander for military operations. He failed to coordinate the activities of the RF/PF and RD units with those of the 2/4 Battalion primarily due to a reluctance on his part to talk to the battalion commander, a Captain. He felt that as a 1st LT, the Captain would not listen to his recommendations. The confusion surrounding the chain of command was further complicated by the presence at Nghia Hanh District Headquarters of the 4th Regiment TAC CP and a representative from Sector Headquarters. The senior individuals within each of these command groups interpreted the guidance issued concerning command lines in a different manner and the result was complete confusion.

In Tu Nghia District, the commander of the 4/4 battalion was outranked by the District Chief, designated as the battalion commander's deputy for military affairs. This caused a breakdown in communications, as the Tu Nghia District Chief would not accept instructions from the battalion commander. As a result of this, the battalion commander directed the Company Commander of the 390th RF Company to assume operational control of the five PF platoons and three RD teams assigned to the area under the OPCON of the 4/4 Battalion. Captain Mai, the Tu Nghia District Chief was aware of this, as he was also aware that the principle reason for designating the District Chief as military deputy was to provide the battalion commander with a responsible individual to control these para-military forces. He made no effort to control these para-military forces activities.

On the night of 24 March, radio contact was lost with the 380th RF Company, and the location of the company, the PF platoons and the RD teams was unknown until 25 March, when it was determined the 3 PF platoons and 2 RD teams had withdrawn without order to La Ha Refugee camp. The 380th RF Company had moved approximately 1,000 meters from its prescribed location. While attempting to clarify this situation, advisory personnel conferred with the Commanding Officer, 4/4 Battalion, Tu Nghia District Chief, and the military deputy of Quang Ngai Sector. Each presented a different concept of the command line, and each declined to accept the responsibility for fostering this situation. No action was taken during the rest of the day to return the PF and RD teams to the operational area. No clarification of command line was made and no disciplinary action was taken by any of the "controlling" Headquarters.

These problems have been discussed several times, in great detail, with the Province Chief, his military deputy, and the Sector Chief of Staff. While

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admitting a problem does exist, and promising repeatedly to correct the situation, neither the Province Chief or his military deputy have demonstrated sufficient command presence, initiative, forcefulness or military knowledge to effect any improvement

Nghia Hanh and Tu Nghia District Chiefs failed to exercise any degree of control over RF/PF and RD units in these areas, nor have they evidenced any desire to cooperate with the battalion assigned to their district. Again, this problem is recognized by the Province Chief and again nothing is done to correct this situation. Repeated efforts by the Deputy Province Senior Advisor to obtain constructive remedial actions resulted in another command group being sent into the area, further compounding this deplorable situation.

(2) Regional Forces: RF companies have extended their sphere of influence into most areas they occupied prior to the Tet offensive. Six sector controlled and 21 district controlled operations were conducted during the month, resulting in 56 VC KIA, 11 VCC, 61 VCS, and 10 VC weapons captured. Supply economy and lack of maintenance continue to be a problem. Ammunition is still being exposed to the weather, wasted and stored in exposed areas. Many vehicles remain on deadline with only a token effort expended to make these vehicles operational or to establish a satisfactory maintenance program. Two newly recruited RF companies are presently undergoing training at Dong Ha Training Center and 31 companies are in the field. On at least three occasions during the month, the need for discipline has been discussed with the Province Chief, the Deputy Province Chief, and the Sector Chief of Staff, without any direct action by the Province Chief or his subordinates to correct the situation. The two week refresher training program has been temporarily suspended because of efforts to regain ground lost during Tet.

(3) Popular Forces: Thirty-two PF platoons have moved to their RD support locations. Because of VC control, three platoons in Tu Nghia District and four platoons in Nghia Hanh District have not returned to their RD support locations. Of 2,454 ambushes or small unit operations, the PF made contact with the VC 64 times killing 48 VC, capturing nine VCC, 49 VCS, and 18 weapons. A shortage of 276 platoon and squad leaders exist with 42 candidates recruited for leadership training. The difficulty in recruiting is a problem because of low pay, high rate of assassinations, and casualties among PF leaders.

(4) US/FWMAF: An increase in joint operations was noted during the month of March and a resultant improvement in territorial security. Increased willingness to participate in joint operations has been evidenced by both US and VN forces. Task Force Barker and Engineer units of the Americal Division have been extremely active and responsive and continue to merit high praise. Task Force Barker has run numerous clearing operations in the area of Southeastern Binh Son and Eastern Son Tinh with significant results against the VC. Americal Engineer efforts in road and bridge building and repair have assisted materially in keeping main lines of communication in the province open.

Defoliation operations suspended due to lack of aircraft will commence during early April. The failure to carry out defoliation plans due to these suspended operations will result in a great deal of the current rice harvest being made available to the VC.

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5. (C) Economics:

a. General: There was a general improvement in the economic situation. Provincial rice stocks more than doubled during March while the free market price of imported rice dropped from 29 piasters per kilo to 23 piasters. Overall, retail prices decreased slightly. The 1968 pacification program has not generated an increase in the standard of living because the plan is in the first stages of implementation following the TET attack and minor revisions.

b. Material Resources and Transport: Route #1 remained open to government and commercial transport from DaNang but the lack of transport vehicles limited the amounts shipped. Fortunately, Americal Division shouldered the burden of transporting the bulk of the many tons of RD commodities from Chu Lai to Quang Ngai. Commercial traffic through the junk port of Phu Tho, the chief supply route for the province, has been meager, due to security problems. Heavy advisory pressure was applied on the GVN military and civil officials to reestablish adequate security at the port and along the road to Quang Ngai City. These pressures will be increased if necessary.

6. (C) Provincial Resources in Support of Pacification:

a. RD Cadre Teams, Truong Son Cadre and other RD Teams:

(1) Of the 46 RDC Groups now in the province, 38 are in their 1968 hamlets; however, not all of them stay in the hamlets twenty four hours a day. Virtually, no NLD work has been accomplished in 1968. Primary concern of all assets is still security. Direction at campaign commander level and below remains poor. Support by Provincial RDC Control Group for RDC Groups in the hamlets has shown very slight improvement. RDC morale remains generally unchanged except in a few groups with new leaders. On 28 March, 45 RD leaders were sent to Vung Tau National Training Center for a two months leadership training course. Cadre attending this course in the past have generally demonstrated some improvement in leadership ability. Therefore, it is felt that these additionally trained personnel will benefit the cadre structure. Action is also being taken to impress the importance of this program with district chiefs.

(2) No significant changes in TSRDC activities.

b. Static Census-Grievance: Because of the security situation and the eagerness with which their OB reports have been received, SCG continued to expend considerable effort in developing OB information. However, two activities of more long range importance have been stressed: 1) Planning for SCG's complete involvement in the 1968 RD plan by preparing to recruit hamlet cadres for 31,968 hamlets not already covered by SCG; and, 2) Maintain close coordination with DIOCC's in order to obtain timely information essential in combatting VCI.

c. Self-Defense Forces: No significant change.

d. Technical Cadre: No significant change.

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e. Police:

(1) During the month of March there was a progressive improvement in the various police programs to the January 1968 level. This can be attributed to the aggressiveness of the new Chief of Police for the Province and an increased sense of urgency on the part of the individual policeman to establish a better degree of law and order. However, it should be noted that population control and resources control programs are generally token and ineffective as they have been for the past several years. In line with the increased priority for the fight against the infrastructure we have pressured the NP chief into priority action on population control. It appears, unfortunately, that USAID is not yet geared up to supply the basic modicum supplies and equipment to make the program possible. We are continuing to press for this US support; the lack of which precludes effecting the program. In response to advisory persuasion, the NP Chief has begun to assign more of his manpower to rural villages, out where police action is essential in order to make population and resources control a reality. Saigon support, both GVN and US, will be necessary if we are to be able to continue this healthy trend away from excessive centralization at Province and District headquarters.

(2) See paragraph 4c. The Police Special Branch (PSB) has become the enforcement arm of the PHPP to include the DIOCC. The PSB is cooperating to the fullest extent. The interest shown by the PSB chief and his superior, The National Police Chief, has been outstanding. The Provincial Interrogation Center (PIC), under the direction of its chief, is working on a 24 hour basis. The interrogation of the VCI has proven to be excellent. Through these interrogations, the "snowballing" of other VCI have been made possible. At this date, 30 VCI have been readied for trial scheduled during the next reporting period. Under the urging of the DIOCC advisors, US units, via their military police, are sending VCI directly to the PIC from their field operations. The FIC chief has initiated a weapon instruction course for all the PIC personnel, to include female personnel. This course, completed 24 March, included the use of all weapons used by the PIC guards.

All information resulting in the arrest of VCI has been processed by the PHUONG-HOANG center. The center received, developed and passed intelligence of a highly valuable nature dealing in VCI and OB. The PHUONG-HOANG has joined the PHOENIX to become one intelligence center. This center is developing a complete "Black Book" dealing with the entire province which will be available within the next two report periods. However, the center can at present check a black list for any district or hamlet in friendly areas. Through the use of the PSB, PIC, DIOCC, and PHPP, the VCI attack continues and is scheduled to gain more momentum during the next reporting period.

(3) PFF: The PFF shifted back from partial assignment to emergency guard duties to full time utilization according to concept. Two platoons of the 102nd are operating with the ARVN forces on operation Quang Quyet; one platoon is operating in Son Tinh and one platoon in Tu Nghia. Operational results for the month are: 12 VCS; nine (9) illegal residents; and 57 draft dodgers captured. Another platoon has been operating with the Special Branch attacking the infrastructure in Quang Ngai City. Results: 15 VC; 10 VCS; three (3) illegal residents; and 46 draft dodgers captured. We are anxiously awaiting the arrival of a second PFF company in order to increase the effectiveness against the VC.

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7. Provincial Administrative Personnel and Organization: No significant change.

8. USAID/JUSPAQ Section: No significant change.

9. Required Actions: Arrange for the Prison Directorate to authorize the move of the Quang Ngai Civil Prison, on an urgent temporary basis, to Ly Son Island. There are some 1200 able bodied males in the prison which has twice been over run by the VC in the last six months and can be over run again. To protect this GVN operated VC military replacement center from another VC attack requires more troops than we can afford. A basic stockade on Ly Son Island - 15 miles at sea, would make it virtually impossible for the VC to over run. It could also be done quickly and easily at negligible cost.

Except for the local prison commander and his staff, who would be pleased to have a more secure location, the Province Chief, Tactical Zone Commander, and higher level GVN officials are apparently opposed to the move. The reasons they give range from weak to ridiculous. The reasons they do not give, but which may motivate the opposition, are without merit and reprehensible if not illegal, involving personal financial avarice or fear of exposure of hanky-panky, a probable accommodation of VC commerce on Ly Son, etc. They are using their usual tactic of delay, in view of heavy US pressure to act, and their rather weak case for inaction.

There is a good chance that this prison will be cracked by the VC again and a regiment of recruits gained thereby. We have fielded this problem to both Region and Saigon levels, in writing and by emissary several times over the past several months. It is time for Saigon leverage to be applied before it is too late.

1. District Chief: 1/LT. Tran Ngoc Tan

2. (C) Security: The security situation in the district has improved considerably since the Tet offensive. A great deal of emphasis has been given to the reinforcement of the defenses in the district and sub-sector headquarters. The presence of ARVN units in the district and the pressure placed on the enemy by the U.S. Forces operating in the district has alleviated the hamlet security problem. Still the VC retain the capability of attacking and destroying any of the RD teams and any installation, or combination thereof, throughout the entire district. The GVN controls 20 out of 29 hamlets in the district during the day light hours only.

3. Construction: Because no funds have been released from Province, no 1968 RD projects have been started in the district. However, a number of unfunded self-help projects have been started.

4. Training: The training of PF and RF is improving. The continuous use of these forces in tactical operations is a very effective training vehicle and this has been utilized effectively in the district. A rotation of the PF platoons for training at DaNang Training Center is in effect. At the present time, one platoon is taking training in that location.

5. Psychological Operations: The District Chief is conducting meetings in the hamlets and explaining the government programs to the people. Much U.S. support is being given to the VIS. Plans have been made to support them in publishing a local newspaper to bring to the people of the district news that affects them.

6. ICEX Program: A very effective liaison with the intelligence sections of the U.S. units in the area is in effect. Much effort has been placed in the processing and transferring of prisoners from the U.S. units to the PIC.

SUBJECT: District Report Son Tinh District

7. Refugees: Some refugees are drifting back to their home in the camps in the Phu Hoa area. The Province Refugee Service has been paying per diem for the last month in an effort to catch up on back payments. The Red Cross is continuing to do a fine job in supporting the in-camp refugees.

1. (C) Status of the Revolutionary Development Plan:

a. April was a month of steady but limited progress in the pacification program. Improved security was the keynote to improvement in almost all aspects of the program. Clearing operations by both American and Vietnamese forces reopened the majority of pre-TET GVN controlled areas within the province. This is particularly true of Nghia Hanh District which had suffered the greatest setback as a result of the Tet Offensive. The improved security status permitted the great majority of the RD Teams to enter their assigned hamlets and provide further momentum to the 1968 RD Plan which is still several months behind schedule. The SOIC and TOC were finally consolidated at one location after having separate locations off and on for the past three months. This will facilitate coordination and enable the RF/PF advisory effort, augmented during the month by the arrival of five mobile training teams, to further influence the security operations within the province. For the third successive month, significant successes have been realized in the infrastructure battle. The Phoenix program has become fully operational and effective and will continue to receive priority attention. The VC concern over the seriousness of the threat of the "Safe Haven Village" concept was evidenced when a company plus VC attack was launched on Phuoc Thien. While the VC did enter the village, they were driven out after suffering numerous casualties and with little damage to the village.

b. CORDS advisors have continued to encourage their counterparts to get out into the rural areas as soon as a sufficient degree of security has been established, and they have succeeded in "lighting a fire" under many GVN cadre to continue the momentum of the previous month. Security within the Province capital has been augmented to the point of arming and training of civil servants into a 500 man civil guard.

c. The return of several members of the Quaker Team reestablished the presence of all voluntary agencies of the pre-Tet period. Further expansion of effort by these agencies is planned for the near future.

d. On the economic side, rice prices have returned almost to pre-Tet levels and appear to be stable. This occurred despite a loss of approximately 30% of the spring harvest due to abnormally light rainfall. Population control has been pressed and will show considerable improvement with

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the addition of a second NPPF company which arrived in Province in month.

e. While most of the yardstick shows progress, the 1968 RD Program still remains behind schedule. The withholding of funds at corps level prohibited initiation of NID projects during the first part of the month. The agonizingly slow process of getting projects started once the funds were released prevented all but a token beginning in this area. The lack of decisive leadership at the provincial top level has continued to plague all advisory effort. The Province Chief does not exhibit the drive and forcefulness required to capitalize on recent successes in the pacification effort. Training and arming of RDPG has been behind even a minimum acceptable time schedule. Recruiting of authorized quotas of RF/PF has been slow because of lack of timely funding. The shift in responsibility for protection of many Highway #1 bridges from American to RF/PF forces created a drain that requires immediate action in the coming month. Continued harassing tactics by VC units, to include murders, and assassinations, have had a deleterious effect on overall security, the lack of which remains the primary roadblock to pacification.

f. As of this date, promised IR-8 rice seed has not been received. Now it appears that this program is doomed to failure for this planting season. The farmers cannot wait any longer for us to deliver. The constant problems of providing readily and reasonably available fertilizers and pesticides have not been solved. Again, the lack of action on a defoliation program has permitted the VC to harvest a rice crop that could have been denied to them. The loss of our education advisor will certainly have its consequences in what has been, to this point, a viable progressive program.

g. All of the above factors have been counter productive to success in the pacification effort. However, on balance, the plus factors outweigh the minus. Progress has been made in the overall effort. The CORDS Team spirit is undaunted by the temporary setbacks that occur in the implementation of the priority programs. With the proviso that security will continue to improve and be expanded, there are no unsolvable problems that should preclude continued and timely progress in pacification.

2. Project Takeoff:

- a. Improve and expand territorial security: See paragraph 4.
- b. Press the attack on the VC infrastructure: See paragraph 4c.
- c. Prevent regression in already pacified hamlets: See paragraph 4.
- d. Press economic revival in the countryside: No significant change.
- e. Step up refugee care, resettlement repatriation, and vocational training: No significant change.

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3. (C) Political/Psychological:

a. General: The general attitude of people in the rural areas continues to be "wait and see" before committing themselves to open support of the GVN. The developments regarding the peace talks and President Johnson's non candidacy evoked mild interest as the people in general do not feel that this will lead to peace. Comments from GVN officials at province level indicate that they are also skeptical of the chances of a favorable settlement through negotiations. Inactivity is still the keynote to the failure of province officials to provide a basis for developing firm support from the people for the government and the pacification effort. The "Weapons Reward" program was opened with an intensive Psyops and information campaign. There has been satisfactory initial results, and improvement can be expected as these initial results and the rewards obtained are disseminated to the people.

b. VIS: VIS has had limited success in fostering pacification. Although they have endeavored to develop support for and acceptance of the program on the part of the rural populace, they have been unable to convince the people that GVN presence and influence is viable or permanent enough to stake their lives and future well being on. VIS has conducted campaigns and will continue working to elicit support from the general public for the GVN. This is their priority project for the future until a satisfactory psychological environment exists for the pacification effort.

c. Election Activities: NA

d. Minorities, Political and Religious Groups: No significant change.

4. (C) Security:

a. General: During April, the overall security situation in the Province improved slightly as a result of extensive US operations in western Tu Nghia and Nghia Khanh Districts and continued ARVN and RF/PF operations and patrolling in eastern Son Tinh, Tu Nghia, and Mo Duc Districts. Although the enemy was able to avoid major contact, the operations, nonetheless, were successful in forcing the main force enemy units back into the mountains, thereby preventing any large concentration of enemy troops in the pacified and semi-secure areas. Enemy units were able, however, to leave behind rice gathering elements, who, with the help of local guerrillas, reportedly collected and transported to caches in the western base camps approximately 2000 tons of rice. Although a continued lack of security denied several RD teams nighttime occupancy of their hamlets, there was no major enemy activity directed against the RD effort during the month. Highway #1 remained open with only a few isolated incidents of mining and harassment of bridge security elements taking place.

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b. Enemy Situation: With most of the enemy effort being directed to the procurement of rice, his military and terrorist activities for the month declined to the lowest level since November, 1967. During April, there were a total of only 37 enemy initiated incidents reported, as compared to 70 in March and 94 in February. The most significant of the 37 incidents was the first ground attack on Tu Nghia District headquarters since its establishment as a subsector and an attack on the "Safe Haven" Hamlet of Phuoc Thien in Binh Son District. In both cases, the adequate defenses of the security elements and the disorganization of the VC forces prevented the accomplishment of the enemy's mission. The general lull in enemy activity and his preoccupation with resupply, together with an increase in low level agent reports, indicate that he is again preparing for a major offensive in the area with Quang Ngai city being reported most often as the likely target. However, statements from prisoners and returnees indicate that the enemy has no immediate plans for a second major attack on the city. Rather, they have indicated that the enemy's targets are diverse and that his most likely course of action during early May will be to attack isolated outposts and refugee camps, while simultaneously harassing with mortar fire various district headquarters, the Quang Ngai airfield, and the city. Recent agent reports and interrogation reports have verified, however, the recent infiltration of a large number of NVA replacements, who are being assigned to local force units, thereby indicating that the enemy is preparing for major combat, perhaps as early as the latter part of May. There is some speculation, however, that local enemy units have an alternate plan, i.e., to be prepared to launch the second general offensive, which will be effected upon the ultimate direction of the Hanoi Government, dependent upon the overall conditions throughout RVN.

c. Infrastructure:

(1) The attack against the Province Infrastructure (VCI) continues in a most aggressive manner headed by the Chief of the PSB, guided by the Chief of the National Police and coordinated by and through the Phuong Hoang (GVN) Phoenix (US) program.

(2) There are several penetration nets in operation, controlled by the PSB, and a number of unilateral nets operating under the control of the RDC/P. All are targeted against VCI targets. The policy of paying for information on a "cash on delivery" basis, not a salary, is in effect, and is bringing in much more effective information which has led to many arrests during this reporting period.

(3) The Police Special Branch has acquired 120 newly trained PSB officers from the training center in Da Nang. These officers are in the process of being assigned to the various districts. The Province Chief has assigned the Chief of Police as his representative in the Phuong Hoang (GVN) organization. During the month, meetings have been held by the Province Chief with all District Chiefs and District Police Chiefs to direct and explain their responsibilities with reference to setting up Phuong Hoang Committees (for DIOCOS) in their districts. Meetings have also been held by the Chief of Police with all District Police Chiefs to detail their duties.

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(4) As a result of the new GVN orders, the Phuong Hoang meetings will be held at the National Police Headquarters, with US cooperation and coordination. The RDC/P will still function as the Phoenix coordinator, thus acting as intelligence center coordinator for both US and GVN. The records of the Phuong Hoang Phoenix Program will be maintained, distributed, evaluated, etc., by the Phoenix coordinator through the RDC/P office. There is no actual program change other than the GVN taking an active operational part in the actual attack on infrastructure. Due to this GVN interest, the office formerly known as the "Phuong Hoang House" is now known as the RDC/P Office Headquarters.

(5) As of 25 April 1968 there were 72 VCI in the Provincial Interrogation Center (PIC). The breakdown for the month is as follows:

Prisoners placed in PIC in March	42

Prisoners from the PIC to the hospital	3
Prisoners from the PIC to National Police	13

(6) The PIC prisoners currently held are typical being composed of district, village and hamlet level VCI (no low-level), and all prisoners are under interrogation. PIC reports are being passed as the interrogations progress.

(7) By cooperation of CORDS and labor from the city prison, 60 new cells are being built in the PIC. The PIC prisoner population has averaged about 60 per month since about 15 February 1968. The PIC was built for 26 prisoners, thus an additional 60 cells are considered completely necessary; both for security and health reasons. In this vein, local US medical officers have sprayed the PIC with DDT and have taken all other medical preventive measures necessary.

(8) As a result of the large number of prisoners in the PIC, two offices have been consolidated and three more interrogation rooms are being built.

(9) During this reporting period, VO THU, alias GIAT THU, age about 58, indentified by the PSP as the Deputy Province NIF Chairman, was captured by the Americal Division and turned over to the PIC. VO THU is under intensive interrogation and has proved to be very difficult. However, he is starting to reveal information concerning the VC political and economic situation. This intelligence is being passed on, on a "need to know" basis.

(10) During the same period, NGUYEN DINH XANG, alias IN LUC, DOB: 29 December 1923, self-admitted Economic Inspector assigned to Quang Nhai Province from Inter-Zone V (MR 5), was turned over to the PIC. He was sent into the Province to speed up rice collection and storage for use by VC troops. XANG revealed that he was under orders to have 2,000 tons in storage and ready for use by the end of April 1968. He also revealed the location of the Inter-Zone V Economic Headquarters in Quang Tin Province. This information has been passed for action. XANG is currently being subjected to intensive interrogation.

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d. Friendly Situation: One major operation was conducted during the month of April. Although the operation had negative results, it was significant in that it was the first major combined operation to take place since December 1967, under direction and control of Quang Ngai Sector. Forces participating were two ARVN Battalions; two provisional Regional Force Battalions; one Battalion of U.S. Infantry; US Naval Forces; and US Army Aviation which supported two combat assaults. Activities affecting the RD program are included in sub-paragraphs.

(1) ARVN Forces: The 4th Regiment, 2nd ARVN Division has been removed from OPCON of Quang Ngai Sector. ARVN Forces currently supporting the RD Program are the 2nd and 4th Battalions, 4th Regiment and the 1st and 3rd Battalions, 5th Regiment. Each Battalion is operating in a specific area of responsibility to clear the area of enemy forces and assist in the reestablishment of RF/FF and RD teams in the area. Operations of the RD support battalions for the month have been satisfactory and have resulted in 59 VC KIA, 13 VCO, 22 VCS, 25 weapons and a large amount of munitions and other commodities captured. The breakdown in communications mentioned in last month's report has improved.

(2) Regional Forces: Regional Force companies continue to return to areas they controlled prior to the Tet offensive. A total of 15 RF companies are now operating in direct support of the 1968 RD program. Five Sector and 30 District controlled operations were conducted with the following result: 44 VC KIA, 20 VCS, 17 VCO and 19 individual weapons captured. Command emphasis has been directed toward the long standing problems of misuse and improper storage of ammunition. A slight improvement has been noticed, but this still represents a major problem area. The vehicle maintenance and deadline rate are still unacceptable. As yet no effort is being made to overcome this problem. Currently three RF companies are undergoing basic training at Dong Ha Training Center. With 94 recruits presently on hand, recruiting of personnel for two RF companies is expected to be completed 15 May. The two weeks refresher training and on-site training for all outposts are expected to be implemented in the early part of May. Four RF Group Headquarters were formed and assigned to Binh Son, Son Tinh, Tu Nghia, and Nghai Hanh Districts. A total of 30 RF companies and four RF Group Headquarters are now deployed in Quang Ngai Province. Each RF Group Headquarters has received one MTC, with a fifth MTC located with Tu Nghia Sub-Sector Team. The shortage of officers and NCOs is hampering the staffing of these RF Group Headquarters, and some major items of equipment i.e., radios and vehicles, have not yet arrived.

(3) Popular Forces: A total of 73 PF platoons are operating in direct support of the 1968 RD program. This represents a significant improvement over last month. Nghai Hanh district has not yet returned four platoons to their 1968 RD support locations. The shortage of platoon and squad leaders is still critical. 42 individuals currently in training will be used to fill existing platoon leader vacancies. A refresher training program is being developed to be administered at district level. A minimum of one platoon will be in training at all times.

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(4) US/F-119AF: Joint operations continue to be conducted throughout the sector with a high degree of success. Task Force Barkor has been inactivated and its AO assumed by the 4th Battalion, 3rd Infantry of the 11th Brigade. Particular praise goes to Task Force Barkor for its outstanding performance in clearing operations in the Son Tinh and Binh Son Districts. American engineers continue to support the lowland districts in road and bridge repair, construction and assistance in keeping the main LOCs in the province open.

5. (U) Economics: No significant change.

6. (U) Provincial Resources in Support of Pacification:

a. RDC and TSRDC Groups:

(1) Fifty RDC groups are now deployed in hamlets. Six of these are not in their assigned 1968 hamlets; they are in nearby hamlets with another RDC group awaiting improvement of the security situation, psychological or real, to allow them to enter their hamlets on a permanent basis. An estimated 80% of the RDC groups remain in their hamlets 24 hours a day. To date participation of RDC in the fight against VCI has been minimal. A one day class was conducted for all intelligence RDC to teach them reporting procedures and how they fit into the DIOCC and PHPP. As a result, reporting by RDC has improved. Direction at campaign commander level and below remains poor; continued changes in RDC leadership positions have improved this situation some. A need exists for the training of district, village and hamlet chiefs to teach them how to properly utilize the services provided by RDC. Effectiveness of Provincial RDC Control Group continued to improve, slightly.

(2) No significant changes in TSRDC activities.

b. Static Census Grievance Cadre: No significant changes.

c. Self-Defense Forces: There has been increasing emphasis placed on organization of RDPGs; however, the effect of the emphasis is not yet discernible.

d. Technical Cadre: No significant change.

e. Police: During the month 563 VC hard core prisoners were shipped to Con Son Island. The ID card section moved to the two safe-haven villages and registered 1200 citizens into the ID program. The family census team conducted 129 family census in one of these hamlets. We continue to exert priority efforts to effect full population and resources control in these villages. Elsewhere in the province, the controls range from nil to ineffective. The National Police Psyops section was enlarged and a police LT placed in charge in order to accelerate the campaign of bringing the police image before the people. Motion pictures and police propaganda films are shown to the public with the National Police Field Forces used as physical security of the area and the persons attending. A police newspaper has been initiated and the first edition has been published. There are 110 police candidates in training at the National Police School, Danang.

7 SPECIAL HANDLING REQUIRED

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A total of 254 new policemen were assigned to the 10 districts for further assignment to the villeges and hamlets. The total number of police in Quang Ngai Province is 1430, of which 620 are assigned outside of the province capital.

(3) PFF: New Company 112 has arrived, and upon receipt of equipment from Saigon, its platoons will be assigned to Binh Son, Ho Duc and Duc Pho lowland districts. Company 112 still has 75 men now in training at Dalat. Company 102 is working effectively in Tu Nahia, Son Tinh and Nghia Hanh lowland districts under the control of the district chiefs,

COL Sanh, the chief of the NFFF in Vietnam, inspected Company 102 during the month and rated them "excellent".

7. Provincial Administrative Personnel and Organization: No significant change.

8. USAID/JUSPAO Section: No significant change.

9. Required Actions: An urgent requirement exists for an assistant Sub-Sector Advisor, Binh Son, Sub-Sector. This position has been without an incumbent since early December 1967.

1. (U) District Chief: 1LT Tran Ngoc Tan
2. (C) Status of Pacification:

a. Security: There has been a noticeable decline in VC attacks on outposts in the district. Although the security situation is still critical, it has improved considerably during this month. The presence of the ARVN Forces and the continuous efficient operations of the US Forces in the district have contributed materially to the security improvements manifested in close in areas. The RF and PF Forces have been concentrating on police action type operations. They have also reoccupied many outposts abandoned during the Tet offensive. The always present problem is providing adequate security for the majority of the government controlled hamlets. The enemy still retains the capability of attacking and destroying any of the RD Teams and any of the installations, or combination thereof, throughout the entire district.

b. RD Programs: The RD programs have gotten off to a late start and are moving slowly. The primary concern of the eight RD Teams in the district has been hamlet defense and security. Fences have been built around RD hamlets and night defensive positions have been established. Also, hamlet meetings have been held to organize the people into various committees for such needs as hamlet defense, education, self-help, etc.

3. (C) Factors Influencing Pacification:

a. Psychological Operations: The repairs of the district VLS office were completed. This building was damaged during the Tet offensive. During the period 22-26 April 1968 the GVN drama team show was presented in nine refugee camps in the district. The presentation was very effective and well received by the people. One night the drama team was invited to dinner by the COADS Team, Son Tinh.

b. Refugee: The refugee situation has not changed significantly during the month. There are still roughly 30,000 refugees in the district, some 25,000 of them living in camps and the rest outside of camps. The Red Cross Team is continuing to do an outstanding job, especially in the area of truck farm assistance.

4. (U) Special Problems: Since no funds have been received at the district, the GVN construction programs have not been started for 1968. About 20 unfunded self-help programs have been approved and construction is moving ahead.

1. (C) Status of the Revolutionary Development Plan:

a. Progress in pacification in Quang Ngai during May has been uneven. Provincial programs such as Project Recovery and efforts to upgrade the RF/PF made slow but steady progress. The arming of self defense groups was a most significant accomplishment. On the other hand, increased GVN efforts during May were accompanied by increased VC initiative. During May VC incidents totalled 97, almost triple the total for April. Most of the increase, however, consisted of minor harassment.

b. The province and the advisory team placed new emphasis on the priorities set by Saigon for:

- (1) Upgrading the RF/PF.
- (2) The struggle against the VC infrastructure.
- (3) Organizing the people.

Specifically the advisory team made renewed efforts to improve the organization, training, recruitment and pay status of the RF/PF. The number of IATS Teams increased to six, five of which have begun training operations. RF span of control problems can be expected to be ameliorated by the establishment of four RF company groups in April.

c. Although there was a sharp increase in VC incidents in Quang Ngai Province in the month of May, the "second Tet offensive" did not materialize except on an increase in harassment and mortaring of installations in and around Quang Ngai City and a few outlying areas. There was a significant increase of pressure at the District capitals of Duc Pho and Da To near the end of May.

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It was significant however that such increased activity resulted in no apparent slackening of morale among GVN officials or slackening in their programs.

d. The economy of the Province continues to be stable. Prices remained fairly steady, although there was some indication that farmers were hoarding rice from the recent harvest in fear of an expected dry season for the summer crop. New crop rice was planted. The port at Phu To started to receive junk traffic, mostly from Saigon, for the first time in several months. This is a good sign but traffic must be reinitiated from Danang to bring the economic situation back to a normal level.

e. IR-8 rice seed finally was received in May. Despite the fact that most farmers had already planted the regular rice, a strong effort on the part of the GVN Agriculture Chief and his CORDS Advisor resulted in utilization of almost all of the 37 plus tons received.

f. Other development programs were largely at a standstill in May because of the lack of funds or commodities or both. Activities in self help were most adversely affected. This situation should be corrected as Project Recovery payments to Tet war victims are completed, however, by 10 June. Concerned Provincial staff members have recently felt the full urgency of the need for rapid completion of Project Recovery. As a result GVN officials and CORDS advisory are now working with unusual cooperation to finish the program.

3. Project Takeoff:

- a. Improve and expand territorial security: See paragraph 4.
- b. Press the attack on the VC infrastructure: See paragraph 4c.
- c. Prevent regression in already pacified hamlets: See paragraph 4.
- d. Press economic revival in the countryside: No significant change.
- e. Step up refugee care, resettlement repatriation, and vocational training: In May, province officials made significant progress toward completion of Project Recovery. A final list of Tet war victims was approved by the Province Chief on 15 May. More than the total of VN\$25,000,000 cash payments were made by 31 May. All payments are expected to be completed by 10 June. Commodity distribution is proceeding more slowly but province officials and the advisory team are accordng the highest priority in incoming commodities to Project Recovery. We hope to complete commodity distribution sometime on July.

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3. (C) Political/Psychological:

a. General: Overall the attitude of the people has not changed significantly over the past month. In some areas where security has materially improved the people have evidenced a more receptive attitude toward GVN programs. However, the wait and see syndrome is still prevalent in most areas of the province. Plans have been formulated to conduct a PSYOPS campaign involving all factions of the populace including non-governmental groups and individuals as well as governmental cadre and Free World Forces. This joint effort is directly under the leadership of the Province Chief. The campaign should be actively underway by mid-June.

b. VIS: No significant change.

c. Election Activities: NA

d. Minorities, Political and Religious Groups: No significant change.

4. (C) Security:

a. General: During the month of May, enemy initiated incidents increased in Quang Ngai Province compared to April. A force consisting of at least one regular North Vietnamese Battalion attacked the Ba To District Headquarters killing the District Chief. The VC were able to avoid major friendly initiated contact until 24 May when a reaction force from 4/5 ARVN Battalion successfully trapped and killed between fifty and seventy-five VC from C.16 LF Company, B.65 Sapper Platoon and possibly one company of the 48th LF Battalion. The only main force elements in the province, those subordinate to the 401st NVA Sapper Regiment remained in the highlands. It is quite possible that the battalion attacking Ba To was one from the 401st, but because no documents or prisoners were recovered in the action, positive identification is not possible. Local Force elements in the province practiced harassment on a markedly increased scale. A vast majority of their actions being harassing fires upon night defensive positions. Although the rice harvest in the province is now complete, reliable reports are still being received of supply sections having been dispatched from main force elements in the mountains to gather food and medical supplies from the lowland villages. Highway 1 remained open. There were a few isolated incidents of mining and harassment of bridge security elements.

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b. Enemy Situation: With the rice harvest being completed, local force elements which during the previous month were forced to concern themselves with securing the harvest areas now have turned to harassing operations. This is reflected in the total number of incidents for the month, 96, a figure two-and one-half times the total for April, which was thirty-seven. The most significant incident for the month was the successful NVN operation against the Ba To District Headquarters. We do not consider, however, that this constituted a first step in clearing the Ba To-Gia Vuc Valley for the resupply columns of the VC. First, the enemy has never found any particular difficulty, because of the lack of friendly forces in that area, in using the valley for his own ends. Second, the action, which most likely was directed by the 401st Sapper Regiment Headquarters, appears to be little more than a repetition of a training problem the same unit performed in Quang Tin Province shortly after its inception in the early fall of 1967. Because of heavy losses suffered both in the ranks and in the command structure by the 401st during Tet, it appears that the unit was directed once again against a relatively elementary target in order to give both officers and men experience in the attack. This unit now will probably linger only a few more days in the extreme south of the province before beginning its movement north once more to the Minh Long - Nghia Hanh border area for rest and training. If the pattern established by the 401st previously holds true again, the Regiment will retire from all contact for a period of at least two months. Also of interest during the month was the increased harassment of the Quang Ngai City area. While no specific targets were singled out for heavy ground attack, small probing actions, accompanied by mortaring, occurred in several locations through the town, such as the 2nd Division Headquarters, The Province Jail, the radio station and the power plant. The lack of prisoners, documents or returnees during the month makes prediction of courses of action difficult. However, it seems reasonable to assume that during the month of June, the pattern of harassment established during the month of May will continue, if for no other reason than an attempt by the enemy to demonstrate to the people his continuing ability to penetrate secure areas. Infiltration of NVN soldiers into IF units continues, the latest recipient being the 83rd IF Battalion. This would tend to indicate that future action may come near the 83rd's area of operation, the most likely target being the Nghia Hanh District Headquarters.

c. Infrastructure:

(1) The attack against the Province infrastructure (VCI) continues in a most aggressive manner headed by the Chief of the PSB, guided by the Chief of the National Police, and coordinated by and through the Phuong Hoang and the Phoenix program.

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(2) The PSB penetrations have resulted in the arrest of several VC penetration agents. The District PSB has arrested several VC hamlet chiefs and a hamlet VC security chief. Many VC communications liaison people have been arrested during this period. The policy of paying "cash on delivery" continues. This policy appears to be producing far better information than previous payment procedures.

(3) U/P of RDC/P Memo, (Chief of RDC/P) - 69/68, 1 May 1968, "Reorganization of Special Police". Four Districts have been designated to receive special consideration in the construction of District Special Police offices and detention facilities (Binh-Son, Mo Duc, Son Tinh and Tu Nghia). The RDC/P will pay the chief of PSB 150,000.00\$VN to be used towards labor and miscellaneous building cost. A total of 600,000\$VN has been paid to meet the needs of the four indicated districts. The RDC/P has also forwarded requisitions for each of the districts for safes, locked filing cabinets, desks and typing stands. National Police and the RDC/P have held a meeting on this reorganization and it appears to be progressing as scheduled.

(4) The Phuong Hoang is becoming established in the Districts. A slight problem existed in obtaining the various services to staff the district offices. This has been discussed with the GVN coordinator and at this writing appears to be solved. The Phuong Hoang is cooperating fully with the Phoenix Program and many arrests of VCI and operations against the VC by both GVN and US have resulted from these programs. It is estimated that these programs have resulted in 796 VCI being killed or captured between 15 February and 15 May.

(5) As of 25 May 1968 there were 126 prisoners in the Provincial Interrogation Center (PIC). The break down for the month is as follows:

Prisoners placed in PIC in April: 100

Prisoners placed in PIC in May: 126

Prisoners from the PIC to the National Police: 29

Prisoners from the PIC to the Hospital: 0

(6) The PIC prisoners currently held are all considered VCI, (no VCS). The group is composed of VCI from Province level to Hamlet level. All prisoners are under full interrogation and reports are passed to interested parties as they are completed.

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(7) The building of additional cell space at the PIC will have to be suspended due to lack of material. COLDS is currently out of cement with which to make the cement block used in the construction. It is expected that work will start again in the near future.

d. Friendly Situation: Quang Ngai Sector did not conduct any significant Sector controlled combat operations during the month of May. There were, however, numerous combined RF/PF clearing and population control operations conducted within Quang Ngai City and around most district headquarters.

(1) ARVN Forces: The 2nd Battalion, 4th Regiment has been removed from the OPCON of Quang Ngai Sector. ARVN Forces currently supporting the RD program are the 3rd Battalion, 4th Regiment and the 3rd and 4th Battalion of the 5th Regiment. There has been a significant decrease in the number of operations conducted by these battalions. This can be attributed to a lack of clear guidance from Sector Headquarters as to their role in the RD effort and how best they can support the RD program. The operations conducted produced the following results: 19 VC killed in action; 1 VCC and 4 individual weapons captured. There still exists a problem of coordination between VNAF FAC's and ground forces. On two occasions, unrequested air strikes were delivered by the VNAF in an area where friendly troops were in contact. No coordination had been made to determine the location and disposition of friendly forces.

(2) Regional Forces: Regional Force company activities have shown little change from the last reporting period. 11 Sector and 52 District controlled operations were conducted with the following results: 29 VC KIA; 14 VCC; 3 weapons captured. Recruiting is progressing satisfactorily and at the present time 432 recruits are awaiting the opening of the RF/PF training center at Quang Ngai. Four RF companies are presently undergoing training at Dong Da. Two of these companies are scheduled to complete training the first week in July. Each of the six lowland districts have started on site training for RF units located in outpost. A problem area exists in obtaining small arms ammunition for training purposes. Although the RF Company Group Headquarters are still short officers and NCO's, all four of the Group Headquarters now have their authorized vehicles and radios. A total of six MATs are assigned to Quang Ngai Province.

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(3) Popular Forces: No change in the number of platoons in direct support of 10. The assumption of bridge security missions by PF platoons of Bo Duc and Duc Pao has reduced the number of platoons available for offensive operations. While the refresher program for PF platoons is in effect in the six lowland districts, obtaining training ammunition is a problem. Platoon and Squad leaders are still short, and the upgrading program has not yet been implemented. PF platoons participated in 22 Sector and 42 District controlled operations with the following results: 21 VC KIA; 9 VCC and 7 individual weapons captured.

(4) US/FRMAF: The 11th Brigade continues to render invaluable assistance in support of combat operations and the RD program. The Brigade has been highly responsive to request for ground and air support submitted by Quang Ngai Sector through advisor personnel. Brigade assistance, combined with Tactical Air Support resulted in 50 VC KIA on one operation. American engineer support continues in road and bridge repair and keeping the main lines of communications in the Province open.

5. (C) Economics: Economic activity in May was near normal levels. Farmers planted their second 1968 rice crop (and removed some regular rice seedlings at mid month when IR-8 rice seed was received). Prices were steady but there was some indication of rice hoarding in the anticipation of a severe dry season. Annual work on diversion dams to provide irrigation for the summer rice crop proceeded almost on schedule. Communication routes in the lowland districts remained open to commercial traffic. The port for Quang Ngai City, Phu To, started to receive junk traffic for the first time in several months. Most of the vessels were from Saigon. The Quang Ngai Advisory Team has requested CORDS logistics at Hanoi to begin sending some CORDS commodities through Phu To. Use of this channel would have the advantages of: 1) increasing commercial activity at the port and from the port to Quang Ngai City; 2) handling these commodities through Vietnamese channels and 3) increasing the total capacity for importing commodities into Quang Ngai.

6. (C) Provincial Resources in Support of Pacification:

a. RDC and TRDC Groups:

(1) Fifty-one RDC groups are now deployed in hamlets. RDC Group 51 has been assigned to six hamlets around Quang Ngai City for a period of two to three months. Their mission is to develop self defense forces on the approaches to the city. After completing this task RDC Group 51 will be dissolved and the cadre will be used as replacements for the other 50 groups. Three RDC groups, 30, 33 and 41 are not in their assigned hamlets; they are in nearby hamlets with another RDC group awaiting improvement of the security situation.

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Seven groups 04, 07, 15, 18, 31, 32 and 34 are not in their hamlets every night but are there during the day. Forty RDC groups (not including RDC Group 51) remain in their assigned hamlets night and day. Little emphasis has been placed on the self help aspects of the RD Program. Direction at the campaign level by the Vietnamese remains poor. MACV Advisory teams in Tu Nghia, Nghia Binh, No Duc and Duc Pho are visiting RDC hamlets with increasing regularity. During the month the Province Chief of Staff/RDC Commander, Major De, visited each campaign headquarters in an effort to promote the rapid arming of RDC's as well as coordinate RDC/District operations. ARVN Battalions in support of RD are of little value because they do not provide an effective screen and they are reassigned too frequently.

(2) No significant changes in the TSPDC Activities.

b. Static Census Grievance Cadre: The Province Chief has agreed to make information available on the actions taken in response to reported aspirations and grievances. We expect to lose 30 SCG cadre to the draft. Recruitment of qualified draft exempt replacements is difficult but not impossible. The emphasis on collection of OB information following the Tet offensive is gradually being replaced by emphasis on obtaining information against the VCI. However, SCG continues to provide a substantial amount of useful OB, much of which has been reacted to successfully.

c. Self Defense Forces: During the month almost every RDC Group made substantial headway in organizing and training hamlet self defense forces. Arms are starting to reach the hamlet level. The effectiveness of the program as a deterrent to the VC should be discernible during the next two months.

d. Technical Cadre: No Significant change.

e. Police: During the month of May maximum efforts were made to all programs to increase the NP effectiveness. Besides the daily QC - NP - NPFF joint patrols, 30 police checking operations were conducted at the provincial capital and suburbs. Six VCS, two deserted soldiers, 30 draft evaders and approximately 100 illegal residents were arrested, a large amount of commodities such as approximately one ton of rice, 1,000 units of medicine seized. The family census program at the safehaven hamlets of Son Tra and Phuoc Thien remains at a standstill since the department is deprived of film and family booklets. An estimated 700 NP out of 1,470 are assigned to the districts or villages especially Son Tra and Phuoc Thien, each village receives 5 NP.

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f. NPF: Company 102 has two platoons in operation at each of the districts of Son Tinh and Nghia Hanh under the control of the district chiefs supporting the RD plan. Upon receipt of equipment from Saigon (18 May), 106 NPF of Company 112 started operating since 20 May but, while waiting for supply of ammunition, this unit is being used on perimeter defense in Quang Ngai City. Efforts will be made to use this company in the NPF concept upon arrival of required ammunition.

7. (U) Provincial Administrative Personnel and Organization:
No significant change.

8. (U) USAID/JUSPAO Section: No significant change.

9. (U) Required Actions:

a. We were obliged to return 4,894 sheets of aluminum roofing to Chu Lai on 28 May because we had no fork lift to unload the shipment. The most recent of our many requests to COM, Danang, for a fork lift was cancelled in May. The PD council of Quang Ngai is now processing another application for a fork lift. We would appreciate any assistance MACCORDS can give in the expediting of this request.

b. The need for military radio operators is becoming acute. This headquarters, including sub-sectors, is authorized nine radio operators and has six assigned. Of the assigned radio operators, two are scheduled for rotation in mid-July. No known replacements are programmed for assignment. The requirement for an assistant sub-sector advisor at Binh Son District is a continuing problem.

1. (U) District Chief: LIT Tran Ngoc Tan
2. (C) Status of Pacification:

a. The pacification program has been progressing steadily during the past month. Still the program has not reached the level that existed prior to Tet.

b. The increased number of cordon and search operations conducted by RF/PF units during the month in the district have helped the RD teams and district officials to concentrate their efforts in organizing the hamlet defenses, combat youth and civil defense teams.

c. The RF companies have been recently utilized as a more effective force by combining RF companies and forming an RF Group.

d. There are still four refugee camps abandoned because of lack of security.

e. The VC can move freely at night in the RD areas, harass the population and collect taxes. Adequate security for the people in the hamlets cannot be provided.

3. (C) Factors Influencing Pacification:

a. A total of 27 civil defense teams have been organized in six hamlets. Combat youths have been organized in 11 refugee camps and in 19 hamlets. The members of the combat youth have been armed and at the present time the district chief has plans to give weapons to the civil defense teams. It is anticipated that the training and arming of these teams will be slow. The district chief is not too enthusiastic about giving weapons to them until a security screening can be conducted.

b. There continues to be no activity in RD construction programs except for a few unfunded self-help projects. Neither the funds nor the supplies have reached the district for the various projects in the areas of agriculture, health, education and funded self-help.

c. Almost all of the 2000 bags of cement and the 2000 sheets of roofing material allotted to the district for Tet war victims has been distributed by the district officials.

d. The Red Cross is continuing with its food distribution program and doing a fine job. The Red Cross also provides a channel through which the district can receive commodities.

1. (C) Status of the Revolutionary Development Plan:

a. The VC successfully attacked Son Tra Hamlet, Binh Son District, on 28 June. The population of the resettled portion of the hamlet was about 4,600, consisting of many refugees and persons relocated from other nearby hamlets. Seventy-eight civilians were killed and many more wounded in the action. About 70% of the hamlet was destroyed. The attack was significant (1) because it demonstrated that the VC could occupy a given hamlet despite GVN and American efforts; (2) because Son Tra, a resettlement area, was chosen because the security was estimated to be better than normal and, (3) U.S. units and advisers were instrumental in the original resettlement. The experience at Son Tra contrasts with that of a similar resettlement village in the same district, Phuoc Thien. Phuoc Thien has successfully resisted a large scale attack. It has effective officials and a large RDPG. Son Tra was not as well organized or administered. The Son Tra incident points up some of the difficulties with the so called "Safe Haven" concept. One of these is that Son Tra was predicated on a long term commitment of fairly large size U.S. units operating in the area. In this case, operations elsewhere necessitated the reduction of American forces from the levels present when the resettlement was accomplished. Although VC motivation for attack has not been determined, the consequence of the attack was that the resettled portion of the hamlet was destroyed while the attack and resultant fire did not reach the older portion of the hamlet. We are investigating further and will attempt to analyze the reasons for the attack in a later report. The Son Tra attack was a setback for the pacification effort in Quang Ngai and a psychological victory for the VC. On the other hand both the GVN and U.S. reacted quickly and extensively. Temporary shelters and foodstuffs were brought in, medical help was given, security forces were augmented, etc.

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b. The incident should also be considered in terms of the overall situation in Quang Ngai. On balance June was a month of limited progress. The number of VC incidents dropped and there was some increase in friendly operations. Tactical units operating in the province were successful in locating a very large cache with over 400 high explosive rounds, 2,000 small arms rounds, plus assorted demolitions and 10,000 pounds of rice in one instance and in achieving significant contact with the enemy (accounting for 31 VC KIA, 10 VC captured, and 16 weapons captured) in another. The number of confirmed VC KIA by RF/PF was also encouraging.

c. There were several other positive factors in the field of security. The province continued to press the arming of RDPG's and city self defense forces. There are now some 2,000 trained RDPG self defense forces with almost 1,500 weapons and about 625 armed city self defense forces. Operations against the VC infrastructure also continued to show success with 71 arrested in June. Intelligence reports indicated that several large enemy units moved into Quang Ngai this month including elements of the 3rd NVA Division in the southern and western portions of the Province. As a result, although there was no large scale increase in overt military action during the month, some decline in security will be reflected in the HES report for June.

d. On the economic front prices remained stable and business activity continued at normal levels. It was gratifying that some USAID commodities were received through the Port of Phu To from DaNang. This use of normal commercial facilities is an important factor in encouraging the development of the economy of Quang Ngai. The long delayed 1968 self help program got underway in June with Province approval of a number of funded and unfunded projects.

e. Another positive development was the transfer of 9,000 refugees from temporary to permanent resettlement status.

f. There were some setbacks during the month. Completion of Project Recovery continued to be held up by a lack of transportation for the distribution of cement (although most money payments to TET war victims have been completed). There is continuing political upheaval and factionalism among various VNQDD elements in the province. This has a significant impact on the administration of many of the province programs.

3. Project Takeoff:

- a. Improve and expand territorial security: See paragraph 4.
- b. Press the attack on the VC Infrastructure: See paragraph 4c.

c. Prevent repression in already pacified hamlets: See paragraph 4.

d. Press economic revival in the countryside: No significant change.

e. Step up refugee care, resettlement repatriation and vocational training:

The conversion of 13 temporary refugee camps into resettlement centers was a major step in implementing the GVN refugee program in Quang Ngai. Conversion of the remaining 59 temporary camps will continue. Two groupings of scattered refugees were recognized and their camps recognized as temporary refugee camps.

3. (C) Political/Psychological:

a. General: Definite attitude improvement has been evidenced during the past month. It appears that the "wait and see" impasse has been broken and that a significant segment of the populace is now willing to support the pacification effort. A recent revitalization of VCS programs and concentration of their effort at the village and hamlet level has made inroads in establishing a favorable GVN image at that level. There is by no means a floodtide of people flocking to the cause, however, the indications of a more favorable psychological climate are evident. Improved security in most areas and the fact that security has been maintained in areas over an extended period of time appear to be a major cause contributing to this improvement. Security is of course the primary consideration in fostering continued growth of this favorable trend.

b. VIS: As indicated in paragraph a above, the VIS, during late May and early June, underwent a thorough revitalization with particular emphasis on operations at the district, village and hamlet level. Under the direction of the Province Chief and leadership of the VCS Chief a program has been instituted to conduct concentrated "person to person" psyops and political indoctrination of the people at the lowest level. The effect of the program is already manifested as previously indicated and continued emphasis in this area will have a significant impact on the pacification program.

c. Election Activities: NA

d. Minorities, Political and Religious Groups: No significant change.

4. (C) Security:

a. General: During the month of June, enemy initiated incidents decreased in Quang Ngai Province as compared to May. This is probably the result of increased ARVN and RF/PF operations, an increase in RDC projects, and most notably, an increase in civilians volunteering tactical information throughout the Province. Local Force elements in the Province practiced harassment on a markedly decreased scale compared to the month of May. A vast majority of VC activities were harassing fires upon night defensive positions.

It has been relatively quiet throughout the Province with no major attacks and local force units have been endeavoring to avoid contact. Reliable reports are still being received of supply sections having been dispatched from main force elements in the mountains to gather food and medical supplies from the lowland villages. Highway #1 remained open the entire month with only a few mining incidents. Two terrorist incidents took place in Quang Ngai City, however, these incidents have not noticeably affected the normal movements of the populace. Police have tightened security measures and the city remains a relatively secure area. The major incident was the 70% destruction, by burning, of the SCN TRA refugee camp in Northern BINH SON. Total losses incurred in this incident were 78 KIA's, both civilian and RDC, 74 WIA and 570 houses destroyed, leaving approximately 2,800 people homeless.

b. Enemy situation: The local force elements have decreased their number of harassing operations throughout the province and have turned to military proselyting, recruiting laborers, R&R, and resupply. Two terrorist incidents occurred in Quang Ngai City, one, a small bomb exploded in the theater; and, the other, a mine exploded at the soccer field. Enemy movement during the month was the displacement of elements of the 3rd NVA Division from Binh Dinh Province to Southern Quang Ngai in Son Tinh District. Indications are that this unit is here for resupply, R&R, movement northward toward the DMZ, or possibly to mount a large scale offensive throughout Quang Ngai Province in coordination with local force elements. Whatever the current intentions, they now pose a threat to the highland districts in Quang Ngai Province. Presently, there is no evidence that a large scale attack is imminent. However, increased harassment is expected due to the dark phase of the moon.

c. Infrastructure:

(1) The attack against the Province Infrastructure (VCI) continues in a most aggressive manner, headed by the Chief of PSB (Deputy Chairman Phuong Hoang/Phoenix Program) and guided by the Chief of National Police (Chairman of Phuong Hoang/Phoenix Program). This attack, both GVN and US, is coordinated through the Phuong Hoang/Phoenix Program.

(2) PSB penetrations are in full action and are resulting in many excellent intelligence reports. Tu Nghia and Nghia Hanh Districts have shown much improvement in the past month in both reporting and VCI arrest. The other districts are also doing excellent jobs. The cooperation between GVN and US officials at all levels (Re: the attack against infrastructure) appears to be outstanding. The policy of paying "cash on delivery" for information continues and is producing fine results with much more accurate intelligence.

(3) RDC/P Memo, 69/68, 1 May 1968: "Reorganization of Special Police". 600,000VN has been paid the National Police Chief. This represents 150,000VN for each chosen district of this province that is to receive special consideration in the construction of District PSB offices and detention facilities. All requirements of the subject memo have been met by the RDC/P. To date we have not received notice of progress.

On 27 June 1968, a special PSB Inspection Team came to Quang Ngai to check on the PSB reorganization, personnel, Provisional detention, SOP and etc. It is felt that this inspection team speeded up the PSB action re: the PSB Reorganization Program. It is hoped that the program will be fully underway during the next reporting period.

(4) The Phuong Hoang/Phoenix Program shows significant progress. All District PHPP offices are operational and have produced fine results during the last reporting period. It is estimated that from 15 Feb 68 thru June over 900 VCI have been killed or captured in this Province.

(5) As of 25 June 1968 there were 71 prisoners in the PIC. The break down for the month is as follows:

Prisoners placed in the PIC in May:	126
Prisoners placed in the PIC in June:	71
Prisoners from the PIC to National Police:	29
Prisoners from the PIC to Hospital:	0

(6) Two (2) prisoners were sent to the hospital but were first transferred to the National Police and then sent to the hospital through National Police channels. A number of prisoner's files have been completed, with full interrogation reports also completed. Those people are and have been appearing before the Province Security Committee for trial and sentence. As of this date the information of these trials is not yet available and will be reported in full in the July report.

(7) The building of additional space at the PIC (30 cells) should be completed within the next seven (7) days. Obtaining materials (lumber) has proven to be a problem, but it appears that lumber is forthcoming and the work will be completed as indicated.

d. Friendly Situation: This month there was a marked improvement in the number and type of operations conducted in Quang Ngai Sector. These operations are significant in that most of them started early in the morning in order to be at the objective area before advance intelligence could be received by the VC. Because of the report of greater enemy activity in and around Quang Ngai City, more offensive operations were conducted to keep the enemy from consolidating his forces. Sector controlled operations produced the following results: 25 VC KIA, 2 VCC, 7 VCS and three weapons captured.

(1) ARVN Forces: The 4th Battalion, 5th Regiment was moved from OPCON of Quang Ngai Sector. Currently there are only two ARVN Battalions in direct support of RD; 3rd Battalion, 4th Regiment and 3rd Battalion 5th Regiment. There has been no increase in the number of operations conducted by these battalions. During the month of June both battalions conducted a total of eight operations with the following results: 7 VC KIA, 1 VCC, 9 VCS and one weapon captured. This headquarters was informed that communications exist

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between VNAF FACS and ground forces, however since there have been no operations where VNAF FACS participated this information cannot be confirmed.

(2) Regional Forces: Regional Force companies continued with the same general pattern of activities as last month. A total of 13* Sector and 78 district controlled operations were conducted with the following results; 55 VC KIA, 2 VCC, 77 VCS and 15 weapons captured (* Includes RD Support Battalions). As a result of a directive from I Corps the number of recruits awaiting medical processing has been materially reduced. A total of 450 recruits completed their processing and were transported to Dong Ha training center. Approximately 150 recruits are still to be processed but this is expected to be completed prior to July 6. Five RF Companies are currently undergoing training; one refresher and four basic training. The problem of ammunition for training is still unresolved and is expected to continue until the general shortage of ammunition is alleviated.

(a) Funds and material have been authorized for the construction of a new recruiting and reception station. No starting date has been determined as Sector officials are awaiting delivery of approved materials and funds from Da Nang. On two occasions ADS&L Company trucks were dispatched from Quang Ngai to Daifang to pick up a total of 3800 uniforms and web equipment from LALC. No delivery was made by LALC. This appears to be the only way supplies can be obtained with any degree of security.

(b) A total of seven MATS teams are now assigned to Quang Ngai Province. Three of these teams are assigned to areas which do not have RF Group Headquarters organized and are operating with individual units assigned to the district. After reevaluating the RF/PF disposition, missions and project strength increases for FY 68, it is recommended that no additional MATS teams be assigned to Quang Ngai Province at this time.

(c) The lack of effective leaders for RF units is still the single most critical problem pertaining to these units. Until the effectiveness of personnel presently occupying positions of leadership is improved the operation and logistical problems will remain unresolved. The upgrading of RF units weapons is nearly completed for all units except for issue of M79s which have not been received.

(3) Popular Forces: Popular Force Platoon activity is relatively unchanged from last month. Nghia Hanh district forces have been extremely active, initiating 60% of the operations conducted by PF units. The majority of these operations are classified as platoon size raids conducted in the early morning hours. One platoon at each district is currently conducting refresher training. This training is hampered by the lack of ammunition and qualified instructors. Again the problem of leaders is still paramount. The recently initiated upgrading program, weapons replacement, additional promotions, improved pay and housing will have a positive effect on quality of incumbent leaders. The PF housing program has started. Shipments of cement, roofing tin, and nails has been received. Lumber has not arrived but is expected for

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pick up for early July. The lack of guidance through Vietnamese channels is expected to create difficulties in controlling and accounting for materials after delivery to construction sites.

(4) The 11th Brigade has contributed invaluable support and assistance when requested in support of combat operations. The Combined Action Platoons (CAP) continue to prove their worth. Their aggressive patrolling produced the following results: 14 VC KIA, five VCC, 20 VCS and five weapons captured. The engineer support provided by FIAF continues to be concentrated on the main LOC in Quang Ngai Province.

5. (U) Economics: Economic activity continued at normal levels. Lowland farmers transplanted much of their second rice crop. Annual work on diversion dams for irrigation continued but there was continued fear of a water shortage as the water table dropped. Prices remained stable with even a slight decrease in the price of rice near the end of the month. All lines of communication were open. Commodities arrived in Quan Ngai by truck from Da Nang and by ship from Da Nang and Saigon.

6. (C) Provincial Resources in Support of Pacification:

a. RDC and TRNDG Groups:

(1) Fifty-one RDC groups are presently employed in hamlets. RDC group 51 is still located in six hamlets along the southern, eastern and western approaches to the city. They have recruited, trained and assisted in arming approximately 30 men in each of the six hamlets. It is expected that RDC group 51 will be dissolved and its members used as fillers for the other 50 RDC groups sometime during July. Only one RDC group is not in its 1968 assigned hamlet. District officials in Mo Duc feel that Vinh Thanh Hamlet is too insecure for an RDC group. As a result RDC group 30 has been working in Dong Cat Hamlet. One RDC group has been reassigned not in accordance with the 1968 RD plan. RDC group 27 was moved from Tan Dai Hamlet to Co Phu Hamlet. Since the large areas of eastern Tu Nghia have never regained the people who were forced to flee, Tan Dai has only a small percentage of its pre-TET population. Co Phu has had a recent influx of displaced persons as a result of military operations and could properly utilize another RDC group. Ten hamlets have been received during June in accordance with the modified requirements for a New Life Hamlet. Two more are scheduled in the next week. None of these RDC groups are expected to move into their second-phase hamlets until a reevaluation of the 1968 RD plan occurs. Approximately 85% of all the RDC groups remain in their assigned hamlets night and day. Organization of the peoples' groups has slowed somewhat as a result of planting. It is expected to pick up next month. Pre-Vung Tau training is presently underway for the July class. An anti-illiteracy workshop lasting one week was conducted for 51 RDC and 39 civilians. The course was promoted by Mr. Goldsmith, USAID Education, taught by the Primary Education Service and supported by AEF funds. The students went back to their hamlets with workbooks, training aids and lesson plans.

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(2) No significant change in TSRC activities.

b. Static Census Grievance Cadre: No significant change.

c. Self-Defense Forces: No significant change

d. Technical Cadre: No significant change.

e. Police: The National Police population in this province is 1507 Policemen, in place, on duty. There are 150 National Police in training at the National Police Academy, Danang. One NP attending the field Intelligence School in the Phillipines, and one NP attending the Counter Insurgency School, Malaysia. The authorized strength of 1800 has been recruited from within the Province. Forty three police from Resources Control, Special Branch, Uniform Branch accompanied the NPF on the three day operation on Ly-Son Island June 21-23, 1968. Their mission there was to conduct family census, collect and exploit Intelligence, resources denial, and project the Police image to the population. This Island has never had extensive police penetration. The Province Chief came to the Island on the second day and talked with the Island council and the village elders explaining the reason for the police operation and solicited their cooperation with the police. Since the operation 40 young men have reported to the Island chief for induction into the GVN forces.

f. PFF: The NPF Company 102 is operating in the four lowland district of Son Tinh, Tu Nghia, Nghia Hanh and Binh Son attacking the infrastructure and in support of the RD program. This Company conducted 14 positive police type operations during the month of June. Lt Nha, Company Executive Officer left to attend training in Malaysia under the Colombo plan.

(2) The 112 NPF Company received all equipment except vehicles and radios. The first part of the month the unit became operational. Patrols and ambushes, day and night, were conducted around the city of Quang Ngai. This unit participated in the Ly Son operation during the period 21-23 June 1968. At 0300 Hrs. June 21 the Co. landed by air on the Island and began a sweep operation; searching areas, hamlets and individual homes. All personnel and houses were checked for contraband, identification and proper documentation. There are presently 10,885 inhabitants and 2,177 families on this Island. Twelve night ambushes were placed in key positions in an attempt to capture persons who tried to escape to the mountains. On the morning of the second day an amphibious landing was launched by this company on a small adjacent Island with assistance from Naval Forces (Market-Time). Also two squads operating with Market-Time and acting as boarding parties boarded 29 large fishing boats and sampans at sea around the Islands. This was the first major operation for this company. The company returned to Quang Ngai by sampan and motor vehicle on June 23, 1968.

7. (U) Provincial Administrative Personnel and Organization: Province officials complained that the mobilization is taking many important staff members. 27 positions in Province Headquarters are presently vacant and


more will be vacant soon. The draft is also taking its toll of the Technical Services. Particularly significant is the fact that several Service Chiefs have been or soon will be drafted.

8. (U) USAID/JUSPAO Section: No significant change.

9. (U) Required Actions:

a. The status of radio operators reported in the May report, remains unchanged. Two operators were assigned this month and two incumbents will rotate in July, leaving two vacancies. C

b. The need for a fork lift, to unload commodities still exists. Information has been received that a fork lift is available and is awaiting transportation from Saigon to Quang Ngai. Request your assistance in getting this major item of equipment to Quang Ngai. A

1. (U) District Chief: 1Lt Tran Ngoc Tan
2. (C) Status of Pacification:

a. The pacification program has maintained the same level of progress of last month. Although VC initiated incidents have decreased in number in this district, it is significant to note that two acts of terrorism took place during the month. A mine was placed and exploded inside the district headquarters killing one civilian and wounding six others. Also a squad size VC unit moved during day light hours to one of the RD hamlets, dressed in ARVN uniforms, and attacked and killed two PF and four RD cadre.

b. The VC still have the capability of massing forces of battalion size in the district. These forces can harass the population, collect taxes and disrupt the RD program.

3. (C) Factor Influencing Pacification:

a. Funded and unfunded self-help projects are now receiving money and/or supplies. The district has 10 funded and 10 unfunded projects in progress. GVN funds and commodities have still not reached district for budgeted projects in agriculture, education and health.

b. Only 500 bags of cement and 500 sheets of roofing have been received for TET war victims out of a total of 2,000 budgeted for the district.

**Results of the Investigation of the Case of the American
Operation in the Son My Area (East of Son Tinh)**

I. GENERAL: Situation in Son My Village

a. **Terrain:** The village of Son My is located in the most eastern portion of Son Tinh District, adjacent to the Son Quang, Son Hai areas. It consists of 4 hamlets:

Tu-cung
My-lai
My-khe
Co-luy

b. **Political and Military Situation:** From until the end of 1964 up until September 1969 this village (Son My) was controlled by the VC and organized into fortified combat hamlets. VC forces in the area consisted of:

48th Province Main Force Battalion
V/20th District Force Company
Company 506A and 506B Sapper Companies
Approximately three platoons of guerillas.

The Communists organized combat hamlets with communication trenches, dugouts, stout perimeter fences, a village self government committee; Hamlet administrations united everyone, young and old in the ranks to fight, produce and lead the people. The young people were recruited into these various units or local guerilla forces. The provisional administrative committee and the Hamlet committees were in exile to Son-Long village and Son-Tinh village. A number of the people fled the village and hamlets to areas under GVN control.

II. The situation prior to the operation.

During the Lunar New Year (30 Jan 1968) the Communists used the 401st Special Mission Regiment and all provincial main force units consisting of 5 battalions and 12 Special Missions and local companies to support two NVA regiments at the 3d Division (Yellow Star) to attack Quang Ngai City. This force was divided into four parts. The Son Tinh portion of the force consisted of the 48th Bn 107th Bn (AAA). Company 506A launched their attack from Son My village with about 150 villagers and struck at the RF/PF Training Center and the RF Company north of the Tra-khuc Bridge. However they were defeated and suffered more than 100 casualties, after which they pulled back to Son My village to reorganize and bury their dead at the village.

Despite their defeat, following the Lunar New Year the Communists continued to remain close to the hamlets on the edge of Quang Ngai City and the District Capitals of Son Tinh, Tu Nghia, Nghia Hanh, to continue their shelling and strike at scattered posts to create pressure, seize farm land and encircle the city.

III. Operations Conducted by RVN and Allies to Relieve Enemy Pressure.

ARVN, RF and Allied forces conducted a consecutive series of operations to relieve every pressure. Responsibilities were divided as follows:

RF/PF operated in those Revolutionary Development areas having local village and hamlet authorities.

ARVN and US units operated in VC controlled areas with no village or hamlet authorities.

IV. The Operation of 16 Mar 68.

On 16 Mar 68 Task Force Barker, of the Americal Division, consisting of 3 companies, A, B, and C conducted a local air mobile operation at Son My village. The operation opened at 0730 with artillery and air fires along the dike to the NE of Song My, after which C Company began to land troops. After the conclusion of the operation we were informed by the US military that 125 VC had been killed on the spot, a number of weapons and documents had been captured, and about 20 civilians had been killed in the engagement. The advance of the troops into one fortified hamlet was very difficult because of very many mines, communications trenches and positions. Allied forces did not disclose any information on their losses. The investigation revealed that fighting and deaths only occurred at the Sub-hamlet of Thuan Yen, part of Tu Cung Hamlet. (This Hamlet has five sub-hamlets: Thuan-Yen, Truong-An, Binh Tay, Binh dong, Trung-hoa. There were no clashes or deaths at the other four sub-hamlets. It is not possible to determine the population in the subhamlet of Thuan Yen prior to 16 Mar 1968 because there were no village or hamlet governmental authorities. However the village and hamlet authorities say there were about 70 families with a population of about 340. Over half of these, 45 families and 250 people had evacuated to Saigon, following their military sponsors or had evacuated to other secure districts in the province. On 16 March 68 there were about 25 families with a population of 80-90 people. After September 1969, the people of this sub-hamlet were assembled at the model village of Son My. There are presently 17 families with a total of more than 30 people there. Perhaps a number of the people of this hamlet were killed during the engagement of 16 March and others went to follow the VC. The investigation confirmed that 25 people whose names and ages are known, were killed and 5 people were wounded. These people are recuperating at the model hamlet. (A roster of those wounded and killed is attached.)

V. The situation in Son My village on the Day of 16 March 1968:

A number of VC were killed in the operation, however the Communists immediately reoccupied the village and reorganized as in the past, until September 1969. Quang Ngai Sector has just developed plans to pacify and reconstruct this village. To reinstate, it was possible to pacify this village in September 1969 thanks to the Ba-Lang An operation. Thanks to this operation, enemy strength in the area was reduced significantly.

VI. Present Situation:

At present Son My village has been pacified, however it has not been possible to completely remove previously organized VC positions, trenches, obstacles and mines. Therefore the people have been moved to a new area in the village called Son My Model Village which consists of

Population of 1987

As for the subhamlet of Thuan Yen of Tu Cung Hamlet, where the engagement took place, there are 17 families, a population of 30.

The population of the village is composed only of women, children and the aged. It is unknown how many men, women and youths left to follow the Communists in the past or evacuated to other hamlets in government controlled areas.

Son My village now has an elected administrative committee and Hamlet Administration. RF/PF and RD Cadre are actively supporting pacification and the people move about freely. Life is happier than before.

VII. Various Investigations:

a. Information during the operation: Approximately one month after March 16th, 1968, information from the VC area stated that the Communists had organized various ceremonies commemorating their cadres and troops that had been killed and to proclaim the glorious victory of district party member Nguyen Tri Thuc, alias Cuong. The ceremony was presided over by Ly Tuong-Anh, district party member. Following the commemorative ceremony, propaganda leaflets were scattered proclaiming a glorious victory and mentioning that 500 villagers had been killed on the operation on March 16th. From there it reached the village chief by word of mouth. The Son My village chief reported this to the District Chief.

b. Investigation by Provincial Authorities and Quang Ngai Sector.

Province noted the District investigation of the case, however the Tu Cung Area of the village of Son my was still under VC control. 1st LT Tran-ngoc-Tan, the District Chief at that time, reported that both sides had suffered losses in the engagement and that a number of civilians had been killed, but that the Communists had exaggerated the matter and used it for propaganda.

c. The second Investigation Conducted by Province by Means of an Operation.

Quong Ngai Sector conducted a three day operation QT/446 to enter Tu Cung Hamlet of Son My village using two RF groups personally commanded by the Province Chief. However as they started to enter the Tu Cung Hamlet they received fire from VC mortars, machine guns and B40 rockets and were unable to occupy their objective. The VC employed one company to envelope them. Results: 4 dead, 8 wounded. Enemy: 20 dead, 3 POW's, 1 crew served and 3 individual weapons captured.

The operation lasted from 11 Jun 68 - 13 Jun 68. However on 12 June 2 US aircraft were shot down, one recon and one HULB, 3KM to the NE at Tu Cung Hamlet. Therefore the direction of the operation was changed to rescue the pilots both of whom were killed in the crash.

Although the force did not succeed in entering the hamlet, the Province Chief and staff met about 20 persons who came out from the hamlet. Interrogation of these people revealed that on 16 March 68 the Americans had conducted an operation with very destructive air and artillery fire. At 0730 when the helicopters landed the troops, the Communists in the hamlet resisted, then pulled out of their positions and communication trenches. A number of people lost their lives running to shelters or while being led by the guerrillas along the trails along the edge of the bamboo to the North at Son quang Hamlet and to the East at Thuan Yen Hamlet. A number of people were asked if anyone observed the losses during the shooting and killing. They answered that they could not observe but that throughout the next morning, when the US forces had completely withdrawn, they returned to police the battlefield on orders of the Communists. They believed the total number killed was 100. When asked how many of these were women and children they said between 20 and 30. And about 50-60 were guerillas in the village and Communist troops. When asked where the bodies, peoples and communists, were buried. They said they were buried right in the hamlet on the spots they were killed.

d. The VN/US Investigating Committee Meeting at Saigon:

On 22 June 1969 a US/VN Investigating Committee assembled at Saigon: The committee included an American Lieutenant Colonel who met with the Colonel, Province Chief, Quang Ngai, and the Son Tinh District Chief. Above information was passed to the US officer. The Committee could not go to Tu Cong hamlet because this area was still controlled by the VC.

e. The Third investigation made by Quong Ngai Province and Sector Headquarters:

During November 1969 after Son My Village was pacified, Colonel Province Chief and the District Chief visited the Village many times to dig into the incident and learned the following: There are 5 people still living who were wounded during the 16 March 1968 engagement. They were treated by the Quang Ngai hospital. They Are

1. Mrs. Nguyen Thi Doc, age 60, wounded in the stomach.
2. Mrs. Ha Thi Quy age 44, wounded in the buttocks.
3. Miss Nguyen Tho, age 17 wounded in the head.
4. Miss Nguyen Danh, age 7 wounded in the leg.
5. Mr. Pham Dat, age 39, stomach wound.

The death of 20 people was confirmed by members of their families:

Family of Mrs. Doc including 11 members killed are: Husband, son, daughter in law, 7 grandchildren and one daughter.

Family of Mrs. Quy had 3 members killed: daughter, grandchild, a relative.

Family of Mr. Nhon, hamlet Chief in exile, had 5 members killed. Child, brother, and three cousins.

Family of Mr. Dat, one member killed, his wife

Family of Mr. Truong Long, 3 members killed: son, daughter-in-law and cousing.

Among the 6 families above with members killed, with the exception of Mr. Do Tan Nhan, hamlet chief, who is non communist, the others all have children following the VC such as: Mrs. Nguyen Thi Doc has a cousin named Tran Sinh, age 18, who is a member of the VC provisional unit. Mrs. Ha Thi Quy's 17 year old son is a member of the C/21 Sopper Company. Truong Long's 24 year old son, Truong Top emancipated, Truong Thanh Van age 29, is a VC Village Medic. Mr. Truong Long himself is the leader of a resistance group who led the Tet Mau Tan demonstrations and was previously jailed in Con Son for 2½ years. Mrs. Truong Thi Tung has a 27 year old son, Do Ky, who is a guerilla, and a daughter in law named Nguyen Thi Thoa, age 23 who is recently captured intelligence liaison cadre.

VIII. CONCLUSIONS

The operation of 16 March 68 did create some damage and loss to Sub-hamlet Thoan Yen, Tu Cung Hamlet.

The VC leaflets saying 500 people being killed were gossip.

The people reported about 100 bodies, thirty of which were civilians and the remainder communists, guerillas and VCI

Following the operations, the American reported 125 VC killed, a quantity of documents and explosives captured, but did not release any information on US losses.

The investigation conducted by the Province confirmed that 5 wounded civilians were treated at the hospital and produced the name and age of 25 persons killed.

But the investigation by Province and Sector still has many obstacles to determining clearly the activities of the First Platoon, C Company, commanded by 1LT William L. Calley, and the extent of losses and destruction caused by that platoon. Province and Sector lacks the authority to interrogate the American participants in the operation. At that time the US Army had adequate authority and resources to investigate both sides, US and VN. Province/Sector Quang Ngai will continue to search for information from hamlet and village and will report immediately any results.

I.- ĐẠI-CƯƠNG : - Tình-hình xã Sơn-Mỹ

a)- Địa-thế : Xã Sơn-Mỹ ở cực đông quận Sơn-Trịnh, phía bắc giáp khu vực Sơn-Quang, Sơn-Hà. Gồm có 4 Ấp :

- Tư-Quang
- Mỹ-Lai
- Mỹ-Khê
- Cỏ-Lũy

b)- Tình-hình Chính-trị Quân-sự : Vào cuối năm 1964 và đến tháng 9/1969 xã này bị Việt-Cộng kiểm-soát và tổ-chức thành Ấp chiến-dấu rất kiên-cố. Lực-Lượng Cộng-Sản tại Vùng này gồm có :

- Tiểu-Đoàn 48/CLT
- Đại-Đội V/20 ĐP Huyện
- Đại-Đội 506.A và 506.B Đặc-công
- Về Du-Kích có khoảng 3 Trung-Đội.

Cộng-Sản tổ-chức thành Ấp chiến-dấu có gần 1000 hộ, có hầm-hố, rào vi vũng chắc, có Ban Tự Quản xã, Tự Quản Ấp. Dân chúng nam phụ lão ấu thì được ghép vào hàng ngũ chiến-dấu, sản xuất và dân công. Thanh-niên trong xã đều gia-nhập vào các Đơn-vị này hay gia-nhập du-kích địa-phương. Ủy-Ban Hành-Chánh lúc thời và Ban Trị-Sự Ấp của ta đã lưu-vong về xã Sơn-Long, Sơn-Trịnh. Một số dân chúng bỏ xã Ấp tản cư về các Vùng Quốc-Gia cư-tru.

II.- Tình-Hình trước ngày Hành-Quản :

Trong dịp Tết Mậu-Thân (30.1.1968) Cộng-Sản đã sử-dụng Trung-Đoàn 401 Đặc-Công và toàn bộ lực-lượng chủ-lực Tỉnh gồm có 5 Tiểu-Đoàn và 12 Đại-Đội Đặc-Công và Địa-phương yểm-trợ 2 Trung-Đoàn Chính-Quy Bắc-Việt của Sư-Đoàn 3 Sao-Vàng tấn-công vào Thị-Xã Quang-Ngãi. Chia ra làm 4 cánh quân. Riêng về cánh quân Sơn-Trịnh gồm có Tiểu-Đoàn 48 và Tiểu-Đoàn 107 Phòng không, Đại-Đội 506.A xuất phát từ xã Sơn-Mỹ, mang theo một số dân công của xã này vào khoảng 150 người tiến đánh Trung-Tâm Huấn-Luyện ĐPQ và NQ và Đại-Đội ĐPQ phía bắc cầu Trà-Khúc. Nhưng tại đây chúng đã thất bại và hơn 100 tên bị tử thương, xong chúng rút lui về xã Sơn-Mỹ để chỉnh-dồn và chôn cất những tử thi của chúng tại xã này.

Sau Tết, trận Mậu Thân mặc dầu CS thất bại, nhưng CS vẫn còn liên tiếp bám sát các Ấp ven Thị và các xã chung quanh quận lỵ Sơn-Trịnh, Tư-Nghĩa, Nghĩa-Hành để tiếp tục Pháo-Kích và đánh những trận lẻ-tẻ nhưng dồn dập để gây áp lực lấy nông-thôn bao vây Thanh-Thị.

III.- Các cuộc Hành-Quản giải-tỏa áp-lực của ta và Đông-Minh :

Lực-Lượng chủ-lực địa-phương và lực-lượng Đông-Minh mở một cuộc Hành-Quản liên tiếp để giải tỏa áp lực địch và phân trách nhiệm như sau :

- Địa-Phương-Quân + Nghĩa-Quân hoạt-động tại các khu vực XDNT có chính quyền địa-phương xã, Ấp.
- Lực-lượng Chủ-lực-Quân + Hoa-kỳ hoạt-động tại ^{cao} khu vực Việt-Cộng kiểm-soát không có chính quyền xã, Ấp.

IV. - Diễn tiến cuộc Hành-Quân ngày 16.03.1968 :

Trong ngày 16.3.1968 một cuộc Hành-Quân Địa-Phương Trục-thăng-vận tại xã Sơn-Mỹ do TASK FORCE BARKER thuộc Lữ-Đoàn AMERICAL gồm có 3 Đại-Đội ALFA - BAAVO và CHARLIE. Cuộc Hành-Quân đã diễn ra lúc 0730G sáng có Pháo-Binh và phi-cơ tạc-xạ dọn bãi đáp về phía đông bắc sơn-mỹ, xong Đại-Đội C bắt đầu đổ Quân. Sau cuộc Hành-Quân xong thì tin tức Quân-sự từ phía Hoa-Kỳ cho biết đã tiêu diệt được 125 VC chết tại chỗ và một số vũ-khí và tài liệu bắt được và vào khoảng 20 thường dân bị chết trong cuộc chạm súng này. Cuộc tiến Quân rất khó khăn để vào 1 Ấp chiến đấu ở nơi đây có rất nhiều mìn, bẫy, giao thông-hào và địa-đạo. Về tổn-thất Quân-Đội Đông-Minh không được tiết-lộ. Cuộc điều-tra cho biết, trận chiến chỉ xảy ra và bị chết chóc tại một xóm Thuận-Yên của Ấp Tư-Cung (Ấp này có 5 xóm là : Thuận-Yên, Trường-An, Bình-Tây, Bình-Đông, Trung-Hoa) 4 xóm còn lại không có giao tranh và chết chóc. Tình-hình dân số của xóm này trước ngày 16.3.1968 không được kiểm kê vì không có Chính-quyền xã, Ấp, nhưng Chính-quyền xã, Ấp cho biết vào khoảng 70 nóc gia, 340 dân số. Trên 1/2 gồm có 45 gia-đình 250 dân số đã tản-cư vào Saigon theo gia-đình Bình-sĩ hay tản-cư về các Ấp an-ninh trong Tỉnh. Còn cư ngụ cho đến ngày 16.3.1968 vào khoảng 25 gia-đình và dân số từ 80 đến 90 người. Hiện nay sau tháng 9/1969 thì dân chúng xóm này đã được tập trung vào cư trú tại xã kiểu-mẫu Sơn-Mỹ gồm có 17 gia-đình trên 30 dân. Có lẽ một số dân trong Ấp này đã bị chết trong cuộc giao tranh ngày 16.3.1968 hoặc một số khác đã đi theo VC. Số dân chúng bị chết trong cuộc điều tra đã được xác nhận là 25 người có tên tuổi và 5 người bị thương đã chữa lành hiện ở tại Ấp kiểu-mẫu (danh sách những người bị thương và bị chết đính kèm).

V. - Tình-hình xã Sơn-Mỹ ngày 16.3.1968 :

Cuộc Hành-Quân trên đã tiêu-diệt một số VC, nhưng liên sau cuộc Hành-Quân Cộng-san tái-chiếm xã này và tổ-chức lại như cũ cho đến cuối tháng 9/1969. Tiểu-Khu Quảng-Ngãi mới có kế-hoạch Bình-Định xây-dựng Xã này. Cũng cần nhắc lại ở đây sơ-diễn tháng 9/1969 xã này được Bình-định là nhờ cuộc Hành-Quân giải-tỏa khu vực Ba-làng-an và nhờ đó áp lực Địch đã giảm bớt.

VI. - Tình-hình hiện nay :

Hiện nay Xã Sơn-Mỹ đã được Bình-định, tuy-nhiên các vị trí Ấp cũ mà VC tổ-chức từ trước còn nhiều địa-đạo và chướng ngại vật mìn bẫy chưa gỡ hết được, nếu dân chúng tái tạo lại nhà cửa thanh từng khu vực mới ở trong xã gọi là Xã kiểu-mẫu Sơn-Mỹ, gồm có :

- 397 nóc gia

- 1.987 dân số

Riêng xóm Thuận-Yên Ấp Tư-Cung là nơi xảy ra cuộc giao tranh thì có : 17 nóc-gia và 30 dân.

Dân số trong Xã chỉ còn là đàn bà trẻ con và người già còn bao nhiêu thanh-niên nam nữ đã đi theo VC từ lâu hoặc tản cư về các Ấp Vùng Quốc-Gia.

Xã Sơn-Mỹ hiện nay đã có Ủy-Ban Hành-Quản và Ban Trị-sự Ấp dân cư. Có lực-lượng ĐPQ + NQ và Cán-Bộ XDNT hoạt-động bình-định và xây-dựng và dân chúng đi lại tự-do. Đời sống tươi-vui hơn trước.

VII. - Những cuộc điều-tra :

a) - Tin-tức trong cuộc Hành-Quân : Vào khoảng 1 tháng sau ngày 16.3.1968 thì tin-tức từ Vùng VC cho biết Cộng-sản đã tổ-chức những buổi lễ Truy-diệu những cán-binh tử thương của chúng và đề cao chiến thắng thành tích của Huyện Ủy-viện Nguyễn-Trí-Thực bí danh ~~Đức Cường~~, do tên Lý-Tường-Anh Huyện-Ủy Chủ-tọa. Sau cuộc meet-ting truy-diệu thì có rải một số truyền đơn đề cao thành tích chiến thắng và đề cập gần 500 dân làng bị chết trong cuộc Hành-Quân ngày 16.3. Từ đó dân ở trong Ấp truyền miệng đến tại Ông Xã Trưởng. Ông Xã Trưởng Sơn-Mỹ phúc trình lên Ông Quận Trưởng sự việc trên;

b) - Điều-tra của Chính-uyên Tỉnh và TK Quảng-Ngãi :

Tỉnh lưu-y Quân điều-tra về vụ này nhưng vì khu vực Tư-Cung xã Sơn-Mỹ còn do VC kiểm-soát nhưng theo tờ trình của Quận Trưởng Sơn-Tĩnh lúc bấy giờ là Trung-Ủy TRẦN-NGỌC-TÂN trình rằng, trong cuộc giao tranh có sự tổn thất cả đôi bên và một số đồng bào chết nhưng VC đã tuyên truyền và phong đại.

c) - Cuộc điều-tra lần thứ 2 của Tỉnh bằng một cuộc H.Q :

Thiếu-Khu Quảng-Ngãi mở cuộc Hành-Quân Q1/44G vào Ấp Tư-Cung thuộc xã Sơn-Mỹ gồm có 2 Đại-Đội ĐPQ trong thời-gian 3 ngày do Đại-Tá Tỉnh Trưởng đích thân chỉ-huy, nhưng khi vào đầu Ấp Tư-Cung thì bị VC bắn ra bằng súng cối, súng máy và B.40 nên không chiếm được mục tiêu và VC điều động 1 Đại-Đội đánh bọc hậu, kết quả : Ta 4 chết 8 bị thương, địch 20 chết 3 bị bắt sống, thu 1 vũ-khí cộng-đồng và 3 vũ-khí cá-nhân.

Cuộc Hành-Quân diễn ra từ ngày 11.6.1968 đến 13.6.1968 nhưng qua ngày 12.6.68 thì có 2 phi cơ Hoa-Kỳ 1 chiếc 2 loại quan sát và 1 chiếc trực thăng HUIB bị rớt cách mục-tiêu về phía đồng-bào Ấp Tư-Cung 3 cơ nên cuộc Hành-Quân đổi hướng để cứu cấp phi-hành-đoàn tử nạn.

Trong cuộc Hành-Quân này mặc dù không tiến được vào Ấp nhưng Đại-Tá Tỉnh-Trưởng và Bộ Tham-Mưu đã gặp khoảng 20 đồng-bào ở trong Ấp đi ra, được chất vấn những đồng-bào này cho biết vào ngày 16.3.1968 có một cuộc Hành-Quân của Quân-Đội Hoa-Kỳ có phi-pháo bắn phá dữ dội. Vào lúc 0730G khi trực thăng đổ bộ thì CS ở trong Ấp chống cự xong rút vào địa-đạo và giao thông hào, còn một số dân chúng thì mạnh ai nấy chạy vào hầm trú ẩn hoặc theo các đường nương bở-tre chạy lên phía bắc Xã Sơn-Quang và phía đông xóm Thuận Yên do Du-Kiểm hướng dẫn. Hỏi trong số đồng-bào này có ai thấy tận mắt trong lúc bị bắn và bị chết thì họ trả lời chúng tôi không được thấy nhưng qua sáng ngày hôm sau khi Quân-Đội Hoa-Kỳ đã rút đi hết thì chúng tôi trở về lại do CS huy-động để thủ dọn chiến trường. Chúng tôi được biết tổng số là trên 100 xác chết. Được hỏi có bao nhiêu đồng-bào và trẻ con thì họ cho biết có từ 20 đến 30 người và vào khoảng từ 50 đến 60 là du-kích trong làng và bộ-đội CS lạ mặt. Hỏi những xác chết của đồng-bào và CS chôn cất ở đâu họ cho biết chôn cất ngay trong Ấp tại các nơi họ bị chết.

d) - Cuộc điều-tra của Phái-đoàn hỗn-hợp Việt-Kỳ Saigon :

Vào ngày 22.6.69 một Phái-đoàn hỗn-hợp Việt-Kỳ Saigon ra gồm có Trung-Tá Hoa-Kỳ đến gặp Đại-Tá Tỉnh-Trưởng và Ông Quận-Trưởng Quận Sơn-Tĩnh, được Đại-Tá và Ông Quận Trưởng cho biết như trên. Phái-đoàn điều-tra không đến tận Ấp Tư-Cung được vì khu vực này vẫn do Cộng-sản kiểm-soát.

e) - Cuộc điều-tra thứ 3 của Tỉnh và TK Quảng-Ngãi :

Vào tháng 11.1969 sau khi xã Sơn-Mỹ đã được Bình-định, Đại-Tá Tỉnh-Trưởng và Ông Quận Trưởng đã đến thăm xã nhiều lần và tập huấn nội-vụ thì được biết thêm như sau : Trong cuộc Hành-Quân ngày 16.3.68 của TASK FORCE BARKER còn có 5 người dân bị thương trong cuộc giao tranh đã được Bệnh-Viện Quảng-Ngãi chữa lành :

- 4 -

- 1) - Bà NGUYỄN-THI-ĐỐC 60 tuổi bị thương ở bụng.
- 2) - Bà HÀ-THỊ-I-QUỖY 44 tuổi bị thương ở mông
- 3) - Em NGUYỄN - THỌ 17 tuổi bị thương ở đầu
- 4) - Em NGUYỄN-THỊ-OANH 7 tuổi bị thương ở chân
- 5) - Ông PHẠM - ĐẠT 39 tuổi bị thương ở bụng.

Hai mươi lăm người chết được xác nhận do các thân nhân khai :

- Gia-đình Bà Đốc có 11 người chết là : Chồng, con trai dậu, ba cháu nội, 1 con gái, 4 cháu ngoại.
- Gia-đình Bà Quý có 3 người chết là : con gái, bà thím, cháu ngoại.
- Gia-đình Ông Nhân Ấp Trưởng Lưu vọng có 5 người chết : Con, Anh và 3 cháu kêu bằng chú.
- Gia-đình Ông Đạt có 1 người chết : Vợ.
- Gia-đình Ông Trương-Long có 3 người chết là : con trai dậu và cháu nội.
- Gia-đình Bà Trương-Thị-Tùng 57 tuổi gồm có 2 người chết là : Dâu và cháu.

Trong số 6 gia-đình nói trên có thân nhân chết chỉ trừ gia-đình Ông Đỗ-Tân-Nhân Ấp Trưởng là thành phần không CS những gia-đình còn lại đều có con em theo Cộng-sản như :

- Bà Nguyễn Thị-Đốc có cháu tên Trần-Sinh 18 tuổi gia-nhập đơn-vị Chu-lực-Tinh.
- Bà Hà-Thị-Quý có Đỗ-Phương 17 tuổi là con trai theo Đại-Đội Đặc-công C.21 Cộng-sản.
- Trương-Long có con là Trương-Tập 24 tuổi thoát-ly, Trương-Thanh-Vân 29 tuổi đi Y-Tả Xã VC. Riêng Ông Trương-Lọng là Trưởng Ban Tranh-Đấu đã hướng dẫn biểu tình Tết Mậu-thần và đã bị cầm tù ở Đảo Côn-Sơn 2 năm rưỡi.
- Gia-đình Trương-Thị-Tùng có con là Đỗ-Ky 28 tuổi du-kích thôn và dâu tên Nguyễn-Thị-Thỏa 23 tuổi giao-liên tỉnh-báo hiện bị bắt.

VIII. - KẾT-LUẬN : Cuộc Hành-Quân ngày 16.3.68 đã gây một số tổn thất tại xóm Thuận-Yên Ấp Tư-Cung.

Về truyền đơn Cộng-Sản thì rải rạo 500 đồng-bao chết. Về phía dân chúng thì cho biết vào khoảng 100 xác chết độ 30 đồng-bao số còn lại là xác Cộng-sản, du kích cũng như bộ-đội và cán-bộ hạ-tấn Cộng-sản.

Về phía Hoa-Kỳ cho biết sau cuộc Hành-Quân là 125 VC bị chết 1 số tài liệu và chất nổ đạn dược bị tịch thu không tiết lộ về phần tổn thất của Quân-Đội Hoa-Kỳ.

Cuộc điều tra của Tỉnh xác nhận 5 người bị thương được chữa lành và 25 người chết có tên tuổi.

Những cuộc điều tra của Tỉnh và Tiểu-Khu Quảng-Ngãi còn nhiều khó-khăn để biết rõ hành-động của Trung-Đội 1 Đại-Đội C do Trung-Ủy WILLIAM - L - CALLEY Chỉ-Huy đã gây tổn thất bao nhiêu đàn bà con nít trong những hành-động nào. Vì hiện nay Tỉnh và Tiểu-Khu không đủ thẩm quyền để chất vấn các đương-sự Hoa-Kỳ tham dự trong cuộc Hành-Quân này. Trong lúc đó thì Bộ Lục-Quân Hoa-Kỳ đã có đủ thẩm quyền và phương tiện để đi điều tra về cả 2 bên. Tiểu-Khu và Tỉnh Quảng-Ngãi cố gắng tìm thêm các manh mối về phía chính-quyền xã Ấp và dân chúng sẽ tục trình nếu có thêm kết-qua.



 - (3) Personnel infusion system.
 - (4) Casualty reporting.
 - (5) Red cross.
- j. Regulations and directives of higher headquarters.
 - k. Availability of training facilities.
 - l. Availability of fortification materials.
 - m. Enemy order of battle.
 - n. Procedures for map and photo procurement.
 - o. Procedures for obtaining security clearances.
 - p. Establishing channels of intelligence information.
 - q. Determining status of linguists.
 - r. Obtaining frequencies and call signs for the Brigade.

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4. The 3d Brigade assisted the incoming Brigades in preparing the following plans:

- a. Brigade debarkation and movement plans.
- b. Administrative and logistical support plans.
- c. Base development and security plans.
- d. Civil affairs plans.
- e. Intelligence estimates.

5. Upon arrival of the incoming Brigades the 3d Brigade provided the following support:

- a. Met the incoming elements at the airfield and transported them to the 3d Brigade firebases.
- b. Provided tent kits and personnel to help erect the tents.
- c. Initially provided aviation support.
- d. Conducted briefings for commanders and staff sections.
- e. Coordinated logistical support.
- f. Conducted on-the-job training for all principal staff officers.
- g. Provided an orientation flight over the TAOR for all commanders and principal staff officers.
- h. Conducted a counterpart training program in which officers at all levels worked with a 3d Brigade counter-part in the same position.
- i. Conducted a three day training program for each Co to include:
 - (1) NVA and VC tactics.
 - (2) Practical work with booby traps.
 - (3) Patrolling and ambushes.
 - (4) Grenade and demolition.
 - (5) TO procedures.
 - (6) Employment of scout dogs.

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AVI 40-02

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(7) Wearing of weapons.

(8) Malaria control.

(9) A training combat assault into a relatively secure area.

j. All units were given instruction by Vietnamese cadre from the 2d ARVN Div on local customs and courtesies at the Vietnamese village training site.

k. The Brigade commanders accompanied the 3d Brigade commander on missions and visits during the training period.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS:

a. Recommendations:

(1) Incoming units should bring sufficient logistical and maintenance support elements with the main body. The 3d Brigade initially had to furnish a portion of this support. As a result, maintenance on this Unit's equipment was not always accomplished in the desired time frame.

(2) The maximum number of personnel eligible for second tours in Vietnam should be infused into incoming units.

(3) US air control teams (FAC'S) should be completely equipped and arrive with the unit. In the past it has been difficult to obtain equipment in country.

(4) Additional aviation assets should be provided to the host unit during the period of sponsorship of the incoming Brigade in order to insure continuity of combat operations and the availability of air control for training purposes.

b. Conclusions: Incoming units benefit immeasurably from the sponsorship program. Particular emphasis must be placed on combat intelligence, operational training, logistics, and maintenance. The program should be continued for all units arriving in Vietnam.
