Global Tobacco Control: International Collaborations

Thomas Glynn, PhD, Director of Cancer Science and Trends, American Cancer Society

Dr. Glynn talked about the importance of collaboration for global tobacco control efforts to succeed. Some of the benefits of international tobacco control collaborations include the following:

- increased political power;
- > maximization of limited resources;
- > maximization of intellectual resources;
- > increased opportunity for capacity development;
- > more rapid agreement on change strategies;
- > more efficient agreement on change strategies;
- > more efficient administrative processes;
- > greater ability to identify and promote global tobacco control leaders.

Non-governmental organizations are critical to such collaborations since they are in a perfect position to move quickly, and they often have a wide range of expertise and a range of resources to bring to the table. Dr. Glynn illustrated how NGOs were – and continue to be – very powerful in the FCTC process because of their unique ability to forge relationships among involved parties.
