Social Computing and the Process of Governance

Throughout modern history, technology has played a critical role in political events:

- Radio's FDR's fireside chats
- Television's presidential debates and war coverage
- Fax machine's "bulldozing" the Berlin Wall
- Cell phone's getting out the vote in 2000

As the possibilities of the Web unfold, it has the potential to inform and engage people in political events and the processes of governance in ways never before possible. Its propaganda potential and power to misinform are also emerging across

transparencies of process and access to information will the citizenry expect? Will individuals be more engaged or more apathetic when faced with the tools of social computing?

To approach these broader questions, Michelle Springer from the Library of Congress Office of Strategic Initiatives will moderate a town hall meeting of forum participants. Springer is a Web 2.0 subject matter expert on the use of wikis, blogs and virtual environments at various federal agencies and is well versed on the challenges that social computing tools presents in the federal space.

political ideologies even as broadbased social networking and social computing sites and trends, all under the rubric of Web 2.0, add to this mix of possibilities for all democratic processes.

This year's FLICC Forum will bring together experts with experience across the socio-political and scientific spectrum, and with different generational perspectives, to explore the topic of "Social Computing and the Processes of Governance."

The forum will begin with a keynote by Anthony D. Williams, co-author with Don Tapscott of the recent bestseller, *Wikinomics*. Drawing upon the thesis that mass collaboration changes everything, Williams will discuss how collaborative technologies and social computing will change the process of governance.

Next, Dr. Peter Levine from the Center of Information and Research on Civic Learning and Engagement at the University of Maryland will share his research-based insights on civic engagement. He will look at the "citizens" of the future who will use social computing to influence fellow citizens and inform elected and appointed lawmakers at all levels of government.

How might decision-making and decisions evolve once real time polling of the electorate is the way of doing the business for government officials? What

By October, the race to White House will be well underway and who better to address the affect of YouTube and other tools on presidential campaigns than James Kotecki. With *The Economist* dubbing him "probably the world's foremost expert on YouTube videos posted by presidential candidates" and his recent bachelor's degree from Georgetown in May, 2007, Kotecki will kick off the afternoon with a keynote on the use and impact of social computing for the next generation of voters.

Next, the forum will explore the latest developments in understanding the workings of the human brain. The guide to this complex center of human circuitry will be Professor Richard M. Restak, M.D., of the George Washington School of Medicine and Health Sciences. Restak is a preeminent neurologist and neuropsychiatrist and author of 16 books on the human brain. He will review the discoveries of higher brain functions relating to perception, decision-making, attention and awareness and pose the question of what happens to the individual's mental development in a world of constant collaboration with and connection to others.

The day will conclude with Hart Rossmann, Chief Technologist, Science Applications International Corporation and his perspective on how information assurance affects library information policy.
