Nurses, Technicians, Volunteers, Audiologists, Other Hearing screening is usually conducted by nursing staff, but volunteers and trained technicians are also used in select hospitals. Most hospital screening programs are overseen by audiologists.

What happens if a baby does not pass the initial hearing screening(s)?	Re-screen in hospital before discharge; Re-screen as outpatient
Birthing hospitals/facilities/providers required to report hearing screening results to the state?	Yes Any hearing screen or test completed on an infant under the age of 12 months, and on any child under the age of 3 years with a diagnosed hearing loss. The report includes the type, degree, and symmetry of the diagnosis, along with where and when the diagnosis was made.
How birthing hospitals/facilities report hearing screening information to the state/territory	85% of individual-level screening results are received on metabolic forms; 4% on birth certificate; 2% on paper form; 9% on fax.
