Legislation regarding newborn hearing screening? If yes, does the legislation mandate or provide funds for newborn hearing screening and follow-up services?	Yes Sections 32.1-64.1 and 64.2 of the Code of Virginia. The law states that "Beginning on July 1, 2000, the Board shall provide by regulation for the giving of hearing screening tests for all infants born in all hospitals." 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State/territory CDC/EHDI Cooperative Agreement related to hearing screening?	Yes In 2005, VDH was awarded a three-year CDC Cooperative Agreement for "Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EDHI) Tracking, Surveillance, and Integration." Funds will be used to support the Virginia Child Health Information System Integration Project (VaCHISIP). The purpose of the project is (1) enhance the Virginia EHDI Program's capability for accurately ascertaining the disposition of every occurent birth for each step throughout the EHDI process and (2) expand the integration of the program's tracking and surveillance system with other child health programs that identify children with special health care needs.
State/territory have a Maternal and Child Health Bureau Grant related to hearing screening?	Yes A four-year HRSA grant was awarded Spring 2001. In 2005, the Virginia Department of Health received a three-year grant.

What happens if a baby does not pass the initial hearing	Re-screen in hospital before discharge, Re-screen as outpatient Referred for diagnostic audiological evaluation. Protocol varies by hospital. Hospitals are instructed to re-screen once before discharge if

screening(s)?	infant fails. Some hospitals bring infants back for nursery re-screen; most do not. All others advise parents to make an appointment with an audiologist.
Birthing hospitals/facilities/providers required to report hearing screening results to the state?	Yes Hospitals are required to report to Virginia Department of Health, parents, and primary health care providers. Hospitals are required to report the following to VDH: infants who fail, infants who pass but are at risk, infants who are missed, infants whose parent refuses, and infants who are transferred out of state. Full demographic information, provider information, risk indicators, and screening results are reported. Hospitals are required to advise parents and primary medical care providers in writing about the infant's screening results and the recommendations for follow up.
How birthing hospitals/facilities report hearing screening information to the state/territory	Custom-developed system VISITS database Results are reported using the Virginia Infant Screening and Infant Tracking System (VISITS) database. 100% of individual-level screening results are received by web-based data entry.
Hearing screening results reported to the infant's physician? [If yes, are all results reported or only failed screening?]	Notify all screening results ("Refer" and Pass) Hospitals are required to report all results to the infant's primary medical care provider in writing.

Who is responsible for scheduling appointments for diagnostic audiologic evaluations?	Primary Care Provider (PCP), Parents or guardians Appointments are the responsibility of the primary medical care provider and the parent.
How audiologists report diagnostic audiological evaluation results to the state/territory	75% audiological evaluations are reported by fax; 25% by paper form. See the Web site for current form.
Guidelines and/or protocols for audiologists to report diagnostic audiological evaluation results to the state/territory?	Yes. Audiilogists report results to VDH, PCPs, and families. http://www.vahealth.org/hearing/documents/Instructions_Audiological_ Reporting _Form.doc VA mandates that audiological evaluations be reported to the EHDI program. VA seeks to obtain audiological evaluation data for all occurrent births below a given age that obtain an audiological evaluation, including children with risk factors.

Type of system program uses to track hearing screening and follow-up information	VA has a "Home grown" system developed by outside vendor: VISITS database The VISITS sytem is a web-based integrated database system that track and supports screening results for four RDH prograoms: birth defects, NBS, at-risk referrals surveillance and VEHDI. The VA program obtain birth certificate data for all occurrent births. The VA program receives individual-level data for 95% of all hearing screens.

Unique identifier is used to identify infants/children in the state/territory EHDI tracking system	Number generated by the data system The data system is being redesigned. Upon completion, the unique identifyer will include the birth certificate number for infants born in VA.
How program addresses de- duplication of screening and diagnostic evaluation data	De-duplication of screening and diagnostic evaluation data are addressed after data entry, staff search for possible matches. If two records belong to the same individual, or if two records have been combined into a single record, it is not possible to fix the error without re-entering the data.
