	Results are recorded on one page of the multi-page infant's bloodspot card. Cards are set to Public Health laboratory where they are logged in and data are entered. The cards and data disc are returned the next

	morning, where the information is merged into the hearing database. The database, developed by Limelight Technologies, has a comprehensive case management system.
Hearing screening results reported to the infant's physician? [If yes, are all results reported or only failed screening?]	Notify "Refer" results only We also report risk factors to primary care providers along with recommendations for re-screening prior to age three.

Type of system program uses to track hearing screening and follow-up information	OR has a "Home grown" system developed by outside vendor: Limelight Technologies The EHDDI tracking and surveillance system is first populated by data from the newborn screening dried blood spot cards, and diagnostic data are predominately entered by audiologists via the web. The OR program obtains birth certificate data for all occurrent births. The OR program receives individual-level data for ALL hearing screens.
State EHDI tracking system includes data items to identify infants and children with risk factors for hearing loss?	Yes
Unique identifier is used to identify infants/children in the state/territory EHDI tracking system	An EHDDI number ascribed to the newborn screening dried blood spot card.
How program addresses de- duplication of screening and diagnostic evaluation data	The WA program address de-duplication of screening data after data entry, software checks for approximate or probabilistic matches. Diagnostic evaluation data are obtained through a trusted source and assumed to be de-duplicated or free of duplicate entries. If two records belong to the same individual, or if two records have been combined into a single record, it is possible to fix the error without re-entering the data.
