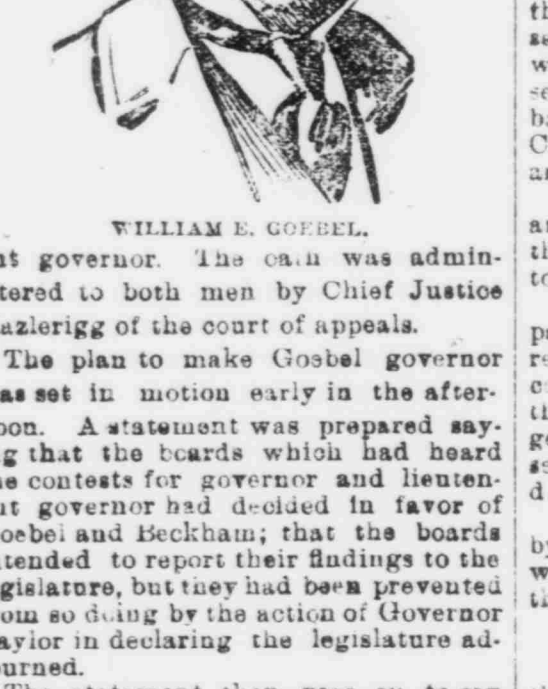

STATE OF KENTUCKY HAS TWO GOVERNORS

Goebel Sworn In, Propped Up With Pillows.
TAYLOR RETAINS CONTROL
Democratic Members of the Legislature Attempt to Hold a Session in the Capitol, but Are Denied Admission—Peace Conference Held.



FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 1.—William Goebel was, shortly before 9 o'clock last night, sworn in as governor of Kentucky and J. O. W. Beckham a few minutes later took the oath of lieutenant governor. The oath was administered to both men by Chief Justice Hazlerigg of the court of appeals.

The plan to make Goebel governor was set in motion early in the afternoon. A statement was prepared saying that the boards which had heard the contests for governor and lieutenant governor had decided in favor of Goebel and Beckham; that the boards intended to report their findings to the legislature, but they had been prevented from so doing by the action of Governor Taylor in declaring the legislature adjourned.

The statement then goes on to say that the members of the legislature were driven from place to place by the militia and threatened with arrest whenever they attempted to hold a meeting. It was declared the belief of all the signers of the statement that Goebel and Beckham were the legally elected governor and lieutenant governor and each man as he signed the paper announced that he voted for the adoption of the majority report of the contest boards, which declared Goebel and Beckham to be the men rightfully elected to the office.

It was slow work obtaining the signatures of the members of the house and senate, and although the work was in progress all afternoon, it was not until evening that the necessary number of signatures had been obtained. As soon as the last man actually needed had affixed his signature to the statement word was sent to the residence of Chief Justice Hazlerigg of the court of appeals.

He came at once to the Capitol hotel, passed directly upstairs to the room of Mr. Goebel and administered the oath of office. Mr. Goebel was propped up with pillows to raise his head, and with the greatest difficulty as he listened to the words of Judge Hazlerigg.

ings of Democrats within the building because they had been informed by Adjutant General Collier that he would immediately seize the building if they did so, declared this morning that they would allow any political meeting to be held that did not act contrary to the rules of the establishment. An effort was made by members of the legislature at 10 o'clock to hold a session. A dozen members of the house went into the gates headed by Representative Curleton of Louisville. Two bayonets were crossed in front of Mr. Charlton's nose as he entered the gates and he was asked for his pass. "I have no pass," was the reply, "as I am a member of the legislature, and as these gentlemen with me, and we wish to enter the hall to hold a session."

Governor Taylor remains in his office in the state capitol building and prescribes his duties to all orders. He will not, moreover, discuss for publication any action which he has taken or may take hereafter.

The records of the house of representatives, which were taken over by the House Edward Leigh yesterday by the militia while the legislature was in session, were found in the main endeavor to find a hall in which they could hold a joint session and seat Mr. Goebel, have been returned to him by Governor Taylor.

The champion will remain at the springs three weeks and then return to his old training quarters at Alaburston, N. J., where the ex-bullfighter will prepare himself for the match with Corbett, scheduled to take place during the month of March.

Jeffries looks strong and healthy and expressed himself as feeling confident that he would be able to dispose of Corbett.

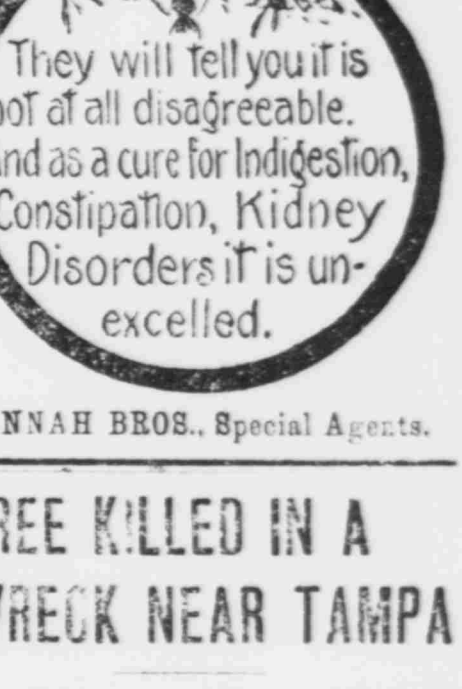
Jeffries stated that he was perfectly willing to give Sharkey another chance, as the sailor claims that he wants to try for the championship again.

THREE KILLED IN A WRECK NEAR TAMPA
Fast Train on Plant System Is Derailed.

RAN INTO OPEN SWITCH
Engineer and Two Passengers Died and Several Others More or Less Seriously Injured—Believed to Have Been Work of Wreckers.

TAMPA, Fla., Feb. 1.—The fast train on the Plant system was wrecked 20 miles north of this place last night. Engineer Kennedy was instantly killed. One passenger was killed, but the body was so tragically mutilated that it is impossible to tell the identity at this time.

The son of S. P. Herndon of this city died this morning at the Sanford hospital. Mr. Herndon himself is badly injured. A number of other passengers were also injured.

The mail, six cars and two day coaches were thrown from the track and turned over. The Pullman cars were not derailed.

The accident was caused by the train running into an open switch and colliding with a freight car.

It is believed that the switch was opened by some person with the intention of wrecking the train.

Boxes of ammunition are being delivered to Adjutant General Collier by the Rail Road, which is packed ceiling high with cartridges. The greatest activity prevails on the capitol grounds. Blankets for the soldiers are arriving and every evidence of a protracted stay is apparent.

A report that Lieutenant Gray of the First regiment had resigned is pronounced absurd by Commandant Williams.

If there is any one to the assassin of Senator Goebel's hand, made itself apparent at Frankfort. No reward for the arrest of the culprit has been offered and since a few minutes after the shooting the statehouse has been so closely guarded as to prevent any action by the local peace officers.

At 12:30 Dr. E. E. Hume came from Goebel's room and declared that the patient had taken a slight turn for the worse and that he would not be surprised to see him die at any minute.

"His kidneys are those of a dead man now," said Dr. Hume, "and he cannot live long in that condition."

Several appeals to the people, "statements to the public" and "proclamations to the commonwealth" were circulated, all of them being a violent nature, one of them, which did not, however, receive many signatures, calling on the people to drive out the military force.

The sure thing in this political chaos is that nobody is going to convince out of their soldiers. They will be driven by nobody, and make no bones of the assertion. Any attack will be promptly met and a desperate fight is certain to result.
