First Official Act Informing the Public of the Change in Ownership of the Waterworks.

The city has sent out notices to ater consumers, advising them that they must pay six months' water tax in advance, or, failing to do so within ten days, suffer the penalty of having the city water turned off, the turning on of which will cost \$1.
