NOTICE SENT TO WATER USERS

PEOPLE MUST PAY UP OR SUFFER A PENALTY.

First Official Act Informing the Public of the Change in Ownership of the Waterworks.

The city has sent out notices to water consumers, advising them that they must pay six months' water tax in advance, or, failing to do so within ten days, suffer the penalty of having the city water turned off, the turning on of which will cost \$1.

This is the first message to the homes of Ogden officially acquainting the people with the fact that the waterworks, so long a disturbing factor in city affairs, is at last a public utility in possession of the municipality.

A taxpayer said this morning: "When is this taxpaying and threat of punishment to cease. I have just escaped the county treasurer's delinquent list by selling a horse. Now here comes the city with another tax and another threatened delinquency and I am going home to inform Mary that the chances are we will be compelled to sell the cow or cease to drink city water."

The city council met in special session yesterday for the purpose of taking those preliminary steps toward taking control of the waterworks of the Ogden Waterworks company, which the city recently purchased and for which the city recently voted an obligation of \$905,400, \$155,400 of which was to be paid in cash to the waterworks company. One hundred and five thousand has already been paid and the remaining \$50,000 will be turned over to the company in question within the next few days. The money on the bonds has not yet been received by the city, but a telegram from the bondholders, the Rollins company of Chicago, yesterday, stated that the money would be forthcoming on or before next Wednesday.

Two commodious rooms have been arranged in the city hall building for the business of the newly acquired waterworks and all the books and business papers relating to that business will be transferred to the new quarters today. The force of managers and clerks under the employment of the private corporation will be maintained for the time being by the city in the transaction of the business of handling the water supply of the city, including Manager C. H. Krieger, but the entire system will be under the direct control and management of the waterworks committee of the city council, which is made up of the following councilmen: Peery, Humphris, Flygare, Thomas and Dana.

Hereafter the water users of the city will transact business with the management at the city hall. The system will be conducted under the order of things until such time as the city council may make more definite arrangements for the handling of the city water. It is thought by a number of the council that the incoming legislature should pass a law providing for the appointment of a special commission to take charge of the waterworks of the city so as to take the business out of the hands of political manipulation. The commission suggested is to be absolutely non-partisan.
