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LAST WEEK -

SENATE ENVIRONMENT AND PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE BRIEFED ON USDA'S ROLE IN THE CLEAN WATER ACTION PLAN (CWAP) - On

Monday, May 10, Glenda Humiston, Deputy Under Secretary, Natural Resources and Environment, briefed the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee staff on USDA's role in the President's Clean Water Action Plan (CWAP). Ms. Humiston used the list of the 111 Action items from the CWAP to explain the progress the Department has made with the current funding and staffing. This was a preliminary briefing prior to the Secretary's testimony on the CWAP held on Thursday with the same committee.

SENATE ENVIRONMENT & PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE HOLDS HEARING ON THE PRESIDENT'S CLEAN WATER ACTION PLAN

(CWAP) - On Thursday, May 13, the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee (Chairman John H. Chafee, R-RI) held a hearing to receive testimony on the CWAP. During the first panel Secretary Dan Glickman, USDA, and Administrator Carol Browner, EPA, gave testimony and answered questions concerning their role in the CWAP. Secretary Glickman's testimony concentrated on the ability of NRCS to deliver technical and financial assistance. He called EQIP the heart of our nation's conservation program. The questions from the members were primarily targeted toward the Unified National Strategy for Animal Feeding Operations (AFO) and the Unified Watershed Assessments (UWA). Senator Craig Thomas (R-WY) was the most vocal of the members during the question and answer period. His concerns were the lack of local and state input in the AFO and UWA plans, as well as the CWAP process in general. The second panel consisted of presenters from Wyoming and Maryland state water quality agencies, Texas Cattle Feeders, American Forestry Association, and the Wyoming Outdoor Council/Clean Water Network. Testimony was given on varying views of the CWAP. Overall, testimony strongly supported the need for increased technical and financial assistance to implement CWAP actions, while adhering to a locally led process.

CONFEREES COMPLETE WORK ON EMERGENCY SUPPLEMENTAL -

Late Thursday, House and Senate appropriators completed work on the FY'99 emergency supplemental package relating to needs in agriculture, defense, and other international disaster assistance. Congressional staff will spend the weekend completing many technical tasks associated with finalizing the bill. The Conference agreement contains the following provisions of interest to NRCS:

Technical Assistance funding to implement CRP/WRP -- \$28 million (FY'99) + \$35 million (FY'00) **\$63 million total**

Emergency Watershed Protection Program

\$95 million

Next week, the House and Senate will likely begin consideration of the Conference report, with final passage expected before the Memorial Day recess.

HOUSE SUBCOMMITTEE BEGINS MARKUP OF FISCAL YEAR 2000 APPROPRIATIONS - On Thursday, May 13, the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration and Related Agencies (Chairman Joe Skeen, R-NM) marked up funding levels for agriculture agencies and programs for Fiscal Year 2000. *This begins the process for determining funding levels for next year and is entirely separate from work on the FY'99 Supplemental.* Funding levels agreed upon by the Subcommittee are reported as follows:
