LAST WEEK:

FARMLAND PROTECTION - The Senate Agriculture Subcommittee on Forestry, Conservation, and Rural Revitalization (Chairman Craig, R-ID) held a field hearing on farmland protection in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania on September 18. Witnesses included NRCS Associate Chief, Danny Sells, and State Conservationist (PA), Janet Oertly. Other witnesses included representatives from American Farmland Trust, and local and state farmland protection programs. Many of the local witnesses advocated that additional funding is the most critical need for the Farmland Protection Program.

Associate Chief Sells underscored the need for funding and the importance of farm policy that makes agriculture profitable as keys to preserving farmland. He also responded to questions from Sen. Rick Santorum (R-PA) and Chairman Craig. Their questions ranged from states establishing ranking criteria to the potential for block granting FPP funds to each state. The block grants were advocated by the American Farmland Trust in their testimony.

URBAN RESOURCES PARTNERSHIP HEARING – On Wednesday, September 20, the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations, Oversight, Nutrition and Forestry Subcommittee (Chairman Goodlatte, R-VA) held a hearing regarding the USDA Office of Inspector General (OIG) audit of the Urban Resources Partnership (URP). Witnesses for the hearing were Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment, Jim Lyons and USDA Inspector General, Roger Viadero. Mr. Viadero discussed a recent audit of the initiative. He stated that a majority of the projects that his office reviewed did not meet the statutory authority permitted by USDA funds. He continued by exhibiting photographs of URP projects and raised questions regarding the management of the initiative. He also stated that the recommendations of the OIG have not been implemented by the Department. Under Secretary Lyons discussed the historical role of the Department in assisting communities. He explained that the initiative was needed to better connect non-farming residents with conservation and resource issues. He also stated that a relatively small amount of resources had been dedicated to the effort and that there is public support for the initiative. The

Subcommittee examined several statutory-related issues. The Chairman concluded the hearing by stating his concern and continued interest in the issue.
