This symbolic group portrait—which unites Senators Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, and John C. Calhoun—celebrates the legislative efforts to preserve the Union, most notably the Compromise of 1850. Webster stands with his hand resting on the “Constitution of the United States of America.”

Senator Calhoun, holding a quill, looks on near the center; seated next to him is Henry Clay. Other prominent politicians and military leaders of the day also appear. The print reflects the hopeful sentiments of a nation that recently averted war and also draws on patriotic themes: a winged goddess Liberty flies down from an Olympian temple inscribed “America” to crown the gathering with an olive branch; while a laurel-crowned bust of George Washington holds a copy of the Constitution in place. The print was published two years after the 1850 Compromise, no doubt to take advantage of this legislative achievement and to celebrate the life of the three principals (all were deceased by the end of 1852; Webster died last, on October 24, 1852). Nearly a decade after the print was published, it was reissued with alterations reflecting the changing political environment (38.00018.001, p. 254). Several of the faces were removed and replaced with more pro-Union public figures. Most notably, the head of Calhoun was supplanted with a portrait of Abraham Lincoln. 🌀

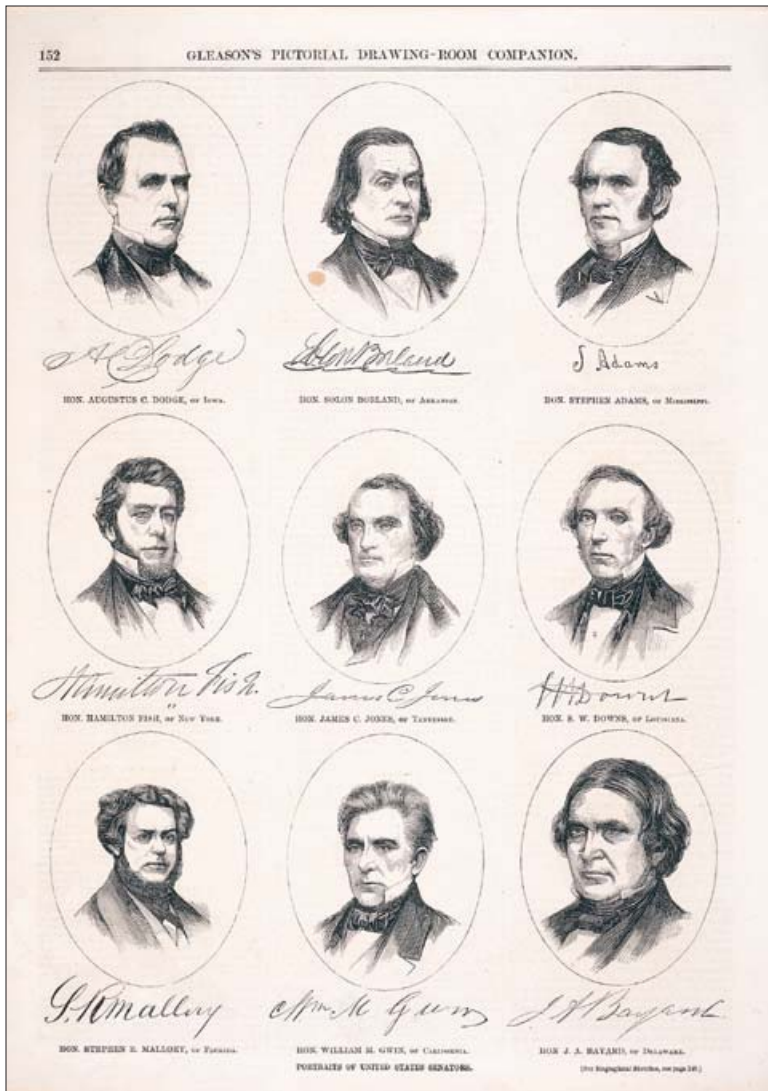

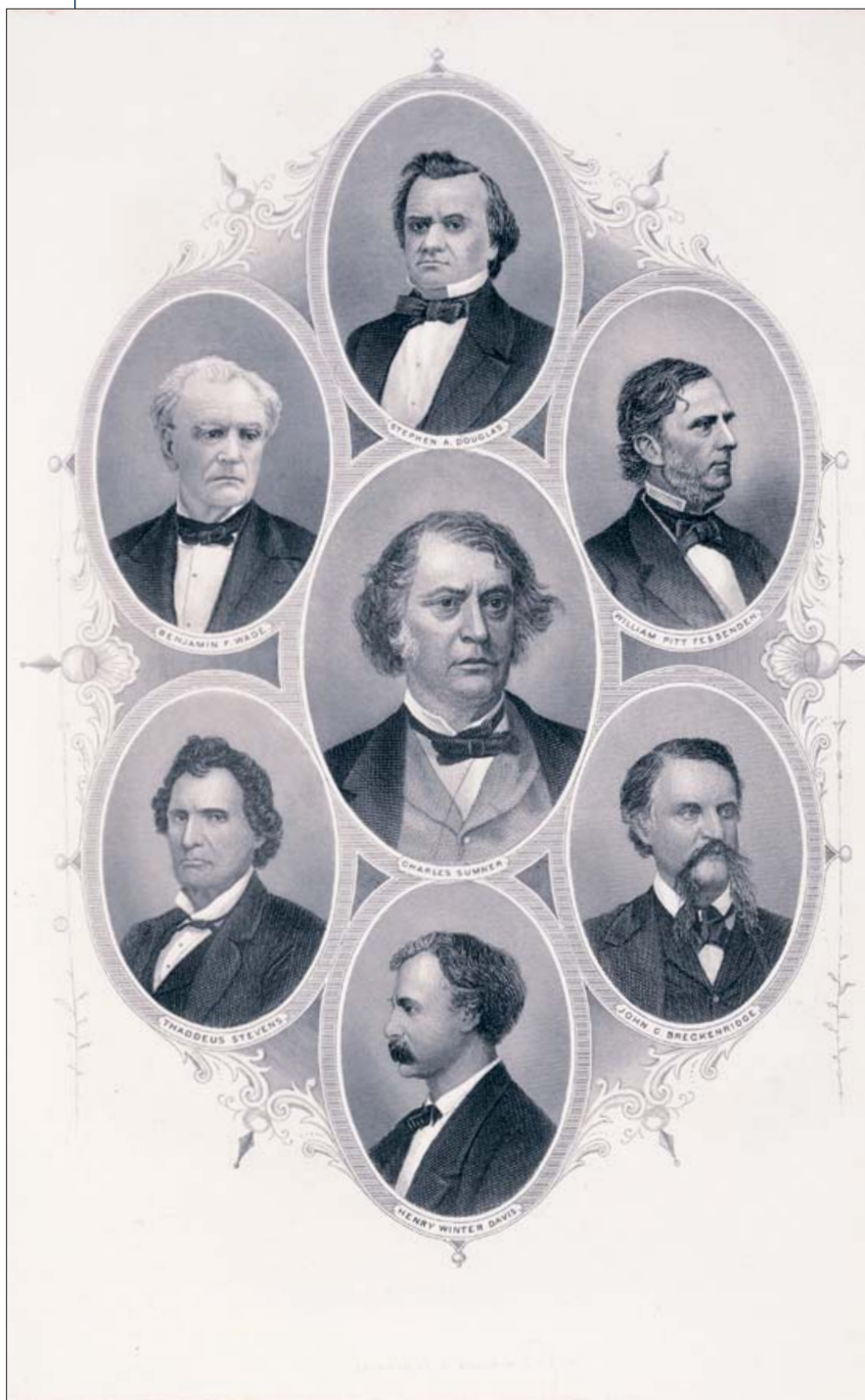

NATIONAL REPUBLICAN CHART



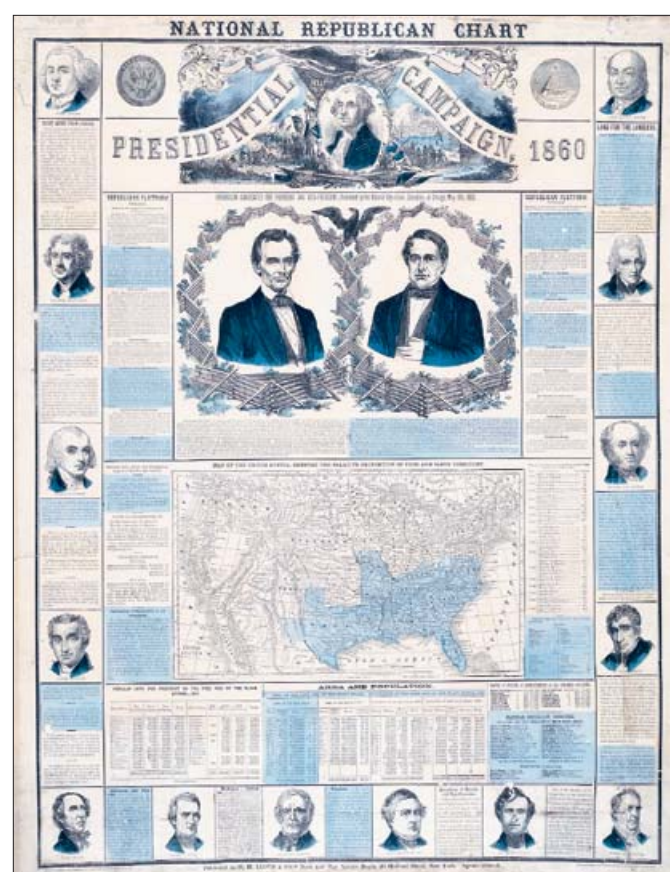
REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT, Nominated by the National Republican Convention, at Chicago, May 18th, 1860.



ABRAHAM LINCOLN, the nominee for President, better known to the people of the North-West as "Honest Old Abe," was born in Hardin County, Kentucky, February 12th, 1809, and is probably descended from the Loxtons of Massachusetts, though his parents were of Quaker stock, that migrated from Pennsylvania to Virginia, whence his grandfather removed in 1781-2 to Kentucky, and was there surprised and killed by Indians while at work on his clearing. Like most pioneers, he left his family poor; and his son also died prematurely, leaving a widow and several children, including Abraham, then six years old. The family removed soon after to Southern Indiana, where Abraham grew to the stature of six feet and some inches, but enjoyed scarcely better opportunities for instruction than in Kentucky. At the age of twenty-one, he pushed further West, into Illinois, which has for the last thirty years been his home, living always near and for some years just in Springfield, the State Capital. He worked on a farm as hired man his first year in Illinois; the next year he was clerk in a store; then volunteered for the Black Hawk war, and was chosen a captain by his company. He subsequently served in the Legislature four sessions, with eminent usefulness and steadily increasing reputation; studied law meantime, and took his place at the bar, where his success was highly flattering. In 1846 he was chosen to represent the Central District of Illinois in the Thirtieth Congress, and served to its close, but was not a candidate for re-election; and in 1849 measurably withdrew from politics, and devoted himself to the practice of his profession, until the *Nebraska Infidelity* of 1854 called him again into the political arena. In 1858 he was nominated to succeed Mr. Douglas in the Senate, and, although defeated in the Legislature, yet, by his logic, eloquence, and truth, he secured the popular vote.

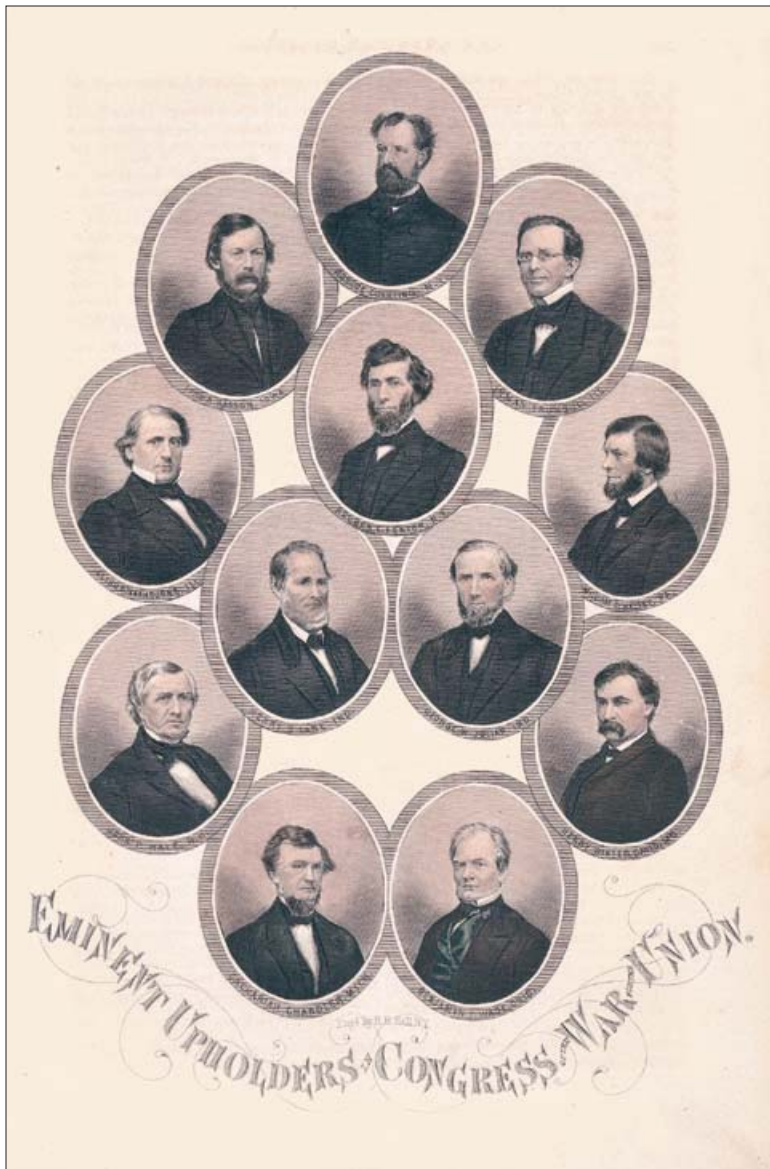
HANNIBAL HAMLIN, the nominee for Vice-President, was born in Paris, Oxford Co., Maine, in August, 1809, and is now in the fifty-first year of his age. He is by profession a lawyer, but for the last twenty-four years has been, for much of the time, in political life. From 1836 to 1840 he was a member of the Legislature of Maine, and for three of those years was Speaker of its House of Representatives. In 1843 he was elected a member of Congress, and re-elected for the following term. In 1847 he was again a member of the State Legislature, and the next year was chosen to fill a vacancy, occasioned by the death of John Fairfield, in the United States Senate. In 1851 he was re-elected for the full term in the same body, but resigned on being chosen Governor of Maine in 1857. In the same month he was again elected to the United States Senate for six years, which office he accepted, resigning the Governorship. He is still a member of the Senate. This record is an evidence of the confidence with which he has always been regarded by his fellow-citizens in Maine. Up to the time of the passage of the Kansas-Nebraska bill, in 1854, Mr. Hamlin was a member of the Democratic party. That act he regarded as a proof that the party with which he had been all his life connected no longer deserved the name of *Democratic*, and was treacherous to the principles he had so long cherished. Thenceforward he gave his support to the Republican party, of which he has ever since continued a faithful and distinguished leader. Mr. Hamlin is a man of dignified presence, of solid abilities, of unflinching integrity, and great executive talent. Familiar with the business of legislation, he is peculiarly adapted, by the possession of all these qualities, to fill beneficially for the country, and to his own and his party's honor, the high post to which he has been nominated.

This elaborate campaign poster was issued sometime after May 18, 1860, when Abraham Lincoln won the Republican presidential nomination. The broadside features portraits of Lincoln and his vice-presidential running mate Hannibal Hamlin, a summary of the Republican platform adopted at the Chicago Convention that year, biographies of the two candidates, a large map of the United States delineating the slave states, and various statistical information. In the border are images of the first 15 presidents. Washington is engraved at the top—the image is based on Gilbert Stuart’s famous Athenaeum portrait—thus suggesting that the first president is blessing both the Lincoln-Hamlin ticket and the Republican platform. Published by the prolific New York cartographic firm of H.H. Lloyd & Company, the broadside was probably a commercial venture rather than strictly a political product, as the printer produced other similar charts, including one for the Democratic party and one listing all the parties and candidates. The 1860 presidential election was historic in fielding four major presidential candidates. 🌀

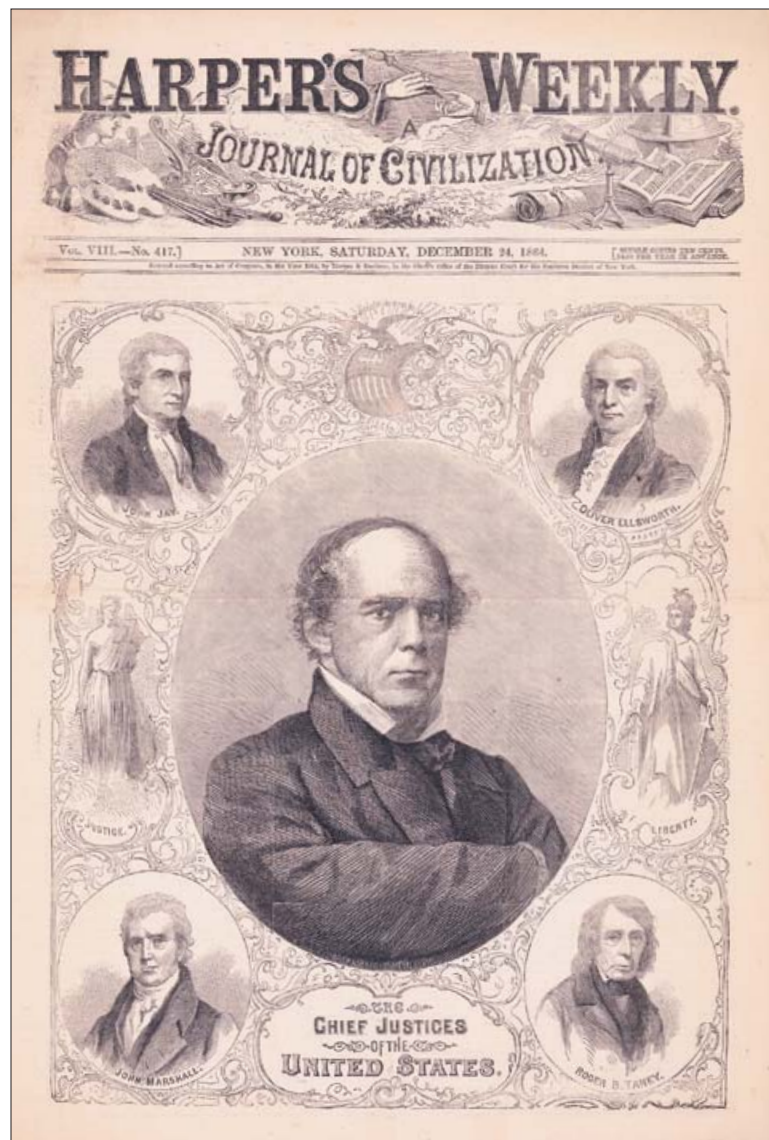

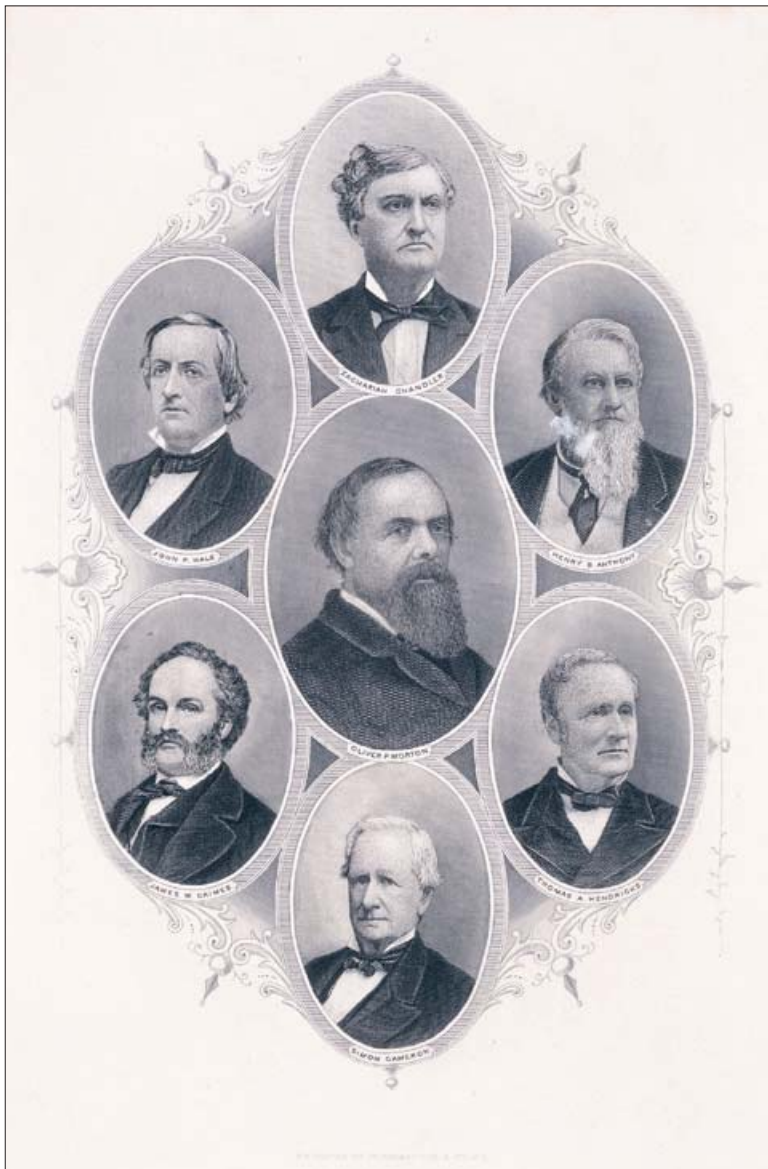

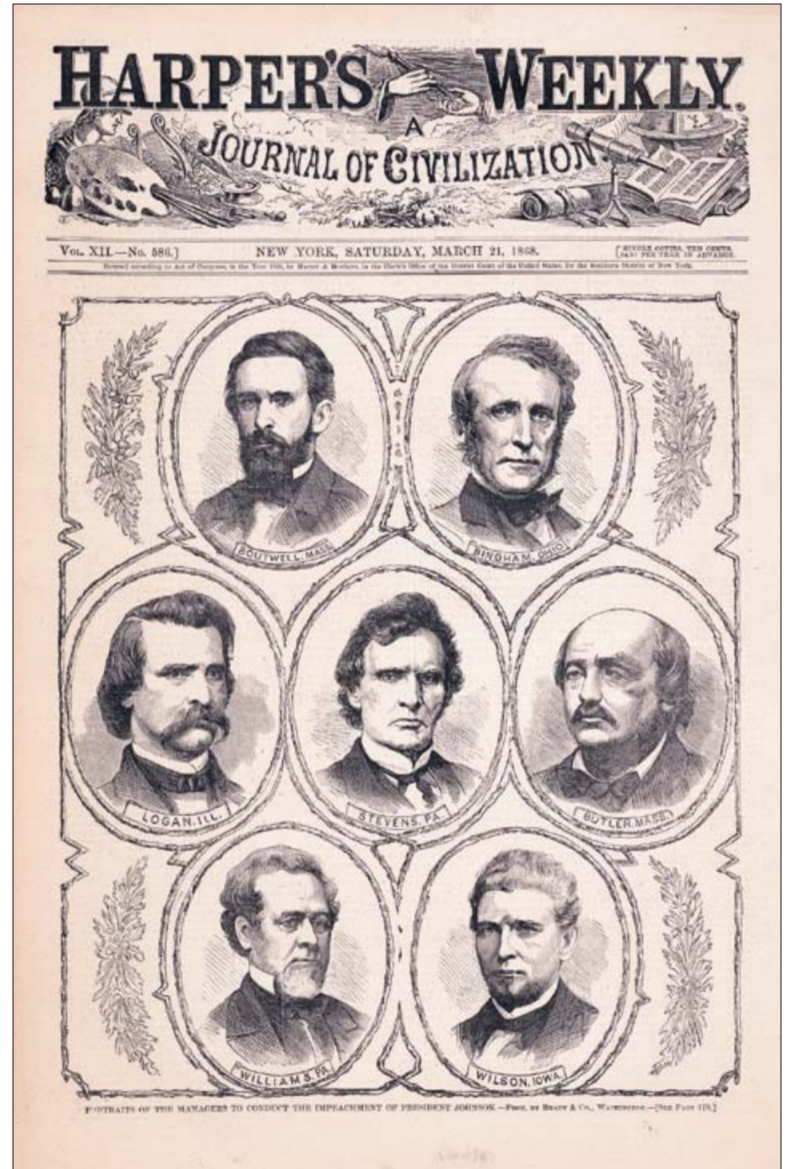

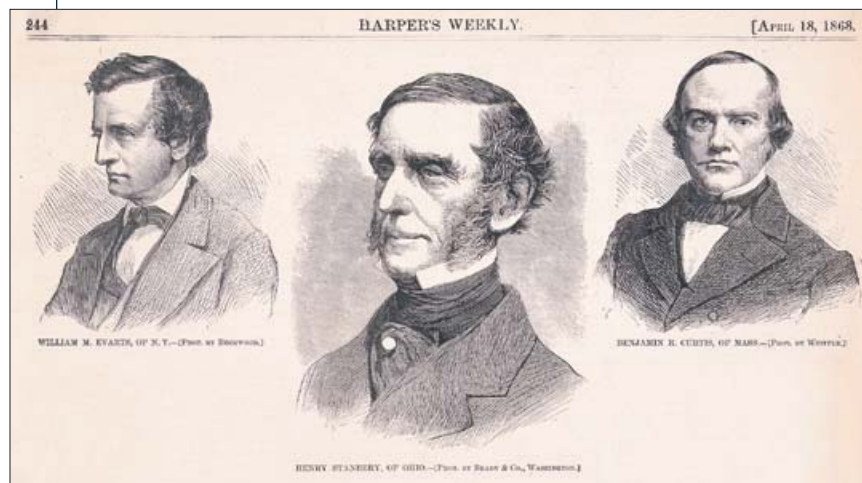

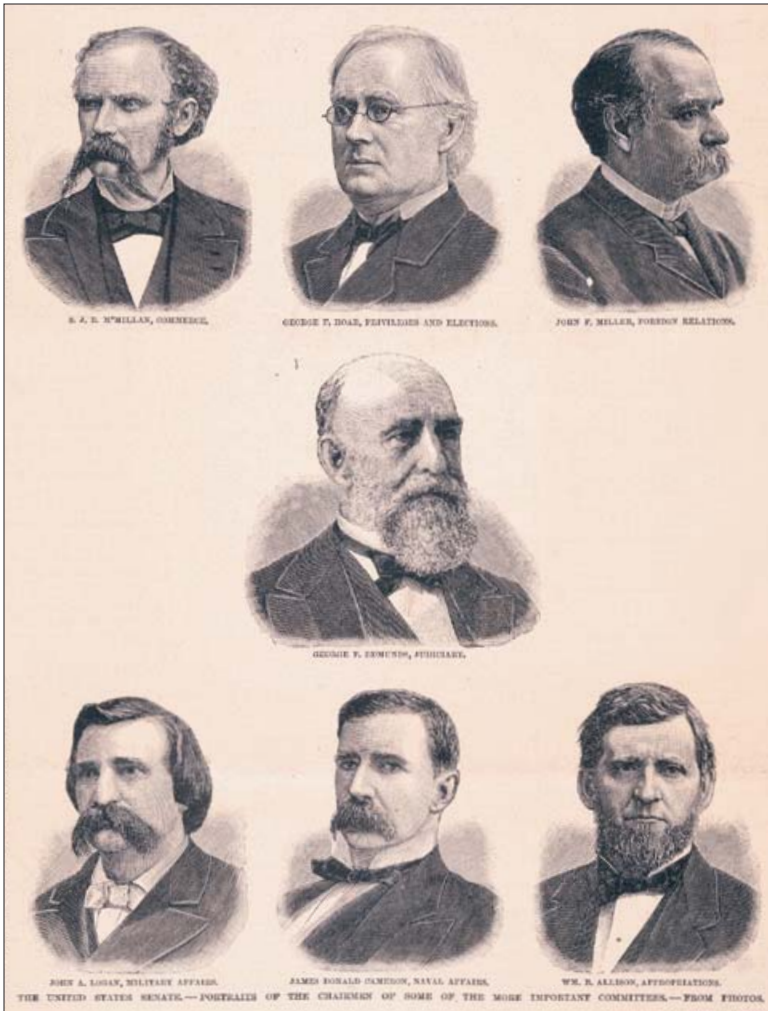

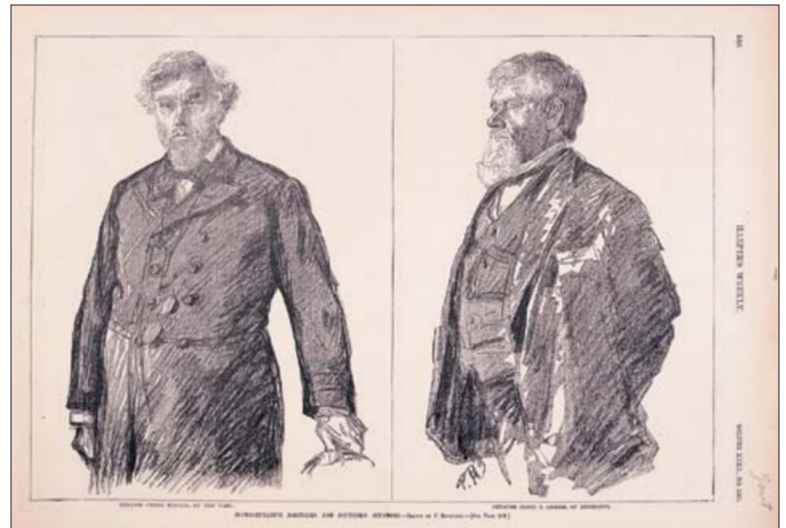

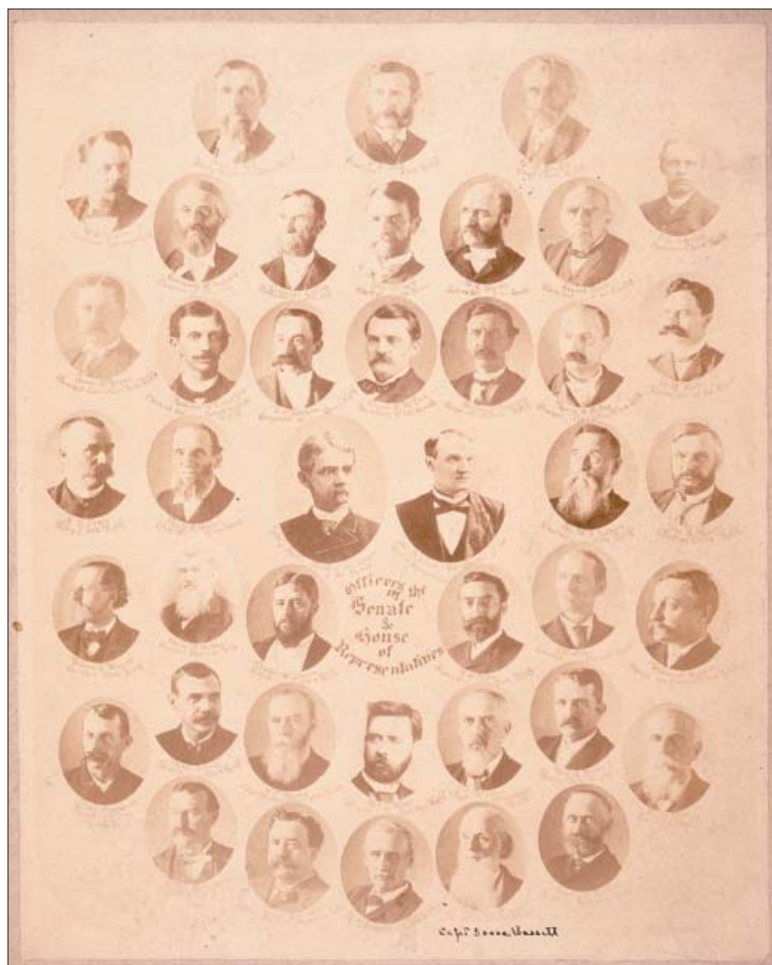

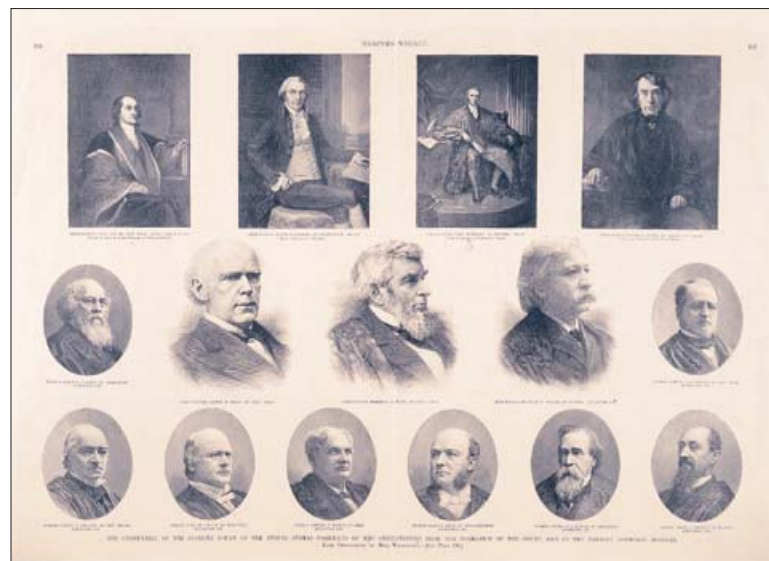

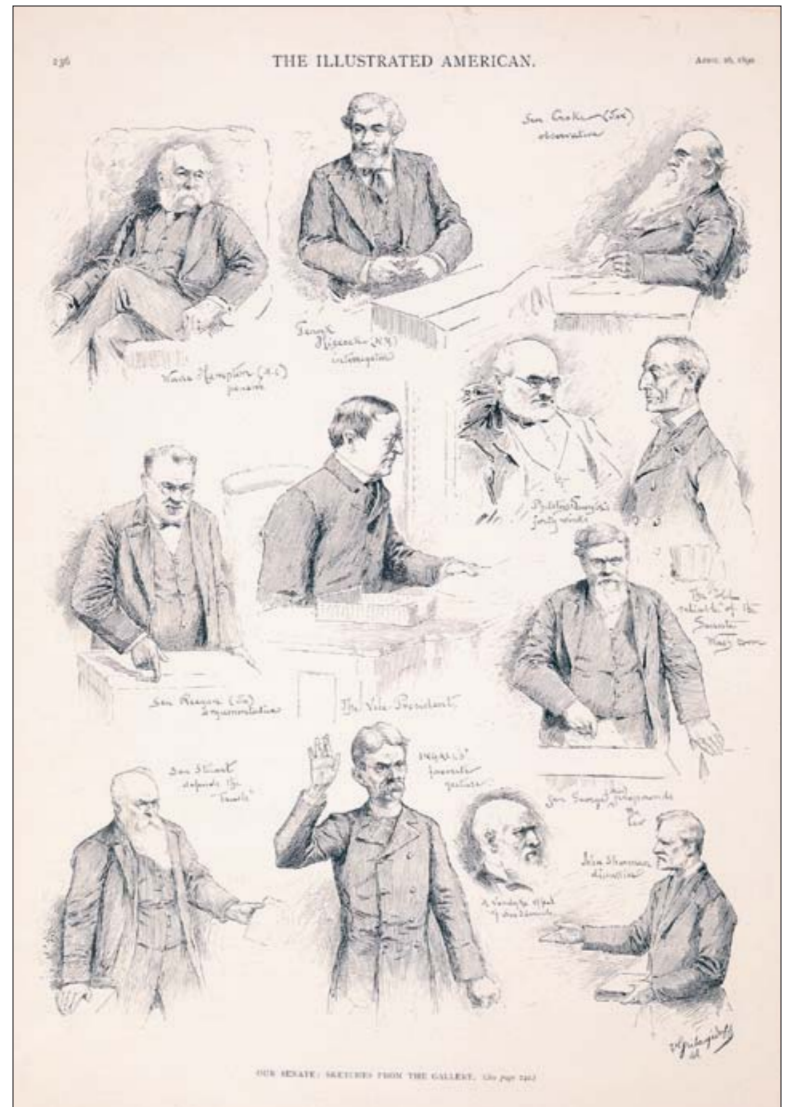

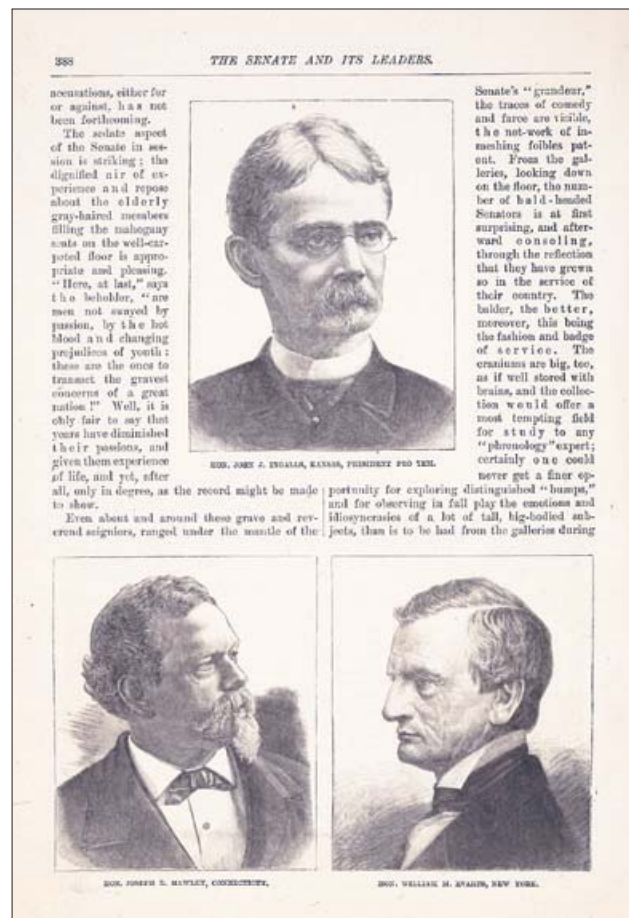

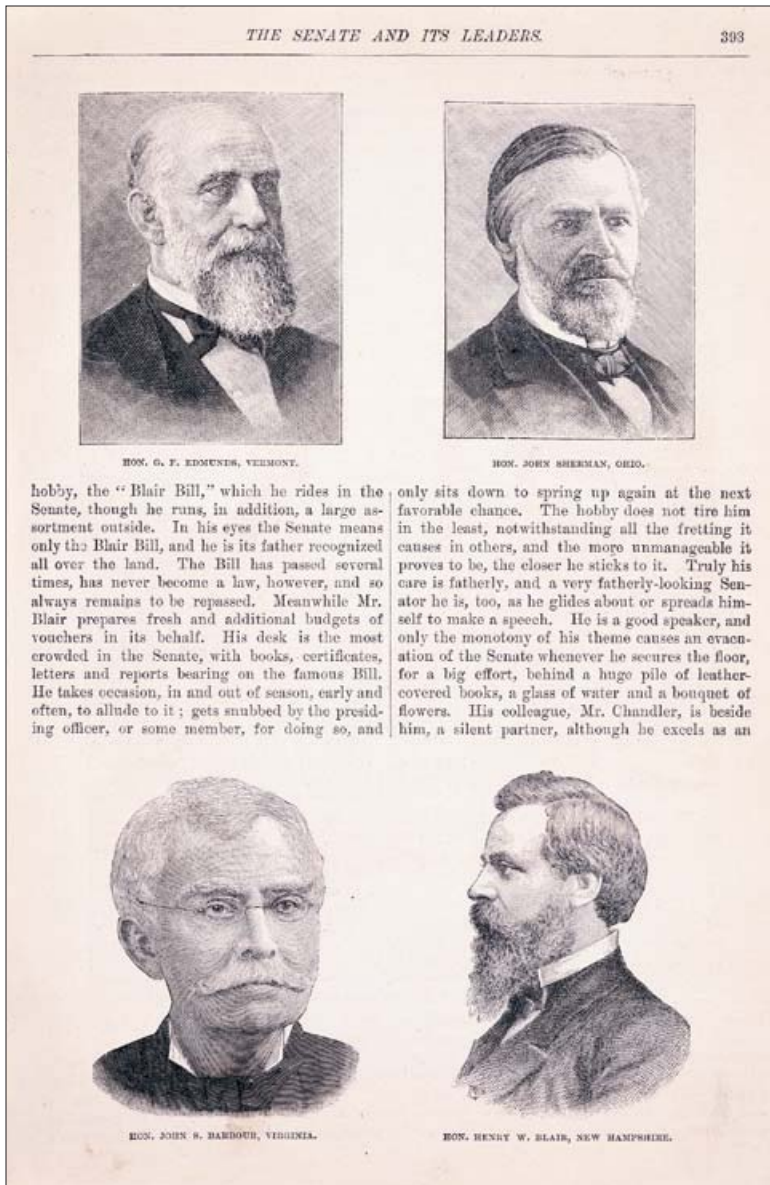

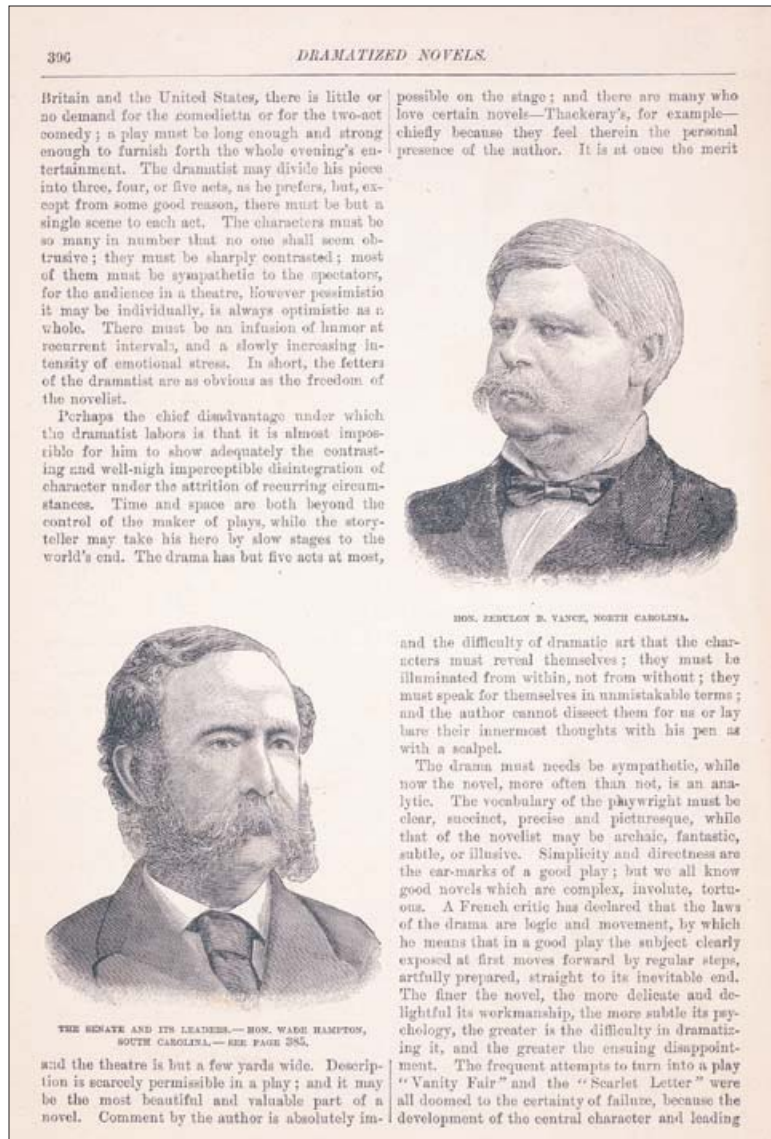
hobby, the "Blair Bill," which he rides in the Senate, though he runs, in addition, a large assortment outside. In his eyes the Senate means only the Blair Bill, and he is its father recognized all over the land. The Bill has passed several times, has never become a law, however, and so always remains to be re-passed. Meanwhile Mr. Blair prepares fresh and additional budgets of vouchers in its behalf. His desk is the most crowded in the Senate, with books, certificates, letters and reports bearing on the famous Bill. He takes occasion, in and out of season, early and often, to allude to it; gets snubbed by the presiding officer, or some member, for doing so, and

only sits down to spring up again at the next favorable chance. The hobby does not tire him in the least, notwithstanding all the fretting it causes in others, and the more unmanageable it proves to be, the closer he sticks to it. Truly his care is fatherly, and a very fatherly-looking Senator he is, too, as he glides about or spreads himself to make a speech. He is a good speaker, and only the monotony of his theme causes an evacuation of the Senate whenever he secures the floor, for a big effort, behind a huge pile of leather-covered books, a glass of water and a bouquet of flowers. His colleague, Mr. Chandler, is beside him, a silent partner, although he excels as an

Britain and the United States, there is little or no demand for the comedietta or for the two-act comedy; a play must be long enough and strong enough to furnish forth the whole evening's entertainment. The dramatist may divide his piece into three, four, or five acts, as he prefers, but, except from some good reason, there must be but a single scene to each act. The characters must be so many in number that no one shall seem obtrusive; they must be sharply contrasted; most of them must be sympathetic to the spectators, for the audience in a theatre. However pessimistic it may be individually, is always optimistic as a whole. There must be an infusion of humor at recurrent intervals, and a slowly increasing intensity of emotional stress. In short, the fetters of the dramatist are as obvious as the freedom of the novelist.

Perhaps the chief disadvantage under which the dramatist labors is that it is almost impossible for him to show adequately the contrasting and well-nigh imperceptible disintegration of character under the attrition of recurring circumstances. Time and space are both beyond the control of the maker of plays, while the storyteller may take his hero by slow stages to the world's end. The drama has but five acts at most,

possible on the stage; and there are many who love certain novels—Thackeray's, for example—chiefly because they feel therein the personal presence of the author. It is at once the merit



and the difficulty of dramatic art that the characters must reveal themselves; they must be illuminated from within, not from without; they must speak for themselves in unmistakable terms; and the author cannot dissect them for us or lay bare their innermost thoughts with his pen as with a scalpel.



The drama must needs be sympathetic, while now the novel, more often than not, is an analytic. The vocabulary of the playwright must be clear, succinct, precise and picturesque, while that of the novelist may be archaic, fantastic, subtle, or illusive. Simplicity and directness are the earmarks of a good play; but we all know good novels which are complex, involute, tortuous. A French critic has declared that the laws of the drama are logic and movement, by which he means that in a good play the subject clearly exposed at first moves forward by regular steps, artfully prepared, straight to its inevitable end. The finer the novel, the more delicate and delightful its workmanship, the more subtle its psychology, the greater is the difficulty in dramatizing it, and the greater the ensuing disappointment. The frequent attempts to turn into a play "Vanity Fair" and the "Scarlet Letter" were all doomed to the certainty of failure, because the development of the central character and leading

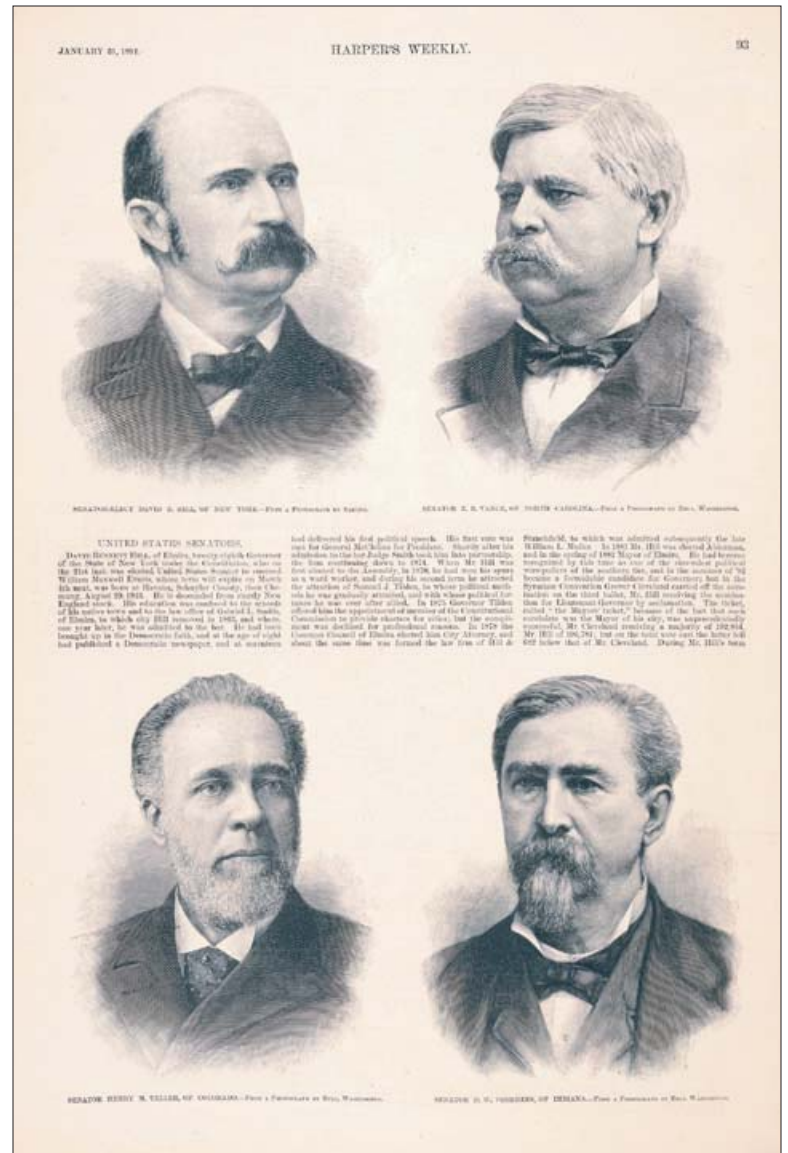

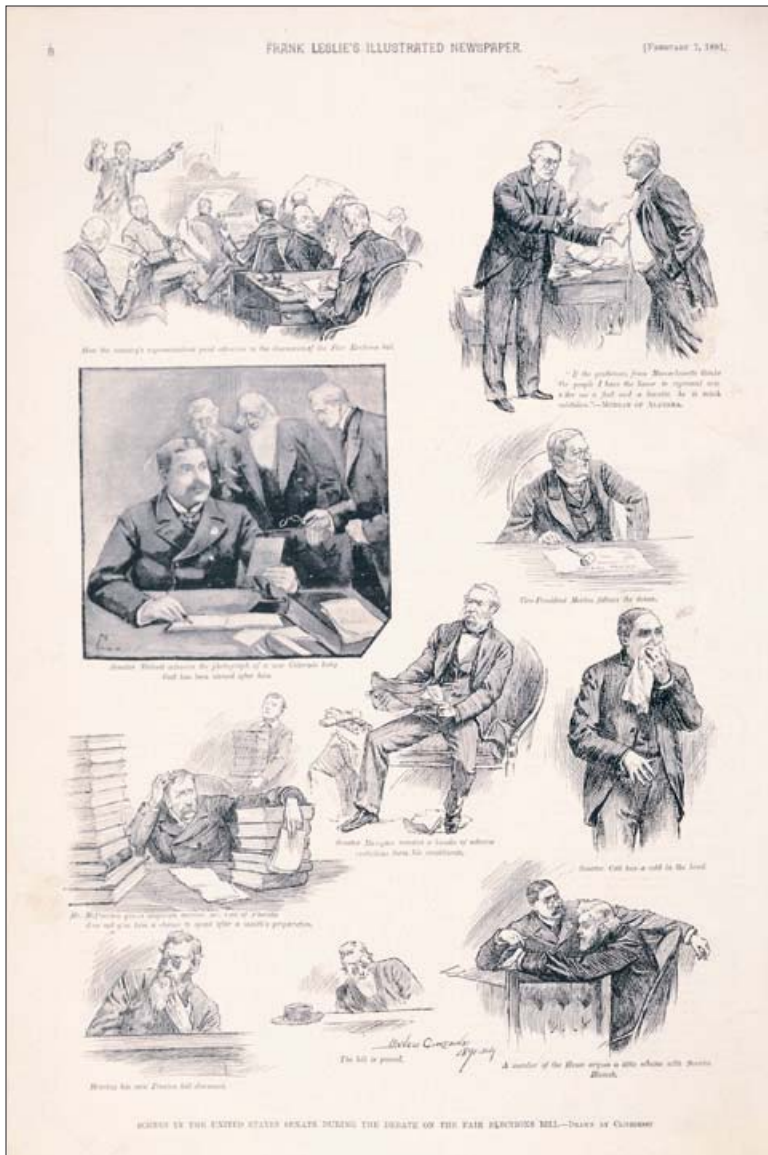

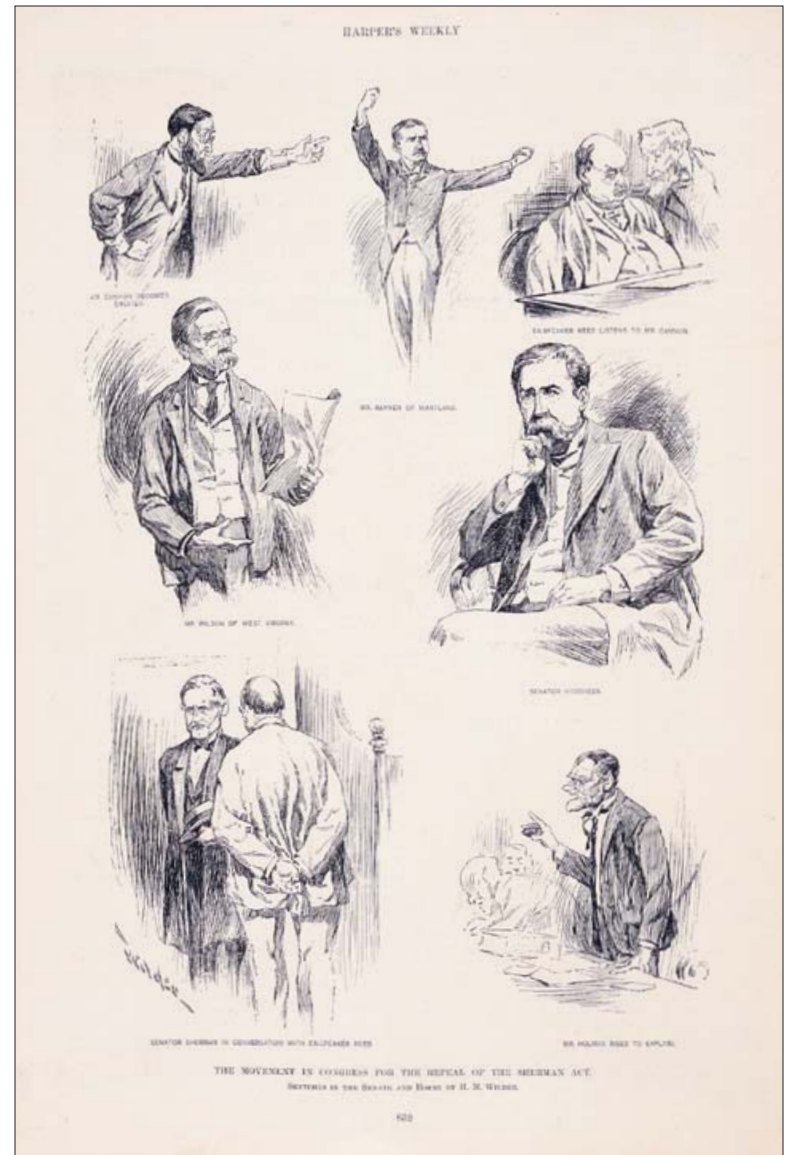

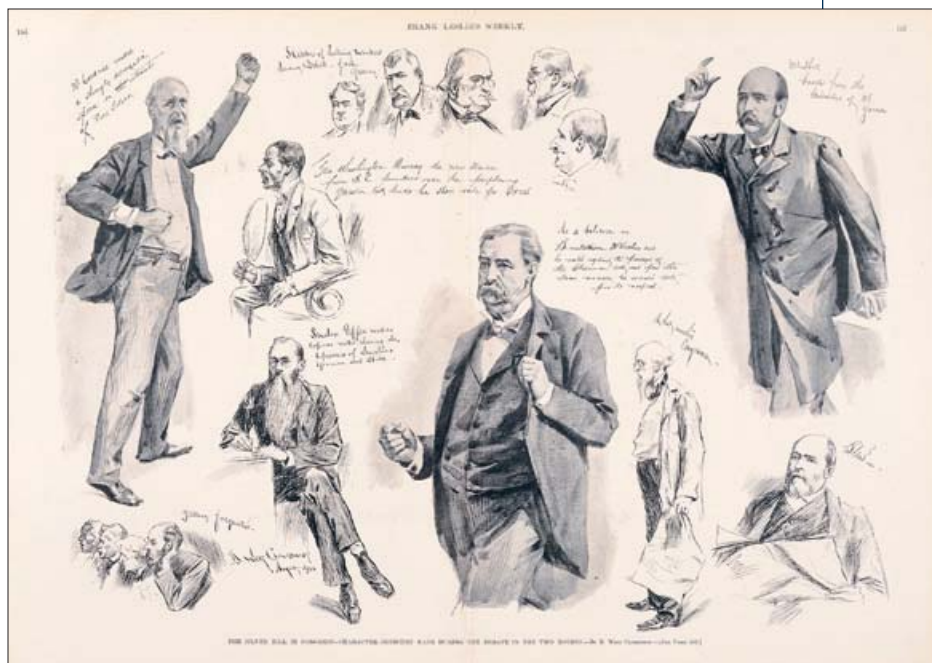

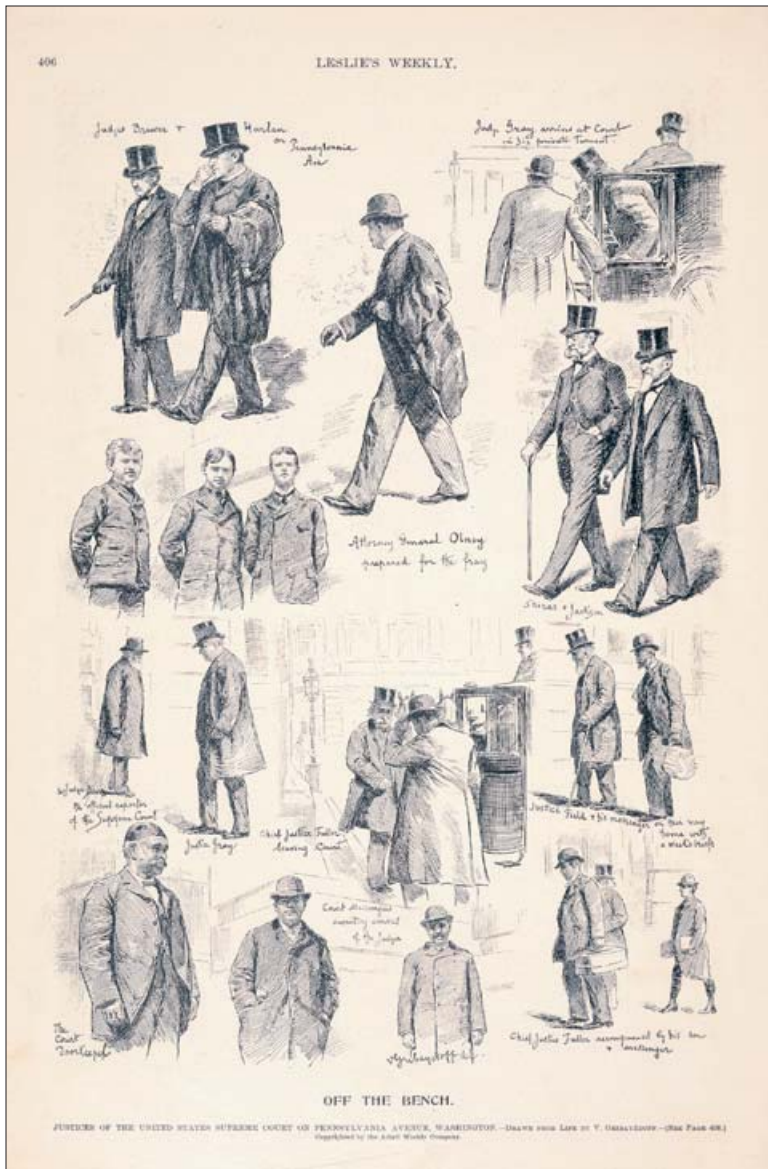


United States Senators on Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington.

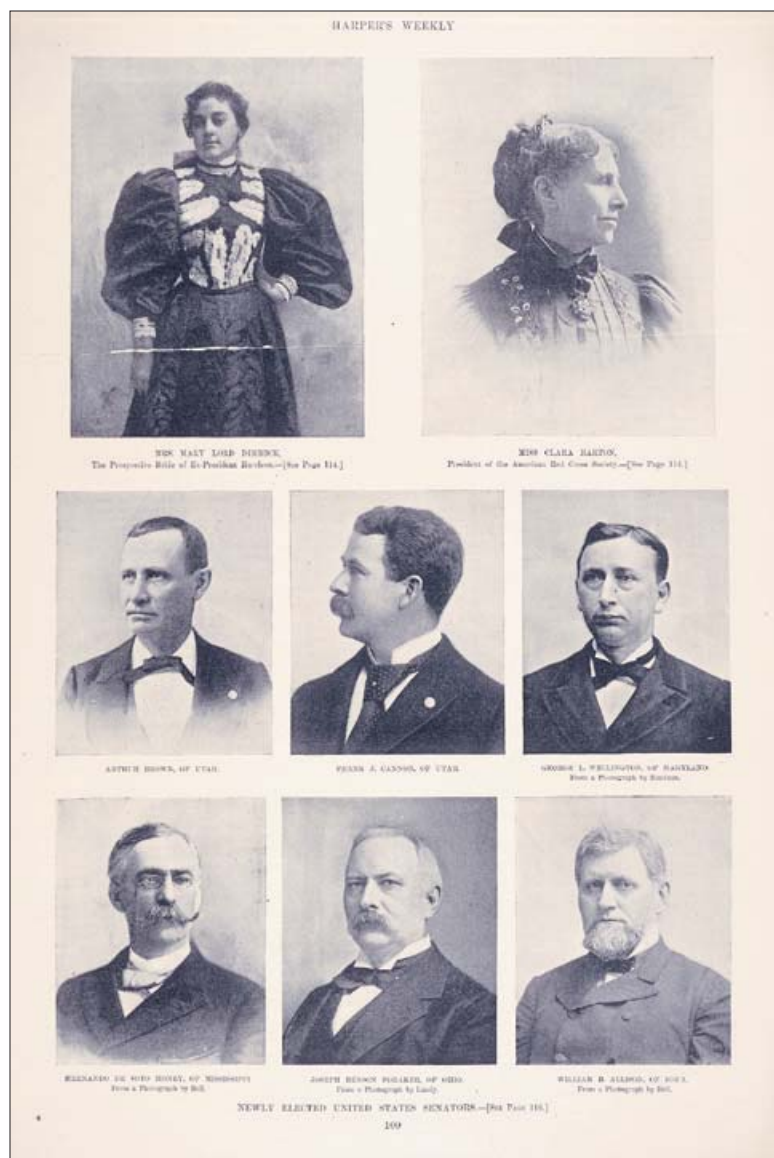

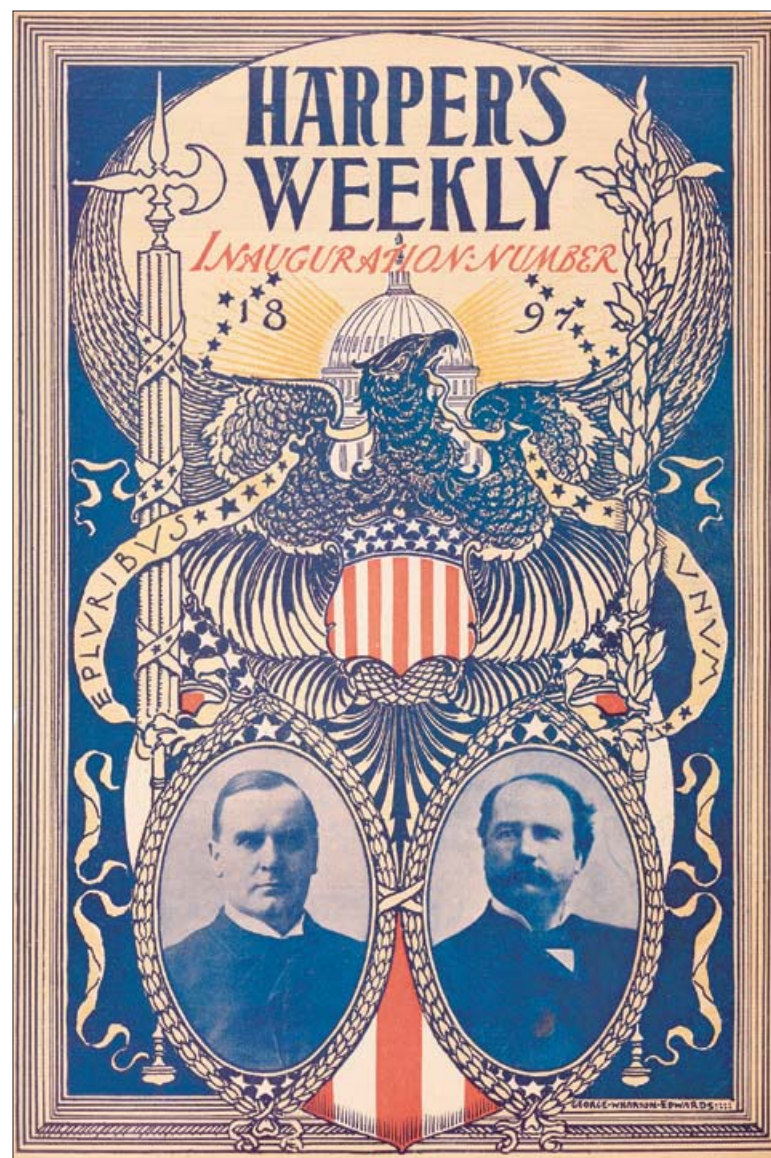

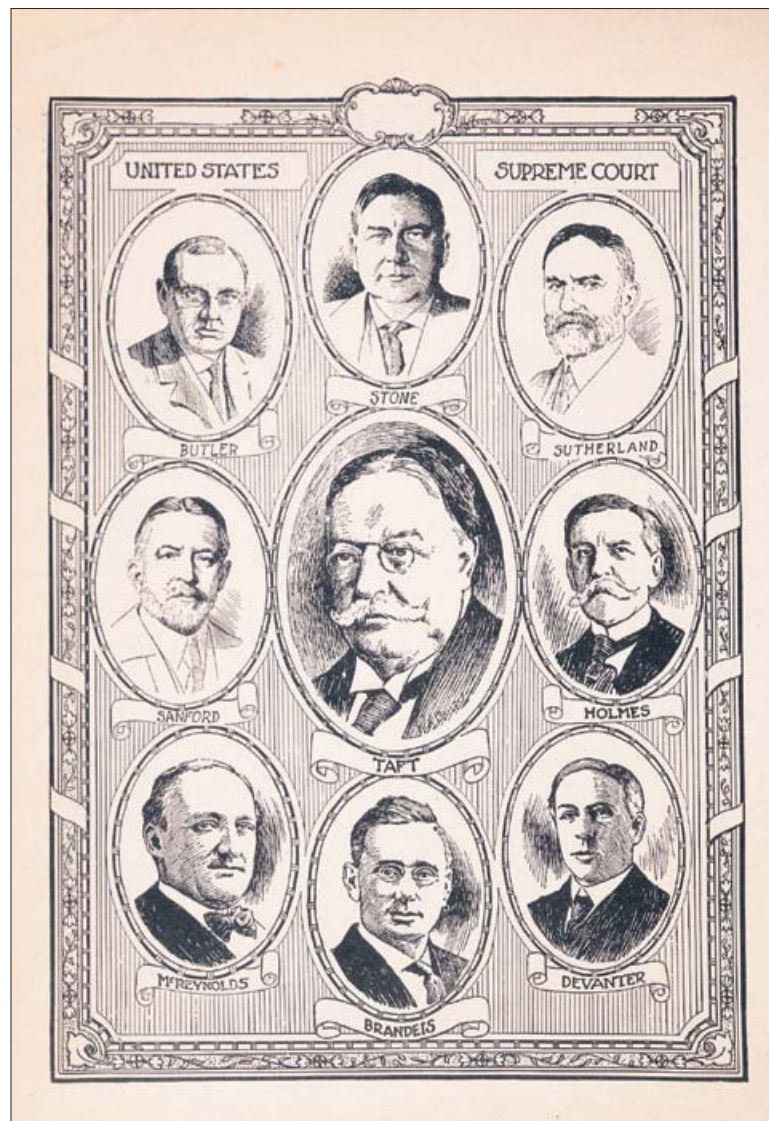
