Year-to-date total of one-year costs of House appropriations: \$79,629,200,000.00

An authorization explicitly allows funding for a certain program and / or directs a federal agency to take a certain action. Authorizations express the House's intent to spend, however, actual funding is provided through the annual appropriations process. Authorizations that would result in no <u>net</u> cost are not reported here.

Mandatory spending directly establishes an appropriation. No subsequent action is required for the money to be spent.
