I want to acknowledge my husband and daughter for their words of encouragement and understanding. There's no way I could have volunteered to be part of this great mission without their unwaivering love and support.

I have served in Iraq since October 2006 and am looking forward to returning home in June, which will end a 19 month tour. Knowing that I am on the downhill slide of my tour, I find myself reflecting back on my experiences here and the reasons that led me to leave the comfort and security of my family and home in Fredericksburg, VA. I find that I am not able to pinpoint any one single reason as to why I felt so compelled to join this great USACE team. As an Army Veteran with 28 years service, I can say the biggest draw for me was working with the soldiers. In conjunction with that, I believe in what we're doing here, and there's no question we're making a huge difference. The news media are failing to inform the American people the good news stories that are taking place here — how we're helping Iraqis rebuild their homeland.
