UTAH.

Population 316,331.

STATE CAPITAL, SALT LAKE CITY.

UTAH is bounded north by Idaho and Wyoming, east by Wyoming and Colorado, south by Arizona, and west by Nevada; length, north to south, about 350 miles; width, about 200 miles; land area, 82,096 square miles. The surface is generally mountainous, interspersed with arid plains, valleys, and basins. The annual rainfall varies from five to twenty inches, the average for the state varies from twelve to fifteen inches. Grazing and mountain lands comprise about two-thirds of the state. The area at present under cultivation is about four per cent. It is estimated that "dry" farming can be successfully practised on several million acres of land which has a limited rainfall, but by reason of its location cannot be irrigated. Much of the finest wheat is grown on such land, and the quality is superior to that grown in more humid climates. Twenty per cent. of the soil can be made productive by irrigation, which almost invariably brings good results, as the soil contains all the elements of fertility. The state contains over 70 miles of canals and nearly 7,000,000 cubic feet of irrigation reservoirs. The United States government has four reclamation projects under way and in prospect, on which \$12,000,000 is to be expended. They will reclaim about 400,000 acres, and private enterprises are engaged in work which will render fit for cultivation 800,000 acres more. Laws have been passed by which the rights of settlers on these lands will be thoroughly safeguarded. The mining industry, formerly Utah's chief source of wealth, and still increasing in value, year by year, has been compelled to yield first place by reason of the wonderful development of the state's agricultural resources. Wheat, oats, alfalfa, barley, corn, potatoes, hay, sugar beets, and wool are the chief products. Wheat of fine quality is grown. It is the state's chief crop, over 6,000,000 bushels being grown in 1909. Vegetables and small fruits grow luxuriantly on the irrigated lands. Cattle and sheep raising are profitable industries and are often successfully carried on where farming is impracticable. The total value of the farm and dairy products in 1909 was \$38,821,880. In addition to this, the wool clip of 1909 was 15,000,000 pounds, valued at \$2,800,000; and live stock had a value of \$18,000,000. Utah has 3,000,000 sheep, 80,000 dairy cattle, and 300,000 other cattle. About 10,000 acres are devoted to orchard and nursery interests and over 13,000 acres to the production of sugar beets. Over 50,000 tons of beet sugar was made in 1909, having an approximate value of \$5,000,000. Manufacturing industries, which are numerous and varied, are of considerable importance, goods to the value of \$41,342,366 being sent out from the factories of the state in 1909. Extensive works for the mining and smelting of ores have been established. The total output of gold in 1909 was \$3,844,800, silver, \$4,957,368, and copper, \$14,500,000; lead, zinc, coal and salt are also largely produced. The total value of the mineral product in 1909 was \$33,331,900. The state is exceedingly liberal in the treatment accorded her schools, and there are many well equipped institutions for higher education.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Utah is 97, including 7 daily, 3 tri-weekly, 5 semi-weekly, 71 weekly, 2 semi-monthly and 9 monthly. The places of publication number 51, of which 21, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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VERMONT.

Population 355,956.

STATE CAPITAL, MONTPELIER.

VERMONT is the most northwesterly of the New England states, bounded north by Quebec east by New Hampshire, south by Massachusetts, and west by New York. It is 143 miles long by from 40 to 85 miles wide, with a land area of 9,135 square miles. The Green Mountains traverse it from north to south, mainly in two ranges, generally covered with dense forests, but affording excellent pasturage. Western Vermont and a large tract of the eastern part comprise beautiful pastoral regions, but the central part is rugged and mountainous. The best soil is found on the western slope of the mountains near the border of Lake Champlain, and in the valley lands of the Connecticut river. The state occupies a prominent position in agriculture. When its area, population, amount of forest land, and long severe winters are considered, there is perhaps no other state that yields so large a return. All the ordinary agricultural staples are abundantly produced; over 2,500,000 bushels each of corn and oats were grown in 1908, also a little wheat; wool and dairy products are large and excellent; cattle, sheep, and horses are raised in large numbers, and the yield of maple sugar is unequalled. Some wrapper tobacco is grown in the south, in the valley of the Connecticut. Manufactures occupy a prominent position in its industries, and cover a wide range of goods, including flour, furniture, cotton and woolen goods, leather, agricultural tools, tin and copper ware, lumber, etc. Large quantities of lumber are exported, and marble and slate extensively quarried. The principal marble quarries are at Brandon, Dorset, Isle La Motte, Manchester, Middlebury, New Haven, Pittsford, Proctorsville, (serpentine), Roxbury (verd-antique), Rutland, Shelburn, Sutherland Falls, Swanton and West Rutland; slate quarries at Castleton, Fair Haven, Guilford, Northfield, Pawlet and Poultney, granite at Barre and Brattleboro. Potters' clay comes from Bennington and Rutland; steatite from Castleton and Grafton. Manganese, brown hematite, kaolin and ochre from Brandon, South Wallingford and Manchester Centre; copper ore from Vershire and Corinth. Rutland is the largest marble centre in the world, not less than \$6,000,000 of capital and 4,000 men being employed in 15 quarries and 20 mills. The granite business at Barre, six miles from Montpelier, is very large. Burlington is a large market for Vermont and Ottawa lumber, having extensive mills and a trade extending throughout the eastern states. Vermont continues to be the greatest breeding state of fine horses (Morgans and Hambletonians) and of Spanish merino sheep. Every year numbers of these superior animals are shipped to all parts of this country, to South America and to Australia.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Vermont is 104, including 10 daily, 85 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 6 monthly, 1 eight times a year and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 69, of which 12, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, RICHMOND.

VIRGINIA is bounded north by West Virginia and Maryland, east by Maryland and the Atlantic Ocean, south by North Carolina and Tennessee, and west by Kentucky and West Virginia. Its greatest length from east to west is about 440 miles, its greatest breadth 192 miles; land area, 40,125 square miles. The surface is divided into six great natural divisions, the Tidewater, comprising the south and southeast; the Middle, an undulating plain, extending westward to the Coast Range; the Piedmont, from the Coast Range to the Blue Ridge Mountains, and from the Potomac River to North Carolina; the Blue Ridge, stretching across the state in a southwesterly direction; the Valley—a part of the great Appalachian valley, reaching from Canada to Alabama—a broad belt of rolling country between the Blue Ridge and the Kittatinny or North Mountain; and the Appalachian, a mountainous region traversed by the Alleghenies. The soil in the Tidewater region is a light sandy loam, yielding large crops of vegetables and small fruits. The Valley region has a rich fertile soil, well adapted for cereals, of which corn, wheat, oats and rye are the principal. Much of the Mountain region is uncultivated and chiefly forest land; but the parallel valleys are very fertile. The Piedmont, Blue Ridge, Valley, and Appalachian regions are noted for their grasses. The forests of Virginia are rich in a large variety of trees, especially the valuable hardwoods, and the export of lumber is large. The growth in the total products of the farms during the last ten or twenty years has been very large. The yield of tobacco is excelled only by Kentucky and North Carolina. Over 114,000,000 pounds were produced in 1908. Some cotton is grown in the Tide-water section; fruit grows all over the state, Virginia being especially celebrated for the fine quality of its apples. A considerable part of the tide water region is devoted to the growing of early vegetables for northern markets, especially near Norfolk, where in some cases of intensive culture \$1,000 profit has been made in a year from a single acre. Dairying, stock raising, and wool-growing are important industries. The dairy products in 1908 were worth \$7,000,000, against only \$2,000,000 ten years ago. The beef cattle in 1908 was worth \$70,000,000, an increase of almost \$30,000,000 in ten years. There are profitable fisheries of bass, shad, etc., and the oyster trade is very large, the total output of the fisheries being estimated at over \$2,000,000. The manufacturing interests are also increasing, the chief seats being Richmond, Alexandria, Danville, and Lynchburg. The more important products are cotton goods, tobacco, leather, coke, saw and planing mill products, flour, clothing, woodenware, paper, agricultural implements, machinery, etc. In 1880 the cotton mills used 5,087,519 pounds of cotton. In 1909 they used 36,517,677 pounds. The lumber and mineral products increased almost in the same proportion. Virginia has excellent natural advantages for commerce, but it is only lately that she has begun to take a prominent part in foreign trade. The state is extremely rich in minerals. There are beds of anthracite, semi-bituminous, and bituminous coal in the southwestern counties, some of them producing a good coking coal. There are coal bearing strata in other parts of the state, particularly near Richmond; the coal is bituminous, and generally of good quality. There were 4,500,000 tons produced in 1907. Virginia has vast beds of gypsum and marl, abundant iron ore, fine granite, marble, and other building stones; zinc, sulphur, kaolin, fire clay, and many other minerals. It abounds in mineral springs of great reputation. Iron and manganese are extensively mined, also zinc and lead ores. There are a number of gold mines in the northern and central counties, which produce gold in paying quantities. Some copper is mined. There are numerous mineral springs, some of which have a wide reputation for their healing qualities. Lime burning is an important industry. Transportation facilities are good, both by water and rail. Water power is abundant, even in the tide-water section the small streams have sufficient fall to operate the local grist mills and other industries.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Virginia is 268, including 32 daily, 2 tri-weekly, 11 semi-weekly, 174 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 3 semi-monthly, 36 monthly, 4 bi-monthly and 5 quarterly. The places of publication number 139, of which 69, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

WASHINGTON.

Population 1,158,998.

STATE CAPITAL, OLYMPIA.

WASHINGTON is bounded north by British Columbia, west by the Pacific Ocean, east by Idaho, and south by Oregon. Its average length, east to west, is 330 miles; width, 220 miles; land area 66,880 square miles. It is divided by the Cascade Mountains into two distinct parts. Western Washington is a fine timber country, with many fertile valleys, well settled and very productive in vegetables, which grow to an immense size, fruit of all kinds, and hops. Fruit growing has been especially successful, and some of the largest and finest fruits in the eastern market are those shipped from Washington. Dairying is an interest of growing importance, and produced butter worth \$3,160,539, cheese worth \$32,750, and condensed milk worth \$4,185,330 in 1909. Extensive coal and iron mines are being operated, coke ovens established, and the state will be, in a short time, the Pennsylvania of the Pacific Coast. Over 3,000,000 tons were shipped in 1909. There are copper, silver, galena and gold mines, all of which are rapidly being developed. Over \$250,000 in gold was produced in 1908. There is also an abundance of iron ore, limestone, granite, marble, etc. Eastern Washington is especially adapted for the raising of fruit of all kinds, vegetables, hops and grain, particularly wheat, of which 30,000,000 to 35,000,000 bushels are grown each year. Oats also grow luxuriantly, frequently yielding seventy bushels to the acre. There are some waterless regions in the central and eastern portions of the state, between the eastern slopes of the Cascade range and the western slope of the Rocky mountains. Some parts of this area have been irrigated by private enterprise, and other reclamation projects are under way, in addition to the Yakima and Okanogan projects, which are being constructed by the United States government. The former of these is expected to reclaim at least 500,000 acres, and within a few years the area of irrigated land will be fully 1,500,000 acres. The climate of Washington is perfection; the mean average temperature for the year being 53° without extremes of heat or cold. It is the best agricultural country on the Pacific coast. Cattle and stock of all kinds do remarkably well; the ranges are good and it is not considered necessary to feed the stock in the winter time, owing to the generally light snow fall and the abundance of natural grasses. Puget Sound is a vast harbor, having an extent of 1,594 miles of shore line, and Seattle, its principal seaport, is fast becoming the metropolis of the northwest Pacific coast. Fish of all kinds abound, and the tacking and canning of salmon employs about ten thousand people in the season. The total value of the fisheries products in 1909 was \$13,534,010. Manufacturing industries of all kinds are increasing rapidly in numbers and importance. The principal industry is the manufacture of lumber and its products. In addition to general wood-working factories, there are over a thousand lumber and shingle mills, and the pay rolls of the loggers and lumbermen reach a total of \$60,000,000 to \$70,000,000 annually. Washington's cedar shingles are celebrated for quality and durability. In the year 1905 over 8,000,000,000 shingles and over 5,000,000,000 feet of lumber were manufactured. Ship building is one of the most important industries. The principal articles of export are lumber, shingles, coal, wheat and salmon. Of the area of the state, over 12,000 square miles are in timber. Parts of this area bear immense trees, ten to twelve feet in diameter and 300 feet high. Douglas fir constitutes more than half of the standing timber. The rest consists of red cedar, hemlock, spruce and western pine. Hardwoods are found in small quantities.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Washington is 372, including 35 daily, 6 semi-weekly, 237 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 3 semi-monthly, 38 monthly, 1 bi-monthly and 1 five times a year. The places of publication number 188, of which 38, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

WEST VIRGINIA.

Population 1,076,406.

STATE CAPITAL, CHARLESTON.

WEST VIRGINIA is bounded north and east by Pennsylvania and Maryland, east and south by Virginia, and west by Kentucky and Ohio. Its greatest length from north to south is about 240 miles; greatest breadth, 160 miles; land area, 24,645 square miles. A large part of the surface is mountainous and hilly; about two-thirds is covered with forest. The soil of the ridges is fertile to the tops, and the summits of many mountains are flat, natural meadows or glades. The valley of the Great Kanawha is the finest grazing region of the state. Blue grass is indigenous; the lumber trade is important, the forests being principally composed of hardwood timber of the most valuable kinds. Nearly the whole of the state lies within the Allegheny coal system, and large quantities of coal are exported both by river and rail, and new mines are constantly being opened. The state ranks third in total output, over 47,000,000 tons being produced in 1907. The total area underlaid by coal is estimated at not less than 16,000 square miles. It is generally bituminous. The Kanawha valley is one of the great salt producing regions of the United States. Petroleum is extensively produced, chiefly in Ritchie, Pleasants, Marshall, Wood, and Wirt counties. Natural gas is found in several sections, Wheeling and the Northern Pan Handle using it as a fuel almost to the exclusion of coal. Limestone, sandstone, and grinding stone abound generally throughout the state. West Virginia is especially famous for wool, while the live stock interests generally are large. Other great staples are corn, wheat, oats, and tobacco. Manufactures are comparatively undeveloped, except in the towns along the Ohio river. The state has enormous water power, all its streams having a rapid descent, but so far this has been but little utilized. The leading products are steel and iron in various forms, glass, flour, salt, wood pulp, liquor, lumber, queensware and porcelain, fire brick, leather, cigars and tobacco, and machinery. The cigar manufacture is very important. Wheeling is the largest and most important city; it is the manufacturing center and all the industries enumerated above, except salt manufacturing, flourish there.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in West Virginia is 219, including 33 daily, 5 semi-weekly, 165 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 1 semi-monthly and 14 monthly. The places of publication number 93, of which 55, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, MADISON.

WISCONSIN is bounded north by Lake Superior, northeast by Michigan, east by Lake Michigan, south by Illinois, and west by Iowa and Minnesota. Its greatest length from north to south is 300 miles; greatest breadth, 260 miles; land area, 54,450 square miles. The surface is generally an elevated plain, with high bluffs along the rivers and lakes, and elsewhere gently undulating, diversified with prairie, woodlands, and numerous lakes. The state ranks high in agricultural products. The northern part is heavily timbered, and has a somewhat severe climate. The lumber business of this section of the state, in pine and hard wood, has built up many large and flourishing inland cities like Oshkosh, Eau Claire, Wausau, Chippewa Falls, Stevens' Point, Merrill and Shawano. There is an immense deposit of the best iron ore, extending across the entire northern part of the state and known as the Gogebic iron belt; many valuable mines have been opened, and the shipments of ore have added millions of wealth to the productive capacity of the state and largely increased the population. Galena limestone, lead, and zinc exist in the southwest, chiefly near Mineral Point. One of the best hydraulic cements comes from the neighborhood of Milwaukee. Wheat, corn, rye, oats, barley, potatoes, dairy products, and maple sugar are all produced in large quantities, especially oats, of which the 1908 crop reached 73,085,000 bushels; hops are exceedingly prolific; fruit growing is an important industry. Cheese and butter making have increased to enormous proportions, especially in the central and southern counties, and the growing of seed leaf tobacco for wrappers has become an important and profitable industry, and the product commands good prices, being excelled only by the wrappers from the Connecticut valley. The 1908 crop was over 39,000,000 pounds. Large numbers of horses are bred; sheep are numerous, and the wool clip large and valuable. The lakes and streams abound with fish, especially trout and black bass. Manufactures are thriving and numerous, lumber and wood work of all kinds holding a very prominent position. The manufactures of furniture, wagons, agricultural implements, leather and brooms are large and increasing, while at Milwaukee are situated several of the largest and wealthiest beer brewing corporations in the world, and the manufactures of cotton and woolen goods, nails, paper, steel rails and merchant iron are large and valuable.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Wisconsin is 672, including 64 daily, 19 semi-weekly, 532 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 2 semi-monthly, 52 monthly, 1 bi-monthly, and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 340, of which 71, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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WYOMING.

Population 101,816.

STATE CAPITAL, CHEYENNE.

WYOMING is bounded north by Montana, east by South Dakota and Nebraska, south by Colorado and Utah, and west by Utah, Idaho, and Montana; length, east to west, 365 miles; width, 274 miles; land area, 97,575 square miles. The mean elevation of the state is about 6000 feet. The clear, dry atmosphere and the abundance of sunshine has made the state a favorite health resort, especially for persons afflicted with pulmonary diseases. Its surface is broken by mountain ranges, deep river canons and flat topped hills or buttes, the latter a feature of South Wyoming, which rise from valley or plain like walled cities or mounds. There are large elevated plateaus or parks, of which the principal is the Great Yellowstone or National Park. There are extensive areas of pine and spruce timber, widely distributed throughout the mountain regions. About 7,000,000 acres is the estimated area of the forests, and as much more is more or less timbered. For many years cattle raising was the only industry, and it is still in the front rank. There are over 700,000 cattle in the state, 127,000 horses, and 5,000,000 sheep. But here, as in all the western states, agriculture is steadily progressing over the ranges. Wyoming leads all the states in the value of its sheep, and of its annual wool clip. Irrigation is needed in a large part of the country to make the soil productive, as there are few places, except in the eastern portion, where crops can be successfully grown without additional water supply. Where it is used, however, the returns are very large; fine crops of alfalfa, sugar beets, vegetables and small fruits being grown. Wheat and other grains do well. It is estimated that 10,000,000 acres may be reclaimed, and there are numerous public and private systems in operation and under construction. Over 1,000,000 acres are now supplied from the existing systems. Experiments are being made in methods of "dry farming" suitable for localities where irrigation is not practicable, and good crops of grain and alfalfa have been grown. The best results are obtained from the two year system, by which half of the farm is allowed to lie idle each year, being plowed and harrowed to preserve the moisture for the next year's crop. It is believed that fully 20,000,000 acres can be made productive by dry farming. There are few states with greater mineral resources than Wyoming. 156 varieties of minerals have been discovered, and new ores are constantly being brought to light. Copper in commercial quantities has been found in many places. Gold and silver are found, but the quantity produced in recent years is small. There are vast beds of iron ore and plenty of good coal, the latter underlying 30,000 square miles of territory. Over 6,000,000 tons were dug in 1907. Gypsum, salt, soda, graphite, asphaltum, epsom salts, plaster, clays, sulphur, lead, tin, and other minerals are found. There are many mineral springs. The oil fields in central and northern Wyoming cover a territory 350 miles long and 150 miles wide. Many wells have been drilled and promise to be heavy producers, but the majority are capped until the several projected pipe lines are constructed. All the various qualities of petroleum have been found, and several strong wells of natural gas. The total mineral output in 1908 was valued at \$18,793,987. Lumber and railroad ties are the chief articles manufactured.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Wyoming is 71, including 5 daily, 5 semi-weekly, 57 weekly and 4 monthly. The places of publication number 48, of which 14, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

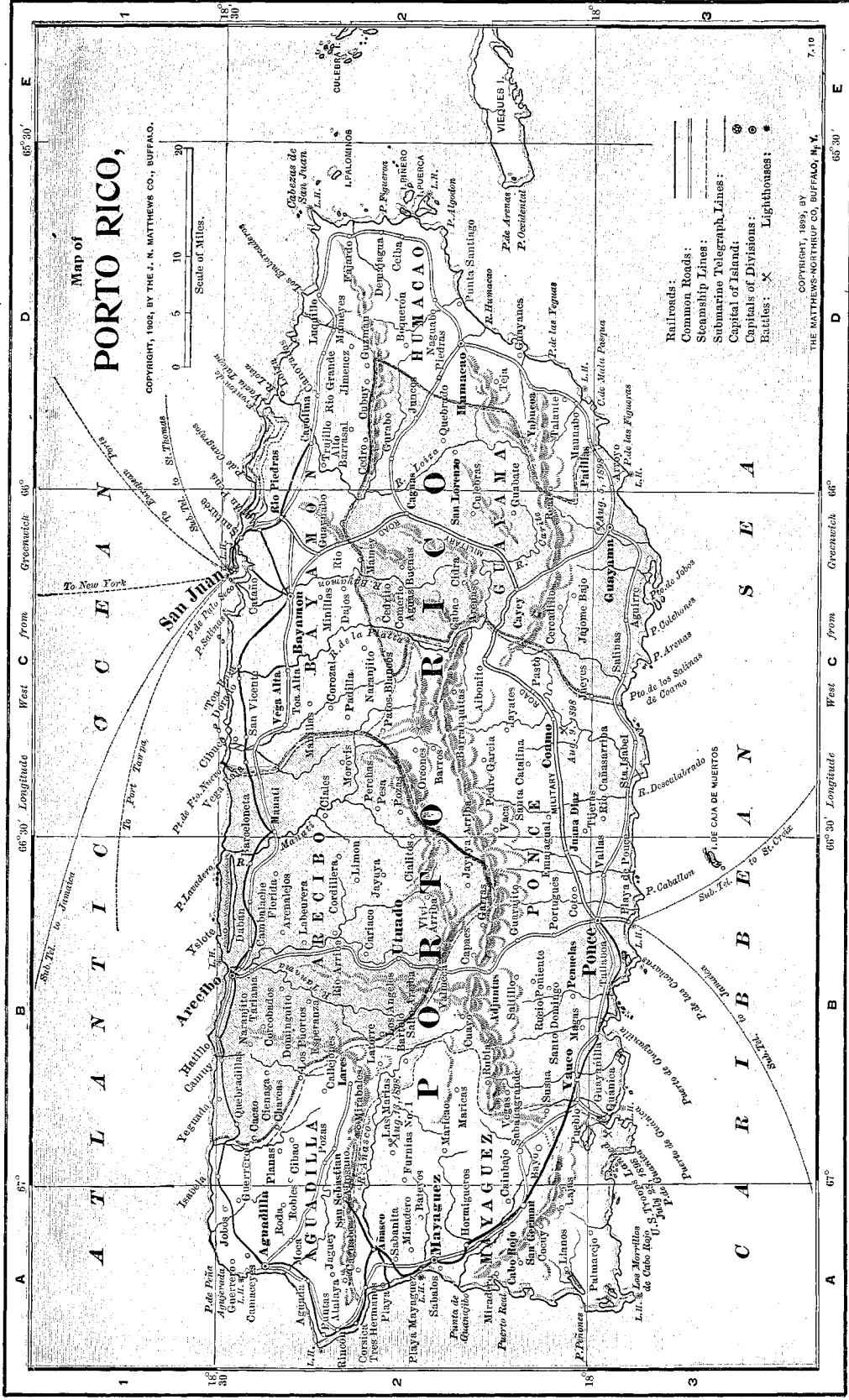

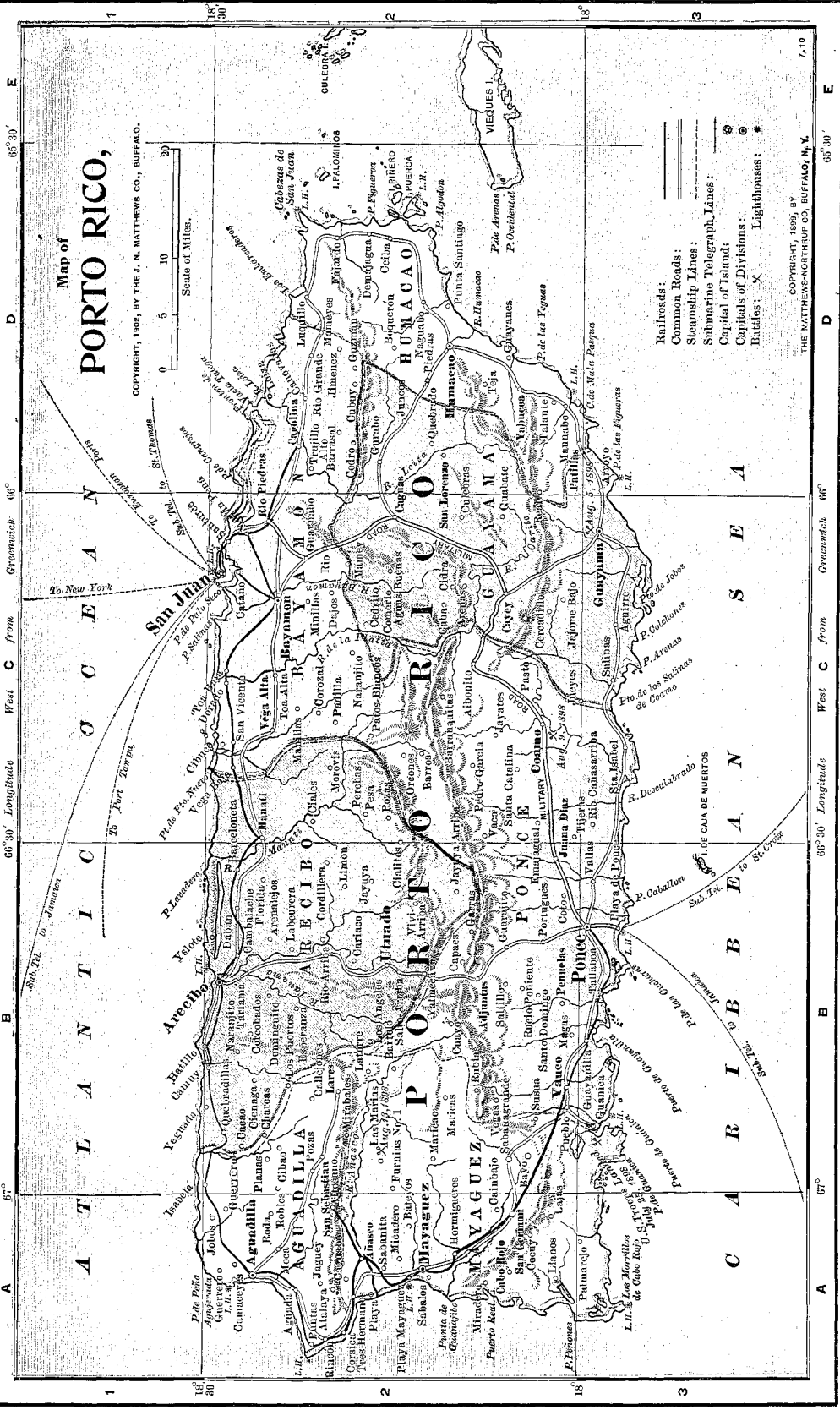
**Map of

CAPITAL, SAN JUAN.

Seventy miles east of San Domingo. The island is 108 miles long from east to west and 36 miles broad. Its area is about 3,600 square miles, about half the size of New Jersey. It is traversed by a mountain range from east to west, the highest point of which is about 3,700 feet. The climate is generally salubrious. The chief industry is agriculture and the principal products are sugar, of which 245,000 tons were made in 1909, coffee, rice, tobacco, salt, corn, oranges, pineapples, bananas and other tropical fruits. Some cotton is grown. In the southern parts of the island irrigation has been found necessary for the better development of its agricultural possibilities, and plans have been made to supply water to about 30,000 acres. Beef cattle are raised in large numbers, and the dairy industry is growing fast, especially near the large cities. The mineral deposits are not large, but have been worked to some extent. Gold, copper, iron and lignite are found, and there are salt works in several localities. Marble, limestone and other building stones exist in large quantities, but have been very little used. The trade of Porto Rico is chiefly with the United States and Great Britain. The exports to the United States in 1909 were valued at \$26,394,812, and the imports from the United States at \$23,618,545. In 1909 the exports of sugar were 244,257 tons, of tobacco, 4,539,320 pounds, 142,088,000 cigars, 23,489,236 pounds of coffee. Fruits, fresh and preserved, are also a large article of export. Since the American occupation great progress has been made in good roads and other transportation facilities, and in education.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Porto Rico is 21, including 11 daily, 7 weekly, and 3 semi-monthly. The places of publication number 6, of which 4, designated by a dagger (†), are department capitals.

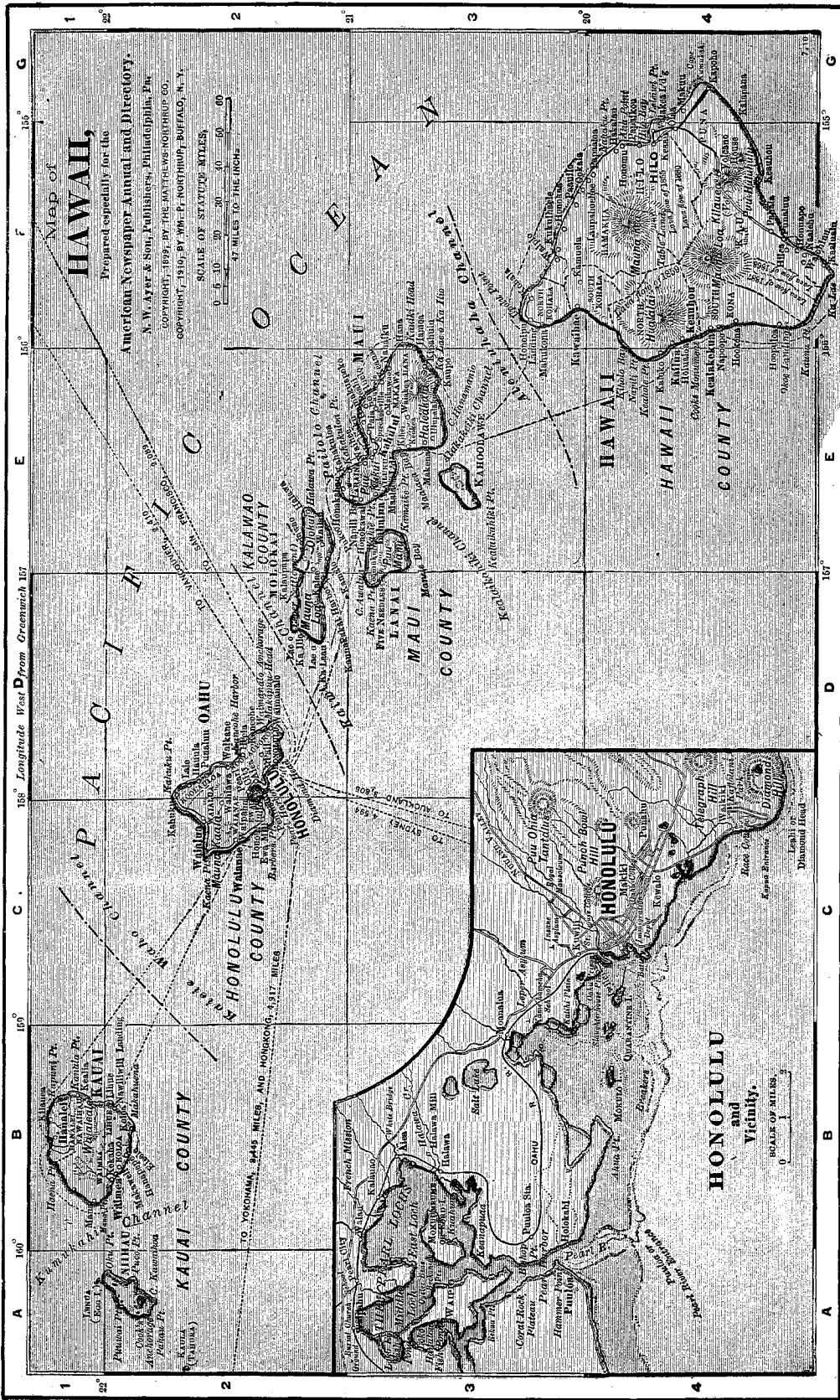

HAWAII.

Population, † 191,909.

TERRITORIAL CAPITAL, HONOLULU.

The HAWAIIAN ISLANDS are situated in the North Pacific Ocean between longitude 154° 40' and 160° 30' west and latitude 22° 16' and 18° 13' north. The eight principal islands have an area of 6,454 square miles, the others are mere rocks. Hawaii is the largest and has given its name to the whole group. The islands are of volcanic formation. There are two active volcanoes. Kilauea and Mauna Loa. Mauna Kea, the highest point on Hawaii, is 13,825 feet high; the mountains generally range from 4,000 to 5,000 feet. Their sides abound in forests containing an abundance of timber and ornamental woods. A large proportion of the population, estimated at over one-third of the whole, is Japanese and Chinese. The native race is dying out, there being but a little over 30,000 at the census of 1900. There are now about 15,000 Portuguese resident in the islands. The chief agricultural products are sugar, rice, coffee, fruits, and vegetables. The production of sugar in the year ending September 30th, 1909, reached 532,000 tons. Bananas are an important product, over 100,000 bunches being exported annually, with a capacity of many times that number. The culture and canning of pineapples is a large and rapidly developing industry, one of the canneries being the largest fruit preserving plant in the world. Rubber culture is a new industry, but has made good progress, about 500,000 trees having been planted in the past four years, and they are all thriving. The culture of cotton is increasing, and sisal hemp is one of the established products. The U. S. Experiment Station has been conducting a series of experiments in tobacco culture, and has discovered that a large area of the soil is suitable for this crop, which will probably be one of the staple products in the near future. Cattle and sheep are raised in sufficient numbers to supply the needs of the islands. Large quantities of commercial fertilizers are manufactured. The United States practically monopolizes the trade of Hawaii. The total exports from July 1, 1908, to June 30, 1909, to the United States, were valued at \$40,436,595. The total imports for the same year from the United States reached a total value of \$17,713,342. There are excellent roads throughout the islands and five railroads, two on Hawaii, two on Oahu and one on Maui.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in five towns of Hawaii is 36, including 6 daily, 4 tri-weekly, 3 semi-weekly, 16 weekly and 7 monthly.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

Population 7,912,593 (1906.)

CAPITAL, MANILA.

An important group of islands in the Malay Archipelago, lying mainly between latitude 82° and 19° 38' north and longitude 117° and 126° east. They number about 2,000, the largest being Luzon, Mindanao, Panay, Negros, Cebu, Samar and Mindoro. The total land area is about 140,000 square miles. There are many diverse races among the people, speaking as many different dialects. The Visayans are the most numerous, and number about twenty per cent of the whole. Next in order come the Tagalogs and the Ilocanos. Education and religion have made much progress through the islands, and fully ninety per cent. of the people may be considered as being, to some extent, civilized. Agriculture is the chief industry. At present not more than twelve per cent of the land is under cultivation, but this will, no doubt, be largely extended, as the soil is remarkably fertile, and a great proportion of the total area of the islands is suitable for tillage. The chief product is hemp, which is known throughout the world as Manila hemp. The value of the hemp exported is double that of all other exports combined. Tobacco of good quality is grown almost everywhere. The other principal products are rice, corn, sugar, coconuts, spices and timber, including dye-woods. The production of sugar in 1909 was 150,000 tons. The principal manufacturing industries are those connected with the manufacture of hemp, cigars and tobacco. The commerce is considerable, the imports for 1909 being about \$35,000,000, and the exports \$31,000,000. Gold was mined to the value of \$284,500 in 1908. Silver, copper, iron, lead, coal, sulphur and petroleum are also found, but not in large quantities.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in 4 towns of the Philippines is 29, including 10 daily, 1 tri-weekly, 2 semi-weekly, 5 weekly and 10 monthly.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, EDMONTON.

The PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, formerly a part of the Northwest Territories, is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by British Columbia, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States) and on the east by the Province of Saskatchewan. Its length from north to south is about 800 miles, its greatest breadth from east to west about 400 miles and its land area is 251,180 square miles. 120,000,000 acres of this, about 75 per cent. of the whole, is capable of cultivation. The northern half is unsettled except for the scattered trading stations of the Hudson's Bay Company. The southern portion has for a number of years been the grazing ground of large herds of cattle, and is now attaining prominence in agriculture, especially in grain growing, for which the soil and climate seem peculiarly adapted, wheat in particular being of the finest quality. In 1906 the wheat crop was 5,932,267 bushels, oats 24,027,071 bushels, and barley 3,876,468 bushels. The other principal crops are hay, potatoes and sugar beets. Live stock forms an important part of the wealth of the province, there being 226,504 horses and 950,632 head of cattle in 1906. What is said to be the largest irrigation system in the world is now being constructed in this province by the Canadian Pacific Railway, and will add 1,400,000 acres to the tillable area. It will cost about \$8,000,000, and will have over fifty miles of main canals and nearly 3,000 miles of lateral canals and ditches. In the Rocky mountain section, in the extreme western portion of the province, large deposits of coal are found, also gold, iron and zinc, with some natural gas and petroleum. The coal is being worked, and the annual production is steadily increasing. In 1908, 1,845,000 tons were mined. The fur industry in the north is of great value, and a large business is done in Edmonton in supplies for this industry, and in shipping its products. The province is developing rapidly, its population having increased from 73,022 in 1901 to 185,412 in 1906, and the number of farms in the same period having increased from 9,433 to 30,236. The population at the present time (1911) is estimated to be close to 300,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in 56 towns of Alberta is 89, including 9 daily, 2 semi-weekly, 73 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 1 semi-monthly and 3 monthly.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, VICTORIA.

BRITISH COLUMBIA is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by the Pacific Ocean and Alaska, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States), on the east by the Rocky Mountains and the meridian of 120° west. It is the largest of all the Canadian provinces, having an area of 390,344 square miles. It includes a number of islands the largest being Vancouver, which contains the capital of the province, has an area of about 14,000 square miles, and produces the finest coal on the Pacific coast. Over 300,000 tons are exported annually to the United States, and the quantity is steadily increasing. The province is about 700 miles long and 500 wide. The Fraser river, its principal stream, is 800 miles long, and 600 yards wide at its mouth; its valley containing much the greater part of the arable land. The surface is largely mountainous and densely wooded, producing trees of enormous size. Lumbering is one of the principal industries, but as the land becomes cleared the soil is found very fertile and a considerable area is well adapted for agriculture of all kinds. The timber cut in 1908 was worth \$20,000,000. The number of farms is rapidly increasing, and agriculture will soon be one of the chief industries. The fruit growing industry is becoming important, the value of the fruit crops in 1908 being \$1,250,000. The climate is temperate and healthy, and is particularly suited for stock raising. Gold has been found in large quantities, and mining it is one of the chief industries. Upwards of \$15,000,000 worth of gold has been exported during the last fifteen years. Copper and iron are widely distributed, and many other minerals are found. The mineral production in 1908 reached a total value of \$24,080,546, of which gold, copper and coal, each with a yield of almost \$6,000,000, produced the greater portion. In addition to the coal on Vancouver Island, there have been already discovered on the mainland over 5,000 square miles of coal bearing lands. The coal produced in 1908 amounted to 2,329,600 tons. The total mineral wealth of the province is beyond computation, for many thousands of square miles of territory have never been surveyed or prospected, and large regions known to be rich in minerals are almost inaccessible at present, and have barely been touched. The fisheries are also very valuable, salmon forming by far the greatest portion of the catch. The total value of the catch of all kinds in 1908 was \$6,122,293. In addition to this, about \$500,000 worth of sealskins are taken annually. Fur bearing animals are very numerous. The principal town on the mainland is Vancouver, the terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The population of the province is now estimated at 200,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in British Columbia is 98, including 16 daily, 1 tri-weekly, 8 semi-weekly, 61 weekly and 12 monthly. The places of publication number 49, of which 6, designated by a dagger (†), are district capitals.

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MANITOBA.

Population365,688

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, WINNIPEG.

MANITOBA extends from the 49th to the 60th parallel of north latitude, and is bounded south by Minnesota and North Dakota, east by Ontario, Keewatin and Hudson Bay, north by Mackenzie Territory and west by Saskatchewan, and has an area of about 175,000 square miles. The settled portion lies almost wholly south of the 52d parallel. Its surface is principally prairie land, with groves of timber along the rivers and streams. About 5,000,000 acres is under cultivation at present. The area devoted to agriculture is increasing rapidly, as thousands of new settlers take up land in the province each year, coming from all the northern European countries. Many also come from the United States. The soil is probably the richest in the world, and produces the finest wheat known in the market. Almost all other cereals grow and ripen in great abundance, also vegetables and small fruits of all kinds suited to the latitude. In 1909 there were produced in the province 45,776,707 bushels of wheat, 50,983,456 of oats, 16,416,684 of barley, and over 5,000,000 bushels of potatoes, and each year sees a large increase in the acreage of these and other crops as the railroads are extended. There are numerous elevators and warehouses scattered through the province and new ones are constantly being erected to take care of the immense crops of grain. The province has been prominent as a most favorable district for the cattle raising industry for many years. The stock returns for 1909 show 189,343 horses, 373,472 cattle and 155,617 hogs. Dairy products are increasing in amount year by year, the annual output of butter being over 9,000,000 pounds. Irrigation is not needed, the work necessary for improving and adding to the area of tillable land consisting chiefly in reclaiming a large amount of first-class land which has a surplus of water. Coal of the lignitic variety is abundant, though mining operations so far have been inconsiderable. There are abundant deposits of clay, sand, gypsum, building stone, etc. The Laurentian district of the north and east is thought to be rich in other minerals, though it is yet unexplored. This region gives a rich yield of furs, while its streams are full of fish. Winnipeg is on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which passes through Manitoba from east to west, and from it several railways branch out into the province and the United States, the province having a total of over 4,000 thousand miles of railroad. The means of water communication are also very considerable. Manufacturing industries are growing in size and number, especially those using the products of the province, as flour and oatmeal mills, meat packing houses, breweries, etc. The total manufactures for 1909 were valued at \$10,000,000, of which \$25,000,000 was from the city of Winnipeg. Flour and other mill products reached \$8,809,833, dressed meats and meat products \$2,338,000, lumber and forest products, nearly \$3,000,000. The fisheries are a valuable asset, over 8,000,000 pounds of fish being taken in Lake Winnipeg alone in the year 1908.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in 64 of the cities and towns of Manitoba is 129, including 8 daily, 1 semi-weekly, 100 weekly, 3 semi-monthly and 17 monthly.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, REGINA.

The PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN, formerly a part of the Northwest Territories, is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by the Province of Alberta, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States), and on the east by Manitoba. Its length from north to south is about 800 miles, and its greatest breadth about 400 miles. Its land area is 242,332 square miles. North of the 54th parallel the country is a region of lakes, swamps and forests, and is practically uninhabited, except by Indians, the white population consisting chiefly of the employes of the Hudson's Bay Company. The annual production of furs from this region is very large. The province is well watered, having numerous streams, lakes and rivers, some navigable. The climate is healthful, although the winters are somewhat severe. The summer days are long, and the great duration of the sunlight brings the crops to maturity in a shorter season than in many countries apparently more favorably situated. The rainfall is usually fully sufficient, especially as the heaviest rains occur during the growing period of the crops. The lumber industry, chiefly handling spruce and small pine, is attaining considerable importance. The acreage under all crops in 1909 was 7,016,272, of which, 6,898,559 were under grain, an increase of over 1,000,000 acres over 1908. The southern portion is unexcelled as a grain growing district. The wheat production in 1909 was 90,215,000 bushels; oats, 105,465,000 bushels; barley, 7,833,000 bushels, and flax, 4,448,700 bushels. In addition to these, large quantities of hay, potatoes, sugar beets and other crops were raised. In the production of wheat in 1909, Saskatchewan was excelled on this continent only by Minnesota and North Dakota, in oats only by Illinois and Iowa. There are 842 grain elevators in the province, having a total capacity of 24,279,000 bushels. The total value of the field and dairy products for 1909 was \$132,539,242. Live stock is also of considerable value, there being, in 1909, 429,776 horses and 594,632 cattle, 233,548 of these being dairy cows, 152,600 sheep, 352,385 hogs and 4,343,642 head of poultry. Coal is mined to some extent, 170,000 tons having been dug in 1909, and there are deposits of petroleum, salt, sulphur and various other minerals. There are between 3000 and 4000 miles of railroads in the province, and extensions are being built as needed. Many thousands of new citizens settle in the province each year, by far the greater number being farmers.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in 104 towns of Saskatchewan is 130, including 8 daily, 2 semi-weekly, 119 weekly and 1 monthly.

YUKON TERRITORY.

Population*12,000

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, DAWSON.

YUKON TERRITORY is bounded on the north by the Arctic Ocean and Mackenzie Territory, on the east by Mackenzie Territory, on the south by Alaska and British Columbia, and on the west by Alaska. Its extreme length from north to south is about 675 miles, its greatest breadth about 625 miles, and its land area 206,427 square miles. It includes the great Klondike gold-producing region. Practically the only industry in Yukon is mining, chiefly for gold; silver and copper are mined to some extent. The amount of gold produced has been decreasing rapidly for some years past. In 1900 the value of the output was \$22,275,000. Since then it has dropped two or three millions per year. In 1908 it was \$3,600,000. This decrease is due to the deposits of gold accessible to the methods of placer mining, hitherto used, having become exhausted. Many companies have been formed recently to prosecute the search for this metal by the more modern methods of hydraulic mining and dredging, also quartz mining. Much machinery has been imported for these purposes, and in a few years the output will no doubt be much increased. Silver has also decreased from \$177,857 in 1900 to \$23,500 in 1907. The production of coal has increased rapidly, and in 1907 was 15,000 tons. There are a number of successful "truck" farms, on which a considerable portion of the vegetables used in the territory are grown, but practically all other agricultural products must be imported. Experiments are being carried on to determine what crops are best suited to the soil and conditions. Oats and barley have been successfully grown. The varieties of wheat so far tested have attained good growth, but have failed to ripen the kernels. Vegetables started under glass, and set out when the summer opens, grow to a large size, the almost continuous sunlight being highly favorable to steady growth.

Three papers are published in the Territory, including 1 daily and 2 weekly.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Population.....331,120

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, FREDERICTON.

NEW BRUNSWICK is bounded north by Quebec, east by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, west and south by the Bay of Fundy, part of Nova Scotia, and Maine. It is 210 miles in length and 180 miles in breadth, and has a coast line of about 500 miles. Its area is 27,174 square miles. Surface generally is undulating, and there is scarcely an elevation on the east coast exceeding 300 feet, while on the north there is a district of mountainous character, consisting of hills of considerable elevation, covered with dense forest, of which there is about 7,500,000 acres, and surrounded by fertile valleys and table lands. The forests are extensive, and lumbering is one of the principal industries. The climate is healthy and the soil fertile, with great agricultural capabilities. The principal cereals, root plants, and vegetables are grown, with apples and the small fruits. The chief grain crop is oats, of which in 1909, 5,682,338 bushels were grown. Buckwheat is also largely grown, the 1909 crop being 1,405,775 bushels. Wheat was 268,079 bushels. Potatoes and turnips produced 8,938,093 and 3,312,862 bushels respectively. The manufacture of cheese, for which New Brunswick has long been famous, is falling off, the production having decreased from 1,910,733 pounds in 1902 to 1,059,540 pounds in 1909, a loss of almost fifty per cent. The production of butter has also decreased. Much attention is given to fruit culture. The area of land under cultivation and the number of farms show a steady increase each year. Ship building, formerly extensively carried on, has declined of late years, owing to the modern practice of building almost all large ships of iron. The fisheries, viz: salmon, smelt, herring and lobster, are second in value only to those of Nova Scotia. Over 30,000 persons are engaged in this industry, and the product is valued at \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000 per year. Coal, antimony, copper, iron, manganese, salt, petroleum and other minerals are found in considerable quantities. Manufactures are chiefly sawed lumber and wooden wares, cotton and woolen goods, refined sugar, rope and cordage, canned goods, polished granite, boots and shoes, edge tools, furniture, paper, castings, machinery, locomotives, etc. Chief exports—lumber, fish, cotton goods, potatoes, butter and eggs, beef and mutton, gypsum, hay, etc.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in New Brunswick is 54, including 9 daily, 1 tri-weekly, 9 semi-weekly, 23 weekly, 2 semi-monthly, 9 monthly and 1 bi-monthly. The places of publication number 17, of which 6, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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NOVA SCOTIA.

Population.....459,574

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, HALIFAX.

NOVA SCOTIA consists of a narrow peninsula, connected with New Brunswick by a narrow isthmus about 16 miles wide, and of the island of Cape Breton. It is bounded on the north by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, on the east and south by the Atlantic, on the west by the Bay of Fundy and New Brunswick. It is 300 miles long and from 80 to 100 wide, with an area of 20,907 square miles, or about 13,000,000 acres, of which 5,000,000 are fit for tillage. The rest is nearly all covered with forest, from which as much as 400,000,000 feet are cut each year. The wood is mostly spruce, fir, hemlock and pine, with some birch, oak and maple. A great part of the wood is used in the ship-building industries of the province. Much is also used for the manufacture of pulp, which is exported to paper mills in the other provinces and the United States. The lumber cut in 1909 was valued at \$2,000,000. The Cobequid Range runs through the interior, the soil on both sides of it being very fertile; which is also the case in the beautiful valley of the Annapolis river. The soil is very rich and productive, and agricultural productions are extensive, wheat, rye, oats, barley, buckwheat, corn, vegetables, and fruit growing abundantly. The farmers are industrious and prosperous, and all but a very small percentage own their own farms. Oats are largely grown, 138,000 acres being sown to this crop in 1909, producing 4,140,000 bushels. Potatoes on 45,500 acres produced 9,100,000 bushels, and turnips, mangels and carrots on 20,000 acres produced 10,300,000 bushels. Buckwheat, peas, beans, wheat and barley are also grown. Dairy farming is increasing, as is the production of live stock. The dairy and live stock products are worth \$6,000,000 per year. Fruit growing, especially in the Annapolis valley, is an industry of great importance. Apples are exported in large quantities, being in great demand in England. The crop of this fruit ranges from 750,000 to 1,000,000 barrels annually, and is worth over \$2,000,000. The principal minerals are coal, iron and gold. Coal is abundant, and is freely worked. Over 12,000 men are employed in the coal mining industry, and 6,000,000 tons were dug in 1909. Gold was produced in 1909 to the value of \$250,000, which is about the average for recent years. Iron is found in large quantities and is practically inexhaustible; it is of a fine quality and commands the highest price in the market. Manganese, gypsum, and roofing slate abound. Manufactures are numerous, and include railroad cars, coarse cloth, flannels, blankets, carpets, boots and shoes, wood pulp, ships and boats, saddlery, furniture and farm implements. The fisheries are reckoned among the richest in the world, and average about \$8,000,000 per year. The capital city, Halifax, is situated on the west side of the harbor of that name, and contains about 50,000 inhabitants. The harbor is one of the finest in existence, over half a mile in width at its narrowest part, and large enough to contain the navies of the world. Halifax is the winter port for the direct mail steamers, and has direct communication with Liverpool, Boston, Baltimore, Quebec and the West Indies. As a summer resort it is yearly becoming better known; its suburbs furnish the pleasantest of drives and superior bathing facilities, and its public gardens have been pronounced by those who have visited them the most beautiful on this side of the Atlantic.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Nova Scotia is 81, including 13 daily, 1 tri-weekly, 3 semi-weekly, 51 weekly, 2 fortnightly, 2 semi-monthly, 3 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 38, of which 16, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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ONTARIO.

Population..... 2,182,947

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, TORONTO.

ONTARIO is bounded on the east by Quebec and the Labrador peninsula, north and north west by Hudson's Bay and Keewatin, southwest and south by the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence river, west by Manitoba, and has an area of 220,000 square miles, exclusive of its water surface. It is the most populous and wealthy province of the Dominion of Canada, and contains many large cities. Ottawa, population about 80,000, is the seat of government and capital of the Dominion. The surface is mostly undulating, traversed by the Laurentian Hills and Blue Mountains, but except in the neighborhood of Lake Superior and Georgian Bay these nowhere exceed a few hundred feet in height. The agricultural resources are very great. Three-fourths of the present area of habitation is fertile, while an immense region beyond is capable of cultivation. New Ontario, as the northern and the northwestern districts are called, has scarcely been touched by the plow, but settlement is now beginning, and the farms which have been cut out of the forests show that it will be fully equal to any part of Canada in productiveness. Oats are the chief grain crop of the province, amounting in 1908 to 96,626,419 bushels, out of a total crop of all cereals of about 160,000,000 bushels. Corn, barley and wheat come next with about 20,000,000 bushels each. Some buckwheat and rye are also grown. Potatoes and other root crops, peas, beans, and fodder corn and hay yield heavily, the produce per acre being usually well above the average in other countries. There are no more successful horticulturists than those of Ontario, who produce about seventy-five per cent of all the fruit grown in Canada. About 350,000 acres are devoted to fruit growing, and almost all the fruits of the temperate zone flourish luxuriantly. The apple is the greatest fruit crop. In addition to those used in the province, over 1,000,000 barrels of apples are exported, chiefly to Great Britain, although many go to the western provinces and to the United States. Grapes are another large crop, estimated at 20,000 tons each year. Horses and cattle are raised in large numbers, and of the finest quality, and have taken many first prizes at international shows. The dairy industry is very large, and much care is given to improving the breed of dairy cattle. There are 1177 cheese factories in Ontario, which in 1908 made 120,624,436 pounds of cheese. The total value of dairy products ranges from thirty to thirty-five million dollars each year. There are over 100,000 square miles of forest land in the province, and the cut of pine alone is about 700,000,000 feet per year. There are large areas of spruce, which is cut for pulp wood, and supplies fourteen pulp mills and twenty-two paper mills in the province. The fisheries, chiefly on the great lakes, employ over 3,000 persons, and the 1908 catch was worth \$2,100,078. The mineral treasures are exceedingly rich and varied; iron, copper, nickel, lead and silver are abundant. The silver produced in 1908, almost wholly from the Cobalt region, was valued at \$9,136,880, about ninety per cent. of the whole output of the Dominion, and about eleven per cent. of the production of the world. There were produced in the same year copper, value \$1,071,140; nickel, \$1,866,059, and pig iron, \$1,390,839. Some gold has been found between Georgian Bay and the Ottawa river; petroleum, salt, rock salt and peat beds also exist. The production of the oil fields is declining, but still reaches nearly 20,000,000 gallons each year. In 1908 the yield was 18,479,547 gallons, valued at \$703,773. The production of natural gas is increasing, its value in 1908 being \$983,616, thirty per cent. more than the year preceding. Mica is extensively worked. Marble, said to be equal to that of Carrara, is quarried. Galena, plumbago, and various other minerals exist. The water power is widely distributed and abundant. Manufactures are rapidly increasing in number and importance, among the principal being agricultural implements of all kinds, wagons, carriages, railroad stock (including locomotives), cotton and woolen goods, leather, furniture, paper and pulp, soap, wooden ware, etc. Transportation facilities are abundant. In addition to the great trunk lines, the Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian Pacific, every important section has competing lines stretching out to it. The province is blessed with a magnificent system of waterways, both natural and artificial. It has over 1,300 miles of water front on the lakes and the St. Lawrence. Surveys are being made for a ship canal across the province, to connect Georgian Bay, on Lake Huron, with Montreal. It is to have a depth of twenty-two feet, and in addition to its use as a canal is expected to produce power to the extent of over a million horse power.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, CHARLOTTETOWN.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND is bounded north by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, east by Cape Breton Island, south by Nova Scotia proper, and west by New Brunswick. The greatest length is 130 miles; greatest breadth, 34 miles; least breadth, 4 miles; area about 2,134 square miles. The surface is gently undulating, a large part of it formerly forest, but the forest area has been greatly reduced by lumbering operations, fires, etc. The soil is a light loam, not known to contain available minerals, but remarkably rich and particularly favorable for the growth of grasses, and practically the whole is fit for cultivation. Principal productions are oats, wheat, barley, hay, pork, potatoes, butter, cheese, starch, horses, sheep, etc. Oats, as in all the eastern provinces, are the chief crop; the 1909 production being 6,293,000 bushels. Wheat was but 525,000 bushels. Turnips are the principal root crop, being much in requisition for the dairy cattle. The production of butter and cheese is very large, about 3,000,000 pounds of cheese and more than 600,000 pounds of butter being manufactured each year. There are valuable fisheries, especially of cod, mackerel, lobsters, and oysters; upwards of twenty thousand barrels of oysters and over 2,800,000 pounds of canned lobsters being shipped annually. Tweeds, flannels, pottery, boots and shoes, agricultural implements and domestic articles, sufficient only for home use, are manufactured; ship building was formerly carried on to a considerable extent, but has latterly become much reduced.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Prince Edward Island is 14, including 3 daily, 1 semi-weekly, 9 weekly and 1 monthly. The places of publication number 4, of which 2, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, QUEBEC.

QUEBEC is bounded north by Hudson Bay, east by Labrador and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, south by New Brunswick, Maine, New Hampshire and New York, southwest by the Ottawa river, which separates it from Ontario. Length from east to west 700 to 1,000 miles, breadth about 300 miles; area about 188,688 square miles. Surface south of St. Lawrence generally hilly, northern part mountainous and rocky and abounding in rivers and small lakes. A great part of the surface is covered with forests. The soil in many districts is rich, and cereals grow well. Oats, potatoes and hay are the chief crops. The crops produced in 1907 were oats, 41,827,762 bushels; barley, 2,885,347 bushels; wheat and buckwheat, each about 1,800,000 bushels; corn, 1,376,892 bushels; peas, over 1,000,000 bushels; potatoes, 22,710,753 bushels, and hay, over 4,000,000 tons. Hops and apples are extensively grown. Cattle raising and cheese dairying are important industries. Copper and mica abound in the eastern townships, and iron almost everywhere. Asbestos is one of the valuable minerals. In 1907 about \$2,500,000 worth of this useful mineral was produced. Lead, silver, platinum, zinc, etc., are found, and there are large deposits of phosphate of lime in the Ottawa river district. Gold is found in small amounts in several places. Lumbering is the principal industry, and its products form a great part of the exports. The fisheries are also important and rank next to those of New Brunswick. Their value in 1907 was \$2,175,035. Ship building is carried on in Quebec. The principal manufactures are cloth, linen, furniture, leather, sawed timber, flax, iron and hardware, paper, pulp, chemicals, boots and shoes, cotton and woolen goods, agricultural implements, etc. Quebec is one of the world's great centers in the manufacture of paper and pulp, its immense forests of spruce and other pulp woods and its abundant water power combining to give it unsurpassed advantages in this industry. Montreal, though not the capital, is the largest city in the province and the chief commercial city of the Dominion.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Quebec is 152, including 18 daily, 1 tri-weekly, 3 semi-weekly, 95 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 31 monthly, 1 bi-monthly and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 57, of which 22, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

CAPITAL, ST. JOHN'S.

NEWFOUNDLAND lies to the eastward of the Dominion of Canada and comprises the island of Newfoundland, in the Atlantic Ocean, at the mouth of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and a strip 800 miles long and about 30 miles wide along the eastern coast of the Labrador peninsula. Newfoundland is bounded on the east, north and south by the Atlantic ocean, and on the west by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Quebec, and the territory of Ungava. The extreme length of the island of Newfoundland is 350 miles; average breadth 130 miles, and area 42,000 square miles. The surface is generally rugged, with numerous lakes and rivers. The central and eastern portion of the interior is but thinly wooded, and consists in part of elevated plains called "barrens." The river valleys and the western portion of the island have a considerable growth of timber, chiefly spruce and birch of moderate size. The soil is fertile near many of the lakes and rivers, and in many places farming is profitable. The area of the cultivated land is rapidly increasing, having more than doubled within the past ten years. About 200,000 acres is now under cultivation or pasturage. Wheat, oats and barley grow well; also potatoes and green crops generally; apples and small fruits are profitable. Hay to the value of over \$1,000,000 is grown every year. The annual potato crop is worth \$375,000, turnips \$60,000 to \$70,000. The lumber industry, while not large, is growing, and the exports amount to about \$200,000 yearly. Much of the spruce is also made into paper pulp. Copper and iron are mined; the other minerals comprise lead, gold, silver, manganese, nickel, plumbago, marble, limestone, petroleum, coal, talc, slate, etc. The iron ore in 1906 was worth \$966,625, the copper ore \$365,345, the total value of the minerals being about \$1,500,000 annually. The fisheries, both on the Grand Bank and inshore, are very valuable. The seal fishery employs a large number of vessels. The Newfoundland cod fishery is the most extensive of the kind in the world. The aggregate annual catch of cod in North American waters is estimated at about 150,000,000 fish, worth about \$15,000,000. The principal exports are fish and fish-oils, seal-oil and skins, and other fisheries products, and form about 80 per cent. of the total exports. The total exports of all fishery products, including the whale and seal products, in 1904, were valued at \$9,574,755. Manufactures are limited and consist chiefly of saw mill products. The total value of manufactured goods, including about \$500,000 worth of pulp and paper manufactured for its own use by an English publishing concern, is from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000. The coast of Labrador, included in the colony, comprises about 120,000 square miles, but has only 4,211 inhabitants. These are engaged in the cod and seal fisheries and, during the winter months, in trapping.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Newfoundland is 18, including 4 daily, 9 weekly, 4 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 6, of which 3, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

CAPITAL, HAMILTON.

A group of islands in the North Atlantic Ocean, 660 miles southeast of New York. Although said to be 365 in number, they occupy a space only 18 miles by $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles. The largest has an area of 9,000 acres, the whole group containing only about 12,000. They are of coral formation, on the summit of a submarine mountain. The climate is delightful, without extremes of heat or cold, the temperature ranging from 55 to 85 degrees, and the islands are a favorite winter and summer resort for Americans and Canadians. Although a governor is appointed by the British crown, the islands have their own representative government for local affairs. The soil produces almost every description of fruits, flowers and vegetables abundantly. Onions, potatoes and celery are the chief crops, and the culture of flowers, especially lilies, for the American market, is a large and growing industry.

CAPITAL, HAVANA.

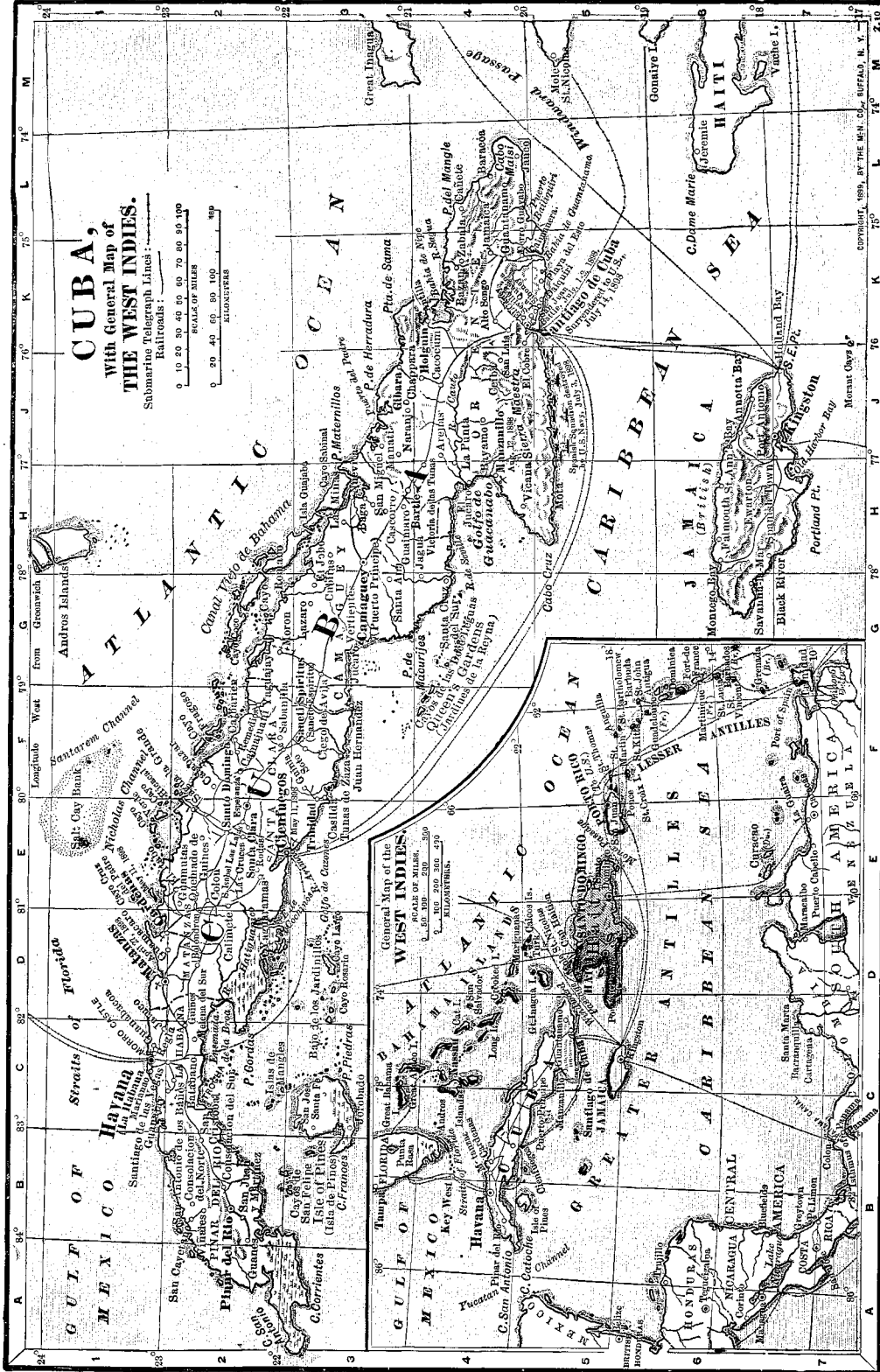
CUBA, the largest of the West India Islands, is situated about 100 miles south of Florida, from which it is separated by the Florida Straits. It is 800 miles in length from east to west; greatest breadth at Cape Cruz, 110 miles; average width from 50 to 60 miles, except at its western extremity where it is about 30 miles. Total area, 44,164 square miles. A mountain range intersects it longitudinally. The climate is hot and dry, and healthy only in the interior. Snow is never known to fall, but frost occurs occasionally on the highest points. The rainy season is mainly confined to July, August and September. The mountains are rich in minerals and there are abundant forests of mahogany, ebony, cedar and other valuable woods. The vegetation is exceedingly luxuriant; the principal cereal is corn, of which two crops are obtained in a year. Rice is also produced in large quantities, but the principal crops are sugar, coffee and tobacco, and of these the first is by far the most important. The exports of sugar in 1907 were valued at \$69,554,419; tobacco at \$28,913,443. The commerce of Cuba is rapidly increasing, especially with the United States, which furnishes about half of the goods imported and takes almost all of the exports. The principal imports are cereals, meats, cotton and cotton goods, and machinery. The total imports for 1908 were \$85,218,391, the total exports \$94,603,324. Cuba forms an exception to the rule in the West Indian islands, in that the white people far outnumber the negroes. About seventy per cent. of the population is white.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC.

Population, *\$800,000.

CAPITAL, SANTO DOMINGO.

(For Map, see Cuba.)

The DOMINICAN REPUBLIC, or SANTO DOMINGO, occupies the eastern and the larger part of the island of Hayti, and has an area of 18,045 square miles, almost double the area of the Republic of Hayti. The central and northern parts are mountainous, but the valley lands and the plains along the northern coast are extremely fertile, and abundant crops of tropical and sub-tropical fruits, vegetables, etc., are grown. The principal products are sugar, cacao, bananas and tobacco. The value of the 1909 crop of sugar was \$3,500,000. All of it was exported to the United States. Cacao is produced chiefly in the northern part of the island, and most of it goes to Germany, the rest to the United States and France. The 1909 crop was valued at \$4,500,000. Bananas, to the value of \$3,000,000, were shipped to the United States, which takes all the crop. The tobacco is all shipped to Germany. It is grown chiefly in the vicinity of Santiago, and in 1909 was worth over \$1,000,000. Other products were coffee, \$350,000, and beeswax, \$140,000. About \$1,000,000 worth of hardwoods and other miscellaneous products are exported each year. The total imports for the year 1908 were valued at \$5,127,463, of which more than half comes from the United States, Germany and England each having about 18 per cent of this business, and France, Italy and Spain furnish the rest. The forests produce large quantities of valuable woods, among which mahogany, satin-wood, logwood and cedar are the most prominent. The mineral resources have been neglected, although deposits of gold, copper, iron and coal are known to exist. A railroad in the northern portion, and another along the southern coast connect the chief cities in those districts. Although political disturbances were formerly frequent, there have been none of importance in recent years, since the United States took charge of the customs, and the government has now a surplus over the necessary expenses. Crops are more abundant and of better quality, and commerce is increasing.

HAYTI occupies the western or smaller part of the island known as Hayti, and has an area of 10,240 square miles. Ninety per cent. of the population is of the negro race. Although much of the land is mountainous and rugged, and covered with dense forests, the soil, where cleared and cultivated, is remarkably fertile, and large crops of coffee, cotton, cacao, sugar and tobacco are grown. Large quantities of valuable timber, consisting of mahogany, cedar and various dye-woods, the products of the forests, are also exported. Hayti imported goods in 1908 to the value of \$4,701,160, and her exports were valued at \$3,478,848. The mineral deposits, which are valuable, have been but little developed.

The most important of the British West India Islands, situated 90 miles south of Cuba. Its length is 145 miles, the greatest width 50 miles. Area 4,250 square miles, of which 843,907 acres, or over 1,300 square miles are devoted to tillage or pasture, 28,000 acres of this to sugar cane, 25,000 acres to coffee, 60,000 acres to bananas and 11,000 to cocoanut palms. It is traversed by mountains in all directions, the highest of which (Blue Mountain) reaches an elevation of 7,360 feet. There are numerous other peaks varying from 2,000 to 6,000 feet. The soil in the valleys is very productive and vegetation extremely luxuriant. Most of the staple products of tropical climates are grown. Jamaica is famous for its coffee. The 1909 reports show a production of 6,144,432 pounds, valued at \$440,000. In addition to sugar and bananas, which are the chief products, dye-woods, cocoa-nuts, coffee, cocoa, ginger and other spices, rum, fruits, etc., are largely exported. In 1909 the production of sugar was over 10,000 tons, valued at more than \$500,000; rum, 1,312,169 gallons, value about \$375,000; bananas over 16,000,000 bunches, value \$4,400,000. The total exports in the year ending in March 1909, were more than \$11,000,000, of which 57 per cent went to the United States. The imports, consisting chiefly of provisions and manufactured goods, were \$12,000,000. The United States supplied 46 per cent and Great Britain 41 per cent. There is an abundance of timber, including all tropical hard woods; there are some copper mines. Fisheries and manufacturing interests are very small.

If the publication sought has general circulation, as distinguished from special or class circulation, it can as a rule be found in one of the three lists in this group, if it is not in the one first consulted.

In the following exposition, I point out two gigantic obstacles that stand between the average manufacturer and low cost of distribution. Although these barriers can never be swept away there *is* a way to *avoid* them, and I explain it. THERE is no use to deny the fact that the manufacturer of to-day is facing an advertising crisis.

Manufacturers used to find half page and page copy sufficiently large for exploiting their goods. Now they use double-spreads, multi-colored inserts and every expensive method known to commercial art and printing, in order to accomplish the same results that small space and modest presentation once produced.

We cannot blame the manufacturer for resorting to extreme

measures to win business in the crowded field he has entered, but let me ask you, where will he ultimately wind up if the present tendency toward increased space continues a few years longer?

I am presenting no bugbear, but a self-evident truth, when I state that the manufacturer to-day faces an *advertising crisis*. And nobody realizes this fact so keenly as the manufacturer himself—the man who puts up the cash to conduct the advertising.

How the Woman Is Denied Commercial Suffrage in Cities

EVERY retail dealer's existence depends upon the consumer's patronage. Therefore his customers should be allowed to say what particular line of goods he shall carry.

Result, the manufacturer had to efface his individuality or lose a large volume of trade. In either case he stood to lose heavily, so elected to discontinue business with this particular store.

Such misfortunes menace a great many manufacturers, and the condition is one which cannot be overcome. It is the outcome of modern merchandising methods and it will be with us just so long as we have large centers of retail merchandising distribution.

You cannot overcome it. Yet you *can avoid* it.

The avoidance is to be accomplished by concentrating your advertising upon the territory wherein large stores are not found and where the consumer who reads your advertisements knows her dealer and influences him; where the consumer's vote, that you spend your money to secure, really *counts* in deciding whether or not the local dealer shall handle, push and sell your goods.

Reaches One In Seven Families

Next Enters the Law of Diminishing Returns

THE second big obstacle that is making distribution very expensive for you is the operation of what is termed the "Law of Diminishing Returns."

Let me explain:

Ten dollars spent in cultivating an acre of soil brings a certain net profit. If you spend twenty dollars in cultivating that same acre the next year, you will increase your net profit. The third year, a further increase in expenditure will further increase your net profit. Amphibious Magazines

AMPHIBIOUS (from Greek *amphi*, double; and *bios*, life) is the term for those animals which we find existing indiscriminately in two widely differing environments, with only partial adaptation to either.

Scientists tell us that the amphibian types were formerly much more numerous and important than to-day. Amphibians were transitional types. They properly thrived in the times when the greatest areas were not yet defined as either land or water; and many of them attained enormous size. Some of the largest creatures that ever existed were amphibians.

But, as conditions over the greatest areas became clearly defined, higher specialization came in and amphibian types, which did not specialize, were driven out. Much more complete adaptation was required for competition in either environment. So, except for a few petty species, the amphibians completely vanished.

Attention of advertisers is called to this short extract from natural history because:

The advertising areas of this country have developed and are continuing to develop such clearly defined characteristics that we generally recognize two distinct advertising environments: that of the cities and that of the country communities.

We attest this by the specialized advertising of a large number of articles, such as electric automobiles and concert grand pianos, in the cities almost exclusively and by promoting private lighting plants, gas pumps and so on exclusively in the country communities.

But, in spite of the general underlying recognition and such particular attestations, the largest part of our national advertising remains amphibious.

For it is persistently maintained by the magazines with mixed circulations, which carry the bulk of the national advertising, that since most advertised articles are consumed both in the cities and in the country communities, therefore the same advertising will do for both. Or, in other words, it is claimed that the same advertising can compete indiscriminately in each of the two different environments with only partial adaptation to either.

There are evident at least three fundamental, natural differences in the method of supply of a large number of articles consumed both in the cities and in the country communities, which render it impossible for the same advertising now to be adequately adapted to compete most profitably in either field against the specialized advertising in either:

The increasingly dissimilar economic position of the same article in the city and in the country community.

The different form in which it may be supplied.

The often different reason for which it is desired.

To illustrate by a specific case: The leading woman's magazine of mixed circulation, in a letter to an advertiser, recognizes the distinct characteristics of its city and its small town circulation by quoting its circulation in towns of 10,000 and under; and it claims that over forty per cent of its circulation is in such towns.

Radiators and window-shades are two common commodities used alike by this magazine's readers, both in cities and in country communities. But, when the vast majority of its readers in the cities must live in apartments and there merely rent radiators and window-shades, can the campaign for either of these articles take the same form indiscriminately in the cities and in the country communities?

The second difference—that of the form in which an article may be supplied.

This magazine often advertises flour for bread. Bread is baked in almost all of the homes of the forty odd per cent of its readers who live in the country communities; in the cities, it is an easily ascertained fact that from seventy-five to ninety-five per cent of the bread is baked in bakeries, in which the choice of the flour cannot be exercised by the eaters. Can any "amphibious" advertising of articles such as flour be most efficiently adapted to meet the conditions in both communities?

The talking machine, in the city, is an unimportant, subsidiary form of entertainment; in the small community it occupies a far more eminent rank as an entertainer. Is it possible that the same copy in an "amphibious" medium can most effectively rouse the interest both from the city woman and from the country woman, when their reasons for desiring the instrument are very distinct?

This could be developed indefinitely. You have merely to turn the pages of any magazine of mixed circulation to see page after page of "amphibious" advertising—weak, indefinite and colorless in comparison with what it ought to be from the unconfessed feeling that the advertisement has to appeal to two constituencies, in which either the economic position of the article is dissimilar; in which the form in which it is supplied varies; or, in which it is desired for altered reasons.

The weakness is precisely the weakness of the vanished amphibian monsters—the endeavor to exist indiscriminately in two differing environments, with only partial adaptation to either.

By Henry D. Wilson, Advertising Manager *Cosmopolitan Magazine*

(Note by Editor:—Mr. Wilson has been with *Cosmopolitan* 23 Years)

MMAGAZINE advertising was discovered, not by the publisher himself, nor by any employee.

It was discovered by the business man who wanted to reach people he did not know—people who undoubtedly would prove to be customers for his goods.

With him at the time of his discovery was another business man who was anxious to save postage, while proclaiming his story to all the then uninhabited United States.

So much for the discovery of magazine advertising.

These main qualities continue to be, largely, the big advantages of magazine advertising—to reach good people you do not know—to do it certainly and economically.

Let us now take up the latter-day aspect of magazine advertising.

Magazine advertising becomes a generic term covering weeklies, bi-monthlies and monthlies. The sizes of these publications today range indefinitely—though, strictly speaking, the standard magazines are those with a type page of 5½x8. These are conceded universally to be standard magazines and are justly so called because of their permanent and widespread popularity and their extraordinary length of life.

Magazine advertising is generally conceded to have been of exceptional value to all manufacturers who have used it consistently and persistently. However, it is not without its victories for retailers also, as is witnessed by its continued use by such firms as—Best & Co., Tiffany, Wanamaker, Sears, Roebuck & Co. and National Cloak & Suit Co.

Magazine advertising has also done big things for jobbers who have used it in a thoro' manner, as is evidenced by the popularity of the "Keen Kutter" brand of hardware, handled by Simmons Hardware Co., and Onyx Hosiery, handled by Lord & Taylor.

Gentlemen:

The price of the daily edition of The Chicago Record-Herald was reduced on October 3rd, 1910, from two cents to one cent a copy.

Since the reduction in price, the high standard of the news and other departments of the paper has been maintained and a number of features have been added that strengthen The Record-Herald's position as the leading family newspaper of the Mid-West.

The growth in circulation has been phenomenal. The last day at two cents, Saturday, October 1, the net sold circulation was 138,041. On October 31 the net sold circulation was 172,852, on November 30, 178,196, on December 31, 198,162, a gain of 60,121 net sold copies per day in three months.

The Chicago Record-Herald's circulation, unlike that of two of its competitors, does not contain a single copy of "coupon" circulation, which involves the purchase by a single buyer of thousands upon thousands of papers from which the coupons are clipped, the rest of the paper being sold as waste.

The net sold circulation of The Sunday Record-Herald on December 25th was 210,044 copies, a gain of 23,706 in three months.

It is usually estimated that one copy of a family newspaper is read by three and one-third

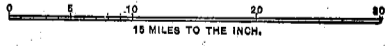


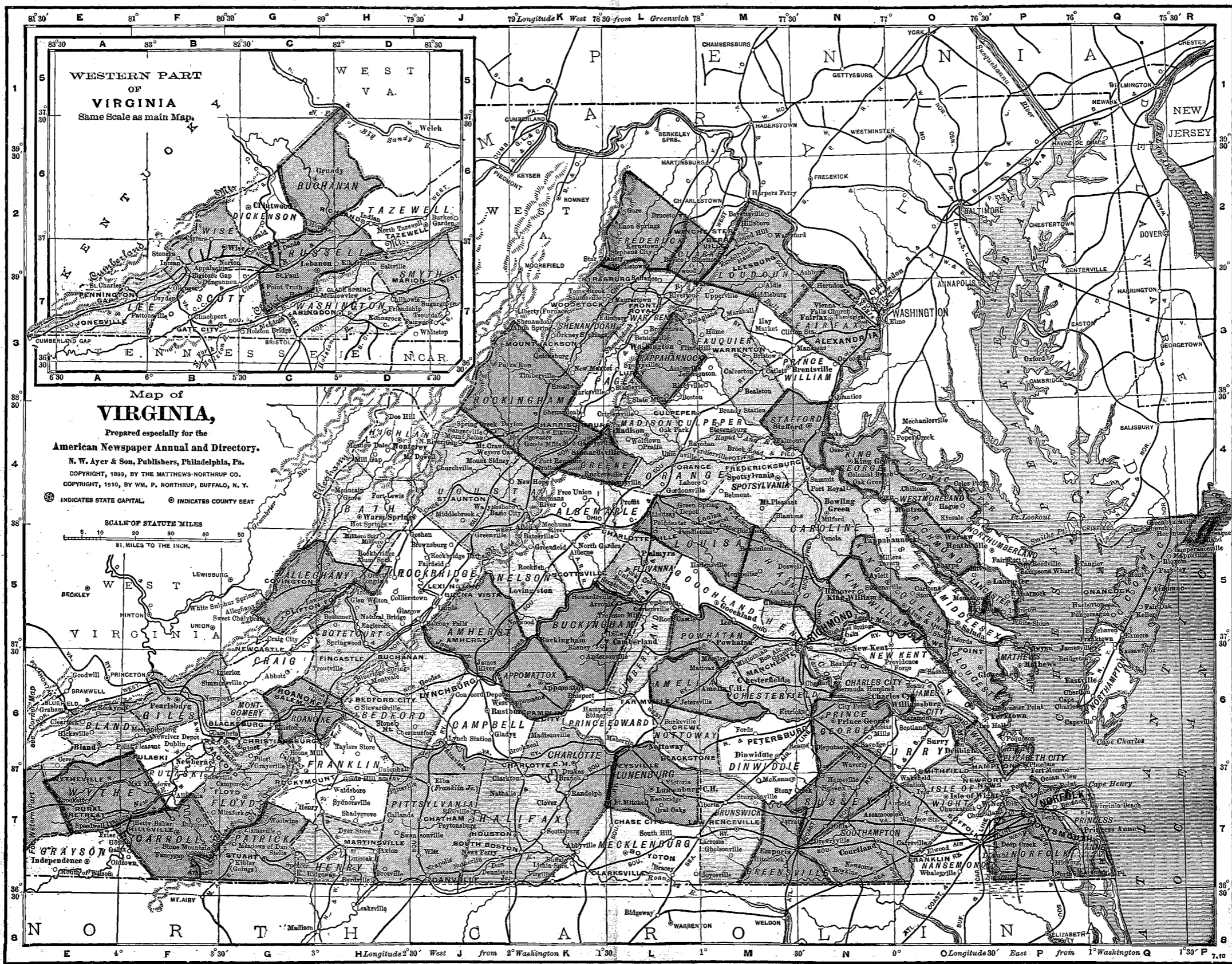
Map of VERMONT,

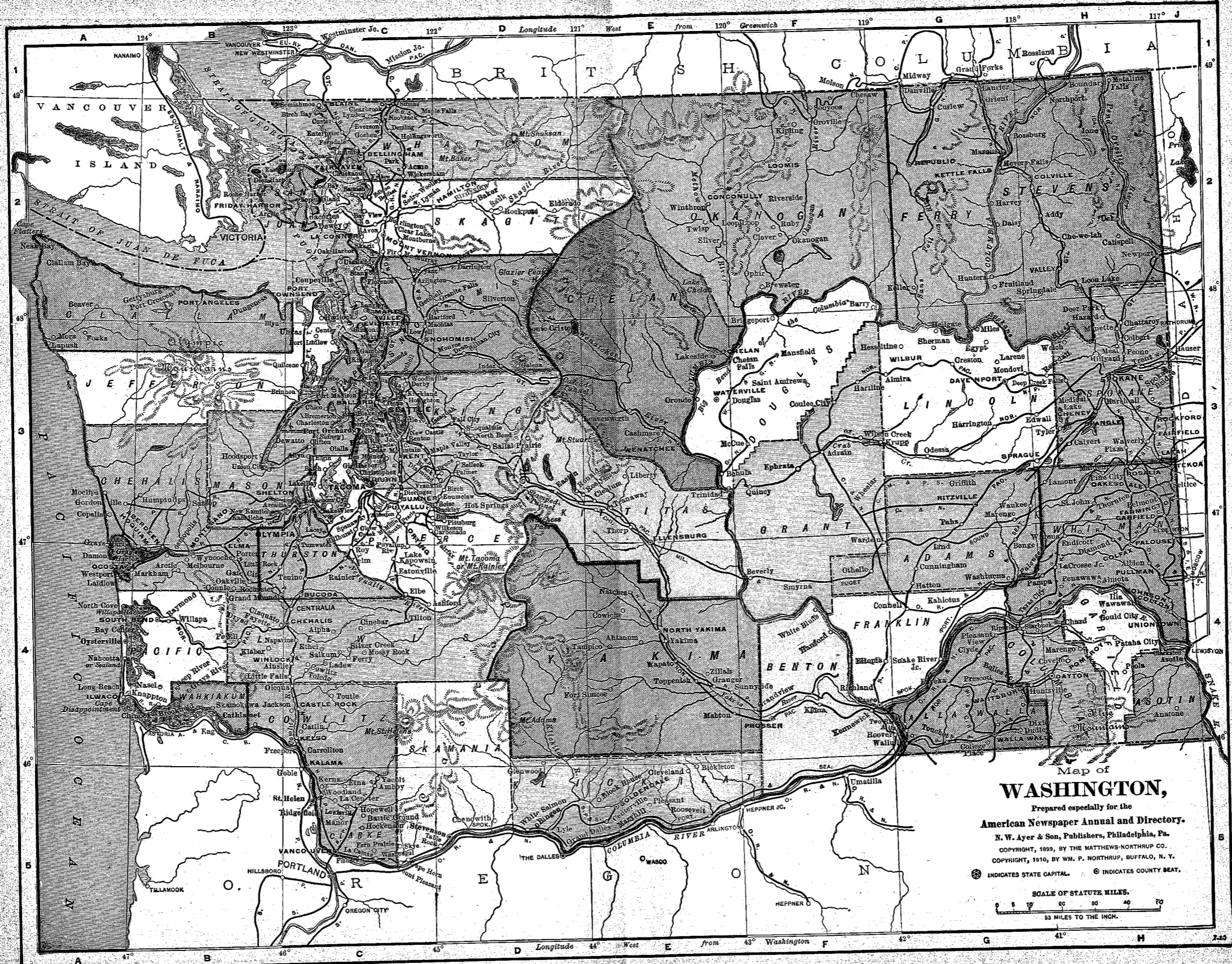

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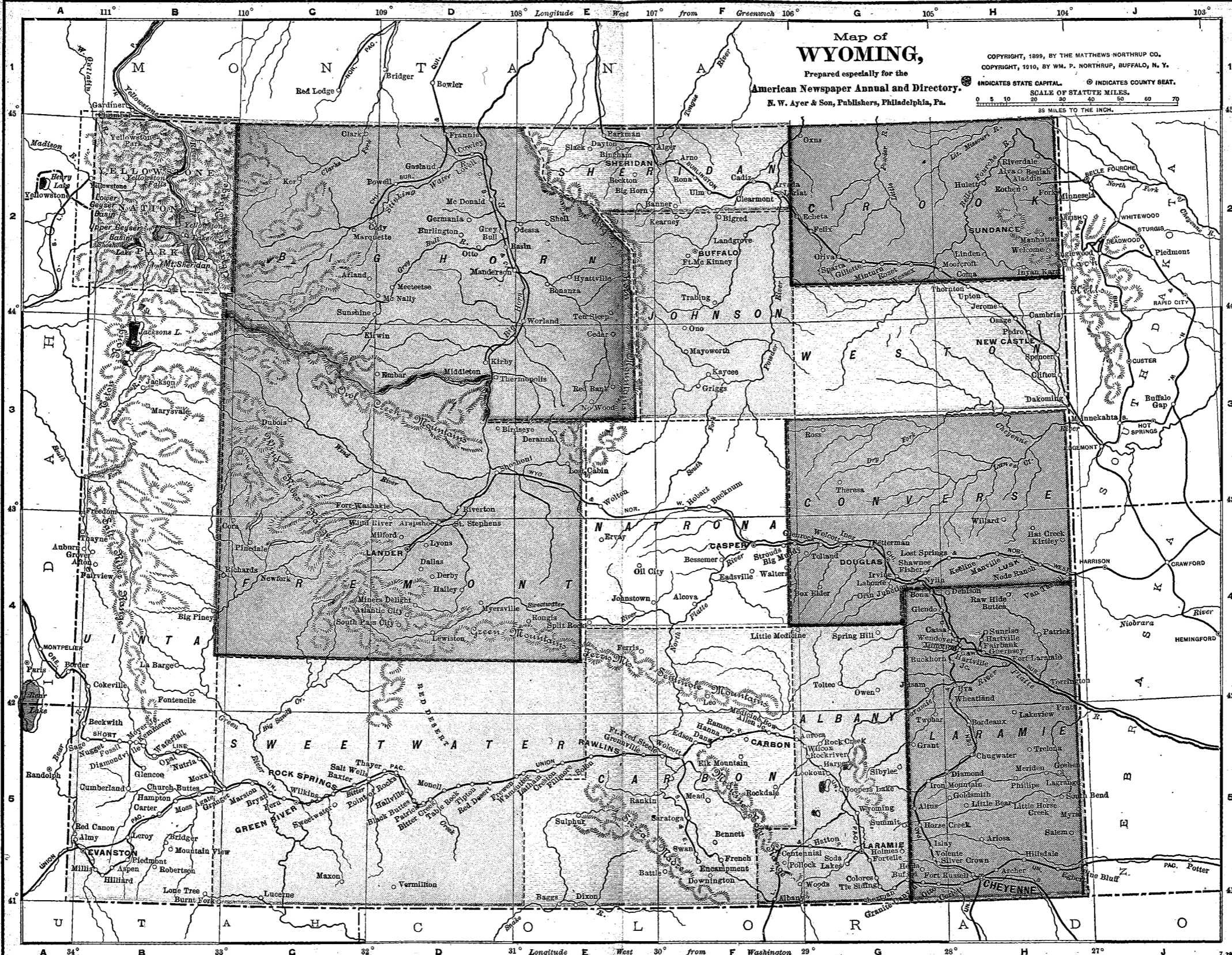

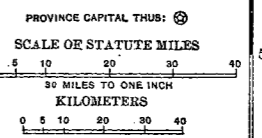

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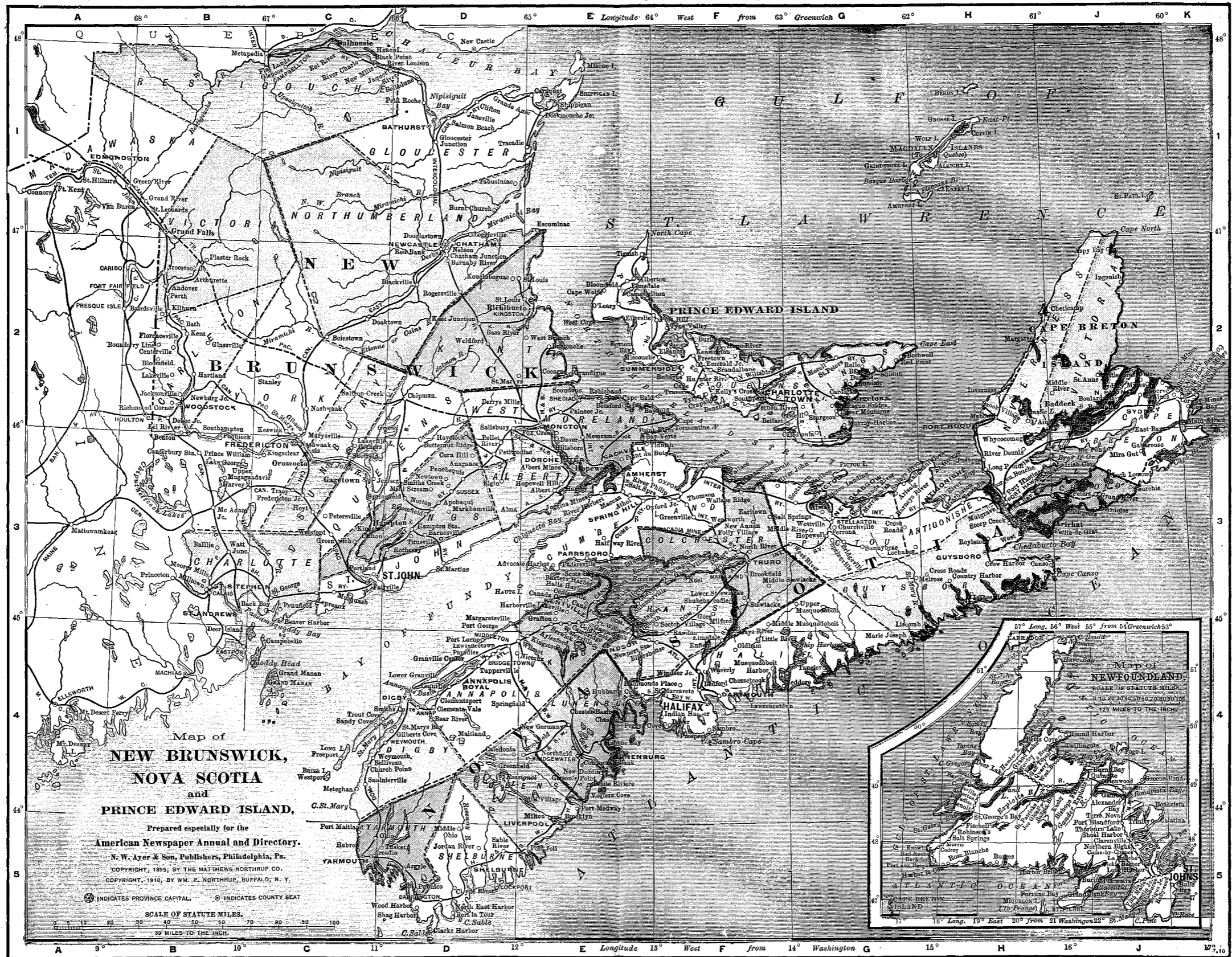

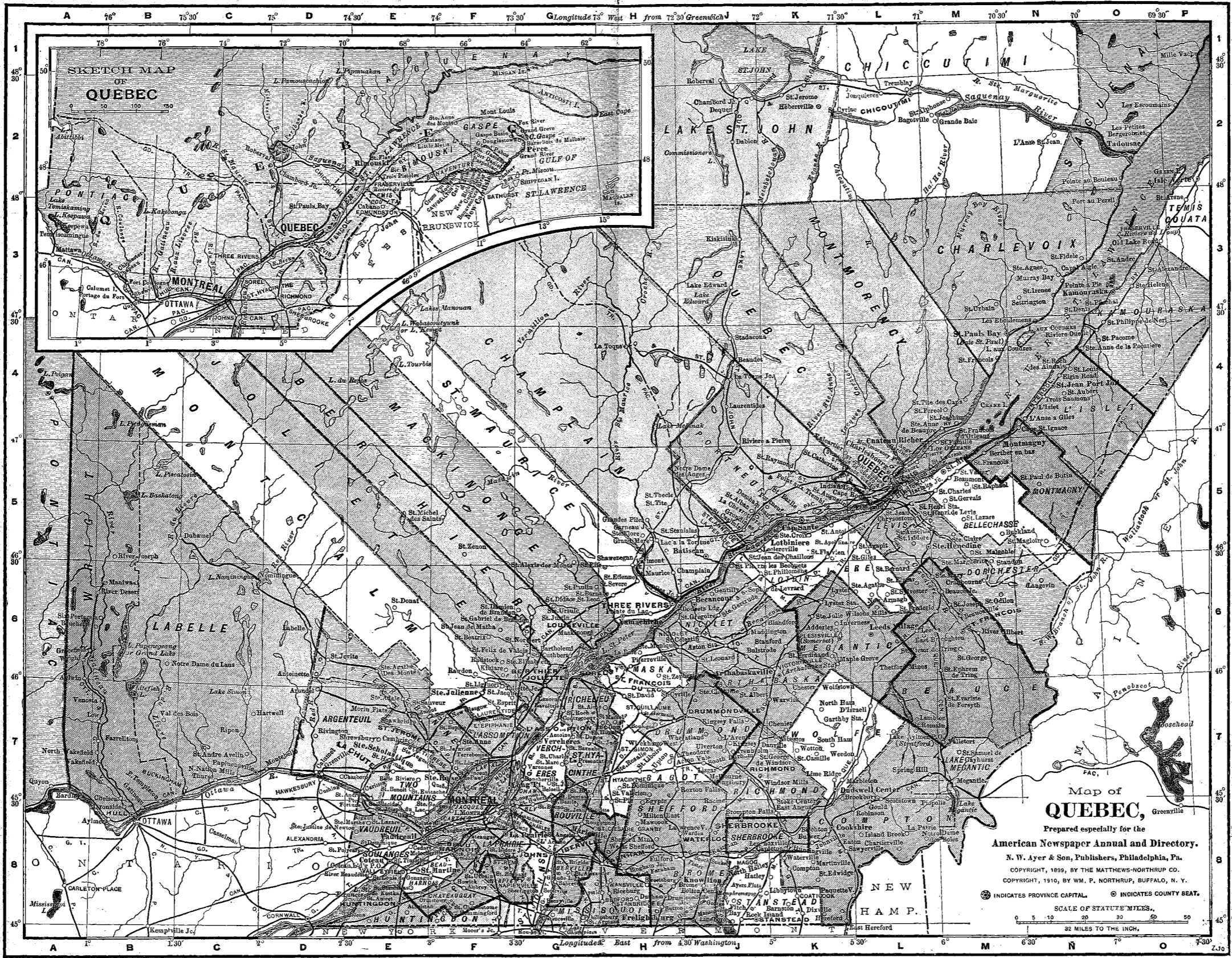

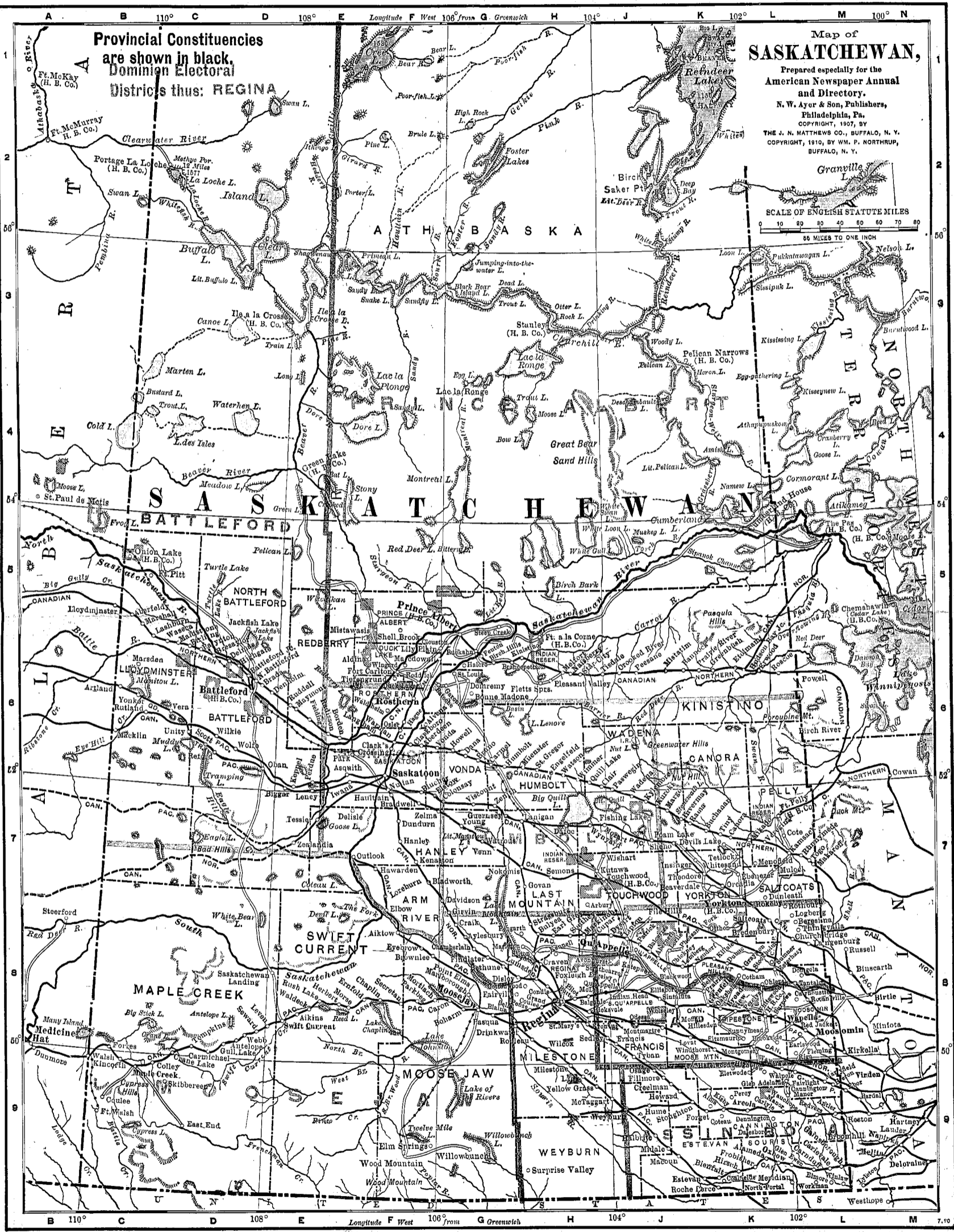

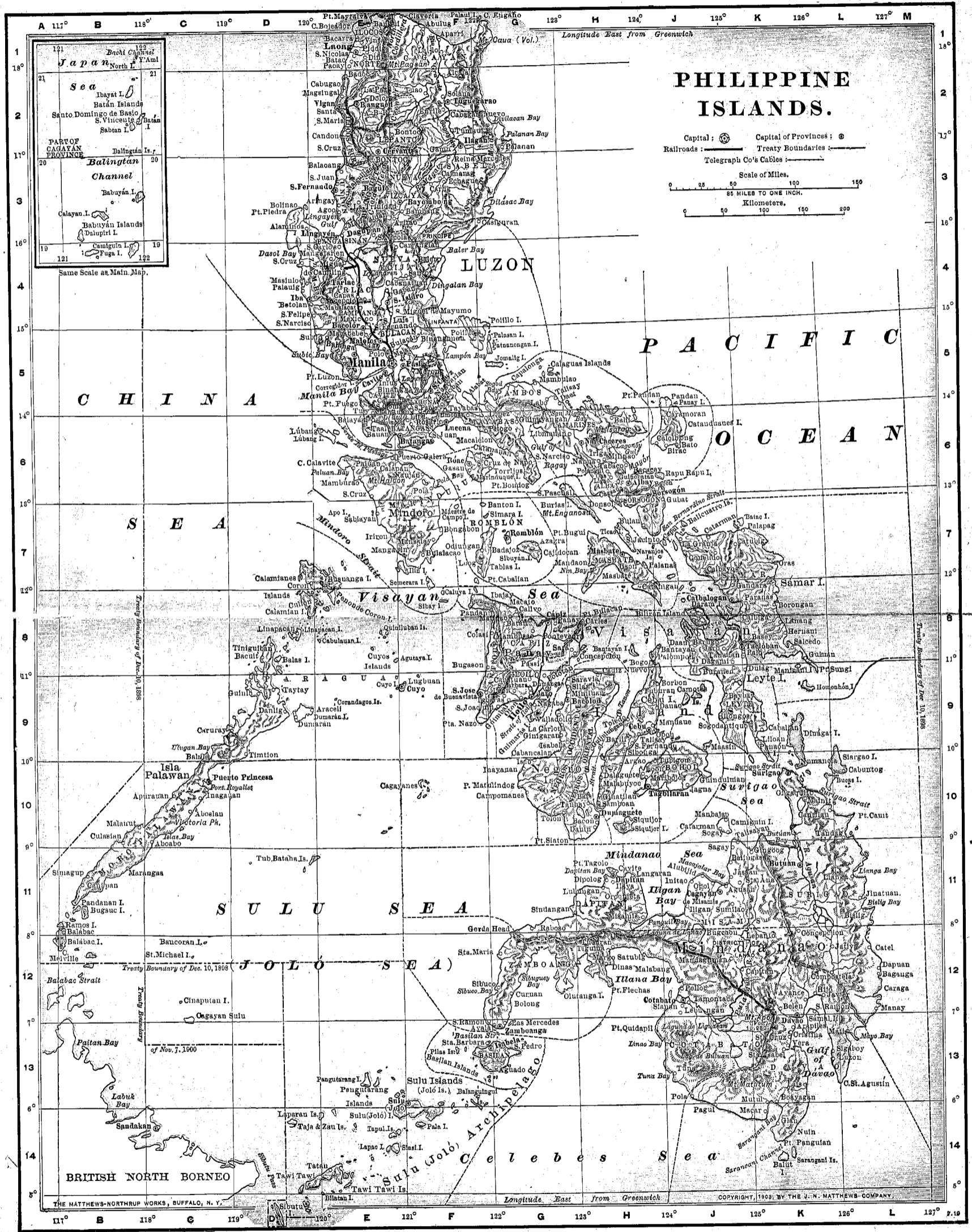
Map of SASKATCHEWAN,

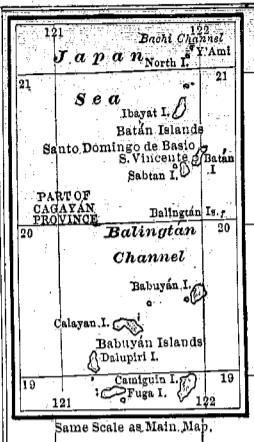
