ALABAMA is bounded north by Tennessee, east by Georgia and Florida, south by Florida and the Gulf of Mexico, and west by Mississippi. Its extreme length north to south is 336 miles, breadth varying from about 150 to 200 miles; land area, 51,540 square miles. The Alleghany range enters the State at the northeast, and extends toward the centre, finally losing itself in mere hills; then follows a tract of rolling prairies, interspersed with pine barrens and exceedingly rich alluvial bottoms, including the cane brake region, one of the richest cotton producing districts in the world. From this to the Florida border and the Gulf the land is generally flat. This part is thinly settled, and is mostly covered with pine forests, which are of great value, while the product of naval stores here is very considerable. North of this is the broad belt of rich black soil, a space of several miles in breadth, constituting the great cotton producing section of the State. The soil then becomes sandy and poor, but abundant water power renders it capable of becoming a fine manufacturing district. The mineral region occupies the northeast part, while the northwest is a good agricultural and stock raising country. The mountain district and the valley of the Tennessee possess fine forests of hardwood timber. Cotton is grown throughout the State, but mainly in the central belt alluded to; tobacco chiefly in the north; very fine wheat in the north and north east; rice in the south; corn largely all over the State. Dairy products, fruits, wool, oats, and sweet potatoes are produced in considerable quantities. Manufactures have been unimportant until lately, when considerable increase has been manifested, but agriculture is by far the leading industry, though it is somewhat rapidly declining in comparative importance. The chief manufactures are flour, lumber, leather, cotton goods and cotton gins, thread and yarn, iron and machinery, that of iron and its products having enormously increased within the past few years. Commerce centres at Mobile. Cotton and lumber are the chief exports. Extensive beds of brown hematite of an excellent quality are found in Bibb, Cleburne, Jefferson, St. Clair, Shelby, and Talladega Counties. Jefferson County is the main seat of the iron production. There are other extensive beds of ore. The coal fields contain thick fields of bituminous coal of several kinds; considerable gold has been mined; silver and copper are also found; potter's, porcelain and fire clays, hydraulic limestone, manganese and many other minerals exist in considerable quantities; there are various building stones. The statuary granite and white marble of Coosa County and the variegated marbles of Talladega and adjacent counties are not surpassed by any in the country. There are 66 Counties in Alabama; newspapers are published in all.

ARIZONA is bounded north by Utah and Nevada, south by Mexico, east by New Mexico, and west by California and Nevada; length, north to south, about 400 miles, breadth averaging about 300 miles; land area, 112,920 square miles. It lies entirely within the Valley of the Colorado, which stream forms nearly all the western boundary. The streams generally flow through deeply eroded chasms, among them being the remarkable "Grand Canon of the Colorado." The soil is very fertile when irrigated, even on the alkaline plains; and the mountain lands are well adapted to stock raising and woolgrowing. Wheat, barley, and corn appear to be the principal crops; Sugar cane has been successfully cultivated in the southwest; but pastoral occupations are better suited to the country, and more profitable than strictly agricultural pursuits. With the increase in the number of irrigating canals, of which there are said to be now 400 miles, representing a cost of \$1,000,000, a corresponding increase may be looked for in land subjected to tillage, of which there are millions of acres suited to the growth of every variety of grasses, grains, fruits and vegetables grown in the temperate and semi-tropic zones, and which only require irrigation to make them yield abundantly. The chief wealth of the Territory, however, lies in its mineral deposits. Gold, silver, lead, copper, iron, cinnabar, salt, borax, etc., abound, and the mining and working of gold and silver ores is at present the leading industry. There are valuable deposits of coal and iron, which await the extension of railroads to be developed. There are 11 Counties in Arizona; newspapers are published in all.

# ARKANSAS.

ARKANSAS is bounded north by Missouri, east by Missouri, Tennessee, and Mississippi, south by Louisiana, southwest by Texas, and west by the Indian Territory; greatest length from north to south, 240 miles, and breadth from 170 to 250 miles; land area, 53,045 square miles. The eastern part is low and level, with dense forests and many swamps and lakes, and is frequently more or less inundated by the Mississippi, Arkansas, and other rivers. The surface rises toward the centre, where it is hilly and diversified with forests and rolling prairies. Further west are branches of the Ozark Mountains, comprising the Black Hills in the north, Cane Hills in the northwest, and the Ouachita Hills in the south. The Valley of the St. Francis, in the northeast, is nearly all swamp; the Valley of the Arkansas, from the Indian Territory line entirely across the State, is unsurpassed as a cotton producing country; the Valley of the White in the north, abounding in forests, is also rich in agriculture; in the southern part of the State are the Saline, Ouachita, Little Missouri and Red rivers, while in the southeast the Bayou Bartholomew makes a large country tributary to the Mississippi River. The soil is very varied. The river bottoms are very fertile, and yield large crops of cotton, corn, sweet potatoes, tobacco and fruit. The soil is less productive on the uplands, but in many places, particularly north, produces good crops of wheat, oats, and fruit, especially apples. Cotton is the chief staple; corn next. Hay is an important crop. Stock raising is growing rapidly, the mild winters being highly beneficial to stock, and the cost of "keeping up" stock thus avoided. The principal manufactures are cotton seed oil, flour and grist mill products, cotton gins, leather, wool carding, and lumber. The production of black walnut lumber for cabinet purposes is an important industry. In the matter of ores, mechanical and precious, Arkansas is coming to the front as one of the greatest of ore producing States, and millions of dollars are now being used in their development. As a fruit country the northwestern part of Arkansas is unrivalled, especially as to apples. Coal, argentiferous galena, zinc, copper, and iron, marble, grind stone, granite, and kaolin are among the minerals. Good coal is mined in Crawford, Conway, Franklin, Johnson, Perry, Pope, Pulaski, Sebastian, Scott, Washington, White, and Yell Counties. Silver is found in connection with galena in Pulaski and Sevier Counties, and with lead in Benton, Carroll, Independence, Izard, Lawrence, Madison, Marion, Newton, Pulaski, Randolph, Searcy, and Washington Counties; excellent marble, especially in Madison County. Slate for all purposes is quarried in Pike, Pulaski, Polk, Garland and Sevier Counties; Garland County has extensive quarries of Arkansas hone or oilstone. In Pulaski County, a few miles south of Little Rock, very extensive quarries of blue granite have been opened up within the past year, and valuable discoveries of iron have also been made. Among the mineral springs, the "Hot Springs of Arkansas," at Hot Springs, Garland County, are the most renowned. There are 75 Counties in Arkansas; newspapers are published in 74.

# CALIFORNIA.

CALIFORNIA is bounded north by Oregon, east by Nevada and Arizona, south by Lower California, and west by the Pacific Ocean. A line drawn through its centre, following the curves of the eastern and western borders, would measure about 770 miles. Its greatest breadth is about 330 miles; least breadth, 150 miles; average breadth, 230 miles; land area, 155,980 square miles. It is the largest State in the Union except Texas. The surface is traversed by two great ranges, the Sierra Nevada in the east and the Coast Range in the west, while between them is the beautiful and fertile valley of the rivers Sacramento and San Joaquin. The Yosemite and other valleys are on the western slope of the Sierra Nevadas, and the eastern slope teems with minerals. The north is an elevated mountain region, with a rugged surface and poor soil. The soil of a large part of the State is very deep and rich, and the yield of agricultural products generally is very great. Irrigation is needed in many parts of the state, particularly in the southern portion and is being rapidly introduced. Not less than 3,000,000 acres have been reclaimed in this manner, and the reservoirs and ditches are being extensively added to. For every kind of fruit that grows in semi-tropical and temperate climates, California is, in soil and climate, pre-eminently favorable. The wheat crop ranges from 20,000,000 to 24,000,000 bushels a year. Barley exceeds 40,000,000 bushels. Cattle and sheep are largely raised, the cattle numbering 500,000; sheep over 4,000,000. The wool clip is estimated at 35,000,000 pounds. The yield of raisins is 20,000,000 pounds, and the estimated yield of wine 17,000,000 gallons, of brandy 400,000 gallons and of grapes 600,000 pounds. Dried fruits are extensively produced; oranges, lemons, and other tropical fruits, and honey, are raised in the south, and tobacco, corn, barley, and hops in various parts of the State. Beet root, for conversion into sugar, is profitably raised. The olive is attracting a great deal of attention, and justly so, as the State furnishes on its hills and mountain slopes the soil exactly suited to its production, and it is believed that in a few years the California olive groves will rival those of the Mediterranean. Indeed, California is famous for her wheat, wool, vineyard produce, and agricultural products generally, scarcely less than for her yield of the precious metals. The estimated production of gold and silver is \$20,000,000, of quicksilver nearly 600,000 pounds, and of petroleum, 12,500,000 gallons, while natural gas has been discovered at Stockton, Santa Barbara, Redwood City and other points. There are numerous other minerals, including valuable deposits of lead, copper, iron, chromium, antimony, borax, rock salt, soda, potash, sulphur, etc. Manufacturing interests are growing rapidly, the principal being lumber, flour, woollens, wine, brandy, tobacco, cigars, machinery, and metallic wares. The annual value of the fishing interest is about \$6,000,000. There are 54 Counties in California; newspapers are published in 53.

# COLORADO.

COLORADO is bounded north by Nebraska and Wyoming Territory, east by Nebraska and Kansas, south by the Indian Territory and New Mexico, and west by Utah. Average length from east to west 380 miles, breadth, 280 miles; land area, 103,645 square miles. The surface consists of three divisions—the mountains and parks, the foot-hills, and the plains. It is intersected near the center by the Sierra Madre Range of the Rocky Mountains, including the highest peaks, among which are Pike's and Long's Peaks, Mts. Torrey, Lincoln, Gray, Yale, Harvard, the Spanish Peaks, etc. The mountains enclose the wonderful valleys or basins known as parks, many of which are small, but others larger than some entire States. These parks are well timbered, and abound with beautiful scenery, being diversified with low hills and ridges, which contain the sources of all the great rivers that rise in the State. The eastern part of Colorado is an immense plain, well adapted to stock raising. Agriculture is being carried on to a greater extent than ever before. Extensive irrigating ditches have been constructed and are being rapidly added to, both in the river valleys of the west, and along the Arkansas in the east. The total length of canals at the present time is about 4,000 miles; acres irrigated, over 2,000,000. Where water can be had the soil is very productive. The leading farm products are wheat, corn, barley, oats, hay, potatoes, fruits, garden and dairy products. The yield of wheat is over 2,500,000 bushels, of oats 1,500,000, of corn, over 1,000,000, and of potatoes about 3,000,000. Cattle raising and sheep farming are the chief agricultural pursuits. It is estimated to have 2,000,000 sheep, and 1,500,000 cattle, while the wool clip is about 10,000,000 pounds. Lumbering is an important industry, but the mining of gold, silver, and other metals is the chief source of wealth. Large beds of lignite, of good quality, exist, the total extent of coal bearing strata in the state being estimated at more than 26,000,000 acres, or as large as all England. Upward of 2,000,000 tons of coal are produced annually. Petroleum has been discovered, and thirty wells have been opened near Florence. Copper, cement, fire clay, and manganese are worked to some extent, while the iron of the state is manufactured into steel and iron rails. There are 55 Counties in Colorado; newspapers are published in all.

CONNECTICUT is bounded north by Massachusetts, east by Rhode Island, south by Long Island Sound, and west by New York. Its average length from east to west is 86 miles; its average breadth, 55 miles; land area, 4,845 square miles. The eastern part is principally composed of rounded hills, which, though stony, afford rich pasturage; and the valleys support a thrifty agricultural and manufacturing population. The Connecticut Valley, near the river, and at a distance from the Sound, is very fertile. In the south the land is broken and the soil sandy and gravelly, but when well manured yields good crops of potatoes, rye, oats, and corn. In the west the surface is rough and the hills are abrupt. There are several good harbors on the coast, and a large business is done in oyster fishing and in the taking of fish for oil and fish-guano. Agriculture employs one-third of the working population and the value of the farms reaches \$121,000,000. Dairy products and hay are the principal staples of the east and west. Tobacco is largely grown in the Connecticut Valley. Corn, rye, oats, and potatoes are grown in nearly all sections. The land near the large cities and towns is chiefly devoted to market gardening. The Connecticut River is open to steamboat navigation from its mouth to Hartford. The Thames River is likewise navigable by Sound steamers as far as its formation by the Yantic and Shetucket Rivers in Norwich city, and steamers ply regularly between that city and New York, and, in the summer season, to the seaside resorts. Connecticut is mainly a manufacturing State, it having an unusual abundance of water power, and its industries are very extensive and varied, among the leading productions being clocks, hardware, india-rubber goods, firearms and textile fabrics. Excellent iron is made from Connecticut ores, and very large quantities of brown stone are taken from the celebrated Portland sandstone quarries. The State of Connecticut, and especially its capital city of Hartford, has become celebrated for the extent and solidity of its insurance interests,—the nineteen life and fire companies of Hartford alone representing in capital and assets nearly two hundred millions of dollars. There are 8 Counties in Connecticut; newspapers are published in all.

STATE CAPITAL, DOVER.

DELAWARE is bounded north by Pennsylvania, east by the Delaware River and Bay, and the Atlantic Ocean, south and west by Maryland. Its length from north to south is 96 miles, its breadth ranging from 9 to 12 miles in the north to about 36 miles in the south; land area 1,960 square miles. The surface in the north is finely diversified with hill and dale, and southward the land is rolling, with fringes of marshes and swampy tracts along the indentations of Delaware Bay. The most southerly two fifths of the State is in great part a sandy region. Kaolin and iron ore are found in the north. The soil in the interior of the State is light and easily cultivated. The agricultural products are grain, corn, fruit, and market garden produce; peach growing and small products—berries,—are prominent industries. Over one hundred evaporators and canneries are engaged in conserving all kinds of fruits, berries and garden vegetables, at Dover, Milford, Georgetown, Smyrna and other towns in the lower half of the State. Manufactures are various, and are carried on chiefly in Wilmington and its vicinity. Iron goods, gunpowder, paper, leather, carriages, machinery, cotton and woolen goods, and flour are the leading products. Seaford ships immense quantities of oysters, and Lewes is a station for menhaden and other fisheries. Oyster growing and fishing are important industries. Large quantities of timber are cut for ship building, the manufacture of glass and for railroad ties. There are 3 Counties in Delaware; newspapers are published in all.

STATE CAPITAL, TALLAHASSEE.

FLORIDA is bounded north by Alabama and Georgia, east by the Atlantic Ocean, south and west by the Gulf of Mexico and Alabama. The peninsular portion of the State is about 375 miles long by an average breadth of 90 miles; the upper portion 360 miles from east to west by from 30 to 90 miles from north to south; land area, 58,680 square miles. The surface is diversified with numerous lakes, the largest, Okeechobee, being 40 miles long by about 30 miles broad. There is a coast line of about 1150 miles, while the water surface comprises one fifteenth of the whole. The largest portion of the southern part of the peninsula is occupied by the Everglades, an evergreen marsh or swamp, impassable in the rainy season, and resembling an immense lake dotted with innumerable islands of from half an acre to hundreds of acres in extent, the whole comprising over 2,000,000 acres. From the northern end of the swamp to Georgia is mostly a dead level, with occasional undulations and small hills. West of the neck of the peninsula the surface becomes a little more uneven; the central portion is the most fertile, but there are many pine barrens there. There are numerous gentle eminences called hammocks, which are remarkably fertile, as are also the swamp lands when ditched and drained. Sugar cane is raised chiefly along the Gulf coast. Both long and short staple cotton and tobacco are grown, but corn and rice are the principal cereals. Oranges, lemons, limes, pineapples, figs, olives, and grapes flourish luxuriantly; garden vegetables are largely produced, for the northern market, while of recent years the shipment of oranges north has become very important. Cattle require little care, are not housed in winter, and large numbers are raised and shipped to Havana. Hogs fatten on the roots and mast of the forest. Sponge is found on many parts of the coast. Manufactures of pine lumber, ship timber, tar, rosin, turpentine, cotton seed oil and cake, palmetto hats and braids; salt is made by solar evaporation; cigars are manufactured at Key West and Ybor City, near Tampa, in large quantities. During 1887 a great impetus was given to the growing of tobacco. In June, 1889, deposits of phosphate rock were discovered, supposed to underlie parts of 8 or 10 counties, and to be of very great quantity. They are being developed, and will doubtless prove of high commercial value. There are considerable fisheries, the inland and coast waters being full of fish; oysters are abundant, and the sponge and coral fisheries are of importance. There are 45 Counties in Florida; newspapers are published in 43.

GEORGIA is bounded north by Tennessee and North Carolina, northeast by South Carolina, southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, south by Florida, and west by Alabama. Its extreme length from north to south is 320 miles, extreme breadth 254 miles; land area, 59,475 square miles. The surface is varied; along the coast, it is intersected by numerous rivers and sounds, and the country for miles inland is a succession of ridges of pines and live oaks and swamps of cypress; the great Okeefnokee Swamp is in the southeast. Back from the coast is a stretch of sandy land, mostly pine barrens, and yielding large amounts of timber and naval stores. A series of terraces bring the land in the middle of the State to about 575 feet above tidewater, from which elevation it rises toward the north more rapidly, until it becomes mountainous, being there crossed by spurs of the Appalachians. The soil of the islands is sandy, producing sea island cotton; that of the mainland, rich alluvial, producing corn, cotton, and rice; the middle region is red loam, yielding good cotton, corn, tobacco, etc. In the north there is much fertile soil; grain, tobacco, fruits, and vegetables are largely grown, but not much cotton, which is mainly raised in the central, west central, and southwestern regions. Sugar cane is grown in the south, and considerable pork fattened, mainly for home consumption; sweet potatoes are largely produced; wool is prominent, but corn and cotton are the leading staples. Among the leading industries are lumber, flour, boots and shoes, carriages, cotton and woolen goods, wool carding and cloth dressing, leather, saddlery, metallic wares, furniture, castings, machinery, farm implements, etc. The number of cotton factories in the State in 1880 was 40, with 198,656 spindles, and 4,493 looms. In 1889, they had increased to 54, with 350,000 spindles and 8,000 looms. The most important are at Augusta and Columbus, the other chief seats of the cotton manufacture are Athens, Atlanta, Decatur, Macon, Savannah, and West Point. Savannah, the commercial capital of the State, is the most important South Atlantic seaport. The city is the seat of a large foreign and domestic commerce. Its railroads extend to all parts of the country, and its steamships ply daily to the principal North Atlantic ports. Savannah is the largest naval stores and second largest cotton and rice port in the United States, and also an important point for the manufacture and shipment of lumber and fertilizers. Atlanta has large iron works, and is developing as a manufacturing city with highly encouraging rapidity. Rome, Dalton, Marietta, Thomasville are manufacturing towns. The product of the cotton factories and iron works is valued at over \$10,000,000. The iron and steel trade is overtaking the cotton manufacture in importance. Other important branches of manufacture are lumber, flour, pulp, etc. Darien, Brunswick, and St. Marys manufacture and export lumber. Minerals; bituminous coal in the northwestern portion; immense deposits of iron ore in Bartow and Cherokee Counties; copper ore in Gilmer County; gold is most plentiful in Cherokee, Carroll, Cobb, and Lumpkin Counties; silver, lead, and many other minerals, granite, marble, gypsum, slate, and petroleum; excellent marble in Pickens and Cherokee Counties; hydraulic limestone in Bartow County. There are numerous mineral springs of which the Indian Spring in Butts County and the Bowden Lithia, or Salt Spring, in Douglas County are the best known. The development of the rich marble resources in north Georgia during the past five years has been wonderful. There are inexhaustible quarries of the finest marble in Pickens, Cherokee, Murray and adjoining counties and millions of dollars have been invested in opening them. There are 137 Counties in Georgia; newspapers are published in 126.

IDAHO is bounded north by British Columbia, east by Montana and Wyoming, south by Utah, and west by Oregon and Washington; its length from north to south is about 410 miles, width varying from 44 to 306 miles; land area, 86,294 square miles. The surface is chiefly mountainous, but there are also large tracts of prairie and fertile valleys. In the southeast is a volcanic region, abounding in geysers and saline springs. It is generally better adapted for grazing than for agriculture, and stock raising is being dilligently prosecuted. Corn is not profitably raised, owing to the shortness of the summer. Barley, wheat, oats, potatoes, dairy products and wool are the staples. There are vast tracts covered with sage grass, on which cattle fatten readily. Fruits of excellent quality are grown in considerable abundance. Many of these plains, if irrigated, would make excellent wheat growing districts. Irrigation has been employed to some extent, and there is abundant water in the streams and lakes, if properly applied, to reclaim the 8,000,000 acres which are susceptible of irrigation. The forest-covered area is very large, embracing about 10,000,000 acres, the timber being chiefly "lodge pole" pine of small diameter, but growing very thickly. Other trees are fir, spruce, cedar, etc., some of these being very large. Gold, silver and lead are plentiful in all parts of the State and are largely produced. There are 21 Counties in Idaho; newspapers are published in all.

# ILLINOIS.

ILLINOIS is bounded north by Wisconsin, northeast by Lake Michigan, east by Indiana, southeast and south by Kentucky, and west by Missouri and Iowa; extreme length north and south 385 miles; extreme breadth 218 miles; land area, 56,650 square miles. The surface is mostly level table land, inclining gently toward the south, with bluffs along the principal rivers. A small tract in the northwest, around Galena, is somewhat broken, and a low mountain ridge extends across the southern end from Grand Tower, on the Mississippi River, to Shawneetown, on the Ohio, about 850 feet above sea level. This is a great fruit region. The prairies are sometimes level, but generally undulating. More than two-thirds of the State is a productive bituminous coal field. The total production of coal in 1889 was 11,597,963 tons, the number of mines being 854, distributed through 49 counties. The iron ore is good only when mixed with Michigan and Missouri ores. Lead and zinc are mined extensively in the northwest. Copper ore, gypsum and marble are found in various places. Limestone and freestone abound. The prairie soils are deep and fertile; that of the river bottoms is often inexhaustible. A tract called the American Bottom, extending along the Mississippi River a length of ninety miles by about five in breadth, has an alluvial soil about twenty-five feet in depth. Illinois is unexcelled as an agricultural State, and is among the first in manufactures. Spring and winter wheat, corn, and other cereals, dairy produce, wool, and hay, are leading products. Corn is produced most abundantly, the 1889 crop rendering the enormous aggregate of 247,980,589 bushels. The industrial pursuits embrace a wide range of articles, and the seats of manufacture are distributed generally throughout the State. The leading articles of manufacture include iron and steel and their products, wooden ware, furniture, farming implements, cars and carriages, flour, watches, woolen goods, bridge work, lumber, tiles, glassware, soap, malt and distilled liquors, etc. Fishing interests center chiefly at Chicago, which is also the centre of an immense business in live stock and lumber. Natural gas in large quantities has lately been discovered at various points in the State, and is successfully used for heating and lighting in Litchfield. There are 102 Counties in Illinois; newspapers are published in all.

INDIANA is bounded north by Michigan and Lake Michigan, east by Ohio, south by Kentucky, and west by Illinois. About two-thirds of the surface is undulating or level prairie; near the Ohio and other streams the surface is hilly and often abrupt and rugged. In the extreme northwest there is a sandy tract, with considerable marsh land. The northeast abounds in oak openings and prairie land, interspersed with many small lakes. The soil is generally fertile, much of it exceedingly so; the richest is found along the Wabash, White, and White Water Rivers. There is abundance of coal of good quality. The iron manufacture is extensive, Indiana coal being particularly suited to this industry, but the ores used come mainly from the Lake Superior region, Missouri, and Tennessee. Indiana has some bog ore and local deposits of better grades which have been worked to some extent. There are some salt springs, good sandstone, limestone, fire brick, potter's clays, and kaolin. Limestone is particularly abundant, being practically inexhaustible in quantity. Indiana ranks high as a grain producing and stock raising State. Corn, wheat, oats, tobacco, and potatoes are raised in large quantities. Corn is the most abundant product, while of live stock cattle and swine are the most numerous. Butter, wool, hay, maple sugar, and sorghum molasses also, are important products; timber is largely exported. Manufactures are numerous and extensive, the chief industries being flouring and grist mill produce, lumber, woolen goods, furniture, carriages and wagons, iron and iron ware, machinery, agricultural implements, pork packing, liquors, metallic wares, leather, boots, shoes, and clothing. The most important fact of the present is the existence of a very large natural gas belt, said to be the largest known in the world, extending over 21 counties, or more than 6,000 square miles. There are 92 Counties in Indiana; newspapers are published in all.

IOWA is bounded north by Minnesota, east by Wisconsin and Illinois, south by Missouri, and west by Nebraska and Dakota. Its greatest length from east to west is 300 miles, and breadth 208 miles; land area, 55,475 square miles. The surface is generally rolling prairie, with no mountains nor even high hills, but with frequent bluffs along streams; and in places near large rivers it presents a broken appearance, caused by erosion from torrents. The southern part is the most level, with prairies, groves, and the numerous affluents of the two great rivers. In the northeast the surface is more elevated, with numerous low hills with tops covered with oaks, and abounding in lead and other ore; but the distinguishing feature of Iowa is its prairies, which are everywhere fertile and easily tilled, and, having few stones or stumps, are especially adapted for the use of agricultural machinery. The valleys of the Red Cedar, Iowa, and Des Moines rivers contain the richest soils; northward of these the soil becomes less fertile, but is still productive and remunerative. Building stone is abundant; coal and lead are extensively worked. Iron ore and other minerals are found. The cereals generally, dairy and market garden products, wool, linseed, sorghum, and live stock of all kinds are very largely produced. As in Illinois and Indiana, corn is the most important product. Grapes grow well in the south, and fruit culture is increasing. Stock raising is an industry of growing importance. Though only 40 years old in 1886 the State then ranked first in swine, second in milk cows and other cattle, and third in horses. The manufacturing interests are rapidly developing, the leading branches being flour, lumber, wood working, carriages, woolen goods, boots and shoes, pork packing, saddlery, furniture, malt liquors, and farm implements. There are 99 Counties in Iowa; newspapers are published in all.

STATE CAPITAL, TOPEKA.

KANSAS is bounded north by Nebraska, east by Missouri, south by the Indian Territory, and west by Colorado. Its length from east to west is 410 miles, and from north to south 210 miles; land area, 82,300 square miles. The surface is chiefly undulating in the east, while the western part has a rolling and varied surface, with every requisite for grazing. There are no mountains, very few lakes, and those small and shallow; no marshes but salt marshes, and these are valuable. When the State was settled only five per cent. of the area was forest, and this was distributed mainly along streams and in occasional groves and small tracts; but it is estimated that the area of forest trees has since increased twenty per cent. by voluntary growth, transplanting, and by seed. The western half, however, is very scantily supplied with timber, but there is an abundance of coal, which is used for domestic purposes and for export to Nebraska, Missouri and other points; over 40,000,000 bushels being mined in 1889, employing 5,600 hands. There are several varieties of good building stone. The bottom and table lands are chiefly a rich black loam, and highly productive. Winter and spring wheat, corn, rye, oats, and potatoes are the chief products, while broom corn, sorghum, flax, hemp, castor beans, tobacco, and hay are also largely produced. The wheat crop is about 37,000,000 bushels; that of corn, nearly 300,000,000 bushels. Cattle raising is a prominent industry, and sheep farming is becoming frequent in the western part. The number of cattle in the State is over 2,000,000, that of hogs about the same number, and of sheep over 1,000,000. Dairy products are increasing rapidly, and progress is also being made in fruit growing and wine making. During 1886 and 1887 attention was especially devoted in Kansas to the development of a process for making sugar from sorghum, which culminated successfully in 1887. Glass works were also established in Fort Scott and Paola in 1887. Manufactures are being developed, and the number of establishments is rapidly increasing, but at present the chief industries are agriculture, stock raising, and fruit culture. The principal cities are Topeka, Wichita, Atchison, Leavenworth and Fort Scott. There are 105 Counties in Kansas; newspapers are published in all.

# KENTUCKY.

KENTUCKY is bounded north by Ohio and Indiana, northwest by Illinois, east by West Virginia and Virginia, south by Tennessee, and west by Missouri; greatest length from east to west, 350 miles; greatest breadth, 178 miles; land area, 42,000 square miles. The surface in the east and southeast is mountainous, being broken by numerous parallel ranges of the Alleghany system, with deep and fertile valleys. Northwest of this section, and in the centre of the State, is the famous Blue Grass Region, with a gently undulating upland surface, and deep valleys at the rivers. Between the Green and Cumberland Rivers the surface is level and known as the "Barrens," because of the lack of stout timber in much of it. The western part is generally level with slight undulations. The soil of the whole State is remarkably fertile, and renews itself readily; that part between Lexington and the Ohio River is known as the "Garden of Kentucky." Cereals grow to greater perfection and maturity in Kentucky than almost any other State. The chief products are tobacco, hemp, corn, wheat, oats, rye, barley and potatoes. Kentucky has acquired a world wide fame for its thoroughbred horses and short horn cattle. The wool clip is very large, and immense numbers of hogs are raised. Dairy products are very extensive; also sorghum molasses, maple sugar, honey, and wax; some cotton is raised in the southwest near the Tennessee line. Tobacco is of vast importance, nearly half the American crop being handled within the State, Louisville being the greatest leaf market in the world. Coal, iron, building stones, clays, etc., are abundant. The timber forest in southeastern Kentucky covers 10,000 square miles underlaid with coking and bituminous coals of superior grade. The greatest known area of coking and fine cannel coals exists at the head of the Kentucky river. Large quantities of so-called "Red River" and the Oriskany ores used in the manufacture of car wheels and other fine iron products are annually mined, the product during the last decade averaging over 50,000 tons annually. The manufacturing interests are varied and important, and are carried on chiefly in the towns on the Ohio River; an extensive industry is the smelting and working of iron, while all wood manufactures flourish. Whisky is an important product of the central counties, and more mules are raised than in any other State. Salt is made from springs in the mountain counties. Louisville is situated at the falls of the Ohio and has two steel bridges across that river, and 14 independent railroad lines. It makes more plows, jeans, cement and oak tanned sole leather than any city in the world. There are 119 Counties in Kentucky; newspapers are published in 104.

# LOUISIANA.

STATE CAPITAL, BATON ROUGE.

LOUISIANA is bounded north by Arkansas and Mississippi, east by Mississippi and the Gulf of Mexico, south by the Gulf of Mexico, and west by Texas. Its extreme length from east to west is about 800 miles, and breadth 240 miles; land area, 45,420 square miles. Surface generally low and level. There are low hills in the north and northwest, from which the land slopes gradually to the Mississippi and the Gulf. Much of the land along the river is below the surface at the spring freshets, and is protected from overflow by the levees, which are built on both banks below Baton Rouge, and on the west bank throughout the State. Many of the principal rivers and bayous are protected in like manner. It is estimated that one-fifth of the surface of the State is liable to more or less frequent inundation. The extent of navigable water surpasses that of any other State in the Union. The soil of the river bottoms is exceedingly fertile, and yields large crops of cotton, sugar cane, rice, etc. Its prairies are productive, and afford good pasture in places. The hilly section yields good cotton crops, but about half is covered with pine barrens. The total wooded area of the State is estimated at 16,608,800 acres, or three fifths of the total area. The timber is mainly pine, but there are large bodies of valuable cypress, and some important groves of live oaks. The great staples are cotton, sugar, rice, and corn. The State produces nearly all the sugar made in the United States. The sugar product has rapidly increased of recent years, and is now claimed to be nearly 200,000 tons, worth \$20,000,000, while about 500,000 persons are said to be supported by the industry. The yield of rice is very large, and the quality excellent. Cattle raising is an important interest. The manufacturing interests are not large. The leading industries are lumber, naval stores, castings, machinery, tobacco, clothing, flouring mill products, cotton seed oil, beer, and ship building. Its commerce, carried on chiefly through New Orleans, is extensive and important. Iron ores, ochre, gypsum, and marl are abundant; large deposits of sulphur exist in Calcasieu Parish, and an immense amount of solid rock salt on Petit Anse Island. There are 69 Parishes in Louisiana; newspapers are published in all.

MAINE is the most northeasterly State in the Union, bounded on the north by Quebec and New Brunswick, east by New Brunswick, south by the Atlantic Ocean, and west by New Hampshire and Quebec; its extreme length is 302 miles, width 285 miles, which is extended to 2500 miles by the many indentations; land area, 29,895 square miles. The northern part is mainly a wilderness of forest land with rugged surface and groups of detached mountains; thinly peopled, except in the fertile tracts of Aroostook County. In the northeast, on the St. John's River, are several French Canadian settlements. The southern part is varied, seldom much broken, and has tracts of great fertility, while others are only moderately fertile, especially in the southeast. The hay and potato crop is large and excellent; corn thrives in the south, and winter wheat in the north-east; oats are very fine and prolific, and barley next. Dairy products are of great value. Large numbers of horses and cattle are exported. Wool is abundant and of good quality. The principal fruits are the cherry, plum, pear, and apple. The State holds a prominent position in the lumber trade; fisheries are important, and the canning of fish, lobsters, green corn, fruits, and vegetables is extensively carried on. The seaboard towns enjoy a large coasting and West India trade. Large quantities of lime are exported from Camden, Rockland, and Thomaston. Granite is extensively quarried at various points, the works employing 4000 men. Slate is quarried in large quantities at Brownsville and Monson. Ice is an important and profitable article of export. The leading articles of manufacture are cotton goods, lumber, woolen goods, leather, paper, boots and shoes, foundry and machine shop products, ships, agricultural implements, etc. The chief seats of the lumber trade are Augusta, Bangor, Biddeford, Calais, Eastport, Fairfield, Lewiston and Machias; of cotton manufacture, Augusta, Biddeford, Lewiston, Brunswick, Saco and Waterville; of ship building, Bath, Bangor, Belfast, Calais, Damariscotta, Machias, Rockland, Thomaston and Waldoboro. Woolens are made at Bridgton, Dexter, Dover, Lewiston, Madison, Oxford, Sanford, and Warren; boots and shoes at Auburn, Bangor, Fairfield, Farmington, Lewiston, Richmond, Skowhegan, Norway, Paris, and Mechanic Falls. Bangor has foundry and machine shops, furniture factories, and steam planing mills. Extensive hemlock sole leather tanneries are located at Brookton, Grand Lake Stream, Kingman, Lincoln, Lowell, Medway, and Winn. Large spool factories are located at Foxcroft, South Lincoln, and Willimantic. Apart from these special branches of trade, Belfast, Ellsworth, Gardiner, Hallowell, Portland, Rockland, Skowhegan, and Waterville are seats of varied and extensive manufactures. There are 16 Counties in Maine; newspapers are published in all.

MARYLAND is bounded north by Pennsylvania, east and southeast by Delaware and the Atlantic Ocean, west by West Virginia, and south and southwest by Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia. The Chesapeake Bay divides the greater part of it into two unequal parts, known as the Eastern and Western Shores. Its extreme length from east to west on its northern border is 198 miles, and its width, following the course of the Potomac, varies from 3 or 4 miles to about 120 miles; land area, 9,860 square miles. The surface of the Eastern Shore is mostly level, and in parts low and swampy, but towards the north rocky and broken. The Western Shore, between the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay, presents mainly the same general features. The northwest is very mountainous; five or six ridges of the Alleghenies, principally the Blue and Laurel, traverse that section. In the extreme west are the beautiful elevated valleys named Glades. The soil of the Eastern Shore and the lower part of the Western is generally light and sandy, well adapted for peaches and market gardening; that of the central and northern parts very rich, yielding immense crops of tobacco, wheat, and corn. The mountain slopes are thickly wooded. The oyster fisheries are more extensive than in any other State. The manufactures are very numerous—canned goods (fruits, meats, and oysters,) being one of the most important. Boots and shoes, bricks, cement, chemicals, clothing, cotton and woolen goods, cooperage, tobacco, flour, leather, lumber, machinery, and metallic wares are leading industries. Its commerce is confined principally to Baltimore, whose foreign trade is very important. Maryland coal is used extensively in all the Atlantic States, the annual product being about 3,000,000 tons. Fire clays are abundant; those of Mt. Savage have a wide reputation. Brown hematite is found in the Trenton limestone, and bog ore on the Eastern Shore. There are numerous quarries of marble, granite, serpentine, and other building stone, limestone for burning, and roofing slate. Kaolin is found in Anne Arundel County; magnesite near Baltimore, from which large quantities of magnesia, carbonate, and Epsom salts are manufactured. There are many other minerals, including alum, amber, barytes, breccia, cements, chromium, hone stone, mill stone, iron pyrites, ochres, etc., some of which are very plentiful. Especial attention is given to tobacco growing in the lower counties of the Western Shore. There are 23 Counties in Maryland; newspapers are published in all.

# MASSACHUSETTS.

STATE CAPITAL, BOSTON.

MASSACHUSETTS is bounded north by Vermont and New Hampshire, east by the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean and by Rhode Island and Connecticut, and west by Rhode Island and New York. Its extreme length is 160 miles, and breadth from 47 to about 90 miles; land area, 8,040 square miles. The surface is greatly diversified; mountainous in the extreme west, hilly and broken in the east and northeast, and in the southeast mainly low and sandy. Toward the west is the fertile Valley of the Connecticut River. The mountains are the Taconic, and the Hoosac (continuations of the Green mountain ranges of Vermont), with detached members of the White Mountains. The soil is generally somewhat sterile, but energy and intelligence have succeeded in making it very productive. The Connecticut Valley, however, can hardly be excelled for fertility. Dairy products are very extensive, as is also the yield of wool, hay, maple sugar, and honey. Corn and potatoes are very largely produced. Of grain, the crop of oats, rye, and barley is large, buckwheat moderate, and wheat (winter), small. The tobacco crop is large; live stock abundant (cattle largely in excess). More than half the fishing vessels owned in the United States belong to Massachusetts. Manufactures, however, constitute by far the largest of its industries. Not only is it the center of the American boot, shoe, leather, wool, paper and cotton trades, but all the large towns are busy seats of more or less numerous branches of manufacture. The chief seats of the ship building interests are Boston, Newburyport and Salem. The State is rich in building stone, principally granite, which is largely quarried at Rockport, Graniteville, Fall River, Monson, and Quincy; a handsome brown sandstone in the Connecticut Valley, and marble and limestone in Berkshire County; Berkshire County has also deposits of excellent iron ore. Except Rhode Island, it is the most densely peopled State. Railroads enter almost every town, and are sufficient in extent to gridiron the State with lines  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles apart if they were evenly distributed, the total length in 1887 being 3377 miles. Fall River, Lowell, New Bedford and Lawrence are, in this order, the chief cotton manufacturing centers in the country. There are 14 Counties in Massachusetts; newspapers are published in all.

# MICHIGAN.

STATE CAPITAL, LANSING.

MICHIGAN is bounded north by Lake Superior, east by Lakes Huron, St. Clair, and Erie, and their connecting rivers, south by Ohio and Indiana, and west by Lake Michigan and Wisconsin; land area, 57,430 square miles. It consists of two peninsulas, of which the southern is the principal seat of wealth and population, its length, north to south, being about 300 miles; width, about 200; coast line of State on lakes not less than 1600 miles. This part of the State is a very level region, abounding in lakes and streams, with very extensive forests of pine and other timber in the north, oak openings or natural parks in the south, and prairies in the southwest. The soil contains sufficient sand to make it easily tilled, and few sections excel it as a farming region. In the west and southwest is the great fruit belt. Winter wheat, oats, and potatoes are abundant, and of excellent quality; corn and other cereals are largely grown. Dairy products are very valuable. Wool is raised in very large quantities, the product being about 15,000,000 pounds; live stock is plentiful. Peppermint and celery are raised extensively in the southwest, and grapes in the south. The surface of the northern peninsula is somewhat rough and mountainous, with a good soil in most parts outside the mining regions; its mineral wealth is very great, especially in copper, iron and silver. Large quantities of iron ore are mined and shipped to Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois to be smelted either alone or with the inferior ores found in those States. Marquette, Ishpeming, Negaunee, Gladstone, St. Ignace and Escanaba are the principal points of shipment. By far the most important copper mines of the country, and what is claimed to be the largest iron mine in the world, are in this State. The output of iron has more than doubled since 1880. There is a large quantity of coal in the lower peninsula used chiefly for local and railroad purposes. The salt producing territory covers about 9,500 square miles, and the annual product is not far from 5,000,000 barrels, which is more than double that of New York State; it is procured from artesian wells, and the Saginaw River and the mouth of the Manistee are the chief centres of manufacture. About 100,000 barrels of dairy salt are produced pronounced by competent judges to be the best in the world. 3600 hands are employed in the salt manufacture. Michigan ranks first among the States in the value and extent of its lumber product; the largest interest centering in East Saginaw. The lumber product, however, is rapidly falling off, through the rapid and wasteful reduction of the forest area. Gypsum, fire clay, and glass sand are also found. Manufactures are important and varied in extent. Among the leading are iron, lumber, salt, wooden ware, furniture, farm implements, leather, cotton and woolen goods, machinery, castings, and hollow ware. There are 85 Counties in Michigan; newspapers are published in 82.

MINNESOTA is bounded north by British America, east by Wisconsin and Lake Superior, south by Iowa, and west by Dakota. Its extreme length from north to south is 380 miles; breadth varies from 133 miles in the center to 262 on the south line, and about 330 on the north border; land area, 83,365 square miles. The surface is generally an undulating plain, diversified with rolling prairies, dotted with lakes and groves, with frequent timber belts. The northeast is generally rugged and hilly, with immense forests and much marsh land. The Red River Valley is a dead level. The southeast is a beautiful rolling prairie region, while the surface rises from the undulating prairies of the south and southwest to the Hauteur des Terres or Heights of Land in the northwest. It is thought that the northeast may develop valuable mineral resources, iron ore being said to abundant, but the yield of minerals is at present unimportant. There are productive fisheries of white fish and lake trout in Lake Superior. The soil is fertile, about two-thirds of it being adapted to the cultivation of cereals and general farm produce. Very large quantities of spring wheat are raised even as far as the Manitoba line, while corn grows well all over the State. Oats, barley, hops, flaxseed, and hay are leading products. The cereals range in the following order, wheat, oats, corn, barley, rye and buckwheat. Wool growing is remunerative in the southwest. Maple sugar is an important product. Cattle, horses, and swine are largely exported, and pork packing is a valuable industry. Manufactures are rapidly increasing in number and value. The leading branches are flour and grist mill products, lumber and woodenware, carriages, furniture, and cooperage, while boots and shoes, brick, leather, lime, saddlery, and woolen goods are also extensively manufactured. There are 80 Counties in Minnesota; newspapers are published in 79.

# MISSISSIPPI.

MISSISSIPPI is bounded north by Tennessee, east by Alabama, south by the Gulf of Mexico and Louisiana, and west by the Mississippi River, which separates it from Louisiana and Arkansas. Its extreme length from north to south is 332 miles; average breadth, 142 miles; land area, 46,340 square miles. The surface is generally hilly or undulating, except in the Mississippi bottom, from Vicksburg to the Tennessee line, and between the Mississippi and Yazoo rivers, where it is low and swampy, subject to inundation, and covered with a dense growth of timber, but with soil which, if reclaimed, would be exceedingly fruitful. Below Vicksburg the surface for some miles inland is hilly, and known as the "cane hills" or "bluffs," and with a generally productive soil. There is a very fertile prairie region in the northeast. The southern part is chiefly a level pine region, and furnishes good pasturage and large quantities of timber, tar, turpentine, etc. The soil of this tract is poor and sandy. Cotton and corn are the great staples, the product of cotton being surpassed probably only by Texas. The corn crop is over 25,000,000 bushels; that of oats over 3,000,000. Wheat is grown in the north, and rice and sugar cane in the south. Grazing is an important industry, much pork is fattened, and the clip of wool is large. Dairy products, sorghum, tobacco, and sweet potatoes are produced in considerable quantities. The manufactures are neither varied nor very extensive, lumber and grist mill products being the most important, while cotton goods and cotton seed oil and cake rank next in importance. Its commerce is carried on principally through New Orleans and Mobile; coasting and river trade large. The State has no coal or iron of practical value. Its mineral deposits are confined mainly to fertilizers, soft limestone and clays. Tishomingo County has large beds of fine pipe and potter's clay, there is also some sandstone suitable for rough masonry. There are 75 Counties in Mississippi; newspapers are published in 74.

MISSOURI is bounded north by Iowa, east by Illinois, Kentucky, and Tennessee, south by Arkansas, west by Indian Territory, Kansas and Nebraska; length, north to south, 277 miles; average breadth, about 244 miles, ranging from 208 miles in the north to 312 miles in the south; land area 68,735 square miles. The Missouri River divides the State into two distinct parts. The surface north of the river is generally nearly level, while that south of it is undulating, becoming rougher and somewhat mountainous as it approaches the Ozark Mountains. There are also here open, treeless plains, an extension of those in Kansas, and in the southeast, bordering on the Mississippi River, is an extensive marshy tract, called the "Sunk Country," the result of the earthquake of 1811-12. The State contains every variety of soil. Corn, wheat, oats, and tobacco are the staple products, the yield of corn being about 200,000,000 bushels annually, but barley, rye, hay, fruit, white and sweet potatoes, dairy and market garden products, wool, cattle, and pork are raised largely in excess of home needs. Sorghum and castor oil beans are largely produced. Cotton, hemp, and flax are cultivated to some degree in the southern counties; so are grapes, and much wine is made. The principal live stock are sheep and swine. Iron ore is mined and manufactured in very large quantities, and the supply is inexhaustible. Lead ore is also largely produced, but its product is declining in consequence of the immense output of the western mines. Many other minerals abound; also marble, limestone, glass sand, kaolin, fire clay, etc. Beside iron and lead, there are important manufactures in many branches of trade, the product of flour ranking second in importance to that of iron and steel. In the last ten years Missouri has grown rapidly in population and wealth, railroads have multiplied, and extensive areas of territory, particularly in the southwest and southeast portions of the State, have been brought into cultivation, and now support large populations, and afford a considerable surplus to feed the world. Kansas City and Springfield are notable instances of increase. The State is in a prosperous condition, and offers more inducements to labor and capital than any other of the southwestern States. There are 114 Counties in Missouri; newspapers are published in 112.

MONTANA is bounded north by British America, east by North and South Dakota, south by Wyoming and Idaho, and west by Idaho; length from east to west about 540 miles, breadth about 280 miles; land area, 145,210 square miles. Surface generally mountainous, especially in the west. Along the three forks of the Missouri River, as well as elsewhere through the State, there is much undulating prairie, with a fertile soil. The Missouri River is navigable to Fort Benton; the Yellowstone is also navigable. Perhaps nowhere else are such advantages offered to the capitalist, mining operator, stock raiser and wool grower as are here found. Very little hay or winter foddering is needed, the stock feeding on the rich grasses, and ranging all winter in the sheltered valleys. Of agricultural staples, spring wheat, potatoes, butter, barley, oats and vegetables are the most prominent. Irrigation is greatly needed to develop the agricultural resources, there being 10,000,000, and perhaps double that number of acres which may be reclaimed in this manner. The timber lands are enormous in area, being estimated at nearly 40,000 square miles. Yellow pine is the most useful timber, the trees attaining a diameter of from 5 to 7 feet. The chief minerals are gold, silver, copper and lead, of which large quantities are obtained, while tin and nickel are reported. Leading manufacturing interests are mining, lumber sawing, quartz milling and stamping, flour, etc. The output of minerals in 1887 was estimated at \$4,000,000 in gold, \$16,000,000 in silver, and the enormous amount of 72,000,000 pounds of copper, which it was estimated would be increased to 120,000,000 pounds in 1889. The lead product of 1888 was about 25,000,000 pounds. Iron is abundant, but has not yet been developed. The wool clip was about 6,000,000 pounds. A superior quality of bituminous coal, in what is said to be one of the largest and most compact coal fields in the country, is being developed about 50 miles from Billings. There are 21 Counties in Montana; newspapers are published in all.

# NEBRASKA.

NEBRASKA is bounded north by Dakota, east by Iowa and Missouri, south by Kansas and Colorado, and west by Colorado and Wyoming Territory. Its extent from north to south is about 210 miles; greatest length about 420 miles; land area, 76,185 square miles. The surface is generally a vast gently undulating plain, with a gradual ascent toward the mountains; the river bottoms are level. There are some bluffs along the Missouri River, some hills in the north-west, which is also partly occupied by the Mauvais Terres or Bad Lands. The state is well watered, three important rivers, the Niobrara, the Platte, and the Republican crossing it from west to east, while the Missouri flows for 500 miles along the eastern border. The Missouri is the only navigable river. East of the Bad Lands and south of the Niobrara is a tract of sand hills of 8,000 square miles area, which afford some pasturage. Timber is scarce. There is little coal, and that poor; but peat abounds. Brick and potter's clay is plentiful, and there are extensive saline deposits; good building stone abundant. The eastern half of the State is a rich agricultural region, and the west is mainly adapted to grazing; the bottom lands are very rich. There is an abundant rainfall in the east, and that of the west seems increasing annually since the era of agriculture, so that the farm limit is extending westward. The leading products are wheat, corn, barley, oats, sorghum, flax, and hemp; vegetables, small fruits, and grapes are raised extensively. More than 150 species of wild grasses have been classified, which afford excellent pasturage to large numbers of cattle and sheep. Manufacturing interests are but little developed, being confined to a few cities, principally Omaha, Lincoln and Nebraska City. They include meat packing and canning, smelting and refining, and the making of flour, farming implements, wagons, cars, etc. There are 90 Counties in Nebraska; newspapers are published in all.

NEVADA is bounded north by Oregon and Idaho, east by Utah and Arizona, and southwest and west by California. Extreme length from north to south, 485 miles in the eastern, and 216 in the western boundary; greatest breadth, 320 miles, decreasing to 310 miles in the north to a point in the south; land area, 109,740 square miles. Surface generally is a table land about 4,000 feet above the sea, traversed by nearly parallel mountain ranges, between which are valleys varying in width from 5 to 20 miles, in some cases narrow canons, and in others broad deserts, covered with sage brush and other scanty herbage. The soil when irrigated is fertile, and produces spring wheat, barley, oats, potatoes, butter, hay, wool, etc. There is much good pasturage, and cattle fatten readily upon it. The State lies almost wholly in the "Great Basin," the most arid region of North America. Yet it is considered possible, by storing the waters of its mountain streams, to reclaim several millions of acres by irrigation. Cotton and sub-tropical fruits do well in the south. It has for years been the leading State in the production of the precious metals. The milling and smelting of ore is the leading manufacturing pursuit. The output of precious metals in 1888 was nearly \$12,305,603. A valuable deposit of anthracite coal has been discovered on the Elko River near Humboldt, which is being developed. The cattle interests of the State are next in importance to its mineral resources. The wool product in 1887 was 3,000,000 pounds. Lumber sawing, once important, is declining, owing to the rapid disappearance of the forests. There are 14 Counties in Nevada; newspapers are published in 13.

NEW HAMPSHIRE is bounded on the north by Quebec, east by Maine and the Atlantic Ocean, south by Massachusetts, and west by Vermont. Its length is 180 miles from north to south; its extreme breadth 93 miles; average breadth 50 miles; land area, 9,005 square miles. Most of the State, except the southeastern part, has a rough and hilly surface. In the northern part are the White Mountains. The State is generally well wooded, and the yield of timber is very large. The Valley of the Connecticut is famed for the beauty of its farms and villages. In productions, the hay crop is by far the most valuable, and while this is steadily increasing the agricultural interests have for some years been gradually declining. While there are some very fertile tracts among the valley lands, the greater part of the surface is rugged and stony, and much more valuable as woodland or pasture than as tilled land. Oats, barley, rye, buckwheat, and corn are very generally cultivated. Dairy farming and wool growing are followed to some extent. Tobacco is grown in Cheshire County, in the southwestern part of the State. Fruit raising is generally profitable. In some localities southward the peach is successfully cultivated. Fine building granite is extensively quarried at Concord, Milford, Pelham, Plymouth, and other points, and a fine soapstone at Francestown. Iron ore is mined principally at Franconia, but abounds in several other localities. There is a thin vein of tin at Jackson. Lead, silver, and zinc are developed in Madison and Warren. Manufactures constitute by far the largest industry. There is scarcely a town of any considerable size without its important manufacture. It is especially noted for its textile interests. The other main industries are boots and shoes, leather, lumber, carriages, flouring mills, saddlery, clothing, starch, etc. There are 10 Counties in New Hampshire; newspapers are published in all.

# NEW JERSEY.

STATE CAPITAL, TRENTON.

NEW JERSEY is bounded north and northeast by New York, east by New York and the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean and Delaware Bay, and west by Delaware and Pennsylvania. Its extreme length is 167 miles; its greatest breadth 59 miles, and its least 32 miles; land area, 7,455 square miles. The surface is mountainous in the northwest, hilly in the northeast and central parts, low and gently undulating in the south. The mountains, a part of the Appalachian system, are the Kittatinny or Blue, and the Highland Range. Between them lies the Kittatinny Valley, about 10 miles wide; soil productive but varied—the northern part adapted to grain and grass; the central part has been well fertilized, and yields abundant farm and market garden products and fruit; the southern part is sandy and light. Its agricultural products generally, including market garden produce, are very extensive. The central part is the most thickly settled and is, in fact, a vast market garden for the supply of New York and Philadelphia. Large quantities of grapes and small fruits are grown in the south. Cranberries are one of the leading productions. It is estimated that more than half of the cranberries produced in the United States are grown in this State. The chief cranberry counties are Ocean, Atlantic, and Burlington. It is celebrated for its marl and clay deposits, peat, bog iron ore, and glass sand. It has become one of the leading States in the value of its manufactures, which embrace a wide range of goods. Prominent among the instances of greatest growth may be mentioned the pottery and rubber interests, while glass making is an important industry in the sandy region of the south. Its iron mines, zinc mines, slate quarries, and clay banks are very valuable, and the fisheries (deep sea, oyster, and fresh water), a source of great profit. Iron ore is found generally through the State. There are a large number of productive mines of magnetic iron ore in Sussex, Passaic, Morris, and Warren Counties. Clay for gas retorts and fire brick is found at Amboy, and valuable deposits of franklinite at Mine Hill and Stirling. In the northwestern portion of the State, excellent roofing-slates, building and flag stones and rich hematites are abundant. It has a large coasting trade, and considerable ship building is carried on. Newark, the metropolis, has a population of 182,000, and its manufacturing industries are claimed to be more important in proportion to population than those of any other city in the United States. Within the past ten years the sea coast has been built up in almost a continuous line of villages from Sandy Hook to Cape May Point, and the temporary residents in the summer season will reach as high as 100,000 persons. There are 21 Counties in New Jersey; newspapers are published in all.

NEW MEXICO is bounded north by Colorado, east by the Indian Territory and Texas, south by Texas and Mexico, and west by Arizona; greatest length, north to south, 390 miles, average width, 335 miles. Land area, 122,460 square miles. Its general surface is a region of high plateaus, traversed by mountain ranges with isolated peaks. The valleys are generally nearly level, and their soil fertile. In the southwest is a part of the barren "Llano Estacado" or "Staked Plain." The mesas, or table lands, occupy a large part of the surface, making stock raising and wool growing the leading occupations; the bunch grass affording rich pasturage, and neither hand feeding nor shelter is necessary for the herds and flocks. In 1888 the Territory possessed 1,127,529 cattle, 1,339,790 sheep, and 45,119 horses. Agriculture is successful in the valleys, glens and on the foot spurs of the mountain ranges. Irrigation is frequently resorted to in the valleys but never on the foot hills; for on the latter nature supplies moisture sufficient for the most luxuriant crops. In fact during the last three years farming on the mesas and in the valleys without irrigation has largely increased and has proven perfectly successful, causing the old inhabitants to say that the rain fall has increased. New comers think it has arisen from deep ploughing and better methods of farming. There is excellent promise from irrigation. On the Rio Grande alone there are works now projecting sufficient to reclaim from three to four million acres. There are many other river valleys of high fertility, whose soil is susceptible of irrigation, and in the future the Territory must attain agricultural importance. Wheat, corn, beans, onions, cabbage, alfalfa, oats, wild hay, and all kinds of vegetables are the chief crops. Of fruits, the apple, peach, melon, fig, apricot, pomegranite, and especially grapes, flourish. Gold, silver, copper, iron, and lead exist, and all are being extensively worked, while the gold output is increasing. The total mineral product for 1887 was valued at \$4,229,234. Iron ore has recently been discovered in extensive deposits in Lincoln Co. Bituminous coal is very abundant and large deposits of fine anthracite exist. The mining product in 1888 was about 500,000 tons. Large mica mines are worked, plumbago, cement, fire clay, gypsum, and mineral paint are found; marbles and other excellent building stones abound. Manufactures are confined principally to grain, quartz, and lumber milling, manufacturing wines and brandies, the making of blankets by the Navajo Indians, and coarse pottery by the Pueblos. There are 18 Counties in New Mexico; newspapers are published in 17.

### STATE CAPITAL, ALBANY.

NEW YORK is bounded on the north and northwest by Lake Ontario and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, east by Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, and west and northwest by Pennsylvania and Lake Erie. Its greatest length from north to south is 312 miles; its greatest breadth 412 miles; land area, 47,620 square miles. The surface is exceedingly diversified. It has numerous ranges of mountains, chains of hills, many beautiful valleys, much undulating land, some broad plains, and numerous beautiful lakes. The greater portion of the soil is arable, much of it exceedingly fertile. The mountainous districts are mainly good grazing land, and the dairy products are enormous, notably in St. Lawrence, Herkimer, and Oneida Counties. Immense crops of cereals are grown in the valley lands; hops in Otsego, Madison, Chautauqua, and Oneida Counties; fruit and grapes in the Hudson and Pleasant Valleys; tobacco is raised in several counties, and corn generally throughout the State. In the neighborhood of the large cities, market gardening is extensively carried on. The State is well wooded, and the timber varied and excellent. Its leading mineral is iron ore, of which the mines, especially those of the Champlain and Adirondack regions, yield heavily, and produce some of the most necessary ores for the iron manufacturing interest of the Middle States. Galena is found in large quantities in St. Lawrence and other counties. It abounds in building stone, consisting of granite, white and colored marbles, of which those of Westchester and St. Lawrence Counties are the most important; Potsdam and Medina sandstones and gray and blue limestones; also in fine brick clay. It has large quarries of slate and stone for flagging. There are extensive deposits of hydraulic cement and gypsum, the former being largely produced at Rondout, Manlius, and Akron, the latter near Syracuse. A vast amount of salt is made, chiefly from the springs of Onondaga County, the product being more than 10,000,000 bushels annually. In recent years new and promising salt fields have been developed in Wyoming and Genesee Counties. There are illuminating gas springs in several counties, and oil is found near Olean, Wellsville, etc. New York has no coal. The State ranks first in the value of its manufactures. The industries cover almost the whole range of business, and are well distributed over the State. The fishing industry is relatively large and valuable, the menhaden and oyster fisheries being the most productive. There are 60 Counties in New York; newspapers are published in all.

NORTH CAROLINA is bounded north by Virginia, east and southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, south by South Carolina and Georgia, and west by Tennessee. Its extreme length from east to west is 490 miles; extreme breadth, 185 miles; land area, 48,580 square miles. The surface is very varied. For nearly 100 miles inland from the coast the country is level, marshy, and swampy; soil sandy but very fertile. It is estimated that there are nearly 3,000,000 acres of swamps in this region. Next is the middle section, with varied surface and fine soil. The surface then rises into small hills, increasing in altitude until they reach the mountainous region in the west. Some of the peaks in the Black Mountains and the Blue Ridge attain an elevation of from 5,000 to 6,000 feet. This region contains good grazing land, with much hard timber; and stock raising is largely carried on. In the coast region the river bottoms and reclaimed swamp lands are very fertile, and here rice, cotton, corn, honey, beeswax, apples, peaches, and pears abound. The Scuppernong and Catawba grapes are native here; cranberries are extensively produced. The pine region is mainly uncultivated, but a large trade is done in timber, tar, and turpentine. Cotton is raised chiefly in the southern counties. The middle section is adapted to the growth of cereals, tobacco, and cotton; sweet potatoes are a leading staple. The principal manufactures are flour, lumber, tar, turpentine, rosin, cotton and woolen goods, tobacco, zinc (smelted and rolled), carriages, boots and shoes. The manufacture of cotton goods more than doubled from 1880 to 1885, there being in the latter year 80 mills, with 4,519 looms and 200,333 spindles. The increase has continued since that date. It exports coastwise and to foreign ports large amounts of lumber, cotton, tobacco, flour, and fish. The fisheries are very large and valuable. The State is very rich in minerals. Gold is mined to a considerable extent in Cabarrus, Mecklenburg, Lincoln, and Rowan Counties, and there is a branch of the United States Mint at Charlotte. Silver, lead, and zinc are found in association, particularly in Davidson County; silver ores mixed with lead or copper, principally in the interior counties; copper ores cover a wide field, and there is a very valuable mine in Ashe County; mica is found among the granites of Cleveland, Mitchell, and Yancey Counties; there is an abundance of corundum and many other metals, and even precious stones are found. Coal and iron are very abundant; the coal is mostly bituminous, and is contained in two fields, one in Stokes and Rockingham Counties, known as Dan River Field, the other in Chatham and Moore Counties, known as Deep River Field. The whole of the region from the navigable waters of the Roanoke and Cape Fear Rivers westward to Cherokee County contains rich beds of magnetic and hematite ores; the "Cranberry" mine, in Mitchell County, yields the purest magnetic ore yet found in the United States, producing a remarkably strong and tenacious iron. There are 96 Counties in North Carolina; newspapers are published in 76.

NORTH DAKOTA is bounded north by Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, South by South Dakota, east by Minnesota, and west by Montana. Length, east to west, about 355 miles. width, about 200 miles. Land area about 75,000 square miles. The Missouri River furnishes navigation for boats of three to six hundred tons burden. The Red River of the North, also navigable, drains the great wheat valley on its eastern border. That portion of the State east of the Missouri River is mostly rolling prairie; the soil on the Missouri Slope being a black, sandy loam, with clay subsoil; while in the Red River Valley it is a vegetable deposit of unsurpassed richness. West of the Missouri river the land is more broken, with stretches of excellent farming and grazing lands along the line of the Northern Pacific Railroad. In the north is a group of hills of moderate elevation known as Turtle Mountain. In the southwest is a district of eroded clay hills, called the "Bad Lands." Most of the latter forms good grazing ranges. The northern and central parts are especially adapted to the raising of wheat and other cereals, potatoes, vegetables and the earlier varieties of corn. The Red River Valley is not equalled on this continent for wheat production. The principal crops of the State are wheat, oats, barley, corn, potatoes, dairy products, butter, cheese, and wool. The rainfall is not great, but seems sufficient for ordinary years. The Missouri River and all small streams and lakes are lined with timber, and west and north of Bismarck are found inexhaustible beds of lignite coal. There are 55 Counties in North Dakota; newspapers are published in 36.

# OHIO.

OHIO is bounded north by Michigan and Lake Erie, east by Pennsylvania and West Virginia, south by West Virginia and Kentucky, and west by Indiana; greatest length from east to west 225 miles; greatest breadth 200 miles; land area, 40,700 square miles. The general character of the surface is that of a plateau of about 800 to 1,000 feet above sea level. The most prominent feature is the great divide which separates the drainage of Lake Erie from that of the Ohio River. This passes diagonally across the State from Trumbull County in the northeast to Mercer and Darke Counties in the west. Its average height is about 600 feet above the lake; and from it the surface slopes gradually northward toward the lake and southward toward the river. The rivers and streams have excavated deep valleys, which give to the surface its distinctive undulating or rolling character. The soil is universally fertile; and Ohio holds a leading position in every branch of agriculture. The uplands are well suited to wheat, the southern slope of the watershed to grain generally, the northern slope to grazing and dairying, and the northeast section or Western Reserve especially so. The bottom lands of the Miami, Muskingum, and Scioto rivers are very rich in corn; the Western Reserve and Miami regions are famous for apples. Flax and linseed are staple products, and tobacco is largely grown in most of the southern counties. The forests have largely disappeared, but several million acres of excellent hardwood timber remain. The fishing interests of Lake Erie are important. The manufactures of the State are very numerous and valuable. Iron, pork packing, farm implements, clothing, flouring and grist mill products, lumber, malt and distilled liquors are among the most important. Coal underlies a greater part of the State: iron ore is abundant, especially in the south; salt is very largely produced from springs; petroleum is an important product, also lime and cement. Good grindstones and building stones are obtained at Amherst, Berea (Berea grit), Buena Vista, and Independence. There are excellent qualities of limestone and sandstone for building, especially at Massillon and Dayton. Marl deposits abound in the Maumee Valley and other points. There are good pottery and fire clays, the fire bricks of Mineral Point being among the best in the United States. Cleveland, Massillon, Youngstown, and the towns on the Ohio River are the chief seats of the iron manufacture, which includes pig, forged, and rolled; iron castings and sheet iron works, rails, Bessemer steel rails, etc. The discovery of natural gas in apparently inexhaustible quantities at Findlay, and many other places in the State, has given its industrial interests an additional and marked impetus. The railroad facilities are rapidly increasing, and Ohio is now a net work of well constructed and busy transportation lines. There are 88 Counties in Ohio; newspapers are published in all.

OREGON is bounded north by Washington, east by Idaho, south by Nevada and California, and west by the Pacific Ocean; average length from east to west, about 300 miles; average breadth, about 260 miles; land area, 94,560 square miles. It is divided unequally by the Cascade Mountains. East of this range the surface is generally undulating table land, with high cone like hills and deep canyons. Between the Cascade and Coast Ranges is the Willamette Valley, 40 miles wide by 140 miles long, and exceedingly fertile; from the Coast Range westward the surface is mountainous, hilly, and broken. This section is suited for wool growing, stock raising, and the growth of winter wheat, barley, oats, and hay. The eastern portion does better as a stock raising region, but good wheat is grown there. In the valley, wheat, corn, hops, tobacco, wool, flax, fruit, linseed, dairy products, and potatoes are raised in large quantities. The mountain regions are abundantly forested, the principal species being fir, cedar, pine, birch, and spruce. Many of the trees are gigantic in size, and afford excellent lumber. The Rogue River Valley, on account of its mild climate, is well adapted for raising fruits and grapes and large quantities are shipped from there annually. The manufactures comprise lumber—the large Douglas spruce affording the best masts and spars in the world;—leather, boots and shoes, saddlery, milling and smelting of ores, carriages, furniture, liquors, linseed oil, etc. The packing of beef and pork, and canning of salmon are successfully carried on. The Salmon pack of 1889 was estimated at 350,000 cases; the total catch for the year at 2,000,000 pounds. Gold and silver are produced, but not in very large amounts; copper and iron ore are abundant; clay, glass sand, granite, marble, etc., are plentiful. There are 32 Counties in Oregon; newspapers are published in all.

## PENNSYLVANIA.

STATE CAPITAL, HARRISBURG.

PENNSYLVANIA is bounded north by New York and Lake Erie, east by New York and New Jersey, south by Delaware, Maryland, and West Virginia, and west by West Virginia and Ohio. Its greatest length from east to west is about 302 miles; its greatest breadth about 175 miles; mean length 280 miles; mean breadth 158 miles; land area, 44,985 square miles. The surface is exceedingly varied, chiefly level or slightly undulating in the southeast, hilly and mountainous in the interior, and generally rolling or broken in the west. A series of parallel ridges, members of the Appalachian system, each with a distinct name, traverse the State from northeast to southwest. The most eastern of these is the South Mountain, an extension of the Blue Ridge, and the western and highest the Allegheny, from which the surface slopes generally toward Ohio. Nearly one-fourth of the State is wooded, and a very large amount of lumber is manufactured, Williamsport and Lock Haven being the chief centres of this industry. The soil of the valleys and plains is generally fertile, and some of it exceedingly so. Lancaster County, and some of the counties bordering on the Ohio River, are the most productive. The State excels in dairy and market garden produce and all the agricultural staples of the Northern States. The tobacco crop is exceeded only by that of Kentucky and Virginia. Lancaster and York counties are the chief seats of the industry, Lancaster yielding nearly twice as much as any other county in the United States. Its beds of anthracite and bituminous coal and iron ore, and the great oil basin, are sources of immense wealth. Anthracite coal is found mainly in the counties of Carbon, Dauphin, Luzerne, and Schuylkill, to some extent in Columbia and Northumberland, and semi-anthracite in limited areas in Sullivan and Wyoming. Bedford, Bradford, Centre, Clearfield, Fulton, Lycoming, and Tioga counties contain fields of semi-bituminous coal, while the bituminous coal beds are located beyond the main Allegheny Ridge, every county west of it, with the exception of Erie, yielding more or less of this coal. Mercer supplies a good block coal for furnace use. The petroleum region is situated mainly in the counties of Venango, Butler, McKean, and Clarion. Salt springs abound in the same region, also natural gas wells, the gas from which is used for heating and lighting purposes. It is rich in minerals, slate, and building-stone of many kinds. There are many medicinal springs, the principal of which are at Bedford, Doubling Gap, Ephrata, Yellow Springs, and York. The southeastern corner of the State (bounded by a line running from Trenton, N. J., to Norristown, thence nearly to Lebanon, thence across the Susquehanna in a southwesterly direction to the Maryland line, east of Gettysburg) is rich in limestone and marble, of which great quantities are quarried for use in Philadelphia. This region also produces combined iron and chromium ores, hematite, magnetic iron, and corundum. Nickel is found at Lancaster, galena at Phoenixville, zinc at Friedensville and Bethlehem. A handsome black limestone is quarried at Williamsport, roofing-slates in the Lehigh and Delaware Valleys, Silurian limestone in the Cumberland Valley and at other points. In manufactures, Pennsylvania is second only to New York, and Philadelphia is one of the principal seats of foreign and coastwise trade. The leading exports are grain, provisions, petroleum, tobacco, oil cake, lumber, tallow, hides, leather, shoes, cotton goods, machinery, and coal. Erie and Pittsburgh are also great commercial centres. Kensington and Chester are the chief ship building stations. Pittsburgh, Allegheny, Harrisburg, Reading, and Scranton are the chief seats of the iron manufactures. Philadelphia is one of the great manufacturing cities of the world, and has an enormous production of iron goods, textile fabrics, and other articles. There are 67 Counties in Pennsylvania; newspapers are published in all.

STATE CAPITAL, COLUMBIA.

SOUTH CAROLINA is bounded north and northeast by North Carolina, southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, west and southwest by Georgia. Its greatest length from east to west is about 275 miles, and its greatest breadth about 210 miles; land area, 30,170 square miles. The surface presents nearly the same features as that of North Carolina. The coast for 100 miles inland is low and level, with sandy soil, numerous swamps, and extensive pine forests; then follows a tract of low sand hills, the soil of which is moderately productive. The land rises abruptly on the western edge of this belt, and continues to rise until it terminates in the Blue Ridge, the highest peak of which, Table Mountain, is 4,000 feet above the sea. The swamps embrace over 1,000,000 acres, and the pine lands 6,000,000. The sea islands are mainly devoted to sea island cotton and rice, and the palmetto grows on them; the tidal swamps to rice; inland swamps, when drained, to rice, cotton, corn and peas; the salt marshes to long cotton; the oak and pine and oak and hickory lands to corn and cotton; and the pine barrens to fruits and vegetables. Rice, cotton, and corn thrive best in the central and southern counties. The northwestern region produces corn, wheat, barley, oats, tobacco, and many fruits. Stock raising and wool growing are carried on with profit. Figs and pomegranates grow in the lower counties, and the peach and grape thrive over the State generally; strawberries abundant. The manufactures are principally cotton goods, flour, lumber, machinery, tar, turpentine, carriages, and fertilizers. Commerce is mainly confined to Charleston, Georgetown, and Beaufort. Exports are chiefly rice, cotton, lumber, phosphate, naval stores, cotton seed and its oil, oil cake, fish, and spring vegetables. Considerable shad and oyster fishing. The mineral wealth, though large, has not been much developed. Considerable gold is found in the northwestern counties; there were four mines worked in 1887 yielding \$100,000; there are large deposits of excellent iron ore in Greenville, Pickens, Spartanburg, and Union Counties; manganese, copper, lead, and bismuth are also found, mainly in the northwest; white and colored marbles and limestones, granites and cyanites, soapstones, flagging stone, and buhr stone abundant. During 1886 and 1887 there was a rapid development of the quarries, especially in Fairfield Co., where is found, what is claimed to be, the finest granite in the United States. It is of beautiful appearance, great strength and fine quality. Aiken County contains immense beds of the finest porcelain clay. A little coal is found in Chesterfield County. The most valuable mineral at the present day is, however, a bone phosphate marl, a fossil deposit of recent origin and one of the best of fertilizers, found in the lowlands and river beds near Charleston; on the Stono, Ashepoo and Edisto Rivers; also near St. Helena Sound. This product had grown from 18,000 tons in 1868-70 to 432,757 tons in 1887. In the year ending August 31, 1889, 212,101 tons were taken from the beds of navigable streams. There are 35 Counties in South Carolina; newspapers are published in all.

SOUTH DAKOTA is bounded north by North Dakota, east by Minnesota and Iowa, south by Nebraska, and west by Montana and Wyoming. Length, east to west, nearly 360 miles; width, about 240 miles. Land area about 86,000 square miles. The Missouri River furnishes navigation for boats of three to six hundred tons burden. That portion of the State east of the Missouri River is mostly rolling prairie; the soil on the Mississippi Slope being a black, sandy loam, with clay subsoil. West of the River the land is more broken, with mining and grazing land in the southwestern section or Black Hills region, which is a mountain district of nearly 5,000 square miles in extent, exceedingly rich in valuable minerals, and in great part well adapted to stock raising. It is largely forested, and with the aid of irrigation much of it might be adapted to agriculture. The northern and central parts of the State are especially adapted to the raising of wheat and other cereals, potatoes, vegetables, and the earlier varieties of corn. In the southern part corn and flax are also successfully grown. The Missouri River and all small streams and lakes are lined with timber. The principal agricultural products are wheat, corn, oats, barley and flax. Dairy products, 7,974,000 pounds of butter, 940,000 pounds of cheese. Wool clip, 1,218,100 pounds. The Black Hills possess some of the richest gold mines in the world. Tin occurs in great abundance, though as yet but little developed, from difficulty in reducing. Other important minerals are silver, copper, iron, gypsum, mica, marble, building stone, lime, brick, fire, and potter's clay, and coal. Petroleum and natural gas are also present, while various other minerals exist. There are 78 Counties in South Dakota; newspapers are published in 53.

TENNESSEE is bounded north by Kentucky and Virginia; southeast by North Carolina; south by Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi; west by Arkansas and Missouri; greatest length from east to west 482 miles, breadth 109 miles; land area, 41,750 square miles. The State is popularly divided into East, Middle, and West Tennessee. East Tennessee comprises the eastern mountain border, the beautiful East Tennessee Valley, and about half of the Cumberland Mountain plateau. Middle Tennessee reaches from about the center of the plateau to the Tennessee River, and is a region of fertile terraces, including the vast elliptical basin of nearly 5,000 square miles, known as the Garden of Kentucky. West Tennessee extends from the Tennessee River to the Mississippi, and is somewhat broken in the east, succeeded by a rolling plain descending to the latter river. The Mississippi bottom is a low, flat, alluvial plain, covered with forests and abounding with lakes and swamps. West Tennessee is extremely fertile, and produces corn and cotton in large quantities. Middle Tennessee is generally fertile, giving excellent grain, tobacco, and much cotton, especially toward the south. East Tennessee valley lands are fertile, producing corn, cotton, and winter wheat; potatoes, oats, hay, and hemp are extensively produced; great numbers of stock are raised, and the wool clip is large and excellent. Swine are extensively grown, and much attention is paid to fine breeds of horses. The leading cereals are corn, wheat, oats and rye. Peanuts form a product of some importance, yielding about 1,500,000 bushels. Tennessee is rich in marble of various kinds, limestone and other building stone; valuable copper mines exist in Polk County; coal and iron ore are very abundant. The coal deposits underlie 5,100 square miles, the yearly product is over 1,000,000 tons. Iron mining and smelting is becoming very extensive, and much iron ore is exported to the iron working towns on the Ohio River. The lumbering interest is very great, there being a very large area of valuable hardwood timber, of which about 16,000,000 acres have scarcely been touched. Wool carding and cloth dressing are carried on extensively. Flouring and grist mill products are very large. Union County contains zinc and lead mines. Colored marbles are found in immense quantities in East and West Tennessee; roofing slates in East Tennessee; hydraulic limestone in East, Middle and West Tennessee; there are also building limestone, sandstone, and granite; fire and potter's clay. There are 96 Counties in Tennessee; newspapers are published in 89.

TEXAS is bounded north by New Mexico, the Indian Territory, and Arkansas, east by the Indian Territory, Arkansas, and Louisiana, southeast by the Gulf of Mexico, southwest by Mexico, and west by New Mexico; greatest length about 825 miles; greatest breadth about 840 miles; land area, 262,290 square miles. From the Sabine River to the Trinity River is the great timber region, generally level and sandy in the south, rolling and fertile in the north. From the Trinity to the Colorado is prairie, timbered along streams, with an extensive forest in the north called the "Cross Timbers." The total area of timber is about 86,000,000 acres, of which 25,000,000 is in pines. The pecan tree is widely distributed, and is a valuable nut bearing tree, its yield in 1887 being estimated at 9,000,000 pounds. Western Texas embraces the counties between the Colorado and Rio Grande; four-fifths of it is prairie; timber generally confined to banks of streams. Between the Colorado and the Brazos Rivers are the Comanche and Leon River Mountain ranges. In the north and northwest are the Church and Double Mountains, and the surface is generally broken until the Llano Estacado, or Staked Plain, is reached, when the surface is gently undulating, and vegetation scanty. Between the Pecos and Rio Grande are several ranges, sometimes attaining an elevation of 5,000 feet. The chief crops are cotton, corn, and wheat. The former two may be grown in nearly any part of the State, but especially in the eastern and central sections; the latter chiefly in the north and centre. Sea island cotton is grown on the coast. Sugar cane is raised chiefly on the Brazos and other rivers, near their mouths, and rice in the southeast. Oats, barley, tobacco, and sweet and white potatoes are grown to a moderate extent. Swine thrive on the abundant mast of the forests. The chief occupation westward is stock raising and wool growing. Figs and oranges thrive in the south. Manufacturing interests are increasing. The leading products are lumber, cotton seed oil, flour, carriages, foundry and machine shop products, woolens, marble, etc. There are immense deposits of copper along the line of the Texas Pacific Railroad; coal, timber, limestone, soapstone and iron are found in the same region. Argentiferous galena is found in large quantities in northwestern Texas; immense quantities of magnetic iron in Mason, Llano, and the western counties which is now being developed. There is a field of lignite coal about 6,000 square miles in extent, and a field of semi-anthracite in Brown, Coleman, Comanche, and Hamilton Counties. Salt is produced in large quantities from springs in El Paso, Lampasas, and Llano Counties; asphaltum is abundant. Large quantities of saltpetre are found in Blanco and Burnet Counties; marble and roofing slate, grindstones, potter and fire clays, marl and other fertilizers are found in great quantities. In 1888 Texas still contained over 67,000,000 acres of public lands, an area larger than that of any State, but California and Nevada. There are 245 Counties in Texas; newspapers are published in 192.

STATE CAPITAL, MONTPELIER.

VERMONT is the most northwesterly of the New England States, bounded north by Quebec, east by New Hampshire, south by Massachusetts, and west by New York. It is 143 miles long by from 40 to 85 miles wide, with a land area of 9,135 square miles. The Green Mountains traverse it from north to south, mainly in two ranges, generally covered with dense forests, but affording excellent pasturage. Western Vermont and a large tract of the eastern part comprise beautiful pastoral regions, but the central part is rugged and mountainous. The best soil is found on the western slope of the mountains near the border of Lake Champlain, and in the valley lands of the Connecticut River. The State occupies a prominent position in agriculture. When its area, population, amount of forest land, and long severe winters are considered, there is perhaps no other State that yields so large a return. All the ordinary agricultural staples are abundantly produced; wool and dairy products are large and excellent; cattle, sheep, and horses are raised in large numbers, and the yield of maple sugar is unequalled. Manufactures occupy a prominent position in its industries, and cover a wide range of goods, including flour, furniture, cotton and woolen goods, leather, agricultural tools, tin and copper ware, lumber, etc. Large quantities of lumber are exported, and marble and slate extensively quarried. The principal marble quarries are at Brandon, Dorset, Isle La Motte, Manchester, Middlebury, New Haven, Pittsford, Proctorsville, (serpentine), Roxbury (verd-antique), Rutland, Shelburn, Sutherland Falls, Swanton and West Rutland; slate quarries at Castleton, Fair Haven, Guilford, Northfield, Pawlet and Poultney granite at Barre and Brattleboro. Potters' clay comes from Bennington and Rutland; steatite from Castleton and Grafton. Manganese, brown hematite, kaolin and ochre from Brandon, South Wallingford and Manchester Centre; copper ore from Vershire and Corinth. Rutland is the largest marble centre in the world, not less than \$6,000,000 of capital and 4,000 men being employed in 15 quarries and 20 mills. The total output of marble in 1889 was 3,863,500 cubic feet. During the last ten years the development of the granite business at Barre, six miles from Montpelier, has been very large. Nearly \$2,000,000 of capital and 1,200 men are employed in it, while the 1889 output was 364,961 cubic feet. Burlington is a large large market for Vermont and Ottawa lumber, having extensive mills and a trade extending throughout the Eastern States. Vermont continues to be the greatest breeding state of fine horses (Morgans and Hambletonians) and of Spanish merino sheep. Every year numbers of these superior animals are shipped to all parts of this country, to South America and to Australia. There are 14 Counties in Vermont; newspapers are published in 13.

STATE CAPITAL, RICHMOND.

VIRGINIA is bounded north by West Virginia and Maryland, east by Maryland and the Atlantic Ocean, south by North Carolina and Tennessee, and west by Kentucky and West Virginia. Its greatest length from east to west is about 440 miles, its greatest breadth 192 miles; land area, 40,125 square miles. The surface is divided into six great natural divisions, the Tidewater comprising the south and southeast; the Middle, an undulating plain, extending westward to the Coast Range; the Piedmont, from the Coast Range to the Blue Ridge Mountains, and from the Potomac River to North Carolina; the Blue Ridge, stretching across the State in a southwesterly direction; the Valley—a part of the great Appalachian Valley, reaching from Canada to Alabama—a broad belt of rolling country between the Blue Ridge and the Kittatinny or North Mountain; and the Appalachian, a mountainous region traversed by the Alleghenies. The soil in the Tidewater region is a light sandy loam, yielding large crops of vegetables and small fruits. The Valley Region has a rich fertile soil, well adapted for cereals, of which corn, wheat, oats and rye are the principal. Much of the Mountain Region is uncultivated and chiefly forest land; but the parallel valleys are very fertile. The Piedmont, Blue Ridge, Valley, and Appalachian regions are noted for their grasses. The yield of tobacco is only equaled by that of Kentucky. Some cotton is grown in the Tide-water section; fruit grows all over the State. A considerable part of the tide water region is devoted to raising early vegetables for northern markets. Dairying, stock raising, and wool-growing are important industries. The timber export is large. There are profitable fisheries of bass, shad, etc., and the oyster trade is very important. The manufacturing interests are comparatively small, but are increasing, the chief seats being Richmond, Alexandria, Danville, and Lynchburg. The more important products are iron, tobacco, leather, coke, cotton, paper, agricultural implements, machinery, etc. Virginia has excellent natural advantages for commerce, but it is only lately that she has begun to take a prominent part in foreign trade. There are beds of anthracite, semi-bituminous, and bituminous coal in the southwestern counties, not much developed; salt is an important product of this region. There are coal bearing strata in other parts of the State, particularly near Richmond; the coal is bituminous, and generally of good quality. Virginia has vast beds of gypsum and marl, abundant iron ore, fine granite, marble, and other building stones; zinc, sulphur, kaolin, fire clay, and many other minerals. It abounds in mineral springs of great reputation. Iron and manganese are extensively mined, also zinc and lead ores. Lime burning is an important industry. Considerable quantities of coal are produced from the Trans-Appalachian district, the total coal output increasing from 300,000 tons in 1883 to 1,250,000 in 1887. There are 100 Counties in Virginia; newspapers are published in 76.

WASHINGTON is bounded north by British Columbia, west by the Pacific Ocean, east by Idaho and south by Oregon. Its average length, east to west, is 330 miles; width, 220 miles; land area 69,994 square miles. It is divided by the Cascade Mountains, into two distinct parts. Western Washington is a fine timber country, with many fertile valleys, well settled and very productive in vegetables which grow to an immense size, fruit of all kinds, and hops. Dairying is an interest of growing importance. Extensive coal and iron mines are being operated, coke ovens established, and the State will be, in a short time, the Pennsylvania of the Pacific Coast. The discoveries during the past two years have been of copper, silver, galena and gold mines, all of which are rapidly being developed. There is also an abundance of iron ore, limestone, granite, marble, etc. Eastern Washington is especially adapted for the raising of all kinds of grain, fruit, vegetables, hops, corn, and particularly wheat. The climate is perfection; the mean average temperature for the year being 53°. It is the best agricultural country on the Pacific Coast. Cattle and stock of all kinds do remarkably well; the ranges are good and it is not considered necessary to feed the stock in the winter time, owing to the generally light snow fall and the abundance of natural grasses. Puget Sound, is itself a vast harbor, having an extent of 1,594 miles of shore line, and Seattle, its principal sea port, is fast becoming the metropolis of the northwest Pacific Coast. Fish of all kinds abound, and the canning of salmon employs many hundred people in the season. Manufacturing establishments are increasing every day and the State is on the eve of great developments. Ship building is one of the most important industries. The principal articles of export are lumber, coal, wheat and salmon. Hops are a leading product of Western Washington, the yield in 1888 being 35,492 bales. The output of coal for the same year was 1,215,715 tons; that of lumber was 760,985,145 feet. Of the area of the State, 20,000,000 acres are in timber, with 10,000,000 additional of mineral and mountain lands, mostly timbered. Parts of this area bear immense trees, ten to twelve feet in diameter and 300 feet high. There are 34 Counties in Washington; newspapers are published in 33.

WEST VIRGINIA is bounded north and east by Pennsylvania and Maryland, east and south by Virginia, and west by Kentucky and Ohio. Its greatest length from north to south is about 240 miles; greatest breadth, 160 miles; land area, 24,645 square miles. A large part of the surface is mountainous and hilly; about two-thirds is covered with forest. The soil of the ridges is fertile to the tops, and the summits of many mountains are flat, natural meadows or glades. The valley of the Great Kanawha is the finest grazing region of the State. Blue grass is indigenous; the lumber trade is important, the forests being principally composed of hardwood timber of the most valuable kinds. Nearly the whole of the State lies within the Allegheny coal system, and large quantities of coal are exported both by river and rail, and new mines are constantly being opened. The total area underlain by coal is estimated at not less than 16,000 square miles. The production increased from 600,000 tons in 1873 to over 4,000,000 tons in 1886. It is generally bituminous. The Kanawha Valley is one of the great salt producing regions of the United States. Petroleum is extensively produced, chiefly in Ritchie, Pleasants, Marshall, Wood, and Wirt Counties. Natural gas is found in several sections, Wheeling and the Northern Pan Handle using it as a fuel almost to the exclusion of coal. Limestone, sandstone, and grinding stone abound generally through the State. The minerals and mineral springs are inexhaustible. West Virginia is especially famous for wool, while the live stock interests generally are large. Other great staples are corn, wheat, oats, and tobacco. Manufactures are comparatively undeveloped, except in the towns along the Ohio River. The State has enormous water power, all its streams having a rapid descent, but so far this has been but little utilized. The leading industries are steel and iron in various forms, glass, flour, salt, wood pulp, liquor, lumber, queensware and porcelain, fire brick, leather, cigars and tobacco, and machinery. The cigar manufacture is important, there being produced in the year ending June, 30, 1889, 46,928,300 cigars in 114 factories. Wheeling is the largest and most important city; it is the manufacturing center and all the industries enumerated above, except salt, flourish there. There are 54 Counties in West Virginia; newspapers are published in all.

STATE CAPITAL, MADISON.

WISCONSIN is bounded north by Lake Superior, northeast by Michigan, east by Lake Michigan, south by Illinois, and west by Iowa and Minnesota. Its greatest length from north to south is 300 miles; greatest breadth, 260 miles; land area, 54,450 square miles. The surface is generally an elevated plain, with high bluffs along the rivers and lakes, and elsewhere gently undulating, diversified with prairie, woodlands, and numerous lakes. The State ranks high in agricultural products. The northern part of the State is heavily timbered but is fast settling up. In 1886 the forest area still occupied about one half the State. It has a somewhat severe climate, but outside the wooded country the soil is good, producing large crops but not of corn. The lumber business of this section of the State, in pine and hard wood, has built up many large and flourishing inland cities like Oshkosh, Eau Claire, Wausau, Chippewa Falls, Stevens' Point, Merrill and Shawano. During the past three years an immense deposit of the best iron ore, extending across the entire northern part of the State and known as the Gogebic iron belt, has developed many valuable mines, and the shipments of Bessemer and hematite ore have added millions of wealth to the productive capacity of the State and largely increased the population. Galena limestone, lead, and zinc exist in the southwest, chiefly near Mineral Point. One of the best hydraulic cements comes from the neighborhood of Milwaukee. Wheat, corn, rye, oats, barley, potatoes, dairy products, and maple sugar are all raised in large quantities; hops are exceedingly prolific; fruit growing is an important industry. Cheese and butter making have increased to enormous proportions, especially in the central and southern counties, and the growing of seed leaf tobacco for wrappers has become an important and profitable industry, the product commanding the highest market price. The leading agricultural products are oats, corn, wheat, barley, tobacco, butter and cheese. Large numbers of horses are bred; sheep are numerous, and the wool clip large and valuable. The lakes and streams abound with fish, especially trout and black bass. Manufactures are thriving and numerous, lumber and wood work of all kinds holding a very prominent position. The manufactures of furniture, wagons, agricultural implements, leather and brooms are large and increasing, while at Milwaukee are situated several of the largest and wealthiest beer brewing corporations in the world, and the manufactures of cotton and woolen goods, nails, steel rails and merchant iron are conspicuous and valuable. There are 70 Counties in Wisconsin; newspapers are published in all.

WYOMING is bounded north by Montana, east by Dakota and Nebraska, south by Colorado and Utah, and west by Utah, Idaho, and Montana; length, east to west, 365 miles; width, 274 miles; land area, 97,575 square miles. Its surface is broken by mountain ranges, deep river canons, flat topped hills or buttes, the latter a feature of South Wyoming, and which rise from valley or plain like walled cities or mounds. There are large elevated plateaus or parks, of which the principal is the Great Yellowstone or National Park. There are extensive areas of pine and spruce timber, widely distributed throughout the mountain regions. Stock raising, sheep husbandry, and coal mining are the leading pursuits. Irrigation is needed in a large part of the country to make the soil productive. It is estimated that 10,000,000 acres may be reclaimed by irrigation. This is being actively applied, more than 4,500 miles of irrigation ditches having been dug in the past ten years. The question of the formation of resevoirs by the Government is under consideration. Gold and silver are plentiful. There are vast beds of iron ore and plenty of good coal, the latter underlying 30,000 square miles of territory, much of it workable. In 1888 nearly 2,000 miners were employed, the product being 1,455,240 tons. Gypsum, salt, soda, sulphur, copper, lead, tin, and other minerals are found. Petroleum seems abundant in central and northern Wyoming. It is produced to some extent. In manufactures, the sawing of lumber and railroad ties, milling of quartz, and railroad repair and machine shops in the towns on the line of the Union Pacific Railroad, occupy the leading places. There are 13 Counties in Wyoming; newspapers are published in all.

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# ALASKA.

Population, White, 4,303; Indian, 23,274; Other Races, 4,218. Total, 31,795.

## TERRITORIAL CAPITAL, SITKA.

ALASKA is bounded north by the Arctic Ocean, east by the Northwest Territories of Canada, west and south by the Pacific Ocean, Behring's Sea and Strait, and numerous islands. It has a land area of about 577,000 square miles, its greatest length, from north to south, being 1100 miles and greatest breadth over 700 miles. The northern half is low with great swampy morasses along the streams, running back into low, rolling hills. Native Indians inhabit that section, living along the streams in small bands. The southern half is mountainous, and along the southwest coast are some of the highest mountain peaks on the American continent; Mount St. Elias, the highest, is estimated at 20,000 feet. The northwesterly section comprises the peninsula of Aliaska and the Aleutian islands, the latter the seat of the valuable fur seal and sea otter fisheries. This district is mountainous and actively volcanic. The principal industry at present is mining, the country being seamed by the largest quartz veins in the world. The Alaska Mill and Mining Co. have erected a \$600,000 plant of 120 stamps, and chlorination works on Douglas Island, across the bay from Juneau, which have been running night and day for five years. Their ledge of solid quartz is 600 feet wide, and the ore averages about \$14 per ton. The company ships \$100,000 a month in gold bricks. Other mining companies are erecting works on the same island, and at Berner's Bay, fifty miles north of Juneau, and in the Basin near the city. In a few years the fisheries and forests of red and yellow cedar will yield large returns. The Seal Islands in Behring Sea pay an enormous yearly revenue to the government. The two principal cities are Sitka, the capital, with a population of 550, and Juneau, the metropolis and supply point with a population of 1,200. The western coast, from the southern boundary to Cape Spencer, is lined with a continuous chain of islands, many of them as large as the State of Maine. Between the islands and mainland are salt water channels, navigable for the largest sized steamships. In the interior is one of the largest rivers in the world, the Yukon, navigable for 2,000 miles, and 60 miles wide at the mouth. The climate along the coast is wet and warm, the thermometer in winter rarely going 5 degrees below zero. In the interior it is warm in summer, but cold in winter.

# BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Population 92,767.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, VICTORIA.

BRITISH COLUMBIA is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by the Pacific Ocean and Alaska, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States), on the east by the Rocky Mountains and the meridian of 120° west. It is the largest of all the Canadian Provinces, having an area of 390,344 square miles. It includes a number of islands, the largest being Vancouver, which contains the capital of the Province, has an area of about 14,000 square miles, and produces the finest coal on the Pacific Coast. Over 300,000 tons are exported annually to the United States, and the quantity is steadily increasing. The Province is about 700 miles long and 500 wide. The Fraser River, its principal stream, is 800 miles long, and 600 yards wide at its mouth; its valley containing much the greater part of the arable land. Its surface is largely mountainous and densely wooded, producing trees of enormous size. Lumbering is one of the principal industries, but as the land becomes cleared the soil is found very fertile and a considerable area is well adapted for agriculture of all kinds. The fruit growing industry is expected to become important. The climate is temperate and healthy, and is particularly suited for stock raising. Gold has been found in large quantities, and mining it is one of the chief industries. Upwards of \$15,000,000 of this metal have been exported during the last 15 years. Copper, and iron ore are widely distributed, and many other minerals are found. The fisheries are also very valuable, their produce in 1886 having been reckoned at \$4,834,848. Fur bearing animals are very numerous. The principal town on the mainland is Vancouver, the terminus of the Pacific Canadian Railway. Newspapers are published in 5 Districts.

# MANITOBA.

Population 154,442.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, WINNIPEG.

MANITOBA is bounded south by Minnesota and North Dakota, east by Ontario and Keewatin and north and west by Keewatin and the Northwest Territories, and has an area of 60,520 square miles. Its surface is principally prairie land, with groves of timber along the rivers and streams. The soil is probably the richest in the world, and produces the finest wheat known in the market. In 1887 the average yield was 27.7 bushels per acre. All other cereals grow and ripen in great abundance, and so do vegetables and small fruits of all kinds. For grazing and cattle raising the facilities are unbounded, hay being chiefly made from the prairie grasses, which are very nutritious, and in illimitable abundance. Cultivated grasses also answer well. Coal of the lignitic variety, is abundant though mining operations have not yet been attempted. The Laurentian district of the north and east are thought to be rich in other minerals, though they are as yet unexplored. This region gives a rich section in furs, while its streams are full of fish. The growth of the Province has been very rapid, the increase in population between 1881 and 1886 having been 74.56 per cent. Winnipeg is on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which passes through the Province from east to west, and from it several railways branch out into the Province and the United States. The means of water communication are also very considerable. Newspapers are published in 6 Districts.

# NORTHWEST TERRITORIES.

Population 99,723.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT, REGINA.

The NORTHWEST TERRITORIES are bounded north by the Arctic Ocean, east by the Atlantic Ocean and Hudson's Bay, west by Alaska and British Columbia, and south by the United States and portions of the Dominion. They cover an area of about 2,646,730 square miles, and were formerly known as the Hudson's Bay Territory. In 1882 four provisional districts were formed, viz: Alberta, Saskatchewan, Assiniboia and Athabasca. The population of the first three at a census taken in 1885 was 48,362. The four districts contain 431,000 square miles, or 275,840,000 acres, the greater number of which are fit for cultivation. The fertile belt of the Saskatchewan Valley alone contains an area of 64,000 square miles, with a rich and deep soil of vegetable mould, while still better wheat lands exist in the valleys of the Athabasca and Pease Rivers, a region of very extensive area. Assiniboia and Saskatchewan contain the best wheat lands, while Alberta is peculiarly well adapted for grazing and stock raising. Upwards of 4,000,000 acres are already under lease for these purposes, on which are more than 100,000 head of cattle. The Canadian Pacific Railway runs through Assiniboia and Alberta. The population of the remainder of the Territories consists principally of Hudson Bay Company employes and Indians. An immense coal field 300 miles wide commences 150 miles east of the Rocky Mountains and extends to the Arctic Ocean, and is now being worked in several places. Lumber is also abundant in many places, so that a good supply of fuel is amply provided for. The completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway has given an impetus to farming and cattle-raising that is rapidly settling the southern portion of the country, while the placing of powerful steamers on the Athabasca, the Pease and Mackenzie Rivers of the North is destined at an early day to open up to settlement the immense tracts of mineral and timber land that constitute almost all the "North Country." These steamers ply in waters two thousand miles north of the North Saskatchewan and far within the Arctic Circle. Newspapers are published in 12 towns.

## ALBERTA DISTRICT. (W.) Pop. 26,123

The Rocky Mountains and foot hills occupy the western section; undulating to the east; southwest portion excellent for grazing. Here are the great cattle ranges of Canada, with over 110,000 cattle, 25,000 horses, and numerous sheep. Dairying a promising industry. The supply of timber is immense. Coal is abundant on the Bow and Belly Rivers; some mining done. Iron ore occurs, and large deposits of petroleum have been found. The mountain section is rich in minerals, including iron, gold, silver, galena, and copper. At Banff, in the mountains, is the National Park of Canada. # NEW BRUNSWICK.

Population 321,294.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, FREDERICTON.

NEW BRUNSWICK is bounded north by Quebec, east by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, west and south by the Bay of Fundy, part of Nova Scotia, and Maine. It is 210 miles in length and 180 miles in breadth, and has a coast line of about 500 miles. Its area is 27,174 square miles. Surface generally very undulating, there being scarcely an elevation on the west coast exceeding 300 feet, while on the north there is a section of mountainous character, consisting of hills of considerable elevation, covered with dense forest, and surrounded by fertile valleys and table lands. Its forests are very extensive, and lumbering is one of the principal industries. The climate is very healthy and the soil fertile, with great agricultural capabilities. The principal cereals, root plants, and vegetables are raised, with apples and the small fruits. Ship building formerly extensively carried on, has fallen off of late years. The fisheries, viz: salmon smelt, herring and lobster, are second in value only to those of Nova Scotia. Coal, antimony copper, iron, manganese and other minerals are found in considerable quantities. Manufactures are chiefly sawed lumber and wooden wares, cotton and woolen goods, refined sugar, rope and cordage, canned goods, polished granite, boots and shoes, edge tools, furniture, paper, castings, machinery, locomotives, etc. Chief exports—lumber, fish, cotton goods, potatoes, butter and eggs, beef and mutton, gypsum, hay, etc. Newspapers are published in 11 Counties.

## ALBERT CO. (S.E.).....Pop. 10,971

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, HALIFAX.

NOVA SCOTIA consists of a very narrow peninsula, connected with New Brunswick by a narrow isthmus about 16 miles wide, and of the island of Cape Breton. It is bounded on the north by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, on the east and south by the Atlantic, on the west by the Bay of Fundy and New Brunswick. It is 300 miles long and from 80 to 100 wide, with an area of 20,907 square miles, or about 13,000,000 acres, of which 5,000,000 are fit for tillage. The Cobequid Range runs through the interior, the soil on both sides of it being very fertile; which is also the case in the beautiful valley of the Annapolis River. The soil is very rich and productive, and agricultural productions are extensive, wheat, rye, oats, barley, buckwheat, corn, vegetables, and fruit growing abundantly. Apples are exported in considerable quantities. The forests are extensive and valuable, and the yield of timber is large. The principal minerals are coal, iron and gold. Coal is in great abundance, and is freely worked, 250,000 tons being exported in 1886. Iron is in large quantities and practically inexhaustible; it is of a fine quality and commands the highest price in the market. There are 58 gold mines in working order, the value produced in 1886 being \$455,564. Manganese, gypsum, and roofing slate abound. Manufactures are numerous, and include coarse cloth, flannels, blankets, carpets, boots and shoes, saddlery, furniture and farm implements. Ship-building is important. The fisheries are reckoned among the richest in the world. The capital city, Halifax, is situated on the west side of the harbor of that name, and contains about 40,000 inhabitants. The harbor is one of the finest in existence over half a mile in width at its narrowest part, and extensive enough to contain all the navies of the world. Halifax is the winter port for the direct mail steamers, and has direct communication with Liverpool, Boston, Baltimore, Quebec and the West Indies. As a summer resort it is yearly becoming better known; its suburbs furnish the pleasantest of drives and superior bathing facilities, and its public gardens have been pronounced by all who have visited them the most beautiful on this side of the Atlantic. Newspapers are published in 16 Counties.

# ONTARIO.

Population 2,112,989.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, TORONTO.

ONTARIO is bounded on the east by Quebec, and the Labrador peninsula, north and north-west by Hudson's Bay and the Northwest Territories, southwest and south by the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River, west by Manitoba, and has an area of 181,800 square miles, exclusive of its water surface. It is the most populous and wealthy Province of the Dominion of Canada, and contains a number of large cities with populations of from 30,000 to 45,000, amongst others being Ottawa, population 35,000, which is the seat of Government and capital of the Dominion. Surface is mostly undulating, traversed by the Laurentian Hills and Blue Mountains, but except in the neighborhood of Lake Superior and Georgian Bay these nowhere exceed a few hundred feet in height. The agricultural resources are very great. Three-fourths of the present area of habitation is fertile, while an immense region beyond is capable of cultivation; very large crops of cereals are raised. The apple orchards of the southwest are very productive, and small fruits and vegetables are prolific. Stock raising and dairy farming succeed remarkably well, cattle, butter and cheese being exported in large quantities. Timber is largely produced and exported, including pine, oak, maple, walnut, hickory, etc. There are very extensive saw mills at Ottawa. The mineral treasures are exceedingly rich and varied; iron, copper, lead and silver are very abundant. Some gold has been found between Georgian Bay and the Ottawa River; petroleum, salt, rock salt and peat beds also exist, the annual yield of petroleum being nearly 16,000,000 gallons. Mica is extensively worked. Marble, said to be equal to that of Carrara, is quarried. Galena, plumbago, and various other minerals exist. Manufactures are rapidly increasing in number and importance, among the principal being agricultural implements of all kinds, wagons, carriages, railroad stock, including locomotives, cotton and woolen factories, tanneries, furniture, paper, soap, wooden ware factories, etc. The railway enterprise is very great, and in addition to the great trunk lines, the Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian Pacific, every important section has competing lines stretching out to it. Its educational system is a combination of the best features of those of other countries, and is claimed to be the best in the world, especially in its common schools. Newspapers are published in 47 Counties.

Newspapers are published in 2 Counties.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, QUEBEC.

QUEBEC is bounded north by Hudson Bay, east by Labrador and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, south by New Brunswick, Maine, New Hampshire and New York, southwest by the Ottawa River, which separates it from Ontario. Length from east to west 700 to 1,000 miles, breadth about 300 miles; area about 188,688 square miles. Surface south of St. Lawrence generally hilly, northern part mountainous and rocky and abounding in rivers and small lakes. A great part of the surface is covered with forests. Soil in many districts is rich, and cereals grow well. Oats, potatoes and hay are the chief crops; also wheat, barley, rye, buckwheat, flax, peas and beans are raised. Hops and apples are extensively grown. Cattle raising and cheese dairying are important industries. Copper and mica abound in the eastern townships, and iron almost everywhere. Lead, silver, platinum, zinc, etc., are in abundance, and there are large deposits of phosphate of lime in the Ottawa River district; 26,000 tons were exported in 1886. Gold is found in several places. The lumber industry is the principal one. The fisheries are also important and rank next to those of New Brunswick in value. Ship building is carried on in Quebec. Lumber is a valuable article of export. The principal manufactures are cloth, linen, furniture, leather, sawed timber, flax, iron and hardware, paper, chemicals, boots and shoes, cotton and woolen goods, agricultural implements, etc. Montreal, though not the capital, is the largest city in the Province and the commercial capital of the Dominion. Newspapers are published in 29 Counties.

NEWFOUNDLAND is in the Atlantic Ocean, at the mouth of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, bounded north and northeast by Labrador (Belle Isle Straits intervening); Cape Breton is off its southwest point; east by the Atlantic Ocean, and west by the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Its extreme length is 350 miles; average breadth 130 miles, and area 40,200 square miles. Surface generally rugged, with numerous lakes and rivers; not much timber, except along the streams and on the western side of the island. Soil is fertile near many of the lakes and rivers, and in many places farming is profitable. Wheat grows well; so do potatoes and green crops generally; apples and small fruits are profitable. The timber lands are unsettled, and lumbering is not carried on. Copper and lead are mined; the other minerals comprise iron, silver, manganese, nickle, plumbago, marble, limestone, coal, etc. The fisheries, both on the Grand Bank and in-shore, are very extensive and valuable. The seal fishery employs many vessels and steamers. The Newfoundland cod fishery is the most extensive of the kind in the world. The aggregate annual catch of cod in North American waters is estimated at about 150,000,000 fish, worth about \$15,000,000. Principal exports are fish and fish-oils, seal-oil and skins, and amount to more than \$5,000,000 annually. Manufactures are very limited, and are confined to St. John's. The coast of Labrador, on the mainland, is now included in the colony; it comprises about 120,000 square miles, but has only 4,211 inhabitants. Newspapers are published in 4 districts.

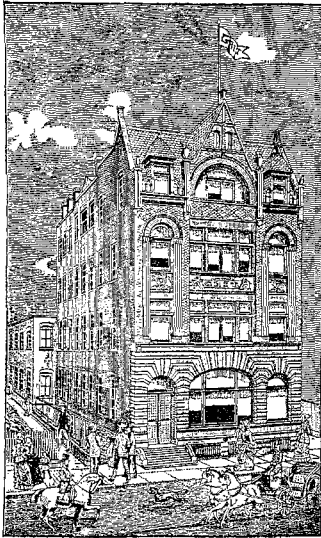
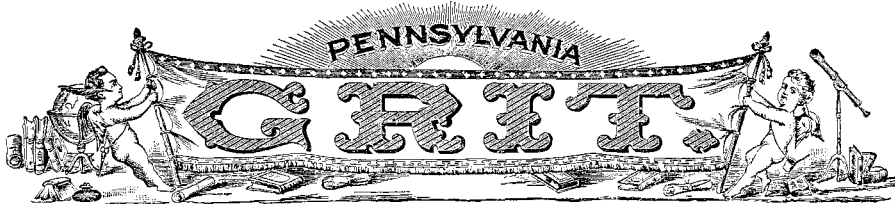

It is equipped with two of the latest improved Bullock perfecting presses, each having a capacity of turning out 12,000 *Telegrams* per hour. It has duplicate 50 horse-power engines and boilers and three electric light dynamos, two incandescent and one arc. It has a thoroughly equipped jobbing department, and one of the finest photo-engraving plants in the country. The *Elmira Telegram* was started in the spring of 1879, with an edition of 1,800 on a cash capital of \$75.00. To-day it has a plant valued at \$300,000, and does an annual business of over \$200,000. It employs over one hundred people at the home office; has well organized and thoroughly equipped branch offices in Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Binghamton and Wilkes-Barre, besides over a hundred paid correspondents and representatives scattered all over the country, looking after the interests of the *Telegram*. #### LONG STREETS OF PHILADELPHIA.

Although Washington is known as the "city of magnificent distances," Philadelphia may well claim a portion of the title, for no city in the world has streets in any way approaching the length of some of Philadelphia's principal thoroughfares. The most prominent, of course, though not quite the longest, is Broad street, which stretches away for nine and three-quarter miles in a line so straight that nothing but an official survey can detect the very slight deviation in the southern portion of the street. But for that slight variation from a straight line the street would extend due north and south for its entire length from League Island on the south to Fisher's Lane, at Logan station, on the north. Throughout that distance the only obstacle is the City Hall at the intersection of Market street. On the city plan, Broad street is laid down as extending to the city line, near Oak Lane Station, but it has not been opened above Fisher's Lane.

The longest open street is Second, which begins down near League Island, where it is known as League Island road, and later on as Old Second street. When it gets above the built-up portion of the city it is called Second street pike, and extends to Fox Chase, a distance of about fifteen miles. It is nearly all stores.

Germantown avenue is about ten miles long within the city limits, extending from Front and Laurel streets diagonally towards the northwest through Germantown and Chestnut Hill, crossing over into Montgomery county in the Wissahickon Valley on the other side of Chestnut Hill. Ridge Avenue is but slightly shorter, extending in the same general direction from Ninth and Vine streets to the Montgomery county line.

Of the numbered streets Fifth comes next to Second in length, being about six and a half miles long, while most of the other numbered streets average about five and a half miles. Frankford avenue, running through Kensington, Frankford and the Thirty-fifth ward, is eight miles long, while the proposed Richmond avenue, from the City Hall to Torresdale, would be twelve miles long.

The longest East and West is Market street, which runs from the Delaware River to Cobb's Creek, the boundary line between Philadelphia and Delaware county, a distance of five and a half miles.
