## a. Technical Progress Reports

1. In addition to the required reports set forth elsewhere in this Schedule, the preparation and submission of regularly recurring Technical Progress Reports will be required in any contract resulting from this solicitation. These reports will require descriptive information about the activities undertaken during the reporting period and will require information about planned activities for future reporting periods. The frequency and specific content of these reports will be determined prior to contract award. ## b. Reports/Deliverables

- 1. Earned Value Management (EVM) reports EVM data is entered into the ProSight system on a monthly basis. EVM reports will be reviewed by the Project Officer (PO) in consultation with the Contract Officer (CO) to validate cost and schedule variances to determine acceptable levels before the EVM information is entered into Prosight system for OMB submission. The report shall be delivered to the PO 20 calendar days prior to the designated monthly submission date into the ProSight system. If levels are outside acceptable levels, the contractor shall draft an explanation to be reviewed by the PO on causation and mitigation efforts to re-establish acceptable variance levels. All drafted explanations will be dated, signed off by the PO, and attached to EVM reports.
- **2. Monthly Progress Reports**: The Contractor shall prepare and submit a monthly progress report that describes by sub-project, the monthly and cumulative hours and dollars spent. Development and maintenance and operations costs should be itemized separately. The plan shall be in a format that is exportable to Excel. Projected estimates for each column shall be provided for comparison. Monthly and cumulative grand totals

for the entire project shall also be provided. Hourly and dollar variance for the entire project shall be provided. Projected project and sub-project end dates should be provided based on dollars and hours.

- **3. Data Quality Reports** -As the CTEP-ESYS matures, data quality will be critical to maintaining information assurance and data integrity. At the discretion of the PO, the contractor shall prepare and submit data quality reports on data discrepancies encountered with applications that are central to the mission of CTEP (i.e., adverse events, patient accruals, number of active organizations). The Contractor shall track data quality report discrepancies and followed up for resolution and document the details. The Contractor shall compile and incorporate data quality information into an enterprise scorecard for Total Quality Management efforts as deemed necessary to maintain effective data governance.
- **4. Quarterly Financial reports supporting Capital Planning and Investment Control (CPIC)** -The Contractor shall prepare and submit quarterly financial reports to support OMB submission requirements for a major CPIC investment. The report shall be utilized as a managerial tool to keep the project on target to meet performance milestones as defined by ANSI/EIA Standard 748. The reports shall provide continuous guidance on planning, scheduling, and budgeting to define the work, assign responsibilities, define indirect procedures, establish proper management controls, schedule the work, authorized all work, time phase the work, and develop cost accounts.
- **5. Final Report**: The Contractor shall prepare and submit a final report that includes a summation of the work performed and results obtained for the entire contract period of performance. This report shall be in sufficient detail to describe comprehensively the work conducted. A final report shall be submitted on or before the last day of the contract performance period.

The Contracting Officer hereby delegates the Project Officer as the Contracting Officer's authorized representative responsible for signing software license agreements issued as a result of this contract.

The Government may unilaterally change its Project Officer designation.

## ARTICLE G.2. KEY PERSONNEL, HHSAR 352.270-5 (January 2006)

The key personnel specified in this contract are considered to be essential to work performance. At least 30 days prior to diverting any of the specified individuals to other programs or contracts (or as soon as possible, if an individual must be replaced, for example, as a result of leaving the employ of the Contractor), the Contractor shall notify the Contracting Officer and shall submit comprehensive justification for the diversion or replacement request (including proposed substitutions for key personnel) to permit evaluation by the Government of the impact on performance under this contract. ## ARTICLE G.3. RECIPIENTS REIMBURSEMENT PROCEDURES

a. The Contractor shall provide scheduled reports and special CTEP-ESYS queries to third party sources (i.e., Collaborators with whom CTEP is co-developing investigational agents; Companies supplying agents for CTEP-sponsored or CTEP-approved trials; Cooperative Groups; investigators; etc.). To protect patient confidentiality and proprietary data, all requests from non-CTEP sources shall first be reviewed and approved by the CTEP Regulatory Affairs Branch (RAB). The Project Officer shall be carbon copied on all correspondence to RAB. A copy of all information sent to the third party source shall also be sent to the Regulatory Affairs Branch at the time it is sent to the company.

b. The Contractor shall bill the third party directly for the services provided in support of CTEP-ESYS scheduled reports and specialized queries. The Contractor shall utilize Government rates to determine

costs. To streamline the process, standard rates shall be developed for development and delivery or reports to third party sources. The standardized rates will be negotiated with the Government. The Contractor shall bill the services in accordance with the standardized rates. In the event that a query will exceed the standard rates, the Contractor shall notify the Project Officer and Contracting Officer, and a specialized rate will be negotiated with the third party source. Under no circumstances will the Contractor bill prices other than the standard rate without Project Officer and Contracting Officer approval. The following categories shall be utilized to determine the standardized rates.

Standard reports - previously identified and developed reports. This task should require minimal effort (<2hrs.).

Simple specialized queries - Ad hoc query that requires from 2 to 16 hours of effort. Complex specialized queries - Ad hoc query that requires > 16 hours of effort. Repeated distribution of one of the above reports.

c. The Contractor shall keep an accurate account of all payments received from CTEP-approved Collaborators and/or companies separate from other fiscal aspects of the contract. The Contractor shall record as credits on monthly invoices to the Government, all payments received from the third party sources. The income from third party sources must be credited to the Government in the billing period actually received. Thus, the Contractor shall bill the Government directly for payment of contract costs and shall subtract as a credit, all payments received from third party sources. The actual collections from billings to third party sources shall be offset against the gross billing, leaving a net amount due on the invoices.

The contractor shall account for the contract related income separately, in accordance with its own double-entry accounting system. The Contractor shall submit to the Government a Monthly Summary of Sales sheet, which is listed as Attachment 3 in Section J. LIST OF ATTACHMENTS of this contract. The Contractor shall submit a copy of this attachment each month with the Monthly Progress Report.

The administration of the contract related income shall be subject to the terms of this contract, including specifically and without limitation, FAR Clause 52.215-2, AUDIT-NEGOTIATION of the General Clauses, and the applicable cost principles of the Federal Acquisition Regulation.

- d. The Contractor shall use the following procedures for collection of delinquent accounts:
- Step 1 Accounts 30 days past due. A copy of the invoice shall be sent to the recipient with a notation that the account is overdue and request payment.
- Step 2 Accounts 60 days past due. The Contractor shall turn the account over to a collection agency and notify the Project Officer.
- e. When the completion (final) invoice is submitted on this contract, a listing of all outstanding Collaborator/company invoices shall be provided along with details as to what disposition is expected on each.

## ARTICLE H.6. AWARD TERM QUALITY ASSURANCE SURVEILLANCE PLAN (QASP)

#### a. Award Term Contract

The Contractor may earn award term(s) as described below. If the Contracting Officer determines that the Contractor's performance merits the award term, the estimated cost plus award fee will be increased as set forth in the ESTIMATED COST, AWARD FEE AND AWARD TERM Article in SECTION B of this contract.

#### b. Award Term Provisions

This contract has a base performance period of 3 years November 1, 2008 - October 31, 2011. The Contractor will have the opportunity to earn 4 additional years of work November 1, 2011 - October 31, 2015 using the evaluation process described herein. These additional years of work are called Award Terms. The total duration of this contract, including all Award Terms, shall not exceed a period of 7 years November 1, 2008 - October 31, 2015.

#### 1. Method for Earning Award Term(s)

- a. The Contractor's performance under this contract will be observed and evaluated continuously by the Government. The Contractor Assessment Report will be used to assess Contractor performance and determine whether the Contractor will receive Award Term(s). The Contractor Assessment Report includes Performance Indicators and Standards which identify the indicators to be evaluated and the associated standards for each indicator. A copy of the "Contractor Assessment Report/Performance Indicators and Standards," dated \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ is included as an attachment in SECTION J of this contract.
- b. The "Contractor Assessment Report/Performance Indicators and Standards" will be prepared by the Government, resulting in an overall rating which will be disseminated to the Contractor annually. The Award Term earned will be determined based upon review of the Contractor's performance against the performance indicators and standards as follows:
  - 1. Using the 0-5 point score in the Plan, the Contractor must receive an average of 3.5 or better for the first two years of Contractor performance. In years three, four and five, the Contractor must receive an average of 3.8 or better in each year to earn the Award Terms. These goals are intended to be a stretch for the Contractor, but achievable.
  - 2. At the conclusion of year two, in addition to the year two Contractor Assessment Report, the government will prepare a summary report which will set forth the average rating for the first two years' of performance and the year two rating. This summary report will be used to determine if the Award Term for year four has been earned. Likewise, at the conclusion of year three, the government will prepare a Contractor Assessment Report and a summary report of year four, the government will also prepare a Contractor Assessment Report and a summary report of year four to determine if the Award Term for year six has been earned. At the conclusion of year five, the government will also prepare a Contractor Assessment Report and a summary report of year five to determine if the Award Term for year seven has been earned.

The advance evaluation of performance is required to allow adequate time for recompetition of the requirement in the event that Contractor performance does not meet the Award Term requirements. If the Contractor does not earn the first Award Term, there will be no opportunity to earn subsequent Award Term(s) and the contract expiration date will remain unchanged.

- c. A unilateral contract modification to add the Award Term will be issued when scoring meets or exceeds that set forth in the contract. The Government shall issue this modification at least 60 days prior to contract expiration. The Award Term determination and the methodology for determining the award term are unilateral decisions made solely by the Government and are not subject to dispute.
- d. The "Contractor Assessment Report/Performance Indicators and Standards" described herein contains rating criteria used solely to assess whether the Contractor has earned the award term specified in this contract. This report differs from the Contractor Performance Report described in the POST AWARD EVALUATION OF CONTRACTOR PERFORMANCE Article in SECTION G of this contract, which uses a standard rating criteria established for the Federal Contractor Performance System to evaluate overall contract performance. For this reason, the Contractor's performance scores for determining authorization of the award term(s) may differ from the Contractor's performance scores for overall contract performance.
- 2. Changes to the Contractor Assessment Report/Performance Indicators and Standards

Unilateral changes to the Contractor Assessment Report/Performance Indicators and Standards may be made if the Contractor is provided written notification by the Contracting Officer at least 30 days before the

start of the upcoming evaluation period. Changes affecting the current evaluation period must be by mutual agreement of both parties.

#### 3. Contractor Performance Assessment

The Project Officer, and other Government personnel as appropriate, will use the "Contractor Assessment Report/Performance Indicators and Standards" and the associated performance elements and standards to score contract performance for the Award Term determination. The Contracting Officer is responsible for making the final decision on the Contractor's score and for determining whether the Contractor has earned the Award Term.

  - (1) If it was transmitted through an electronic commerce method authorized by the solicitation, it was received at the initial point of entry to the Government infrastructure not later than 5:00 p.m. one working day prior to the date specified for receipt of proposals; or
  - (2) There is acceptable evidence to establish that it was received at the Government installation designated for receipt of offers and was under the Government's control prior to the time set for receipt of offers; or
  - (3) It is the only proposal received.
- (B) However, a late modification of an otherwise successful proposal that makes its terms more favorable to the Government, will be considered at any time it is received and may be accepted.
- (iii) Acceptable evidence to establish the time of receipt at the Government installation includes the time/date stamp of that installation on the proposal wrapper, other documentary evidence of receipt maintained by the installation, or oral testimony or statements of Government personnel.
- (iv) If an emergency or unanticipated event interrupts normal Government processes so that proposals cannot be received at the office designated for receipt of proposals by the exact time specified in the solicitation, and urgent Government requirements preclude amendment of the solicitation, the time specified for receipt of proposals will be deemed to be extended to the same time of day specified in the solicitation on the first work day on which normal Government processes resume.
- (v) Proposals may be withdrawn by written notice received at any time before award. Oral proposals in response to oral solicitations may be withdrawn orally. If the solicitation authorizes facsimile proposals, proposals may be withdrawn via facsimile received at any time before award, subject to the conditions specified in the provision at 52.215-5, Facsimile Proposals. Proposals may be withdrawn in person by an offeror or an authorized representative, if the identity of the person requesting withdrawal is established and the person signs a receipt for the proposal before award.
- (4) Unless otherwise specified in the solicitation, the offeror may propose to provide any item or combination of items.
- (5) Offerors shall submit proposals in response to this solicitation in English, unless otherwise permitted by the solicitation, and in U.S. dollars, unless the provision at FAR 52.225-17, Evaluation of Foreign Currency Offers, is included in the solicitation.
- (6) Offerors may submit modifications to their proposals at any time before the solicitation closing date and time, and may submit modifications in response to an amendment, or to correct a mistake at any time before award.

(7) Offerors may submit revised proposals only if requested or allowed by the Contracting Officer.

- (8) Proposals may be withdrawn at any time before award. Withdrawals are effective upon receipt of notice by the Contracting Officer.
- (d) Offer expiration date. Proposals in response to this solicitation will be valid for the number of days specified on the solicitation cover sheet (unless a different period is proposed by the offeror).
- (e) Restriction on disclosure and use of data.
  - (1) The proposal submitted in response to this request may contain data (trade secrets; business data, e.g., commercial information, financial information, and cost and pricing data; and technical data) which the offeror, including its prospective subcontractor(s), does not want used or disclosed for any purpose other than for evaluation of the proposal. The use and disclosure of any data may be so restricted; provided, that the Government determines that the data is not required to be disclosed under the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. 552, as amended, and the offeror marks the cover sheet of the proposal with the following statements, specifying the particular portions of the proposal which are to be restricted:

Unless disclosure is required by the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. 552, as amended, (the Act) as determined by Freedom of Information (FOI) officials of the Department of Health and Human Services, data contained in the portions of this proposal which have been specifically identified by page number, paragraph, etc. by the offeror as containing restricted information shall not be used or disclosed except for evaluation purposes.

The offeror acknowledges that the Department may not be able to withhold a record (data, document, etc.) nor deny access to a record requested pursuant to the Act and that the Department's FOI officials must make that determination. The offeror hereby agrees that the Government is not liable for disclosure if the Department has determined that disclosure is required by the Act.

If a contract is awarded to the offeror as a result of, or in connection with, the submission of this proposal, the Government shall have right to use or disclose the data to the extent provided in the contract. Proposals not resulting in a contract remain subject to the Act.

The offeror also agrees that the Government is not liable for disclosure or use of unmarked data and may use or disclose the data for any purpose, including the release of the information pursuant to requests under the Act. The data subject to this restriction are contained in pages (insert page numbers, paragraph designations, etc. or other identification).

(2) In addition, the offeror must mark each page of data it wishes to restrict with the following statement:

"Use or disclosure of data contained on this page is subject to the restriction on the cover sheet of this proposal or quotation."

- (3) Offerors are cautioned that proposals submitted with restrictive statements or statements differing in substance from those cited above may not be considered for award. The Government reserves the right to reject any proposal submitted with a nonconforming statement(s).
- (f) Contract award.

(1) The Government intends to award a contract or contracts resulting from this solicitation to the responsible offeror(s) whose proposal(s) represents the best value after evaluation in accordance with the factors and subfactors in the solicitation.

- (2) The Government may reject any or all proposals if such action is in the Government's interest.
- (3) The Government may waive informalities and minor irregularities in proposals received.
- (4) The Government intends to evaluate proposals and award a contract without discussions with offerors (except clarifications as described in FAR 15.306(a)). Therefore, the offeror's initial proposal should contain the offeror's best terms from a cost or price and technical standpoint. The Government reserves the right to conduct discussions if the Contracting Officer later determines them to be necessary. If the Contracting Officer determines that the number of proposals that would otherwise be in the competitive range exceeds the number at which an efficient competition can be conducted, the Contracting Officer may limit the number of proposals in the competitive range to the greatest number that will permit an efficient competition among the most highly rated proposals.
- (5) The Government reserves the right to make an award on any item for a quantity less than the quantity offered, at the unit cost or prices offered, unless the offeror specifies otherwise in the proposal.
- (6) The Government reserves the right to make multiple awards if, after considering the additional administrative costs, it is in the Government's best interest to do so.
- (7) Exchanges with offerors after receipt of a proposal do not constitute a rejection or counteroffer by the Government.
- (8) The Government may determine that a proposal is unacceptable if the prices proposed are materially unbalanced between line items or subline items. Unbalanced pricing exists when, despite an acceptable total evaluated price, the price of one or more contract line items is significantly overstated or understated as indicated by the application of cost or price analysis techniques. A proposal may be rejected if the Contracting Officer determines that the lack of balance poses an unacceptable risk to the Government.
- (9) If a cost realism analysis is performed, cost realism may be considered by the source selection authority in evaluating performance or schedule risk.
- (10) A written award or acceptance of proposal mailed or otherwise furnished to the successful offeror within the time specified in the proposal shall result in a binding contract without further action by either party.
- (11) If a post-award debriefing is given to requesting offerors, the Government shall disclose the following information, if applicable:
  - (i) The agency's evaluation of the significant weak or deficient factors in the debriefed offeror's offer.

## c. TYPE OF CONTRACT AND NUMBER OF AWARDS

It is anticipated that one award will be made from this solicitation and that the award will be made on November 1, 2008.

It is anticipated that the award from this solicitation will be a multiple-year Cost-Reimbursement type Completion contract with a Period of Performance of three (3) years with four (4) Award Term years, and that incremental funding will be used (See Section L.2.c. Business Proposal Instructions).

### d. PERFORMANCE BASED ACQUISITION

The Government intends to use a Performance Based Acquisition method in the evaluation and award of any contract resulting from this RFP.

The Performance Based contract is designed to motivate the Contractor to perform at a higher standard. Outstanding performance is rewarded through an incentive defined in the contract. The following performance incentive will be used in any contract awarded from this RFP:

**Cost-Plus-Award-Fee (CPAF):** The CPAF contract includes an estimated cost and an award fee amount that is paid based upon periodic evaluations of Contractor performance. The Quality Assurance Surveillance Plan (QASP), which is included as an attachment to this RFP sets forth

all the elements required for evaluation and determination of the award fee amount. The award fee determination is made unilaterally by the Government and is not subject to Disputes clause procedures. The QASP is included in this RFP and located at SECTION J.

### **AND**

**Award Term (AT):** The AT contract includes one or more extensions of the contract period for which the Contractor is entitled based upon periodic evaluations of Contractor performance. This is not a Government option to extend the contract. Under the Award Term incentive, if the Contractor's evaluated performance meets the Award Term criteria set forth in the Quality Assurance Surveillance Plan (QASP), the Award Term must be issued. The QASP is included in this RFP and located at Section J.

### e. ESTIMATE OF EFFORT

The Government estimates that the work set forth in the Statement of Work of this solicitation will require approximately 117,760 labor hours per year over the seven years of the contract. It is further estimated that if the option for IPAD development is exercised, 4,320 labor hours per year will be required over the two years estimated for this option.

Offerors should use the estimate that the CTEP-ESYS will contain approximately 15,000 user accounts with approximately 1,500 users. It is estimated that 4,000 help desk requests of varying complexity will occur annually. In 2007, CTEP entered data into CTEP-ESYS on approximately 2,000 protocol documents and compiled and coordinated 230 special mailings to investigators related to adverse events affecting approximately 5,500 protocols.

### f. COMMITMENT OF PUBLIC FUNDS

The Contracting Officer is the only individual who can legally commit the Government to the expenditure of public funds in connection with the proposed procurement. Any other commitment, either explicit or implied, is invalid.

## g. COMMUNICATIONS PRIOR TO CONTRACT AWARD

Offerors shall direct all communications to the attention of the Contract Specialist or Contracting Officer cited on the face page of this RFP. Communications with other officials may compromise the competitiveness of this acquisition and result in cancellation of the requirement.

### h. RELEASE OF INFORMATION

Contract selection and award information will be disclosed to offerors in accordance with regulations applicable to negotiated acquisition. Prompt written notice will be given to unsuccessful offerors as they are eliminated from the competition, and to all offerors following award.

Failure of offerors to examine the reference materials prior to proposal preparation and submission will be at the offeror's own risk. The Government will make available CTEP facilities for offerors that want to see the physical equipment. software and location for the work. This will be by appointment only. Contact Ms. Annmarie Keane, Contracting Officer, (301) 435-3814 for arrangements. Note: Contact Annmarie Keane no latter than August 8, 2008 to schedule an appointment.

### i. PREPARATION COSTS

This RFP does not commit the Government to pay for the preparation and submission of a proposal.

### 2. INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFERORS

### a. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

### INTRODUCTION

The following instructions will establish the acceptable minimum requirements for the format and contents of proposals. Special attention is directed to the requirements for technical and business proposals to be submitted in accordance with these instructions.

### 1. Contract Type and General Clauses

It is contemplated that a cost-reimbursement completion type award term contract will be awarded. (See General Information) Any resultant contract shall include the clauses applicable to the selected offeror's organization and type of contract awarded as required by Public Law, Executive Order, or acquisition regulations in effect at the time of execution of the proposed contract.

# 2. Authorized Official and Submission of Proposal

The proposal must be signed by an official authorized to bind your organization and must stipulate that it is predicated upon all the terms and conditions of this RFP. Your proposal shall be submitted in the number of copies, to the addressees, and marked as indicated in the Attachment entitled, PACKAGING AND DELIVERY OF PROPOSAL, Part III, Section J hereof. Proposals will be typewritten, paginated, reproduced on letter size paper and will be legible in all required copies. To expedite the proposal evaluation, all documents required for responding to the RFP should be placed in the following order:

### I. COVER PAGE

Include RFP title, number, name of organization, DUNS No., identification of the proposal part, and indicate whether the proposal is an original or a copy.

### II. TECHNICAL PROPOSAL

It is recommended that the technical proposal consist of a cover page, a table of contents, and the information requested in the Technical Proposal Instructions and as specified in SECTION J, List of Attachments.

### III. BUSINESS PROPOSAL

It is recommended that the business proposal consist of a cover page, a table of contents, and the information requested in the Business Proposal Instructions and as specified in SECTION J, List of Attachments.

## 3. Proposal Summary and Data Record (NIH-2043)

The Offeror must complete the Form NIH-2043, attached, with particular attention to the length of time the proposal is firm and the designation of those personnel authorized to conduct negotiations. (See SECTION J, Attachment entitled, PROPOSAL SUMMARY AND DATA RECORD).

## 4. Separation of Technical and Business Proposals

The proposal must be prepared in two parts: a "Technical Proposal" and a "Business Proposal." Each of the parts shall be separate and complete in itself so that evaluation of one may be accomplished independently of, and concurrently with, evaluation of the other. The technical proposal should disclose your technical approach in as much detail as possible, including, but not limited to, the requirements of the technical proposal instructions.

### 5. Alternate Proposals

You may, at your discretion, submit alternate proposals, or proposals which deviate from the requirements; provided, that you also submit a proposal for performance of the work as specified in the statement of work. Such proposals may be considered if overall performance would be improved or not compromised and if they are in the best interests of the Government. Alternative proposals, or deviations from any requirements of this RFP, shall be clearly identified.

## 6. Evaluation of Proposals

The Government will evaluate technical proposals in accordance with the criteria set forth in PART IV, SECTION M of this RFP.

### 7. Use of the Metric System of Measurement

It is the policy of the Department of Health and Human Services to support the Federal transition to the metric system and to use the metric system of measurement in all procurements, grants, and other business related activities unless such use is impracticable or is likely to cause significant inefficiencies.

The offeror is encouraged to prepare their proposal using either "Hard Metric," "Soft Metric," or "Dual Systems" of measurement. The following definitions are provided for your information:

**Hard Metric** - The replacement of a standard inch-pound size with an accepted metric size for a particular purpose. An example of size substitution might be: selling or packaging liquids by the liter instead of by the pint or quart (as for soft drinks), or instead of by the gallon (as for gasoline).

**Soft Metric** - The result of a mathematical conversion of inch-pound measurements to metric equivalents for a particular purpose. The physical characteristics are not changed.

**Dual Systems** - The use of both inch-pound and metric systems. For example, an item is designed, produced, and described in inch-pound values with soft metric values also shown for information or comparison purposes.

## 8. Privacy Act - Treatment of Proposal Information

The Privacy Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-579) requires that a Federal agency advise each individual whom it asks to supply information, the authority which authorizes the solicitation, whether disclosure is voluntary or mandatory, the principal purpose or purposes for which the information is intended to be used, the uses outside the agency which may be made of the information, and the effects on the individual, if any, of not providing all or any part of the requested information.

The information provided by you may be routinely disclosed for the following purposes:

- to the cognizant audit agency and the Government Accountability Office for auditing.
- to the Department of Justice as required for litigation.

- to qualified experts, not within the definition of Department employees, for opinions as a part of the review process.

### 9. Selection of Offerors

- a. The acceptability of the technical portion of each contract proposal will be evaluated by a technical review committee. The committee will evaluate each proposal in strict conformity with the evaluation criteria of the RFP, utilizing point scores and written critiques. The committee may suggest that the Contracting Officer request clarifying information from an offeror.
- b. The business portion of each contract proposal will be subjected to a cost and price analysis, management analysis, etc.
- c. If award will be made without conducting discussions, offerors may be given the opportunity to clarify certain aspects of their proposal (e.g., the relevance of an offeror's past performance information and adverse past performance information to which the offeror has not previously had an opportunity to respond) or to resolve minor or clerical errors.
- d. If the Government intends to conduct discussions prior to awarding a contract -

1. Communications will be held with offerors whose past performance information is the determining factor preventing them from being placed within the competitive range. Such communications shall address adverse past performance information to which an offeror has not had a prior opportunity to respond. Also, communications may be held with any other offerors whose exclusion from, or inclusion in, the competitive range is uncertain.

Such communications shall not be used to cure proposal deficiencies or omissions that alter the technical or cost elements of the proposal, and/or otherwise revise the proposal, but may be considered in rating proposals for the purpose of establishing the competitive range.

 The Contracting Officer will, in concert with program staff, decide which proposals are in the competitive range. The competitive range will be comprised of all of the most highly rated proposals. Oral or written discussions will be conducted with all offerors in the competitive range.

While it is NCI's policy to conduct discussions with all offerors in the competitive range, NCI reserves the right, in special circumstances, to limit the number of proposals included in the competitive range to the greatest number that will permit an efficient competition. All aspects of the proposals are subject to discussions, including cost, technical approach, past performance, and contractual terms and conditions. At the conclusion of discussions, each offeror still in the competitive range shall be given an opportunity to submit a written Final Proposal Revision (FPR) with the reservation of the right to conduct finalization of details with the selected source in accordance with HHSAR 315.370.

- e. The process described in FAR 15.101-1 will be employed, which permits the Government to make tradeoffs among cost or price and non-cost factors and to consider award to other than the lowest price offeror or other than the highest technically rated offeror.
- f. The NCI reserves the right to make a single award, multiple awards, or no award at all to the RFP. In addition, the RFP may be amended or canceled as necessary to meet NCI requirements. Synopses of awards exceeding \$25,000 will be published in FedBizOpps.

### 10. Past Performance Information

a. Offerors shall submit the following information as part of their Business proposal.

Offerors may also submit past performance information regarding predecessor companies, key personnel who have relevant experience or subcontractors that will perform major or critical aspects of the requirement when such information is relevant to the instant acquisition. For the purposes of this solicitation, a "major subcontract" is defined as greater than \$100,000.

Include the following information for each contract or subcontract listed:

- 1. Name of Contracting Organization
- 2. Contract Number (for subcontracts, provide the prime contract number and the subcontract number)
- 3. Contract Type
- 4. Total Contract Value
- 5. Description of Requirement
- 6. Contracting Officer's Name and Telephone Number

- 7. Program Manager's Name and Telephone Number
- North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) Code
   The offeror may provide information on problems encountered on the identified contracts and the offeror's corrective actions.
- b. The Government is not required to contact all references provided by the offeror. Also, references other than those identified by the offeror may be contacted by the Government to obtain additional information that will be used in the evaluation of the offeror's past performance.

# 11. Electronic and Information Technology Accessibility, HHSAR 352.270-19(a) (January 2008)

Section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794D), as amended by the Workforce Investment Act of 1998, and the Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board Electronic and Information (EIT) Accessibility Provisions (36 CFR part 1194), require that, unless an exception applies, all EIT products and services developed, acquired, maintained, or used by any Federal department or agency permit:

### 1. Technical Discussions

The technical discussion included in the technical proposal should respond to the items set forth below:

## a. Statement of Work

The proposal should include: 1) a statement of the overall objectives of the project, as envisaged by the offeror; and 2) an outline of the technical approach that would be used to achieve the objectives.

Proposals should address each area of the Statement of Work in a manner that describes the offeror's approach to the particular task and methods of quality control for the

various tasks outlined in the Statement of Work. The offeror should demonstrate a clear understanding of the needs of the program and an understanding of the potential problems involved with these types of projects.

Specifically, the offeror should discuss its:

- 1) Approach to specific technical aspects of investigational drug management and investigator registration.
- 2) Understanding of the needs of the project and understanding the FDA requirements as they relate to drug management and investigator registration.
- 3) Approach to and development of plans and documentation addressing:
- i. Quality and change management
- ii. System availability and functionality including disaster recovery
- iii. Transition-in over a period of 90 days
- iv. Earned Value Management specifically, the offeror should describe the approach to EVM and provide a copy of the most recently developed EVM plan for a Tier I investment.
- 4) As part of the Technical Proposal, provide a detailed description of how the Contract performance will be maintained during fluctuations in the personnel needs as a result of high or low levels of requests, etc. Also explain in detail the plan for maintaining performance during periods of extended absences by personnel. For personnel proposed as "backup" personnel to key positions, Curriculum Vitae or resumes should be provided.
- 5) Provide a plan on how you will be able to bring on new staff if the options proposed for this contract are exercised.
- 6) The Government will provide the hardware and software as listed in the Government Property attachment.

## b. Personnel

Describe the experience, qualifications and availability of all personnel who will be assigned for direct work on this project. Information is required which shows the composition of the task or work group, its general qualifications and recent experience with similar programs. Each area of the Statement of Work shall be addressed in sufficient detail to permit evaluation of the proposal in terms of the adequacy and availability, as needed, of all staff to be assigned to the project. Indicate the approximate percentage of total time each could be made available for this contract and specifically to which tasks each employee would be assigned.

Within the total level of effort offerors should indicate the specific level of effort which they consider appropriate for each function outlined in the Statement of Work. Provide a Personnel Ranking Matrix which indicates the hierarchical line of supervisory authority, and indicate which contractor employee(s) will perform the various tasks. State the estimated time to be spent on the project.

OFFERORS SHOULD ASSURE THAT THE PRINCIPAL INVESTIGATOR, AND ALL OTHER PERSONNEL PROPOSED, SHALL NOT BE COMMITTED ON FEDERAL GRANTS AND CONTRACTS FOR MORE THAN A TOTAL OF 100% OF THEIR TIME. IF THE SITUATION ARISES WHERE IT IS DETERMINED THAT A PROPOSED EMPLOYEE IS COMMITTED FOR MORE THAN 100% OF HIS OR HER TIME, THE GOVERNMENT WILL REQUIRE ACTION ON THE PART OF THE OFFEROR TO CORRECT THE TIME COMMITMENT.

1. Project Manager

List the name of the Project Manager responsible for the overall implementation and management of the contract and the offeror's key contact for technical aspects of the program. The Project Manager shall be an employee of the offeror and not a consultant or subcontractor. He/she shall have authority to commit company resources as needed for efficient and timely completion of work under this contract.

The Project Manager should possess at least a bachelors degree in health care, computer sciences, business or related discipline plus three (or more) years management experience in the health care/bioinformatics/biomedical/clinical research field. He/she should demonstrate experience within the oncology community and clinical trials. He/she should possess overall management capabilities which would permit effective implementation of all phases of the project. He/she should have experience in supervising all efforts of the type to be conducted under the contract. The individual should possess knowledge of quality control and assurance methods for all contract activities. The CV of the individual should include all certifications earned such as project management, quality improvement, database development, etc. The Project Manager will coordinate all contractor activities pertaining to the work specified in the SOW.

This individual should demonstrate self motivation and demonstrate superior project management, communication, organization and analytical skills. This individual should demonstrate the ability to be able to converse with health care professionals at all levels using both verbal and written communication skills. He/she should have experience with word processing and spread sheet software/computer skills. He/she should demonstrate the ability to effectively present complex IT matters to non-IT persons in layman's terms.

# 2. Other Investigators

List all other professional personnel who will be participating in the project. Discuss the qualifications, experience, and accomplishments. State the estimated time each will spend on the project, proposed duties on the project, and the areas or phases for which each will be responsible.

## 3. Additional Personnel

List names, titles, and proposed duties of additional personnel, if any, who will be required for full-time employment, or on a subcontract or consultant basis. The technical areas, character, and extent of subcontract or consultant activity will be indicated and the anticipated sources will be specified and qualified. For all proposed personnel who are not currently members of the offeror's staff, a letter of commitment or other evidence of availability is required. A resume does not meet this requirement. Commitment letters for use of consultants and other personnel to be hired must include:

- The specific items or expertise they will provide.
- Their availability to the project and the amount of time anticipated.
- · Willingness to act as a consultant.
- · How rights to publications and patents will be handled.

### 4. Resumes

Resumes of all key personnel are required. Each must indicate educational background, recent experience, specific or technical accomplishments, and a listing of relevant publications.

## 2. A. Other Considerations

Record and discuss specific factors not included elsewhere which support your proposal. Using specifically titled subparagraphs, items may include:

- a. Any agreements and/or arrangements with subcontractor(s). Provide as much detail as necessary to explain how the statement of work will be accomplished within this working relationship.
- b. Unique arrangements, equipment, etc., which none or very few organizations are likely to have which is advantageous for effective implementation of this project.
- c. Equipment and unusual operating procedures established to protect personnel from hazards associated with this project.
- d. Other factors you feel are important and support your proposed research.
- e. Recommendations for changing reporting requirements if such changes would be more compatible with the offeror's proposed schedules.

## B. Organizational Experience/Support Capabilites

Offerors shall describe in detail prior experience of the organization in furnishing services similar to each area described in the Statement of work. The proposal should include sufficient information to demonstrate the previous effectiveness of the firm in similar or related work. Include documentation with specific reference to applicable contract numbers, dates of agreements and dollar volume. This documentation should include clear and concise descriptions of these projects and should indicate project sponsors (e.g., government contract or grant, etc.). For each of the described projects, references (including phone numbers) should be provided. Please note that organizational experience is defined as accomplishment of work, either past or ongoing that is comparable or related to the effort required by this RFP. Organization experience should also specify the size and scope of the project referenced and if the offerer served as the prime or subcontractor. Additionally, the offeror should explain how the corporate office and expertise will provide support to this project and to the proposed Project Manager. The offeror should explain how the organization will support the project manager in resolving problems or special situations.

The Government will provide space in CTEP's office in for up to two (2) Technical Support Specialists. The technical support specialists will help trouble shoot user issues with CTEP-ESYS, install new CTEP-ESYS, and assist users with the audio visual system. CTEP's audio visual system is currently comprised of the following components; Polycom votex phone, Tandberg codec 3000, Cineo projector.

The Offeror should demonstrate that its physical facilities are adequate to perform the statement of work. The Offeror should demonstrate that it has a training facility on-site capable of hosting of up to 15 people classroom style where each student has their own desktop with the access to appropriate software and applications relevant to the training to occur. It is estimated that on-site classroom

training may be conducted at the Offeror's training facility or other facility conveniently located to CTEP, approximately four times per year and up to four hours per training session. The Offeror will also be engaged in training CTEP-ESYS users via web sessions or at CTEP.

### 3. Technical Evaluation

Proposals will be technically evaluated in accordance with SECTION M - Evaluation Factors for Award of this solicitation.

# 4. Obtaining and Disseminating Biomedical Research Resources

As a public sponsor of biomedical research, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) has a dual interest in accelerating scientific discovery and facilitating product development. Intellectual property restrictions can stifle the broad dissemination of new discoveries and limit future avenues of research and product development. At the same time, reasonable restrictions on the dissemination of research tools are sometimes necessary to protect legitimate proprietary interests and to preserve incentives for commercial development. To assist NIH contractors achieve an appropriate balance, the NIH has provided guidance in the form of a two-part document, consisting of Principles setting forth the fundamental concepts and Guidelines that provide specific information to patent and license professionals and sponsored research administrators for implementation.

The purpose of these Principles and Guidelines is to assist NIH funding recipients in determining: 1) Reasonable terms and conditions for making NIH-funded research resources available to scientists in other institutions in the public and private sectors (disseminating research tools); and 2) Restrictions to accept as a condition of receiving access to research tools for use in NIH-funded research (acquiring research tools). The intent is to help recipients ensure that the conditions they impose and accept on the transfer of research tools will facilitate further biomedical research, consistent with the requirements of the Bayh-Dole Act and NIH funding policy.

## c. Position Sensitivity Designations

Prior to award, the Government will determine the position sensitivity designation for each Contractor (including subcontractor) employee that the successful offeror proposes for work under the contract. For proposal preparation purposes, the following designations apply:

[ ] Level 6: Public Trust - High Risk (Requires Suitability Determination with a BI). Contractor employees assigned to a Level 6 position are subject to a Background Investigation (BI).

  - 6. Proposed cost; profit or fee; and total;
  - 7. Whether you will require the use of Government property in the performance of the contract, and, if so, what property. See Item (13) Other Administrative Data, subparagraph (2) Government Property of this Section L.2.c of this solicitation.;
  - 8. Whether your organization is subject to cost accounting standards; whether your organization has submitted a CASB Disclosure Statement, and if it has been determined adequate; whether you have been notified that you are or may be in noncompliance with your Disclosure Statement or CAS, and, if yes, an explanation; whether any aspect of this proposal is inconsistent with your disclosed practices or applicable CAS, and, if so, an explanation; and whether the proposal is consistent with your established estimating and accounting principles and procedures and FAR Part 31, Cost Principles, and, if not, an explanation;
  - 9. The following statement: This proposal reflects our estimates and/or actual costs as of this date and conforms with the instructions in FAR 15.403 5(b)(1) and Table 15.2. By submitting this proposal, we grant the Contracting Officer and authorized representative(s) the right to examine, at any time before award, those records, which include books, documents, accounting procedures and practices, and other data, regardless of type and form or whether such supporting information is specifically referenced or included in the proposal as the basis for pricing, that will permit an adequate evaluation of the proposed price;
  - 10. Date of submission; and
  - 11. Name, title and signature of authorized representative.
- B. In submitting your proposal, you must include an index, appropriately referenced, of all the cost or pricing data and information accompanying or identified in the proposal. In addition, you must annotate any future additions and/or revisions, up to the date of agreement on price, or an earlier date agreed upon by the parties, on a supplemental index.
- C. As part of the specific information required, you must submit, with your proposal, cost or pricing data (that is, data that are verifiable and factual and otherwise as defined at FAR 15.401). You must clearly identify on your cover sheet that cost or pricing data are included as part of the proposal. In addition, you must submit with your proposal any information reasonably required to explain your estimating process, including

In addition, provide a summary of your cost analysis and a copy of cost or pricing data submitted by the prospective source in support of each subcontract, or purchase order that is the lower of either \$11.5 million or more, or both more than the pertinent cost or pricing data threshold and more than 10 percent of the prime contractor's proposed price. The Contracting Officer may require you to submit cost or pricing data in support of proposals in lower amounts. Subcontractor cost or pricing data must be accurate, complete and current as of the date of final price agreement, or an earlier date agreed upon by the parties, given on the prime

contractor's Certificate of Current Cost or Pricing Data. The prime contractor is responsible for updating a prospective subcontractor's data. For standard commercial items fabricated by the offeror that are generally stocked in inventory, provide a separate cost breakdown, if priced based on cost. For interorganizational transfers priced at cost, provide a separate breakdown of cost elements. Analyze the cost or pricing data and submit the results of your analysis of the prospective source's proposal. When submission of a prospective source's cost or pricing data is required as described in this paragraph, it must be included along with your own cost or pricing data submission, as part of your own cost or pricing data. You must also submit any other cost or pricing data obtained from a subcontractor, either actually or by specific identification, along with the results of any analysis performed on that data.

- B. **Direct Labor**. Provide a time phased (e.g., monthly, quarterly, etc.) breakdown of labor hours, rates, and cost by appropriate category, and furnish bases for estimates.
- C. Indirect Costs. Indicate how you have computed and applied your indirect costs, including cost breakdowns. Show trends and budgetary data to provide a basis for evaluating the reasonableness of proposed rates. Indicate the rates used and provide an appropriate explanation.
- D. Other Costs. List all other costs not otherwise included in the categories described above (e.g., special tooling, travel, computer and consultant services, preservation, packaging and packing, spoilage and rework, and Federal excise tax on finished articles) and provide bases for pricing.
- E. **Royalties**. If royalties exceed \$1,500, you must provide the following information on a separate page for each separate royalty or license fee:
  - 1. Name and address of licensor.
  - 2. Date of license agreement.
  - 3. Patent numbers.
  - 4. Patent application serial numbers, or other basis on which the royalty is payable.
  - 5. Brief description (including any part or model numbers of each contract item or component on which the royalty is payable).
  - 6. Percentage or dollar rate of royalty per unit.
  - 7. Unit price of contract item.
  - 8. Number of units.
  - 9. Total dollar amount of royalties.
  - 10. If specifically requested by the Contracting Officer, a copy of the current license agreement and identification of applicable claims of specific patents (see FAR 27.204 and 31.205 37).
- F. Facilities Capital Cost of Money. When you elect to claim facilities capital cost of money as an allowable cost, you must submit Form CASB CMF and show the calculation of the proposed amount (see FAR 31.205 10).

## 3. Formats for Submission of Line Item Summaries

The detailed breakdown shall be in the format as shown on the form **Breakdown of Proposed Estimated Cost (plus fee) and Labor Hours** (Section J, List of Attachments). For each separate cost estimate, the offeror must furnish a breakdown by cost element as indicated above. In addition, summary total amounts shall be furnished. In the event the RFP cites specific line items, by number, a cost breakdown for each line item must be furnished.

### 4. General Information

a. There is a clear distinction between submitting cost or pricing data and merely making available books, records, and other documents without identification. The requirement for submission of cost or pricing data is met when all accurate cost or pricing data reasonably available to the offeror have been submitted, either actually or by specific identification, to the Contracting Officer or an authorized representative. As later information comes into your possession, it should be submitted promptly to the Contracting Officer in a manner that clearly shows how the information relates to the offeror's price proposal. The requirement for submission of cost or pricing data continues up to the time of agreement on price, or an earlier date agreed upon between the parties if applicable.

b. By submitting your proposal, you grant the Contracting Officer or an authorized representative the right to examine records that formed the basis for the pricing proposal. That examination can take place at any time before award. It may include those books, records, documents, and other types of factual information (regardless of form or whether the information is specifically referenced or included in the proposal as the basis for pricing) that will permit an adequate evaluation of the proposed price.

# 3. Requirements for Cost or Pricing Data or Information Other than Cost and Pricing Data [FAR Clause 52.215-20 (October 1997)]

- (a) Exceptions from cost or pricing data.
  - (1) In lieu of submitting cost or pricing data, offerors may submit a written request for exception by submitting the information described in the following subparagraphs. The Contracting Officer may require additional supporting information, but only to the extent necessary to determine whether an exception should be granted, and whether the price is fair and reasonable.
    - (i) Identification of the law or regulation establishing the price offered. If the price is controlled under law by periodic rulings, reviews, or similar actions of a governmental body, attach a copy of the controlling document, unless it was previously submitted to the contracting office.
    - (ii) Commercial item exception. For a commercial item exception, the offeror shall submit, at a minimum, information on prices at which the same item or similar items have previously been sold in the commercial market that is adequate for evaluating the reasonableness of the price for this acquisition. Such information may include
      - (A) For catalog items, a copy of or identification of the catalog and its date, or the appropriate pages for the offered items, or a statement that the catalog is on file in the buying office to which the proposal is being submitted. Provide a copy or describe current discount policies and price lists (published or unpublished), e.g., wholesale, original equipment manufacturer, or reseller. Also explain the basis of each offered price and its relationship to the established catalog price, including how the proposed price relates to the price of recent sales in quantities similar to the proposed quantities;
      - (B) For market priced items, the source and date or period of the market quotation or other basis for market price, the base amount, and applicable discounts. In addition, describe the nature of the market;
      - (C) For items included on an active Federal Supply Service Multiple Award Schedule contract, proof that an exception has been granted for the schedule item.

(2) The offeror grants the Contracting Officer or an authorized representative the right to examine, at any time before award, books, records, documents, or other directly pertinent records to verify any request for an exception under this provision, and the reasonableness of price. For items priced using catalog or market prices, or law or regulation, access does not extend to cost or profit information or other data relevant solely to the offeror's determination of the prices to be offered in the catalog or marketplace.

- (b) Requirements for cost or pricing data. If the offeror is not granted an exception from the requirement to submit cost or pricing data, the following applies:
  - (1) The offeror shall prepare and submit cost or pricing data and supporting attachments in accordance with Table 15 2 of FAR 15.408.
  - (2) As soon as practicable after agreement on price, but before contract award (except for unpriced actions such as letter contracts), the offeror shall submit a Certificate of Current Cost or Pricing Data, as prescribed by FAR 15.406 2.

(End of provision)

Alternate I (October 1997) of FAR Clause 52.215-20, Requirements for Cost or Pricing Data or Information Other than Cost and Pricing Data (October 1997). As prescribed in 15.408(I), substitute the following paragraph (b)(1) for paragraph (b)(1) of the basic provision:

(b)(1) The offeror shall submit cost or pricing data and supporting attachments in the following format:

The format specified in paragraph L.2.c.(4) Cost and Pricing Data, subparagraph 3. Formats for Submission of Line Item Summaries shall be used for the submission cost information. Submission of all other cost or pricing data shall be in accordance with Table 15-2 in FAR 15.408.

# 4. Small Business Subcontracting Plan

If the proposed contract exceeds a total estimated cost of \$550,000 for the entire period of performance, the offeror shall be required to submit an acceptable subcontracting plan in accordance with the terms of the clause entitled "Small Business Subcontracting Plan," FAR Clause No. 52.219-9, incorporated herein by reference in the Solicitation, See SECTION J - LIST OF ATTACHMENTS, BUSINESS PROPOSAL ATTACHMENTS of this RFP for an example of such a plan.

- a. THIS PROVISION DOES NOT APPLY TO SMALL BUSINESS CONCERNS.
- b. The term "subcontract" means any agreement (other than one involving an employer-employee relationship) entered into by a Federal Government prime Contractor or subcontractor calling for supplies or services required for the performance of the original contract or subcontract. This includes, but is not limited to, agreements/purchase orders for supplies and services such as equipment purchase, copying services, and travel services.
- c. The offeror understands that:
  - No contract will be awarded unless and until an acceptable plan is negotiated with the Contracting Officer which plan will be incorporated into the contract, as a material part thereof.
  - An acceptable plan must, in the determination of the Contracting Officer, provide the
    maximum practicable opportunity for Small Businesses, Small Disadvantaged Businesses,
    Women-Owned Small businesses, HUBZone Small Businesses, Veteran-Owned Small
    Businesses, and Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Businesses to participate in the
    performance of the contract.
  - 3. If a subcontracting plan acceptable to the Contracting Officer is not negotiated within the time limits prescribed by the contracting activity and such failure arises out of causes within

the control and with the fault or negligence of the offeror, the offeror shall be ineligible for an award. The Contracting Officer shall notify the Contractor in writing of the reasons for determining a subcontracting plan unacceptable early enough in the negotiation process to allow the Contractor to modify the plan within the time limits prescribed.

- 4. Prior compliance of the offeror with other such subcontracting plans under previous contracts will be considered by the Contracting Officer in determining the responsibility of the offeror for award of the contract.
- 5. It is the offeror's responsibility to develop a satisfactory subcontracting plan with respect to Small Business Concerns, Small Disadvantaged Business Concerns, Women-Owned Small Business Concerns, HUBZone Small Business Concerns, Veteran-Owned Small Business Concerns, and Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business Concerns that each such aspect of the offeror's plan will be judged independent of the other.
- 6. The offeror will submit, as required by the Contracting Officer, subcontracting reports in accordance with the instructions thereon, and as further directed by the Contracting Officer. Subcontractors will also submit these reports to the Government's Contracting Officer or as otherwise directed, with a copy to the prime Contractor's designated small and disadvantaged business liaison.

# d. Each plan must contain the following:

- Goals, expressed in terms of percentages of total planned subcontracting dollars, for the use of Small, Small Disadvantaged, Women-Owned, HUBZone, Veteran-Owned, and Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business Concerns as subcontractors.
- A statement of total dollars planned to be subcontracted. A statement of total dollars
  to be subcontracted to each of the following type of small business concerns: Small,
  Small Disadvantaged, Women-Owned, HUBZone, Veteran-Owned, and Service Disabled
  Veteran-Owned Small Businesses.
- 3. A description of the principal types of supplies and services to be subcontracted with an identification of which supplies and services are expected to be subcontracted to Small, Small Disadvantaged, Women-Owned, HUBZone, Veteran-Owned and/or Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business Concerns.
- 4. A description of the method used to develop the subcontracting goals.
- 5. A description of the method used to identify potential sources for solicitation purposes.
- 6. A statement as to whether or not indirect costs were included in establishing subcontracting goals. If they were, a description of the method used to determine the proportionate share of indirect costs to be incurred with Small, Small Disadvantaged, Women-Owned, HUBZone, Veteran-Owned, and Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Businesses.
- 7. The name of the individual employed by the offeror who will administer the offeror's subcontracting program and a description of his/her duties.
- 8. A description of the efforts the offeror will make to assure that Small, Small Disadvantaged, Women-Owned, HUBZone, Veteran-Owned, and Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Businesses have an equitable chance to compete for subcontracts.
- 9. Assurances that the offeror will include in all subcontracts the contract clause "Utilization of Small Business Concerns." Assure that all subcontractors, other than small businesses, in excess of \$550,000 adopt a plan similar to the plan agreed upon by the offeror.
- Assurances that the offeror (and any required subcontractors) will cooperate in studies or surveys as required and submit required reports (Individual Subcontract Reports (ISRs) and Summary Subcontract Reports (SSRs) to the Government.

11. List the types of records the offeror will maintain to demonstrate procedures that have been adopted to comply with the requirement and goals in the plan, including establishing source lists. Also, the offeror shall describe its efforts to locate Small, Small Disadvantaged, Women-Owned, HUBZone, Veteran-Owned, and Service Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Businesses and award subcontracts to them.

For additional information about each of the above elements required to be contained in the subcontracting plan, see FAR Clause 52.219-9, Small Business Subcontracting Plan, and the Sample Subcontracting Plan which is provided as an attachment to this RFP in SECTION J.

HHS expects each procuring activity to establish minimum subcontracting goals for all procurements. The anticipated minimum goals for this RFP are as follows:

27% for Small Business; 5% for Small Disadvantaged Business; 5% for Women-Owned Small Business; 3% for HUBZone Small Business; and 3% for Veteran-Owned Small Business and Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business.

### 5. HUBZone Small Business Concerns

Small Business offerors located in underutilized business zones, called "HUBZones," will be evaluated in accordance with FAR Clause 52.219-4, NOTICE OF PRICE EVALUATION PREFERENCE FOR HUBZONE SMALL BUSINESS CONCERNS, which is incorporated by reference in ARTICLE I.3. of this solicitation. Qualified HUBZone firms are identified in the Small Business Administration website at http://www.sba.gov/hubzone.

## 6. Extent of Small Disadvantaged Business Participation

In accordance with FAR Subpart 15.304(c)(4), the extent of participation of Small Disadvantaged Business (SDB) concerns in performance of the contract in the authorized NAICS Industry Subsectors shall be evaluated in unrestricted competitive acquisitions expected to exceed \$550,000 (\$1,000,000 for construction) subject to certain limitations (see FAR 19.1202-1 and 19.1202-2(b). The dollar amounts cited above include any option years/option quantities that may be included in this solicitation. The definition of a "small disadvantaged business" is cited in FAR 19.001.

The factor entitled "Extent of Small Disadvantaged Business Participation" as set forth under the Evaluation Criteria in Section M shall be used for evaluation purposes.

The Department of Commerce determines, on an annual basis, by Subsectors, as contained in the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes, and region, if any, the authorized SDB procurement mechanisms and applicable factors (percentages). \* Note: Public Law 103-355 which authorized the SDB Price Evaluation Adjustment (PEA) and associated percentages/factors expired on December 9, 2004, therefore, the percentages shown at this website are no longer applicable.

Offerors shall include with their offers, SDB targets, expressed as dollars and percentages of total contract value, in each of the applicable, authorized NAICS Industry Subsector(s). The applicable authorized NAICS Industry Subsector(s) for this project is (are) identified elsewhere in this RFP. A total target for SDB participation by the Prime Contractor, that includes any joint ventures and team members, shall be provided as well as a total target for SDB participation by subcontractors. In addition, offerors must provide information that describes their plans for meeting the targets set forth in their proposal. This information shall be provided in one clearly marked section of the Business Proposal, which shall describe the extent of participation of SDB concerns in the performance of the contract.

If the evaluation factor in this solicitation includes an SDB evaluation factor or subfactor that considers the extent to which SDB concerns are specifically identified, the SDB concerns considered in the evaluation shall be listed in any resultant contract. Offerors should note that addressing the extent of small disadvantaged business participation **is not in any way intended to be a substitute** for submission of the subcontracting plan, if it is required by this solicitation. An <u>example</u> of the type of information that might be given (in addition to the narrative describing the plan for meeting the targets) follows:

\*Note: FAR Subpart 9.6 defines "Contractor team arrangements" to include two or more companies forming a partnership or joint venture to act as a potential Prime Contractor, or a potential Prime Contractor who agrees with one or more companies to have them act as its subcontractors on a specific contract or acquisition program. For purposes of evaluation of the SDB participation factor, FAR 19.1202-4 requires that SDB joint ventures and teaming arrangements at the prime level be presented separately from SDB participation by subcontractors.

# 7. Total Compensation Plan

### a. Instructions

- 1. Total compensation (salary and fringe benefits) of professional employees under service contracts may, in some cases, be lowered by recompetition of these contracts. Lowering of compensation can be detrimental in obtaining the necessary quality of professional services needed for adequate performance of service contracts. It is, therefore, in the best interest of the Government that professional employees, as defined in 29 CFR Part 541, be properly compensated in these contracts. All offerors as a part of their Business Proposal will submit a "Total Compensation Plan" (salaries and fringe benefits) for these professional employees for evaluation purposes.
- 2. The Government will evaluate the Total Compensation Plan to ensure that this compensation reflects a sound management approach and an understanding of the requirements to be performed. It will include an assessment of the offeror's ability to provide uninterrupted work of high quality. The total compensation proposed will be evaluated in terms of enhancing recruitment and retention of personnel and its realism and consistency with a total plan for compensation (both salaries and fringe benefits).
- 3. Evaluation for award, therefore, will include an assessment of the Total Compensation Plan submitted by each offeror.

# b. Evaluation

## 1. Total Compensation Plan (Professional Employees)

In establishing compensation levels for professional employees, the total compensation (both salaries and fringe benefits) proposed shall reflect a clear understanding of the requirements of the work to be accomplished and the suitability of the proposed compensation structure to obtain and retain qualified personnel to meet mission objectives. The salary rates or ranges must recognize the distinct differences in professional skills and the complexity of varied disciplines as well as job difficulty. Proposals offering total compensation levels less than currently being paid by the predecessor Contractor for the same work will be evaluated, in addition to the above, on the basis of maintaining program continuity, uninterrupted work of high quality, and availability of required competent professional employees. Offerors are cautioned that instances of lowered compensation for essentially the same professional work may be considered a lack of sound management judgment in addition to indicating a lack of understanding of the requirement.

# 2. Cost (Professional Compensation)

Proposals which are unrealistically low or do not reflect a reasonable relationship of compensation to the professional job categories so as to impair the Contractor's ability to recruit and retain competent professional employees, may be viewed as reflecting a failure to comprehend the complexity of the contract requirements. The Government is concerned with the quality and stability of the work force to be employed on this contract. The compensation data required will be used in evaluation of the offeror's understanding of the contract requirements.

## 3. Other (Labor Relations)

An assessment of the potential for adverse effect upon performance and maintenance of the required number of professional employees with requisite skills resulting from an unrealistically low compensation structure will also be made.

## 4. Federal Acquisition Regulation Clauses incorporated by Reference

FAR Clause 52.222-46, Evaluation of Compensation for Professional Employees (FEBRUARY 1993).

## 8. Earned Value Management System

IMPORTANT NOTE TO OFFERORS: The following information shall be addressed in a separate section of the Business Proposal entitled, "Earned Value Management System."

- a. This resulting contract will be a Tier 1 information technology investment and must apply Earned Value Management (EVM) principles for tracking investment cost, schedule, and performance in full compliance with American National Standards Institute Electronic Industries Alliance (ANSI/EIA) Standard 748 A (Criteria 1 32).
- b. Earned Value Management (EVM) is a project management system used by the Contractor to effectively integrate the project technical scope of work with schedule and cost elements for optimum project planning and control. The qualities and operating characteristics of earned value management systems are described in American National Standards Institute (ANSI)/ Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) Standard 748 A 1998, Earned Value Management Systems, approved: May 19, 1998, Reaffirmed: August 28, 2002.
- c. The offeror shall provide documentation that the Contracting Officer has recognized that the proposed earned value management system (EVMS) complies with the EVMS guidelines in ANSI/EIA Standard 748.

d. If the offeror proposes to use a system that does not meet the requirements of paragraph (a) of this provision, the offeror shall submit a comprehensive plan for compliance with the EVMS guidelines.

## 1. The plan shall--

- i. Describe the EVMS the offeror intends to use in performance of the contracts;
- ii. Distinguish between the offeror's existing management system and modifications proposed to meet the guidelines;
- iii. Describe the management system and its application in terms of the EVMS guidelines;
- iv. Describe the proposed procedure for administration of the guidelines, as applied to subcontractors; and
- v. Provide documentation describing the process and results of any third party or self evaluation of the system's compliance with the EVMS guidelines.
- 2. The offeror shall provide information and assistance as required by the Contracting Officer to support review of the plan.
- 3. The Government will review the offeror's plan for EVMS before contract award.
- 4. The offeror's EVMS plan must provide milestones that indicate when the offeror anticipates that the EVM system will be compliant with the ANSI/EIA Standard -748 guidelines.
- e. The offeror shall identify the major subcontractors, or major subcontracted effort if major subcontractors have not been selected, planned for application of the guidelines. The prime Contractor and the Government shall agree to subcontractors selected for application of the EVMS guidelines.
- f. The Government will conduct an Integrated Baseline Review (IBR) prior to contract award. The objective of the IBR is for the Government and the Contractor to jointly assess technical areas, such as the Contractor's planning, to ensure complete coverage of the contract requirements, logical scheduling of the work activities, adequate resources, methodologies for earned value (budgeted cost for work performed (BCWP)), and identification of inherent risks.

Offerors [ ] Will [X] Will Not be directly compensated for the costs of participating in a preaward IBR.

# 9. Other Administrative Data

### a. Property

- It is HHS policy that Contractors will provide all property necessary for contract performance. Exception may be granted to provide Government property (Government-furnished or Contractor-acquired), but only when approved by the Contracting Officer. If the offeror requests that Government property be provided, other than that specified under "Government Furnished Property," below, the proposal must include a comprehensive justification addressing the following items:
  - a. State why the property is essential to contract performance and whether the property will be used exclusively for this contract.

b. Describe other alternatives (e.g., purchase, lease, etc.) pursued and why they were not viable options.

## 2. Government Property

The offeror shall identify Government property in its possession which it proposes to use in the performance of the prospective contract as follows:

- a. A list or description of all Government property that the offeror or its subcontractors propose to use on a rent-free basis. The list shall identify the accountable contract under which the property is held and the authorization for its use (from the Contracting Officer having cognizance of the property);
- b. The dates during which the property will be available for use (including the first, last, and all intervening months) and, for any property that will be used concurrently in performing two or more contracts, the amounts of the respective uses in sufficient detail to support prorating the rent;
- c. The amount of rent that would otherwise be charged in accordance with FAR 52.245-9, Use and Charges; and
- d. The voluntary consensus standard or industry leading practices and standards to be used in the management of Government property, or existing property management plans, methods, practices, or procedures for accounting for property.

NOTE: The Contracting Officer will consider any potentially unfair competitive advantage that may result from the Contractor possessing Government property, and for evaluation purposes only, adjust the offers using a rental equivalent evaluation factor, as appropriate.

## 3. Government-Furnished Property

A Listing of Government Furnished Property is provided in Section J - Solicitation Attachments of this solicitation

4. # b. Submission of Electronic Funds Transfer Information with Offer, FAR Clause 52.232-38 (MAY 1999)

The offeror shall provide, with its offer, the following information that is required to make payment by electronic funds transfer (EFT) under any contract that results from this solicitation. This submission satisfies the requirement to provide EFT information under paragraphs (b)(1) and (j) of the clause at 52.232 34, Payment by Electronic Funds Transfer Other than Central Contractor Registration.

- (1) The solicitation number (or other procurement identification number).
- (2) The offeror's name and remittance address, as stated in the offer.
- (3) The signature (manual or electronic, as appropriate), title, and telephone number of the offeror's official authorized to provide this information.

(4) The name, address, and 9 digit Routing Transit Number of the offeror's financial agent.

- (5) The offeror's account number and the type of account (checking, savings, or lockbox).
- (6) If applicable, the Fedwire Transfer System telegraphic abbreviation of the offeror's financial agent.
- (7) If applicable, the offeror shall also provide the name, address, telegraphic abbreviation, and 9 digit Routing Transit Number of the correspondent financial institution receiving the wire transfer payment if the offeror's financial agent is not directly on line to the Fedwire and, therefore, not the receiver of the wire transfer payment.

(End of Provision)

## c. Financial Capacity

The offeror shall indicate if it has the necessary financial capacity, working capital, and other resources to perform the contract without assistance from any outside source. If not, indicate the amount required and the anticipated source.

## d. Incremental Funding

An incrementally funded cost-reimbursement contract is a contract in which the total work effort is to be performed over a multiple year period and funds are allotted, as they become available, to cover discernible phases or increments of performance. The incremental funding technique allows for contracts to be awarded for periods in excess of one year even though the total estimated amount of funds expected to be obligated for the contract are not available at the time of the contract award. If this requirement is specified elsewhere in this RFP, the offeror shall submit a cost proposal for each year. In addition, the following provision is applicable:

## Incremental Funding, HHSAR 352.232-75 (January 2006)

- (a) It is the Government's intention to negotiate and award a contract using the incremental funding concepts described in the clause entitled Limitation of Funds as specified in FAR 52.232-22. Under the clause, which will be included in the resultant contract, initial funds will be obligated under the contract to cover the first year of performance. The Government intends to allot additional funds up to and including the full estimated cost of the contract for the remaining years of performance by contract modifications. However, the Government is not obligated to reimburse the Contractor for costs incurred in excess of the periodic allotments, nor is the Contractor obligated to perform in excess of the amount allotted.
- (b) The Limitation of Funds clause to be included in the resultant contract, as specified in FAR 52.232-22, shall supersede the Limitation of Cost clause found in the Section I, Contract Clauses.

(End of provision)

### e. Facilities Capital Cost of Money, FAR 52.215-16, (June 2003)

(This is applicable if you are a commercial organization.)

(a) Facilities capital cost of money will be an allowable cost under the contemplated contract, if the criteria for allowability in FAR 31.205-10(b) are met. One of the allowability criteria requires the prospective Contractor to propose facilities capital cost of money in its offer.

(b) If the prospective Contractor does not propose this cost, the resulting contract will include the clause Waiver of Facilities Capital Cost of Money.

(End of Provision)

If the offeror elects to claim this cost, the offeror shall specifically identify or propose it in the cost proposal for the contract by checking the appropriate box below.

[ ] Fac Cap Cost of Money (Has) The prospective Contractor has specifically identified or proposed facilities capital cost of money in its cost proposal and elects to claim this cost as an allowable cost under the contract. Submit Form CASB-CMF (see FAR 31.205-10).

[ ] Fac Cap Cost of Money (Has Not) **has not** specifically identified or proposed facilities capital cost of money in its proposal and elects not to claim it as an allowable cost under the contract.

### 10. Qualifications of the Offeror

You are requested to submit a summary of your "General Experience, Organizational Experience Related to this RFP, Performance History and Pertinent Contracts."

## a. General Experience

General experience is defined as general background, experience and qualifications of the offeror. A discussion of proposed facilities which can be devoted to the project may be appropriate.

# b. Organizational Experience Related to the RFP

Organizational experience is defined as the accomplishment of work, either past or on-going, which is comparable or related to the effort required by this RFP. This includes overall offeror or corporate experience, **but not** the experience and/or past performance of individuals who are proposed as personnel involved with the Statement of Work in this RFP.

### c. Performance History

Performance history is defined as meeting contract objectives within **delivery** and **cost schedules** on efforts, either past or on-going, which is comparable or related to the effort required by this RFP.

## d. Pertinent Contracts

Pertinent contracts is defined as a listing of each related contract completed within the last three years or currently in process. The listing should include: 1) the contract number; 2) contracting agency; 3) contract dollar value; 4) dates contract began and ended (or ends); 5) description of contract work; 6) explanation of relevance of work to this RFP; 7) actual delivery and cost performance versus delivery and cost agreed to in the contract(s). For award fee contracts, separately state in dollars the base fee and award fee available and the award fee actually received. The same type of organizational experience and past performance data should be submitted.

### e. Pertinent Grants

List grants supported by the Government that involved similar or related work to that called for in this RFP. Include the grant number, involved agency, names of the grant specialist and the Science Administrator, identification of the work, and when performed.

You are cautioned that omission or an inadequate or inaccurate response to this very important RFP requirement could have a negative effect on the overall selection process.

Experience and past performance are factors which are relevant to the ability of the offerors to perform and are considered in the source selection process.

### 11. Subcontractors

If subcontractors are proposed, please include a commitment letter from the subcontractor detailing:

- a. Willingness to perform as a subcontractor for specific duties (list duties).
- b. What priority the work will be given and how it will relate to other work.
- c. The amount of time and facilities available to this project.
- d. Information on their cognizant field audit offices.
- e. How rights to publications and patents are to be handled.
- f. A complete cost proposal in the same format as the offeror's cost proposal.

## 12. Proposer's Annual Financial Report

A copy of the organization's most recent annual report must be submitted as part of the business proposal.

## 13. Representations and Certifications - SECTION K

One copy of SECTION K (which includes FAR Clause 52.204-8 Annual Representations and Certifications) shall be completed and be signed by an official authorized to bind your organization. Additionally, a completed copy of SECTION K shall be submitted from any proposed subcontractor. SECTION K can be found at: http://rcb.cancer.gov/rcb-internet/wkf/sectionk.pdf

# 14. Travel Costs/Travel Policy

## a. Travel Costs - Commercial

Costs for lodging, meals, and incidental expenses incurred by Contractor personnel shall be considered to be reasonable and allowable to the extent they do not exceed on a daily basis the per diem rates set forth in the Federal Travel Regulations, General Services Administration (GSA). Therefore, if travel costs are applicable and proposed by offerors, please be advised that they shall be calculated using the per diem rate schedule as established by GSA. Reimbursement of travel costs under any contract awarded from this RFP shall be in accordance with FAR 31.205-46.

# b. Travel Policy

One copy of the offeror's (and any proposed subcontractor's) written travel policy shall be included in the business proposal (original only). If an offeror (or any proposed subcontractor) does not have a written travel policy, the offeror shall so state.

## **SECTION M - EVALUATION FACTORS FOR AWARD**

### 1. GENERAL

The major evaluation factors for this solicitation include technical (which encompasses experience and past performance factors) cost/price factors and Small Disadvantaged Business (SDB) Participation. Although technical factors are of paramount consideration in the award of the contract, cost/price and SDB participation is also important to the overall contract award decision. All evaluation factors other than cost or price, when combined, are significantly more important than cost. The Government intends to make an award(s) to that offeror whose proposal provides the best overall value to the Government.

The evaluation will be based on the demonstrated capabilities of the prospective Contractors in relation to the needs of the project as set forth in the RFP. The merits of each proposal will be evaluated carefully. Each proposal must document the feasibility of successful implementation of the requirements of the RFP. Offerors must submit information sufficient to evaluate their proposals based on the detailed criteria listed below.

### 2. MANDATORY QUALIFICATION CRITERIA

Listed below are mandatory qualification criteria. The Offeror must provide a copy of the appraisal that certifies that it has achieved CMMI Level III or higher IN ONE CLEARLY MARKED SECTION OF ITS PROPOSAL, additionally the offeror must indicate its CCMI Level certification on the face page of both the technical and business proposal.

The qualification criteria establishes conditions that must be met at the time of receipt of proposals by the Contracting Officer in order for your proposal to be considered any further for award.

CMMI Level 3 Certification - The Prime Offeror must be functioning at the CMMI level 3 certification stage.

### 3. EVALUATION OF OPTIONS AND AWARD TERMS

It is anticipated that any contract awarded from this solicitation will contain both option and award term provision(s) and period(s).

In accordance with FAR Clause 52.217-5, Evaluation of Options, (July 1990), the Government will evaluate offers for award purposes by adding the total price for all options to the total price for the basic requirement, except when it is determined in accordance with FAR 17.206(b) not to be in the Government's best interests. Evaluation of options will not obligate the Government to exercise the option(s).

### 4. TECHNICAL EVALUATION CRITERIA

The evaluation criteria are used by the technical evaluation committee when reviewing the technical proposals. The criteria below are listed in the order of relative importance with weights assigned for evaluation purposes.

### A. Personnel and Experience 40%

1. Qualifications of Senior Staff (Principal Investigator, Project Director, Head, Software Engineer/ Senior Analysts, Subject Matter Experts and Lead Software Developers and Statistical Programmer)

- Knowledge and experience in developing, implementation and management of a large scale (>1 million lines of code or equivalent) software systems in a biomedical environment.
- Demonstrated experience in the development, implementation, management, and maintenance of large scale database systems, in an NT Server, RAID-5 Server and Oracle® Environment.
- Knowledge of applying CMMI best practices
- Experience in the use of CASE tools, such as Oracle Designer 2000®, Oracle Developer 2000®.
- Experience in the development, implementation and maintenance of "Client Server" applications.
- Knowledge and experience with Windows NT Server and application within a LAN environment.
- Experience in development, implementation and maintenance of 'Web' applications, and Web services within the context of a service oriented architecture.
- Knowledge and experience with the latest Internet technologies (i.e. XML, HTML, JAVA).
- Knowledge and experience with the latest Internet security tools and measures.
- Knowledge and experience with change management applications and processes required for a large software development effort that will involve system integration, convergence and legacy migration activities.
- Knowledge of caGRID tools and caBIG<sup>™</sup> compatibility requirements for bronze, silver, and gold compatibilities.
- Knowledge of best practice for IT and data governance to support a balanced scorecard approach for strategic alignment.
- Knowledge of best practice for implementing and sustaining data quality at the enterprise level.
- Knowledge in applying earned value management for IT projects to meet Capital Planning Investment Control (CPIC) requirements.
- Knowledge of biomedical informatics within the context of clinical trial management systems environment.
- 2. Qualification of non-senior professional staff members (programmers, programmer/analysts).
- Knowledge and experience in developing, implementation and management of a large-scale (>1 million lines of code or equivalent) software development effort in a biomedical environment.
- Experience with recognized standard systems development methodology.
- Training and experience of the Software engineers in the use of Oracle CASE Tools, (i.e. Oracle Designer 2000® and Oracle Developer 2000®.)
- Knowledge and experience of the Software Engineers in the development and maintenance of large scale database systems in an NT Server, RAID-5 Server, Oracle, and Oracle WEB server environments.
- Demonstrations of the Software testers documented training and experience in the testing and validation of newly developed software.
- Experience with processes to assure quality of data captured and maintained in a large-scale database.
- Experience with development and maintenance of support materials and other documentation for custom software. Including mature change management, configuration management, help desk management, test management, etc.
- Demonstrated experience with knowledge acquisition, joint applications development/rapid application deployment methods.
- Experience with the development of promotional materials to demonstrate custom software applications.
- Experience with development, implementation and maintenance of training programs for custom software.
- Knowledge and experience with common Web page development tools.
- 3. Combined range of experience
- Breadth and depth of composite experience of the proposed team members with the software products used by CTEP.
- Composite experience of the proposed team members in bio-medical information management and automation.

• Knowledge and experience in developing, implementation and management of a large scale (>1 million lines of code or equivalent) software systems in a biomedical environment.

- Demonstration of ability to work with other contractors on joint system integration projects.
- 4. Demonstrated experience of proposed staff working together as a team. Evidence of a stable workforce and ability to recruit and retain staff.
- 5. Demonstrated availability of personnel.

## B. Adequacy of Technical Approach and Understanding of the Project 40%

- 1.Demonstrated experience of the organization as a whole which indicates history with leading, participating, and contributing to various projects of equivalent scope, size and mission.
- 2. Demonstration of an understanding of the needs of the project. Demonstration of an understanding of the oncology community and cancer clinical research. Explanation of the methods and approach for accomplishing the tasks outlined in the Statement of Work (Section 1 to 8) in a secure, flexible and user-friendly environment. Ability to meet with CTEP personnel on short notice.
- 3. Demonstrated understanding of Quality Assurance (QA) methods, goals and objectives. Specific descriptions of how the work performed will meet or exceed Quality Assurance goals shall be included. Demonstration of approach to development of a QA plan, evaluation of activities covered in the QA plan, and method used to update the QA plan.
- 4. Demonstrate a plan to optimize data quality and timeliness of projects and tasks as detailed in the Statement of Work. Including provision of a quality assurance plan to demonstrate overall project efficiency, productivity and cost-effectiveness.
- 5. Demonstration of the ability to provide daily contact with CTEP staff by the Project Managers, Head Software Engineer, System Analysts, Programmers, Data Technicians, and IT Security Managers to discuss and advise on technical problems and to review data for all CTEP systems.
- 6. Demonstration of a management plan which will provide CTEP Project Officers up to date financial, project/subproject status, and personnel information. The plan should include methods to demonstrate cost of ownership, earned value management, and multiple baseline data, IT enterprise evolution utilizing an enterprise unified process approach.
- 7. Demonstrated experience with best business practices utilizing CMMI level 3 and associated specific practice tools (i.e., rational unified process, enterprise unified process).
- 8. Demonstration of a transition plan that would support a smooth transfer of responsibility from the incumbent Contractor.
- 9. Plan for providing training, including provision of facilities and equipment for hands-on computer training.

### C. Past Performance 20%

- 1. The Government will evaluate the offeror's past performance based on information obtained from references provided by the offeror, other relevant past performance information obtained from other sources known to the Government, and any information supplied by the offeror concerning problems encountered on the identified contracts and corrective action taken.
- 2. The Government will assess the relative risks associated with each offeror. Performance risks are those associated with an offeror's likelihood of success in performing the acquisition requirements as indicated by that offeror's record of past performance.

- 3. The Government will consider the currency and relevance of the information, source of the information, context of the data, and general trends in the offeror's performance.
- 4. The lack of a relevant performance record may result in an unknown performance risk assessment, which will neither be used to the advantage nor disadvantage of the offeror.
- 5. Listed below are past performance subfactors and the weights to be used for evaluation purposes.
- 6. The past performance subfactors are listed below in order of relative importance. These subfactors will be used to evaluate the quality of past performance.
  - a. Record of success in activities involving clinical trials, oncology, and other biomedical fields
  - b. Record of success in contracts with bioinformatics, particularly large scale activities.
- c. Record of success in contracts providing development, maintenance, and help desk support for IT networks.
  - d. Record of cost containment in providing services under contract.

### 5. EXTENT OF SMALL DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS PARTICIPATION

**SDB participation will not be scored**, but the Government's conclusions about overall commitment and realism of the offeror's SDB Participation targets will be used in determining the relative merits of the offeror's proposal and in selecting the offeror whose proposal is considered to offer the best value to the Government.

The extent of the offeror's Small Disadvantaged Business Participation Targets will be evaluated before determination of the competitive range. Evaluation of SDB participation will be assessed based on consideration of the information presented in the offeror's proposal. The Government is seeking to determine whether the offeror has demonstrated a commitment to use SDB concerns for the work that it intends to perform.

Offers will be evaluated on the following sub-factors:

- a. Extent to which SDB concerns are specifically identified
- b. Extent of commitment to use SDB concerns
- c. Complexity and variety of the work SDB concerns are to perform
- d. Realism of the proposal
- e. Past performance of offerors in complying with subcontracting plan goals for SDB concerns and monetary targets for SDB participation
- f. Extent of participation of SDB concerns in terms of the value of the total acquisition.

# 6. EVALUATION OF BUSINESS PROPOSAL

6. A cost realism analysis will be conducted to determine whether the estimated proposed cost elements are realistic for the work to be performed; reflect a clear understanding of the requirements; and are consistent with the unique methods of performance and materials described in the offeror's technical proposal. Proposed costs will be evaluated for reasonableness, allowability, and allocability. This analysis is intended to determine the degree to which costs and fee included in the proposal are fair and reasonable.
