Requirements

- Have one year of experience that included such duties as entering and updating information in databases, maintaining manual and automated records, and serving the public; experience in drug testing, police work or other criminal justice positions is desirable but not mandatory; or have a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice, Sociology, Psychology, Social Work, or a related field; or a combination of education and specialized experience as described above. You must have completed more than 60 semester hours with an appropriate major to qualify on this basis.
- Must either be under age 37 when first hired into the occupation or have previous service in another law enforcement position.
- U.S. Citizenship
- May be required to work in shifts or at unusual hours, including nights, weekends and holidays.



Drug Testing Technician

Monitor submission of urine samples by defendants, offenders or respondents under Court and post-sentence orders for drug testing, and ensures maintenance of chain-of-custody procedures for samples; may travel to halfway house to perform testing duties; take photographs, verify addresses and update information in automated systems; explain drug testing procedures and distribute collection materials to individuals.
