EPA Developing Innovative Approach to ACE Integration

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is currently working on a cutting edge proof of concept design to demonstrate a potential new approach for interoperating with the ACE system. Under the leadership of Mark Luttner, Director of Office of Information Collection, EPA plans to leverage current technology that the agency uses to exchange data with 50 states, 7 Indian tribes, and one territory. This technology uses an open source web service platform and provides for the efficient and timely transfer of information. EPA plans to start implementing their proof of concept in January of 2008. The implementation of this technology has the potential to be significantly more cost effective and faster to implement then current methods. The term subject matter expert does not do justice to the amount of experience that Cornelia Mueller has accumulated throughout her career at the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). In 1977, with a freshly minted Biology degree, Cornelia joined APHIS and began her career as an Animal Health Technician. Over the course of the next 30 years her career would entail everything from working side by side with customs officers at the port to working in the Smuggling Interdiction Trade Compliance Program. As a lead member on this program Cornelia would visit multicultural commerce sites that carry products that may not be found in any other place in the world and ensure all APHIS regulations were being followed. During her 30 year career Cornelia has spent time at almost every major port in the country, as well as served on several overseas assignments.

PGA Spotlight: "ACE is the Place" Cornelia Mueller of APHIS

APHIS works in constant and close collaboration with customs officials at the port. Cornelia learned early on that the collaboration between CBP and APHIS is critical. As a member of the Plant Protection and Quarantine (PPQ) unit Cornelia worked with customs officials to facilitate the success of the APHIS mission at the border. With the advent of the ACE program, this collaboration at the border between APHIS and CBP has been streamlined and taken great strides to increase field operations efficiency.

The ITDS program has drawn on Cornelia's vast experience and knowledge base to integrate APHIS business processes into the ITDS/ ACE program. Cornelia has been an integral member of the ITDS team since early 2000 when she participated in assessing and defining how APHIS field operations currently interacted with existing CBP technology. Additionally, she has been vital in analyzing how APHIS looks at their service to all of their stakeholders and customers, and identifying touch points where the ACE system could streamline these operations. During the course of Cornelia's participation she has worked with over 100 potential ACE users to define how APHIS will interact with the ACE system. She has also served as a project champion and generated significant agency level support for the implementation of ACE.

Today, thanks much in part to Cornelia's participation, APHIS is reaping the rewards of the ACE system. Several APHIS employees have access to ACE and are able to view critical import information in a timely matter. As Cornelia stated "the time factor is one huge advantage of ACE! ACE will give you information in 1-2 minutes on queries of imports". Prior to ACE that 1-2 minute process could take potential hours sifting through mounds of paperwork. ACE has also helped APHIS identify potential dangerous shipments prior to port arrival and facilitated timely collaboration with CBP.

Looking to the future APHIS looks forward to continued close collaboration with CBP through the use of the ACE system. Some future benefits that they look forward to are the ability to house certificates of origins, statements, etc. in one place. This single system con-
