
Resident recalls days aboard **USS Silversides**

Message from the Chief Operating Officer



Happy New Year!
Before we take the big plunge into the new year, share with me a moment of reflection on all that has been accomplished this past year.

Without a doubt, 2008 was a year for new beginnings. In Gulfport, we broke ground for our new Home. The collaborative efforts of our DC staff members working with our contracted design/build team is paying off as you can see in the

progress of the construction that has occurred. As the building evolves from a vision to reality, from sketches and drawings to concrete and mortar, we can begin to feel the anticipation and excitement of our residents who are waiting to move back home. If you will recall, a year ago the last pieces of the former building had just been removed and the property where the new Home is being constructed was scraped clean. The progress of the new facility is tracking smoothly and on time. Our new Home is being designed as a state of the art LEED (Leadership in Engineering and Excellence in Design) facility. It will no doubt be a place that our veterans will be proud to call 'Home.'

In anticipation of the move back to Gulfport and upcoming Scott project, staff are engaged on these efforts to put contracts in place and to accommodate activities related to the construction and renovations. The Scott project will update and reshape the Washington facility and encompass both renovation and new construction, which will address all levels of care and many of our resident programs found in the Scott Building and many of our older facilities. Our initial

funding for the design has been received and we are off to a good start with GSA, our Project Manager.

Last February, here on our DC campus, President Lincoln's Cottage opened to the public for the first time. The cottage, which is next to the Sherman Building, underwent a \$17 million restoration funded by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a private, non-profit organization. The close proximity of this historic treasure gives our residents a wonderful opportunity to step back in time and see firsthand the life of our nation's President in the 1860s. It is indeed a welcome addition to our campus and in fact, enhances our vision of preserving our military heritage.

Over at the Wellness Center, a display case has been installed as another means of preserving our military heritage. Although this first display case is designated to showcase Army memorabilia, each branch of service will have its own. Residents are encouraged to add personal items of interest to display cases to share with everyone. You may also have noticed several new benches around campus. The benches were donated by various individuals to honor a military member of their choosing. Plaques are being made to attach to the benches for all to share in the memory.

During the last 12 months, we hosted 30 active duty tours and reaped the benefit of approximately 3,500 volunteer service hours. The connection we have and continue to build with our military community is invaluable in that it not only demonstrates to these young men and women how their monthly investment is being used, it also strengthens the bond that our residents have with their fellow veterans that are still serving and protecting our country. By talking with our residents, today's military members can learn life lessons that cannot be taught in school. Residents, too, seem to enjoy hearing about new technologies and the advances the military has made since they served. This year we also host-

ed the Military Coalition Group for a quarterly Red, White and Blue luncheon. The Coalition is made up of the top military enlisted members from each service.

This fall, I was very pleased to announce that we received notification of certification from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) - Continuing Care Accreditation Commission (CCAC). This is the first time AFRH applied for and received the five-year accreditation. AFRH was recognized for exemplary conformance in five areas to include the Performance and Accountability Annual Report to Congress, the minimization of long term financial threat to the agency through strategic planning, our sound financial status and wide variety of on and off campus activities offered to our residents. The CARF team collected data over a six- month period before they released their findings. I am very proud of this accomplishment as it marks for us another milestone towards achieving excellence.

These are some of the highlights of our year. We live in an ever- changing world and while sometimes it may be easier to remain in the 'status quo' it is not feasible or acceptable for us to do so. We must be vigilant in preserving the promise to those young men and women standing watch today and we must continually look for ways to improve the facilities and services we offer, it is not only our fiscal and environmental responsibility, it is the right thing to do. Last year we welcomed 157 new veterans to our Home. This year, we will begin to draw down our numbers as we right size for the Scott Project. Over the next several months, the Assisted Living residents will be moved out of the Scott building to King Health Center. The winds of positive change are in the air and we are poised on the edge of 2009, ready to take on the challenges and changes of the new year.

Annual 2008 Count

Bird life at AFRH documented, 27 species identified

Four intrepid souls braved the cold and cloudy day on December 21st to conduct the Annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count on the AFRH grounds. The Bird Count is a citizen-scientist effort to document our winter resident bird life that has been going on for over 100 years. They had already surveyed Catholic University Campus and the MacMillan Reservoir that morning and were eager to add to their species count here. They were not disappointed!

Aside from the usual Canada Geese on the fields and Mallard Ducks on the pond, they saw Red-Tailed Hawks, a Red

Shouldered Hawk, Blue Jays, Red Bellied Woodpeckers, Downy Woodpeckers, and way back in the corner, a Ruby-Crowned Kinglet, popping around an evergreen tree. The crows were not happy with the Red Shouldered Hawk and came cawing up the hill to harass him. He just ducked down into the underbrush until they flew over and then surfaced again to sit very quietly and give the birders time to identify him completely. The wintery mix that was promised for the evening hours could be smelled on the wind and clearly affected the birding, but the group was pleased to come away from their Count for 2008 with a total of 27 species.



1881 Governor of the Home Was Embroiled In Political Controversy

Gen. Sturgis was one of the Last Active Duty Governor

Compared with the massive scandals in the War Department, Indian Bureau, and the Cabinet during the post-Civil War years, minor abuses in the administration of Soldiers' Home in 1882 were, at most, a "tempest in a teapot."

Three decades after the Home's establishment, three generals, who were members of the Board of Commissioners, considered the Home their fiefdom. Though their rule was benign, complaints were lodged by inmates who were discharged from the Home for behaving, as Gen. McFeely put it, "as if the Home belonged to them."

Col. Samuel Sturgis, 7th Cavalry, was named Governor in 1881 by President

Chester Arthur. The Board was not pleased at the President's choice. Col. Paul R. Goode wrote in the United States Soldiers' Home, "Col. Sturgis, or to give him his brevet rank, Maj.Gen. Sturgis, was a salty and forthright character. He was brevetted four times for gallantry. He now added to his combat record by engaging in battle with the Board of Commissioners."

Col. Sturgis' Background

Accounts of the 7th Cavalry are usually associated with the career of "General" George Armstrong Custer, with little notice to Sturgis, who actually commanded the 7th. The hatred between Sturgis and Custer was malevolent. The "stupendous frauds" in Custer's contracts with merchants were exposed by Sturgis. Custer wanted revenge. Gen. Sheridan recognized their antipathy and kept Sturgis "behind a desk and Custer in the saddle." With the approval of General of the Army W. T. Sherman, Sturgis was detailed to meaningless and humiliating assignments. Sherman and Sheridan enjoyed Custer's planned buffalo hunts with Bill Cody and European royalty, as well as the publicity provided by the entourage of newspaper men at Custer's headquarters. Sturgis was in his office in St. Louis, detailed by Sherman to the Mounted Recruiting Service, when he heard about the Battle of Little Big Horn, and with it the death of the 7th's youngest officer, a recent West Point graduate, Lt. Jack Sturgis, who had requested assignment to his father's regiment.

Sturgis as Governor of Soldiers' Home

Surely Sturgis considered his 1881 appointment as Governor of Soldiers' Home another meaningless assignment. He told the investigating committee, "The general happiness does not appear to have ever attracted the managing authorities. Money seems to have been dealt out with a lavish and unstinted hand in all directions except that leading to the benefit of inmates of the Home."


An inmate said, "I know Gen. Sturgis would give us every favor if he could, but he is hampered by the Board of Commissioners. He cannot lift a finger without the Board. He is here in spite of the Board. They did not want him."

Another inmate's complaint to the investigating committee has a recent ring to it. "We are deprived of rights we ought to have. When I first came here we received clothing and a dollar a month; but after the Supreme Court gave us our pensions, that money was taken away from us and, not satisfied with that, they made us pay for our own washing."

Goode wrote: "The investigation was thorough, fair and spared no one." The Board tried to have the Secretary of War replace Sturgis by a Governor of their choosing, but the colonel remained as Governor until 1885. Relations were not more amiable. The Washington Star even published an article on the subject May 26, 1883.

Sturgis became the last active duty officer named Governor of Soldiers' Home.

Beryl X. Smith, the Soldiers and Airmen's Home's historian pointed out some

of the "good" that came from the Sturgis tenure and the 1882 investigation. "Overall," Smith noted, "I would say that a lot of good came from the Congressional hearing. The Permanent Fund was set up. The Governor became a member of the Board of Commissioners. This meant that the Governor's position gained in prestige with the result that retired generals sought the position. It was revealed that the Home had a lot of money due from the Treasury from such things as unclaimed estates of soldiers who had died, forfeited from desertions, etc."

"The Home provided the sum of \$10,000 to employ clerks to assist the Treasury Department in dispersing funds due the Home. These considerable monies funded one of the Home's biggest construction periods lasting to 1910," Smith explained.

Resident recalls emergency surgery performed at sea during WWII

Sixty-six years ago, as AFRH resident Albert Stegall handed his shipmate a scalpel, he didn't think about everything that could go wrong. Forget the fact that he was a radioman on a submarine far out at sea and 150 feet below the surface, assisting a pharmacist's mate (that had never performed an operation before) in an emergency appendectomy on a crew member that was laid out on the dining

room table in the officer's wardroom. Forget also the fact that an enemy Japanese destroyer was hovering over them and enemy aircraft was circling above. It was Christmas Eve, 1942, and Albert only had one thing on his mind and that was to help save his shipmate's life.

"The guy on the table was a friend of mine," Albert said in an interview earlier this month.


"I was glad I was able to help," he said. "The surgery lasted four hours. It was a long time ago but that was a day

I'll never forget."

The operation, onboard the USS Silversides (SS-236) turned out to be the war's most publicized surgical operation. The Pharmacist's Mate, Thomas Moore, armed with makeshift instruments and a volunteer surgical team, successfully removed a gangrenous appendix from crew member George Platter. It was later reenacted in the movie Destination Tokyo. This particular operation was but one of three appendectomies performed at sea on board U.S. submarines during World War II. The one on Silversides was the only one to be photographed.

During his 20 years with the Navy, Albert served four years onboard the USS Silversides and went on 10 war patrols. He joined the Navy in 1935. His world, like many others, changed forever on December 7, 1941.

"Everything changed that day," Albert recalled. "I was in San Francisco at the time. We were on our way to Pearl Harbor in a matter of days after the bombing. Nothing was



Albert Stegall holds up the photo of the historical emergency surgery that took place at sea in 1942.


the same after that."

Upon retirement, Albert returned to his home state of Tennessee and, with his electronic background, easily got a

ny that made atomic bombs. He was a quality inspector and said the job was very interesting.

Albert joined his fellow veterans at the AFRH four years ago. The 91-year old has four daughters, a son and 20 grandchildren.


Left - the path the Silversides took on her 4th War Patrol.

He finished in first place on the two different occasions during the month in which he averaged 183 for nine games which included four games of 200 or better. He has high series scratch for the month with a 593 which is the second highest for the year in the shootout. Only Ralph Wineland with a 614 has a higher series. He accumulated 15 points for the month which moved him to the top spot for Bowler of the Year honors with 55 points leading both Smokey Prussman and Buron Noel who have 53 points each with one month left. Jim Vancil with 48 points still has an outside chance to make the top spot so it should be an interesting month of December.

Gene Allison has one advantage over

his two closest competitors in his race to win Bowler of the Year. He presently stands in first place as far as finishing in the top four spots the most times during the year and if he should hang on and finish with the most top four finishes for the year that would add five more points to his Bowler of the Year point total. At the present time Smokey Prussman has 15 top four finishes which stands in third place which is worth two points. He trails Bob Schonherr by two for second place which is worth three points. Jim Vancil with 14 top four finishes presently sits in the fourth spot which is worth one point. Another key factor is going to be able to finish in the top four each week the last month which earns valuable points. First place earns five points, second place is worth three points while third place is two points and fourth place one point. So there's several different ways to earn points and it could go down to the final week before a winner is decided. The winner will be announced in my next column.


