## MEMORANDUM ON PROPOSED TARIFF LEGISLATION of the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress <sup>1</sup>

Bill No. and sponsor: H.R. 4314 (Mr. Joseph Crowley of New York).

Proponent name, location: Honeywell International, Inc., Morristown, NJ.

Other bills on product (110<sup>th</sup> Congress only): None.

Nature of bill: Extend the existing temporary duty suspension through December 31, 2011.

Retroactive effect: None.

Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Color video monitors each having a cathode-ray tube and a video display diagonal exceeding 35.56 cm (provided for in subheading 8528.49.40).

#### Product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports:

This product is a video monitor with a cathode-ray tube with a screen size greater than 35.56 cm (14 inches) in video display diagonal, designed for viewing live and recorded video signals from security cameras, video storage devices, and other closed-circuit television (CCTV) equipment. The pertinent HTS subheading covers goods that are non-high definition, have a single picture tube intended for direct viewing, and do not incorporate video recording or reproducing apparatus; that is, they produce an image intended for direct viewing. Unlike video monitors intended for consumer use, these monitors have BNC<sup>4</sup> input connections and video loop-thru connectors to permit increased flexibility of video signal routing and connectivity. These monitors are usually used in applications requiring around-the-clock continuous operation and feature higher reliability than monitors intended for consumer use.

- 4 (a) In General.—Heading 9902.23.53 of the Har-
- 5 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to
- 6 certain color video monitors) is amended by striking the
- 7 date in the effective period column and inserting "12/31/
- 8 2011".
- 9 (b) Effective Date.—The amendment made by
- 10 subsection (a) applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from

- 1 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after
- 2 the date of the enactment of this Act.
