**MEMORANDUM ON PROPOSED TARIFF LEGISLATION
of the 110th Congress¹**

[Date approved: March 26, 2008]²

Bill No. and sponsor: H.R. 4315 (Mr. Joseph Crowley of New York).

Proponent name,³ location: Honeywell International, Inc., Morristown, NJ.

Other bills on product (110th Congress only): None.

Nature of bill: Extend the existing temporary duty suspension through December 31, 2011.

Retroactive effect: None.

Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Color video monitors each having a flat panel screen, BNC input connection and video loop-thru connector, the foregoing with a video display diagonal of either 41.9 cm or more but not more than 44.5 cm, or 47 cm or more but not more than 49.5 cm (provided for in subheading 8528.59.30).

Product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports:

These products are video monitors with flat display panels designed for viewing live and recorded video signals from security cameras, video storage devices, and other closed-circuit television (CCTV) equipment. The pertinent HTS subheading covers complete color flat panel displays other than those of a kind solely or principally used in an automatic data processing machine of heading 8471; the displays may be plasma-type, LCD-type (direct view) or other types. Unlike video monitors with LCD panels intended for consumer use, these monitors have BNC⁴ input connections and video loop-thru connectors to permit increased flexibility of video signal routing and connectivity. The subject monitors are usually used in applications requiring continuous operation and feature higher reliability than monitors intended for consumer use. These two products are differentiated by screen sizes—nominally 17-inch and 19-inch diagonal measurements.

China is the principal import source of these monitors.

⁴ A BNC connector is a “male” connector used to connect video components to coaxial cables. The name reportedly stands for British Naval Connector or Bayonet Nut Connector or Bayonet Neill-Concelman connector, according to various Internet sites.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. CERTAIN COLOR VIDEO MONITORS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Heading 9902.23.52 of the Har-
5 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to
6 certain color video monitors) is amended by striking the
7 date in the effective period column and inserting “12/31/
8 2011”.

9 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by
10 subsection (a) applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from

- 1 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after
- 2 the date of the enactment of this Act.
