## Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Tilting arbor table saws with motors of an output equal to or greater than 1865 watts and less than 2611 watts and with contact detection and reaction systems (provided for in subheading 8465.91.00).

## Product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports:

Tilting arbor table saws are table saws that allow the cut depth or angle to be adjusted. A table saw typically has a heavy cabinet of cast-iron or similar material that acts as a base for the machine. Mounted on the base cabinet is a horizontal, smooth-surface table top. Mounted inside the cabinet is a motor that drives a circular saw blade. The saw blade protrudes through a slot in the table top, thus allowing the saw blade to cut wood workpieces that rest on the table top. The cutting depth is adjustable by raising or lowering the blade height through the slots in the table. This is accomplished typically by a worm gear driven by a hand crank that raises or lowers the arbor (i.e., shaft) on which the saw blade is mounted. The arbor is driven by an electric motor, either directly or by a pulley.

The subject tilting arbor table saws have a motor with an output equal to or greater than 1865 watts and less than 2611 watts. These saws also have a contact detection and reaction system that detects when a person contacts the spinning blade. The system reacts by stopping the blade before further injury occurs.

These saws are imported from Taiwan.

## A BILL

To suspend temporarily the duty on tilting arbor table saws with motors of an output equal to or greater than 1865 watts and less than 2611 watts and with contact detection and reaction systems.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. TILTING ARBOR TABLE SAWS WITH MOTORS OF AN OUTPUT EQUAL TO OR GREATER THAN 1865 WATTS AND LESS THAN 2611 WATTS AND WITH CONTACT DETECTION AND REACTION SYSTEMS.
(a) In GeneraL.-Subchapter II of chapter 99 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States is amended by inserting in numerical sequence the following new heading:

(b) Effective Date.-The amendment made by subsection (a) applies to articles entered, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after the date of the enactment of this Act.
