Public Meeting by Audio Teleconference

April 28, 2005 Noon to 1:00pm, Eastern Time

Summary

Opening Administrative Matters

The Aviation Security Advisory Committee (ASAC) Designated Federal Official (DFO), Joe Corrao, serving as moderator of this meeting, called the ASAC meeting to order at 12:02pm Eastern time. In opening remarks, Mr. Corrao noted that public notice of this meeting, dial-in procedures, and directions to obtain a copy of the Freight Assessment System Working Group (FAS-WG) report were published in the *Federal Register* on April 13, 2005. Mr. Corrao summarized the agenda, outlined conference call procedures for this public teleconference meeting of ASAC, and called the roll. The list of ASAC members and public participants attending this meeting is attached at Appendix A.

Upon establishing the presence of an ASAC quorum, Mr. Corrao called on Mr. Christopher Bidwell, representing the Air Transport Association (ATA) and the FAS-WG, to present a brief summary of the FAS-WG report.

Presentation: Report of the Freight Assessment System Working Group

Mr. Bidwell emphasized the following elements of the FAS-WG report and recommendations:

- The concept of a "freight assessment system" designed to identify air cargo posing an elevated security risk has been, and continues to be, supported by the industry.
- The working group should be extended to provide input to TSA as it designs a freight assessment process.
- A study of existing Customs and Border Protection (CBP) targeting data should be conducted to provide a baseline from which a freight assessment system can be developed. This would help prevent duplication and waste.
- Consideration should be given to using the current Shipper Export Declaration as a model, to capture data at the earliest possible point in the supply chain.
- The assessment process should evaluate the data and assess the risk posed by the cargo. The working
 group feels it should have a conceptual understanding of the process, but not actually determine how it
 works.
- There should be a system of outbound communication from the government that provides real time notification to industry of any cargo found to possess an elevated risk. This should be a green light/red light system that works almost instantaneously, much like the system used to approve credit card purchases.
- Cargo found to possess an elevated security risk should be inspected. However, there must be a process
 to differentiate paperwork and/or computer anomalies from true risk situations. Inspection of cargo should
 be performed by TSA employees.
- No random inspection should be included in the program.
- Implementation of the freight assessment system should be phased in to avoid potential chaos in the supply chain.
- Before final implementation, a pilot program should be established to test the proposed system.
- Before final implementation, a description of the freight assessment system should be released for public comment in a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. Implementation should be by amendment of each regulated party's security program.

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In discussion following Mr. Bidwell's presentation, the following points were made:

- In response to a question, Mr. Corrao clarified that only ASAC members would be permitted to participate in discussion of the FAS-WG report, consistent with ASAC practice for in-person meetings.
- The Airforwarders Association, the Airport Consultants Council, and Victims of Pan Am 103, in separate comments, stated support for the FAS-WG report and recommendations.
- In response to a question, Pamela Hamilton, Director of TSA's Office of Air Cargo Programs, stated that the freight assessment system is being designed by an internal TSA team in collaboration with industry through the ASAC process. Deloitte Consulting is the prime contractor supporting this effort.
- The Coalition of Airline Pilot Associations stated that random inspection of cargo should continue after implementation of a freight assessment system.

Dave Wirsing, representing the Airforwarders Association, moved ASAC to accept the FAS-WG report and recommendations. The motion was seconded by Mr. Bidwell. Following an opportunity for discussion of the motion, ASAC voted unanimously to receive the FAS-WG report and recommendations, and to forward them to TSA for action.

Presentation: Continuation of the Freight Assessment System Working Group.

Pam Hamilton, Director of Air Cargo Programs at TSA, asked ASAC to accept a new task for the FAS-WG. Ms. Hamilton noted that the FAS-WG report (just received by ASAC) recommends a pilot project to test the freight assessment system prior to implementation, and further recommends that the FAS-WG remain in operation through the pilot project to consult with TSA, to review lessons learned, and to help develop recommendations for a path forward after the pilot project. Ms. Hamilton stated that TSA believes that these recommendations have merit, and she asked ASAC to accept a new task for the FAS-WG to authorize undertaking the specified actions.

Following brief discussion, Steve Alterman, representing the Cargo Airline Association, moved ASAC to accept the new task. Paula Hochstetler, representing the Airport Consultants Council, seconded.

One ASAC member representative asked the moderator to restate the motion. Mr. Corrao responded that the motion before ASAC is "to take a new task to keep the Freight Assessment System Working Group intact, and the Freight Assessment System Working Group would be kept intact to consult with TSA on implementation of the FAS Pilot Program, and to help draft recommendations for what happens after the pilot is finished."

Following an opportunity for discussion of the motion, Mr. Corrao called for a vote on the motion. ASAC unanimously accepted the proposed new task for the Freight Assessment System Working Group.

Closing Remarks

In closing remarks, Mr. Alterman asked TSA to keep ASAC informed of later developments with respect to the FAS-WG. Mr. Corrao stated that tentatively, status reports on all four of the existing ASAC working groups are planned for the next ASAC meeting. He stated that the next ASAC meeting is tentatively planned for around the end of the Summer, 2005.

In response to another ASAC member's question, Mr. Corrao stated that a summary of this meeting, together with the list of participants, would be available to ASAC members and the public a few weeks after the meeting, consistent with the customary ASAC process.

<u>Adjournment</u>

The business of the committee concluded, the moderator adjourned the meeting at approximately 12:57pm, Eastern time.
