## **Unmanaged Recreation**



One of the fastest growing forms of outdoor recreation in our National Forests is the use of off-highway vehicles (OHVs), which includes all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and similar motorized means of transportation. Such vehicles allow their riders to go deeper into the woods than was previously possible.



## **Unmanaged Recreation**

- Unmanaged access has led to managed recreation.
- Management of recreation is intended to protect the land and reduce adverse impacts to natural resources while protecting fragile ecosystems.
- The Forest Service works with citizens and recreation organizations to ensure responsible use of OHVs and to assure enjoyable experiences for all users.



## **Summary of the 2005 Travel Management Rule**

- Designate roads, trails, and areas open to motor vehicle use by vehicle class, time of year.
- National framework for local decisions.
- Public involvement, coordination with governmental agencies.
- Designated roads, trails, and areas identified on motor vehicle use map.
- Motor vehicle use inconsistent with designations prohibited.



## NFAB Travel Management Subcommittee Recommendations

- 1. Provide easy access for a variety of motorized and non-motorized users.
- Establish a publicly supported, actively designed, maintained, and enforced travel system.
- 3. All funding options should be pursued.
- 4. Cooperative management between Federal, State, and Local Governments.
- 5. Multiple scale loops tied into local communities.
- 6. Limit noise and conflicts adjacent to communities.



## NFAB Travel Management Subcommittee Recommendations

- 7. Designate some areas for motorized game retrieval.
- 8. Continue managing firewood cutting with firewood permits.
- Allow motorized dispersed camping within 300 feet of a designated motorized route.
- 10. Allow cross-country motorized use only in designated areas.
- 11. Mud-bogging should not be allowed.



## **The Travel Management Vision**

- Extensive public involvement (2003 2007)
- A forest-wide transportation system...
  - environmentally sustainable, economically viable, socially acceptable.
- An OHV trail system consisting of...
  - a main arterial (backbone) system connecting Black Hills communities
  - multiple scale loops branching off the main system, well distributed throughout the Forest,
  - providing for non-motorized users as a conscious, proactive choice.




## The Black Hills NF Travel Management Plan

- The starting point for travel planning is current travel management direction.
- Includes:
  - The forest transportation system; and
  - Existing prohibitions on motor vehicle use.
- State traffic law.


#### 2007 Travel Analysis Process - GIS Modeling Examples

## Criteria for designation of roads, trails, and areas

General criteria for designation of NFS roads, NFS trails, and areas on NFS lands: "...the responsible official shall consider effects on National Forest System natural and cultural resources, public safety, provision of recreational opportunities, access needs, conflicts among users of ..."



#### **Defining our Decision Space**

- Starting with a good inventory of routes:
  - What are the main Forest System roads?
  - What are the closed roads, trails, and areas?
  - What are the county & state Roads? (no authority to designate).
  - What are the private roads we don't control?
  - Whatever is left is what we will have to decide on.
- Main Routes Decision Space Closed



## Scope of Decisions to be Made

- NFS Roads, NFS Trails, Areas on NFS Lands.
  - Not private or county roads, state highways, or non-NFS land.
- Exemptions:
  - Aircraft, watercraft;
  - Over-snow vehicles;
  - Limited administrative use;
  - Emergency, defense, law enforcement;
  - Use specifically authorized in writing.



## **Standard Designations**

- 1. Road open only to highway-legal vehicles.
- 2. Road open to all motor vehicles.
- 3. Trail open to all motor vehicles.
- 4. Trail open only to vehicles ≤ 50 inches in width.
- 5. Trail open only to motorcycles.
- 6. Special local designation.

## **Standard Designations**

	Route Type	Miles
	Road open only to highway-legal vehicles:	1,075
2.	Road open to all motor vehicles:	2,213
3.	Trail open to all motor vehicles:	165
4.	Trail open only to vehicles ≤ 50 inches in width:	437
5.	Trail open only to motorcycles:	79
6.	Special local designation (Rock Crawlers):	29

Total Miles: 3,998



#### **Final Products and Outcomes**

- Updated vehicle designations for lands in Black Hills National Forest.
- Key output will be identifying Designated Routes and what uses are allowed on them.
- A free Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM) that will show vehicle designations in the Black Hills National Forest. This will be the main enforcement tool.
- Selective on-the-ground signing based on "Closed Unless Signed Open" strategy.
