There is no need to give these companies or instititions a substantial windfall by granting them patents. Also, if patents are granted, there will be a race to obtain patents and subsequent litigation (and lawyers' fees) over issues such as priority and the scope of the patents. All of these dead weight costs should be avoided as a matter of public policy. Therefore, I would not allow patents on any aspect of the human genome. I think it is also immoral and generally outside the framework of the patent laws to grant patents on products of nature.
