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# PASSENGER LISTS OF CITIZENS (JUNE 1924BAUG. 1948) AND ALIENS (MARCH 1946BNOV. 1948) ARRIVING AT PENSACOLA, FLORIDA, AND PASSENGER LISTS OF VESSELS DEPARTING FROM PENSACOLA, FLORIDA (AUG. 1926BMARCH 1948)

#### Introduction

On the single roll of this microfilm publication, M2021, are reproduced ship passenger lists of citizens, June 21, 1924 to August 7, 1948, and aliens, March 1, 1946 to November 22, 1948, arriving at Pensacola, Florida, and passenger lists of vessels departing from Pensacola, August 3, 1926 to March 2, 1948. These records are part of the Records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Record Group (RG) 85.

#### Background

Early records relating to immigration originated in regional customhouses. The U.S. Customs Service conducted its business by designating collection districts. Each district had a headquarters port with a customhouse and a collector of customs, the chief officer of the district. An act of March 2, 1819 (3 Stat. 489) required the captain or master of a vessel arriving at a port in the United States or any of its territories from a foreign country to submit a list of passengers to the collector of customs. The act also required that the collector submit a quarterly report or abstract, consisting of copies of these passenger lists, to the Secretary of State, who was required to submit such information at each session of Congress. After 1874, collectors forwarded only statistical reports to the Treasury Department. The lists themselves were retained by the collector of customs. Customs records were maintained primarily for statistical purposes.

On August 3, 1882, Congress passed the first Federal law regulating immigration (22 Stat. 214B215); the Secretary of the Treasury had general supervision over it between 1882 and 1891. The Office of Superintendent of Immigration in the Department of the Treasury was established under an act of March 3, 1891 (26 Stat. 1085), and was later designated a bureau in 1895 with responsibility for administering the alien contract-labor laws. In 1900 administration of the Chinese-exclusion laws was added. Initially the Bureau retained the same administrative structure of ports of entry that the Customs Service had used. By the turn of the century it began to designate its own immigration districts, the numbers and boundaries of which changed over the years. In 1903 the Bureau became part of the Department of Commerce and Labor; its name was changed to the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization when functions relating to naturalization were added in 1906. In 1933 the functions were transferred to the Department of Labor and became the responsibility of the newly formed Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). Under President Roosevelt=s Reorganization Plan V of 1940, the INS was moved to the Department of Justice.

## **Records Description**

Immigration and Naturalization Service passenger lists include the names of U.S. citizens returning from abroad, foreign visitors, and immigrants. The lists also contain names of vessels and shipmasters, ports of arrival and embarkation, and dates of arrival.

The lists of citizen arrivals are one-page forms that include the person's name and age. For native-born citizens, the date and place of birth is indicated. For naturalized citizens, the date and court of naturalization is indicated. If the person became naturalized by reason of marriage to a U.S. citizen, the date and place of marriage is noted. The citizen's U.S. passport number may also be annotated on the form.

Alien passenger lists are two-page forms that include the following information about each passenger: full name; age; sex; marital status; occupation; last residence; port of arrival and final destination in the United States; if the passenger had been in the United States before, when, and where; if the passenger were going to join a relative, the relative's name and address, and relationship. Beginning in 1903, race was included; in 1906, personal description and birthplace; in 1907, the name and address of the alien's nearest relative in the country from which he or she came. Due to the manner in which the records were filmed, the "right side" of the form is located to the left of the "left side."

The passenger lists of departing vessels are one-page forms that include the passenger's name, age, sex, nationality (citizenship), country of future permanent residence, country of birth, country of residence before coming to the U.S., and date and port of arrival in the U.S. For citizens who intend to reside abroad permanently, the person's date and place of birth (for native born citizens) or place of naturalization (for naturalized citizens) is indicated. These lists include "stowaways" being returned to their country of origin.

The records in this microfilm publication are those for the Port of Pensacola, Florida, although some lists indicate arrival at Port St. Joe, Florida, or Charleston, South Carolina. The citizen lists, 1924B1945, are arranged in chronological order, while the remainder of the lists are arranged in reverse chronological order due to the manner in which they were microfilmed. Some lists were filmed out of sequence.

For each vessel, the Table of Contents indicates the date of arrival and port of embarkation or destination. The records are not paginated. See NOTES for explanation of notes (a) through (e).

### General Remarks

The records were microfilmed by the INS on November 6, 1946, and July 12, 16, and 25, 1956, and later transferred to the National Archives on microfilm. Although some of this film may be difficult to read, it is impossible to correct the situation since the INS destroyed the original records.
