The Alaska Division of the U.S. Bureau of Education, 1885–1931

In 1885, the Alaska Division of the Bureau of Education was created within the Department of the Interior to provide education for Native children in Alaska. The Division had a main office in Washington, DC and field offices in Seattle, Washington and, later, Juneau, Alaska. Unlike the Bureau of Indian Affairs program in the western U.S., in Alaska, the Bureau of Education did not construct a network of boarding schools but relied on day schools in every village possible. The Division took on responsibilities beyond education, including the introduction and maintenance of reindeer herding, dental and medical care, the operation of several orphanages

after the devastating 1918-1919 influenza epidemic that killed thousands of Natives on Alaska's west coast, a marketing agency for Native arts and crafts in Seattle, and economic help for the Native population of Alaska. The Alaska Division became one of the largest divisions of the Office of Education. The records of the Alaska Division were transferred to the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) (Record Group 75) when the division was transferred to the BIA in 1931. The Federal Government provided education

for most Natives in Alaska until the 1980s, when the responsibility for their education was funded by the State of Alaska or the locality.

This photograph, dated 1924-1925, is the girls' sewing class for the U.S. Public School at Wainwright. The older girls made school dresses and underclothes for all the girls in the school. The younger girls hemmed towels and made curtains, handkerchiefs, and other items. Regular sewing classes were held practically every week during the school term.

The U.S. Public School at Wainwright was completed in 1905, with a capacity for sixty students. They had a classroom,

a Native store, a shop, a living room, kitchen, pantry, hallway, and teacher living quarters. The school was heated by gas lamp. There was no indoor plumbing, as no water or sewer connections existed. Wainwright, located on the shore of the Arctic Ocean, was icebound and inaccessible, except in August of each year.
