BPMM Summary

The Division of STD Prevention has completed an 18 month collaborative initiative with state and local health departments to define leading practices for STD prevention and document the requirements for technology applications that support STD leading practices. Through collaborative efforts between the Division of STD Prevention and its grantees, participants have accomplished the goals of the initiative:

- Identify leading practices for STD Prevention processes
- Provide input on STD Program Area Module development, as part of the National Electronic Disease Surveillance System Initiative (NEDSS)
- Outline implementation support for deployment of STD PAM and related business processes

The outputs of the initiative are intended to serve all grantees and inform various application development efforts, including: 1) The STD Program Area Module (PAM) as part of the National Electronic Disease Surveillance System (NEDSS) and, 2) NEDSS-compliant applications being developed by state and local health departments.

Approach

The BPMM team engaged DSTDP staff, state and local health department representatives and external stakeholders to ensure that the STD PAM development and implementation support met the needs of grantees and their local health departments. Materials were drafted through facilitated sessions, workgroups and phone conferences. Using a highly iterative process, deliverables were then circulated to grantees and DSTDP staff for further input. Feedback was incorporated and then validated during workgroups, calls and meetings.

Outputs

A full list of deliverables is attached, along with copies of the materials. Achievement highlights include:

- Documentation of current STD prevention practice for CDC grantees and local health departments
- Documentation of how state and local health departments will use a surveillance and investigation application to promote leading practice for STD Prevention
- Documentation of improvement opportunities and a gap analysis between current practices and identified leading practices
