Discovery Channel Telescope Update

Lowell Observatory recently announced a \$5 million contribution from the John and Maureen Hendricks family in support of the Discovery Channel Telescope (DCT). This is in addition to the \$1 million dollars they contributed to the DCT.

Mr. Hendricks is the founder and Chairman of Discovery Communications. A member of the Lowell Observatory Advisory Board for more than a decade. "In recognition of this generous gift, the existing Planetary Research Center at Lowell Observatory will be renamed the Hendricks Center for Planetary Studies," said Lowell Trustee William Lowell Putnam. Mr. Putnam also said that while the Observatory remains open to the possibility of an additional university or observatory partner in the project, such a partner is no longer essential to completion of the telescope in 2010.

Currently the telescope's 14-foot diameter primary mirror, built by Corning Inc. in Canton, New York is being figured and polished to its precise final shape by the College of Optical Sciences at the University of Arizona in Tucson. The second phase is planned after the telescope is fully operational and would add a state-of-the-art prime focus camera to the telescope. With the addition of a \$10 million camera, the telescope is expected to be one of the most effective asteroid trackers in the world.


According to Lowell Director, Bob Millis, the Discovery Channel Telescope will be applied to a variety of research topics spanning the gamut of modern astrophysics and planetary science. Of particular near-term interest are studies of distant bodies in our solar system including Pluto and its trans-Neptunian neighbors, searches for planets orbiting other stars. And investigations of how stars form in our own galaxy and beyond.

This has been a very exciting and rewarding project for the Mogollon Rim Ranger District certainly not excluding the local community of Happy Jack! We are excited that a project such as this, that is so immense, will be a large economic boost! According to a study by the Center for Business Outreach at Northern Arizona University. The Discovery Channel Telescope will increase Arizona's economic output by more than \$576 million over its 50-year expected useful lifetime! Wow!

April is Tax and Wood Cutting Month!



They seem to blend right together don't they? Taxes are due April 15th and firewood cutting season begins April 14th!

There are no new changes this year, with the exception of more free use wood cutting areas. It is still \$5 per cord, with a minimum purchase of 4 cords, thus \$20. You may cut any wood that is dead and down with your permit. There are some species that you may cut dead standing, there will be specific do's and don'ts for dead standing trees and these will all be listed in the firewood guide you receive when you purchase your permit.

You may purchase up to 10 cords of wood per firewood cutting season, but please remember it is ALWAYS a minimum purchase of 4 cords. Before you come in think ahead and make sure you are getting enough cords to get you through next winter.

Forest Roads



Very slowly we have been able to re-open forest roads that were closed due to weather this past winter. At this time we are still not able to open the two most popular roads on the Mogollon Rim Ranger District, FR95 and FR300 (Rim Road). We have re-opened the road to Blue Ridge Reservoir, so the anglers can get in!
