What is the Most Dangerous Weather Event in Terms of Lives Lost?

Lightning! Follow these rules and it may save your life:

 Keep an eye on the sky and when a thunderstorm threatens, doors or an enclosed vehicle.



stay in-

- Do NOT use the telephone except for emergencies.
- If you get caught outside, avoid tall, isolated trees and utility poles. Avoid projecting above the landscape; don't stand on a hilltop. In a forest seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees. In open areas go to a low place such as a ravine or valley.
- Get off and away from water. Avoid tractors, farm equipment, motorcycles, golf carts and other metal vehicles. Avoid lines, wire fences, metal pipes and other railings. Put down golf clubs. If you are in a group, stay apart.
- If you are in an enclosed building, close all windows. Lightning follows air currents.

MONSOON FACTS AND FIGURES

Average Date of Monsoon Beginning	July 7th

Statistically, it is considered a "monsoon day" when the average daily dew point is 55 degrees or higher. When the weather forecast calls for thundershowers or thunderstorms, take it seriously. It means that lightning is possible. Lightning kills 125 people on the average every year in the United States and injures over 500. We have had a good monsoon season in our area for this year, however the monsoon is most pronounced in southern Arizona and becomes more marginal over northern Arizona. The end of our wonderful monsoons normally comes in the latter half of September state wide. Not much longer folks!

Fossil Creek Restoration & Childs-Irving Hydropower Decommissioning Project

Fast approaching is the beginning of the Childs-Irving power plant decommissioning process and preparation for restoring natural water flow to Fossil

Creek. For nearly a century 95% of the stream flow has been diverted from Fossil Creek within a 1/4 mile of its spring-based origin by a dam to supply two hydroelectric power plants at Irving and Childs.

In 1999, Arizona Public Service (APS) took a bold step and, in partnership with numerous conservation groups, agreed to "decommission" the Childs-Irving hydroelectric facilities. Arizona Public Service (APS) felt that this was a rare opportunity to return the area to its original, unique condition. APS will begin the process of removing hydroelectric facilities this fall and full flows will be returned to Fossil Creek by the end of 2004.

Prior to the return of full flows, research and monitoring will be on-going to help determine the effects of this unique opportunity to restore a free-flowing creek.
