The unintended consequence of a classic regulatory approach to Environmental Health issues in Florida is that citizens do not receive the full complement of services needed to protect their health and safety.


Background

Primarily focused on regulatory functions


Reactive to new and emerging threats.

Over time Environmental Health programs have been under funded and most recently they have been subjected to budget reduction. This budget reduction has also impacted the ability to hire qualified staff to manage the core program functions. While the programs are operating at zero base budget we have seen new and emerging threats to the public health.


Causal Loop Diagrams and applicable archetypes



Project Logic Model



Goal: Increase the health of the public by ensuring that local county health departments have the capacity to provide the Ten Essential Environmental Public Health Services




County population vs. EH Budget

Contributing Factors

- 1. Lack of public awareness of available EH Services.
- Lack of CHD staff awareness of the level of services being provided.
- 3. Program evaluation are not based on delivery of the 10 Essential Services.

Conclusions

Tool scoring could be based on perception. Involve stakeholders to raise community awareness and measure perceptions. Budget constraints are a barrier to demand for increased services. Identified concern of increased staff work load

Benefits/Next Steps

Stakeholder satisfaction process for one program. Will use results for ongoing improvement.

Encourage use of tool to evaluate performance related to outcomes rather than outputs.

Seek or recommend changes to evaluation process to reward local CHD's for looking at the bigger picture of Environmental Health.

Recommendations

Encourage Local EH programs to apply the tool to gain valuable insight from capacity gap analysis and the resulting action plans.

Involve community partners and stakeholders for raised awareness.
