Home to Wyoming's Highest Peak

The Fitzpatrick Wilderness is a wild and rugged place dominated by glaciated mountains, sheer granite walls, and alpine meadows profuse with wildflowers. The wilderness is 191,103 acres in size and is home to the highest mountain in Wyoming, Gannett Peak. It towers 13,804 feet above sea level - higher than the Grand Teton.

Not as Hardy as It Looks

The ruggedness of this country betrays it natural fragility. Country near or above timberline is extremely sensitive to human impacts. Please practice Leave No Trace as you recreate.



Nature's Extremes

Temperatures here rarely exceed 80 degrees Farenheit, but it may plunge to 40 below in the winter. Snow may fall any day of the year and is the main form of precipitation. There are occasional heavy rains in summer and brief yet fierce afternoon thunderstorms are common.
