

Welcome to Shasta-Trinity National Forest

Listen to the majestic cry of the bald eagle overhead. Watch the northern flicker as it swoops past with brilliant red wings outstretched and white rump patch exposed. A day of birding the Shasta-Trinity National Forest has just begun.

Birdwatching is a great way to enjoy and appreciate the diversity of habitats and wildlife found on these treasured Forest lands. While you enjoy the many outdoor experiences, please respect the land and the wild things that depend upon it. Also, please observe birds quietly and at a distance, particularly nesting eagles and hawks.

Northern California's Shasta-Trinity National Forest contains over 2 million acres of diverse avian habitat. Over 200 bird species require these habitats for year-round residency, spring/ summer breeding and spring/fall stopovers. Breeding birds that migrate south for the winter to tropical environments are called Neotropical Migratory Birds (*). They are of special international concern for conservation. The Forest, along with your support and assistance, conducts conservation efforts which involve bird surveys, habitat improvement and developing awareness. Remember to report unusual sightings and occurrences.
